HEADLINES of the WEEK As Compiled by the Grosse Pointe News

Thursday, May 23

THE BLUE SHIELD Board of Directors approved a 16.8 per cent increase for medical insurance early this morning. This boost is to be spread over the next 18 months and, coupled with the 23.4 percent Blue Cross hospital insurance rate increase State Insurance Commissioner Sherwood Colburn ordered earlier, means most "Blue" subscribers will pay a net 20.6 percent additional premium. Wayne County Circuit Judge Theodore R. Bohn approved the Blue Shield rate hike yesterday and Blue Shield board members, after weighing "the financial burden of a mounting deficit at the rate of \$45,000 a day," voted reluctantly in favor of the raise, although Blue Shield deputy executive director Frank O. Starr had previously termed the 16.8 figure inadequate.

Friday, May 24

MICHIGAN'S ATTORNEY GENERAL and the State Police are investigating a Roseville bar owners' \$1,000 corporation contribution to the Democratic State Central Committee, Continental Lanes, Inc. owner of a Class C and SDM license at 31055 Grotuit, contributed the \$1,000 last October, shortly after their liquor license transfer was approved by the State Liquor Control Commission. An additional \$300 donation went to the Democratic Party, reportedly finding its way to a Macomb County Democratic candidate's campaign fund. The law prohibits corporations from making campaign contributions, with penalty for violation set at two years in prison or a \$1,000 fine, or both. "My staff is working with Prosecutor George Parris, of Macomb County," Attorney General Frank J. Kelley noted yesterday. "I'm not prepared to say anything more at this time. I expect some action to be taken in the future."

Saturday, May 25

NIKITA KHRUSHCHEV has promised to visit Cuba, "first socialist state in America." In a joint communique issued Friday at the conclusion of Cuban Prime Minister Fidel Castro's Russian Tour, the Soviet Premier accepted Castro's invitation to call "with gratitude." There was no date mentioned. Khrushchev also pledged Russian military assistance if Cuba is invaded.

Sunday, May 26

PICKET LINES at Cobo Hall have failed to halt work on a trade show being assembled in one of the 10,000-square-foot halls and scheduled to open tomorrow. Only Carpenters Union members formed protest lines at the Civic Center. Electricians, teamsters and members of other craft unions reported for work on schedule. Marvin Grisham and William Powers, banned from Cobo Hall by Civic Center Director John D. McGillis and Mayor Cavanagh for "outrageous and persistent violations" of work rules, marched in the Carpenters Union picket lines. Grisham still insisting the charges against him and his steward are "completely false."

