Park Residents Plan Drive For Police Pay Increase

Shores—unlimited sick leave for both non-duty and duty connected disability; and retirement at age 55.

St. Clair Shores — 120 days leave for non-duty ailment; unlimited service connected; and retirement at age 55.

Park—65 days leave for non-duty ailment; 130 days for duty connected; and retirement at age 60.

Recently, Park police officers petitioned for a 10 percent increase in pay; 10 cents an hour more for afternoon shift work, and 15 cents more for midnights; longevity; and an increase in insurance benefits, including a fully paid-up life insurance policy in the amount of \$2,500 on retirement.

They also asked that an option be granted to give them the right to purchase additional life insurance, if desired, at the present group rate.

Too, the policemen asked for an increase in the amount of non-duty sick leave from the present 65 days to 130 days; and service-connected sick time from the present 130 to 260 days; and that one-half of the sick days be paid upon retirement in an amount not to exceed 60 days.

Family Forum Series Planned

A new Family Forum series speaker at the St. James Research Group held weekly at St. James Lutheran church on Sunday evenings at 8 p.m. on April 21 and 28 and May 5. Detroit patrolmen — \$6,364; sergeants—\$7,328; longevity — \$300; insurance—\$5,000; shift differential—10 cents an hour for afternoon, 15 cents an hour for midnights.

GP Woods patrolmen—\$6,367; sergeants—\$6,895; longevity — \$300; insurance — \$5,000; no shift differential.

GP Shores patrolmen — \$6,312; sergeants—\$6,792; longevity—\$300; no insurance or differential pay, because this is prohibited by state law because of village status. However, this is taken care of by the high pay.

St. Clair Shores patrolmen—\$5,985; sergeants—\$6,585; longevity—\$300; insurance — \$6,000; shift differential—2 1/2 percent for afternoons and five percent for midnights — plus \$5.00 for each court appearance.

GP Park patrolmen—\$6,134.94; sergeants—\$6,760.49; no longevity; insurance—\$2,000; no shift differential.

Also, Detroit grants its officers 240 days of sick leave for non-duty disability; unlimited leave for service connected disability; and retirement after 25 years of service.

Woods — 90 days non-duty sick leave; unlimited for service connected; and retirement at age 55.

Rickey Peterson Receives Honor

Rickey Peterson, an 11th grade student at Grosse Pointe University School, has been selected as a participant in the National Science Foundation High School Institute to be held at Northeastern University, Boston, Mass., from June 23 to August 2 this summer.

Director Charles M. Goolsby congratulated Peterson for his fine school record and informed him that he was one of 36 young men from 12 states selected from 150 final applicants from 19 states, with assignment to the Electrical Engineering laboratory.

The National Science Foundation grant covers \$600 plus travel expenses, leaving only \$100 to be paid by the student. The teachers from the institute will be drawn from the Northeastern University faculty, with a guidance counselor from the Plymouth, Mass., public schools. Visiting lecturers will be drawn from Harvard, Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Brandeis, Tufts Medical School, and the Marine Biological Laboratories.

The purpose of the Institute is "to supplement high school courses by providing some insights into the fascinating problems that lie at the forefronts of our knowledge. The aims of the program are to help the student better identify those areas of particular interest to him, to aid in his scholarly development through the discussion of topics of fundamental importance with scientists of recognized competence and to acquaint him with some of the methods used in the study of problems in biology and medicine and some of the ways that electronics technology is associated with our advance toward solutions of these and other problems."

"Morning hours will be devoted to lectures and discussions led by outstanding teachers and other authorities at Northeastern and from other Greater Boston universities, research laboratories, and hospitals. There will be a refreshment period during which students may become better acquainted with the visiting lecturers."

"In the afternoon there will be a short essay-writing period dealing with the previous day's work. There will also be periods of laboratory and library work. Each student successfully completing the program will receive a certificate."

Rains of April Finally Arrive

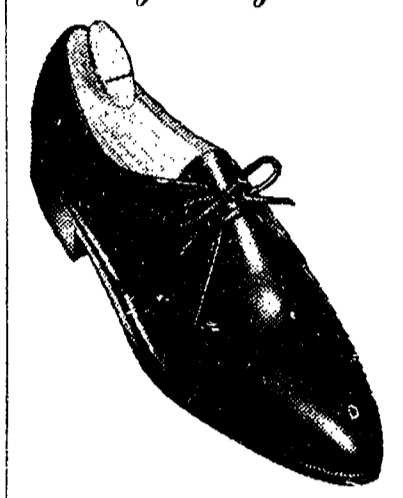
A total of 1.40 inches of rain fell in the Pointe area within a 24-hour period, from 3 p.m. Thursday, April 18, through 3 p.m. Friday, April 19, according to official weather statistics recorded at the Farms Storm Water Pumping Station, Chalfonte and Kerby roads.

Douglas Feben, chief chemist at the station, disclosed that weather reports must be figured on a 24-hour basis.

However, according to the records, from 10 p.m. Thursday, to 9 a.m. Friday, the total rainfall was .98 inches, with the heaviest downpour starting at 12:15 a.m., when 33 inches per-panied by severe thunder and ed the area during a 25-minute lightning.

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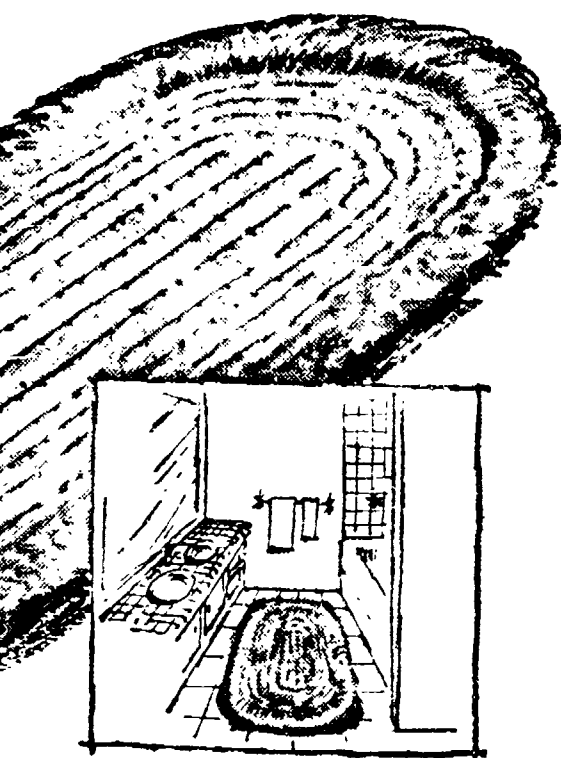

Grosse Pointe winners include four high school students—Robert L. Hudson, Philip J. Pratt, Donald W. Kosy, and Barbara Kerber; three Grosse Pointe University School scholars—Leslie M. Rein, Margaret Van De Graaf, and David W. Hughes; St. Ambrose student Michael H. Roe; and Cass Tech student Keith B. Shoaps.

Robert L. Hudson, son of the S. Lyle Hudsons, of Mt. Vernon avenue, was awarded a National Merit Scholarship. He intends to major in science at Kalamazoo College, and plans a career in research. Hudson ranked first scholastically in a senior class of 734 in 1962, served as an advertising manager and photography editor of the high school paper, "The Tower," in 1962-63; and was a member of the editorial staff of Proem, the school literary magazine, in 1961-62.
