



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
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





Headlined in this week's issue of the Grosse Pointe News is a story about the proposed merger of the Grosse Pointe Yacht Club and the Detroit Boat Club, now under discussion by the clubs' boards of directors. If the merger goes through the Boat Club, oldest rowing club in the nation, now marking its 125th year, will abandon its longtime site on Belle Isle, once known as Hog Island.

The boat club was the idea of Edward A. Brush and seven other young men of Detroit society who met in his office one cold February day in 1839. Those founding members with Mr. Brush, who was elected president, included his son, Alfred Brush. James A. Armstrong. John Chester, A. J. McReynolds, A. H. Sibley, Alpheus Williams and J. H. Farnsworth.

The first boat house was located on the river at the foot of Randolph street near the Campau warehouse. For \$225 the members bought a 38-foot six-oared racing barge from New York and began boating. They also secured a four-oared clinker barge named the "Georgiana" and raced both barges on the river.

Uniforms for club members on an outing were spectacular. They wore sailor pantaloons of white duck with a black belt, blue shirts with broad square collars, black silk handkerchiefs knotted at the neck, coats of Kentucky jean and chip sailor hats banded in black and covered with white linen.