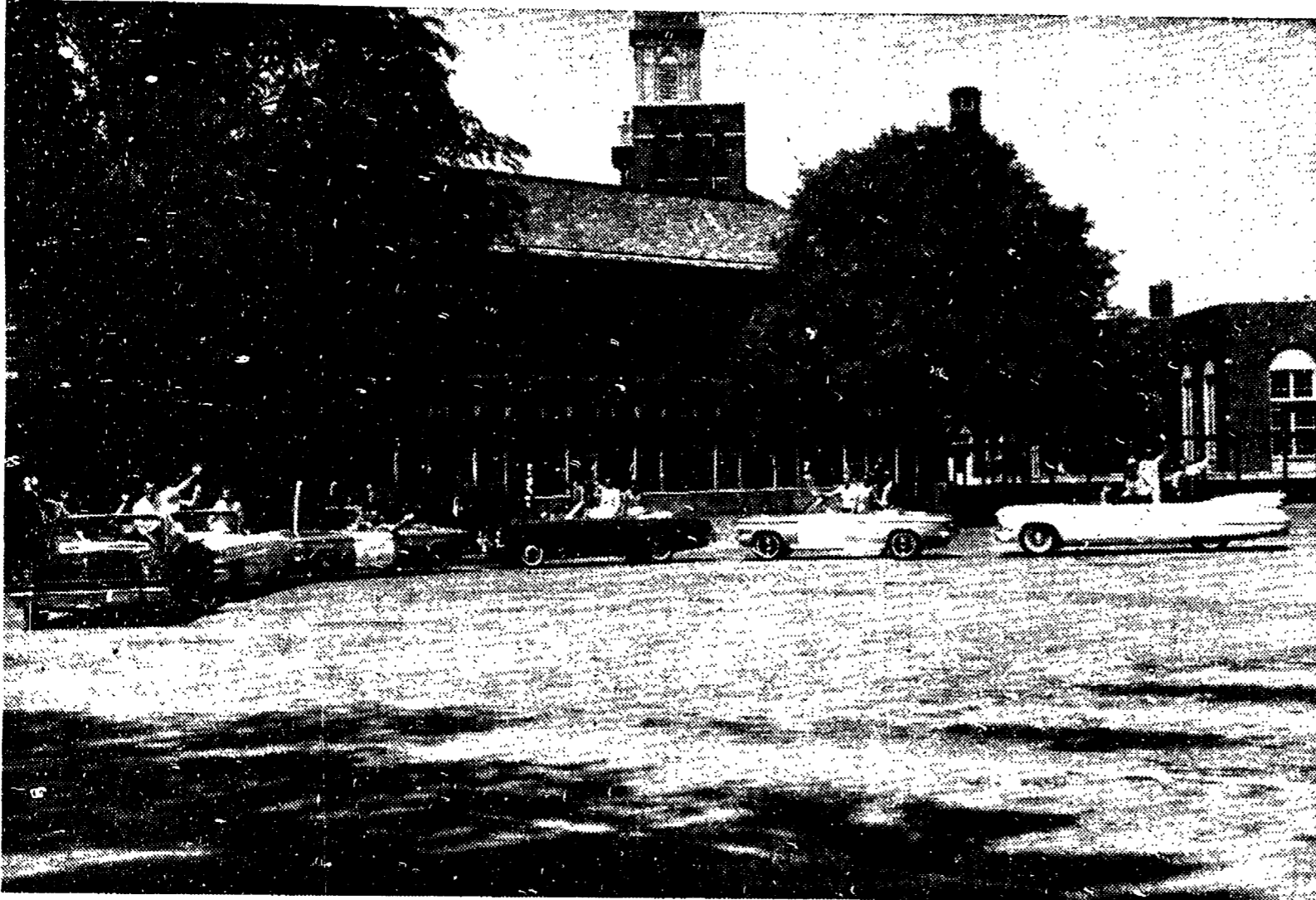
Monday, May 27

Unsoeld and Bishop told of being lost on the slopes of the world's tallest mountain, of kicking each other with spiked boots to maintain circulation in 18-below-zero weather.

Association Gets President Elected To Shores Board

Members of Improvement Organization See Greater Representation for Taxpayers in Village Affairs; Flintermann Defeated

Grosse Pointe Shores residents gained a greater voice in Shores government as a result of last week's election in which they were successful in placing a new member on the Village Board of Trustees.

Arnold P. Fuchs was elected to the board, unseating Donald Flintermann. Fuchs has been president of the Grosse Pointe Shores Improvement Association which was formed a year ago after Shores taxpayers charged that the Trustees were ignoring citizen's requests for greater participation in Village planning, particularly as it concerned the Shores Park.

Members of GPSIA, which represents every area in the village, determined to place one of their members on the Board of Trustees by defeating Flintermann, who, they said, had opposed efforts to open Board meetings to taxpayer participation. The GPSIA also sought successfully to defeat Arthur Sherman, Jr. who had the endorsement of Jack Williams, village president. Because of their willingness to sit down and discuss Shores programs, the group supported Gilbert T. Jerome and John Huettman. Interest in the election was high and resulted in a record voter turnout.

Votes for the three successful candidates were: Huettman, 519; Jerome, 334; and Fuchs, 299. Unsuccessful candidates received: Flintermann, 295; and Sherman, 256. Other members of the Board of Trustees are: Mr. Williams, Alfred T. Wilson, Gerald C. Schroeder, and Benson Ford.

Mr. Fuchs said following the election that he would work to promote better communications between the trustees and the taxpayers of the whole village.

4,000 Donate \$60,000 for Maintenance

Hope Additional Late Gifts Will Care for Sea Wall, Landscaping, Painting and Boiler

The Grosse Pointe War Memorial Association is confident that it will be able to announce the achievement of the \$60,000 Family Participation goal by the target date, Memorial Day, May 30.

Figures at the time of this writing stand only a few dollars short of the amount set for the drive with nearly 4,000 families heard from already. Follow-up telephone calls will be made to as many of the remaining 12,000 families as possible before Memorial Day, which date will officially end the active effort to obtain funds.

The Board of Directors of the Grosse Pointe War Memorial Center through the president, Thomas L. Munson and campaign chairman, Gerald C. Schroeder wish to thank the many donors who have responded so generously and promptly to this 1963 annual appeal of the Center. It is very gratifying to this group of volunteers to have the work of the Center and the facilities of the new Fries addition so well accepted and supported by the community.

Gifts Still Welcome

Though the active campaign will soon draw to a close with the drive goal apparently insured, Mr. Munson wishes to emphasize that gifts will still be hoped for and needed. The Fries Auditorium, magnificent community asset though it is, still does not seem to be operable on the same budget which was approved for Alger House alone as the Board had hoped.

Further, additional sea walls have proved necessary to insure the protection of the building and extensive landscaping is needed to complete the picture. Hopefully, too, funds will be obtained to paint the new edifice to blend with Alger House if these monies are not otherwise needed to replace the 50-year-old boiler in Alger House.

Mutual Fire Aid Board Has Meeting

Reports on Activities to Be Sent to Councils; Inspection Tours Planned

The Grosse Pointe-Harper Woods Fire Mutual Aid Board met Thursday, May 16, in Grosse Pointe Park, with representatives from the Park, City, Farms, Shores and Woods, and Warren Carson of the Grosse Pointe Radio System in attendance.

The Board agreed to send an annual report on mutual aid fire activity to the Councils of all participating communities, and decided that prior to each meeting, (meetings are held every two months) an inspection tour of one of the major buildings in the area covered by the mutual aid pact would be made.

A recommendation that a program of inter-departmental training be instituted was approved. Through this training program, member departments will familiarize themselves with each department's equipment, special hose lays, hookups, etc., thus expediting a fire attack which requires multiple alarm response.

Warren Carson reported that application has been made to the Federal Communications Commission for a new fire radio channel to be shared with Leamington, Ont., Hamburg and Howell, Mich.

Grosse Pointe Shores' new 1,000 gallon pumper is expected to be delivered within the next few days, and all members will be invited to the Underwriters acceptance tests. The next meeting of the Fire Mutual Aid Board will be held in Grosse Pointe City on July 18.

Block of Audubon Road To Be Closed to Permit St. Clare Church to Build

Park Council Approves Request After Public Hearing; Eight Classrooms and Gymnasium to Be Added to School's Facilities

Grosse Pointe Park Council Monday night approved the vacating of one block of Audubon road, and the issuance of a building permit to St. Clare of Montefalco Church. This Council action clears the way for St. Clare to begin construction on an eight-classroom addition to the present school structure. A gymnasium will be included in the new addition.

Several weeks ago, on Tuesday, May 14, over 550 persons, most in favor of the Audubon vacating, filled Pierce Junior High School auditorium for a public hearing to determine whether or not the Park should vacate the 1400 block of Audubon for the proposed school addition.

Church officials petitioned the Board of Appeals to rezone the block from residential use only so that a permit to build the additional school facilities could be obtained.

Without warning or provocation, the newsboy said, the two teenagers pounced on him. One held him from behind while the other beat him with his fists, striking his face and stomach.

Larry said that the boys attempted to steal his money after the beating, but he foiled their attempt by jamming his fists into his pockets. The two youths then mounted their bicycles and left, heading behind Wrigley's in the direction of Bournemouth.

Woods police have Larry's description of the boys and their bicycles. They are working on the case.

Burglars Get Loot Worth \$28,269 in Park Residence

Burglars entered the Victor Mushro residence, 682 Westchester, between 7 and 9 p.m. Sunday, May 26, and departed with \$28,269 worth of goods.

Mrs. Mushro discovered the theft when she returned to her home at 9, having been absent two hours. The thieves—Park Police Chief Arthur Louwers believes there must have been more than one man, as they took many items, including a TV set, impossible for a single person to handle alone—gained entrance by removing the lock on sliding glass doors opening onto a sunken patio.

The Mushro house is a tri-level, and it is difficult to see persons on the sunken patio. Having entered the house, the burglars processed it very thoroughly. Chief Louwers describes them as "good bad burglars"—persons who apparently know their trade, and know what to look for.

Six Seek Posts On School Board

Voters of the Grosse Pointe School District will elect two candidates to the Board of Education, Monday, June 10, as well as respond to a request to transfer school funds from one account to another. Six candidates are vying for the two vacancies, each of which carries a 4-year term of office.

Incumbent Robert Whiteley is seeking reelection to a second term while Mrs. Ruth Goebel, also an incumbent, will retire from public office. Other candidates, all of whom are running,

for the first time are Lionel Bird, Hudson Mead, Frank Parcells, Russell Peebles and Horace Roc.

Permission to transfer \$84,422.68 from the Pre-1932 Debt Retirement Fund to the Building and Site Fund of the school district will be asked in this election. All Pre-1932 bonds have been retired and these monies represent a residual balance which cannot be used for other capital improvement purposes without voter approval. The Board of Education has indicated that the transfer will help it complete the 4-year construction and rehabilitation program currently under way.

Voters are reminded that the polling places for this school election are the neighborhood elementary schools. Those who have resided in Michigan six months and in the Grosse Pointe School District 30 days next preceding the election and are registered voters of the city or township in which they reside are eligible to cast ballots. The polls will open at 7 a.m. and remain open until 8 p.m.

Chamber Music Concert Slated

The Chamber Music Players of Grosse Pointe will present the final program of their 1962-63 season on Sunday, June 2, at 3 p.m. in the Fries Auditorium of the Grosse Pointe War Memorial. This program climaxes a season which has afforded an opportunity for area musicians of all levels—professional, amateur, and student—to be heard in works appealing to a wide variety of musical preferences.

Marius Fossenkemper, clarinet. Kay Fuller, clarinet, and Dominic Intili, piano, will join in presenting the Duo Concert, opus 33, by Karl Barmann. Kay Fuller, a junior at Grosse Pointe High School, has for some years studied with Mr. Fossenkemper, who was formerly with the Detroit Symphony and is now associated with the Detroit Conservatory of Music.

The Sonata for Violin and Piano, opus 108, by Brahms will be performed by Emery Molnar, violin, and Marjorie Connell, piano. Miss Connell, winner of a statewide piano contest in 1959, has appeared as guest soloist with several symphonies in the Detroit area.

A Samuel Barber composition, "Dover Beach" for voice and string quartet will be presented by Florence Morris, soprano, and instrumentalists Aaron Farbman, violin, Kenneth Miller, violin, All Dalida, viola, and Harry Siegel, cello. Miss Morris, a Grosse Pointe resident, comes from a family with lively musical traditions. Her grandfather, William Jerome, was the composer of such popular favorites as "Chinatown" and "Row, Row, Row"; while her grandmother, whose best-known composition was "Rosie O'Grady," was also a performer in musical variety circles. Her mother was a Ziegfeld girl who performed both in this country and on tour in Europe. Miss Morris herself, in something of a departure from the family background, turned to classical music, and has studied and performed in California and Detroit, appearing in several opera productions.

The finals of the program, and of the season, will be a performance of Mozart's "Musical Joke" (The Village Players). Mozart wrote deliberate mistakes and off-key intonations into the music to present a burlesque of a group of earnest but not very talented musicians. Joining in the humor will be the string quartet of Aaron Farbman, Kenneth Miller, Ann Dalida and Harry Siegel, together with French horn players Ernestine Barnes and Charlotte Binhammer.

Those attending the program are invited to remain for the coffee hour which will follow. The monthly program meetings of the Chamber Music Players will resume in the fall.

A portion of the money raised will also be allotted to the national M. D. research clinic in New York where a medical staff has been working almost around the clock in hopes of finding a cure for this crippling germ that annually claims the lives of hundreds of small children. For some years past the annual drive to raise funds has been held during the latter part of November and early December. However, this year, at the insistence of the marchers themselves, the National Muscular Dystrophy offices gave Michigan permission to hold its fund raising campaign in the spring of the year. If the local drive proves successful it is quite likely that the national fund raising campaign will be held in June next year.

Patty Duke, the only teenager ever to win an Academy Award, flew into Detroit to meet with local committeemen regarding next Tuesday's march. Miss Duke, who won an Oscar last month for her role as Helen Keller in the Miracle Worker, is National Youth Chairman for Muscular Dystrophy. "In my opinion the Michigan Campaign can't miss," said Miss Duke before returning to New York to work on her fall television show. "I have never seen a more enthusiastic group of workers any place in the country. These people are determined to make their march a success so how can they fail?"

All volunteer marchers will wear the symbolic Jerry Lewis badge when they call on residents of this area next Tuesday evening during the hours of 7 to 9. Film and television star, Lewis is the National Chairman of the Muscular Dystrophy Association of America. Mrs. George Romney, Michigan's first lady, is the Honorary Chairman of the Tri-County Campaign.

Precinct to include: North, Wayne-Macomb County Line; East, Lake St. Clair; South, southerly rear lot line of Vernier Road from Marter to Fairway Lane and by a line which would extend from the rear lot line of Fairway Lane along the rear lot line of the Vernier Circle and Maple Lane subdivisions to the line which separates Grosse Pointe Woods from Grosse Pointe Shores, thence extending north to the south rear lot line of Vernier Road, thence extending east to Lake Shore, except that all of the area included on Fairway Lane shall be in the Ferry district; West, the middle of Marter Road from Vernier Road to the rear lot line of the south side of Roslyn Road, thence westerly to the middle of Goethe, thence northerly to the Wayne-Macomb County Line.

Precinct to include: North, Wayne County-Macomb County Line; East, middle of Goethe southerly to rear lot line of the south side of Roslyn Road; thence easterly to the middle of Marter Road; thence southerly to the rear lot line south side of Vernier Road, thence easterly to the rear lot line west side of Fairway Lane; thence southerly to the rear lot line of the south side of Lochmoor Boulevard; South, rear lot line of the south side of Lochmoor Boulevard; West, Grosse Pointe Woods-Harper Woods Line.

PRECINCT NO. 8—Voting place at the JOHN MONTEITH SCHOOL, 1275 Cook Road, Grosse Pointe Woods, Michigan. Precinct to include: North, rear lot line of the south side of Fairway Lane along the rear lot line of the area included in the Vernier Circle and Maple Lane subdivision from Fairway Lane to the line which separates Grosse Pointe Woods from Grosse Pointe Shores, thence extending north to the north rear lot line of Willison, thence extending east to Lake Shore; East, Lake St. Clair; South, by the line which separates Grosse Pointe Farms from Grosse Pointe Woods and Grosse Pointe Shores from Chalfonte to the Lake Shore; West, east side of Chalfonte from the line which separates Grosse Pointe Farms from Grosse Pointe Woods, extending northerly to Cook Road, thence to the middle of Milk River, continuing northerly to the southerly rear lot line of Oxford Drive, thence west along the rear lot line of Oxford Drive to Mack Avenue, thence north to the northerly rear lot line of North Renaud Road, thence easterly to the middle of Fairway Drive back to the point of beginning.

PRECINCT NO. 9—Voting place at the CHARLES A. POUPOUD SCHOOL, 20655 Lennon, City of Harper Woods, Michigan. Precinct to include: North, Wayne County-Macomb County line; East, Harper Woods-Grosse Pointe Woods line from County line to the south side of Lochmoor Boulevard; thence south along the middle of Helen Avenue to rear lot line of Kenmore Drive; South, the rear lot line of the south side of Kenmore Drive; West, the middle of Beaconsfield Drive to the middle of Vernier Road, thence westerly to the County Line.

PRECINCT NO. 10—Voting place at the JOHN R. BARNES SCHOOL, 20090 Morningside Drive, Grosse Pointe Woods, Michigan. Precinct to include: North, a line extending from the rear lot line of Fairway Lane along the rear lot line of the area included in the Vernier Circle and Maple Lane subdivision from Fairway Lane to the line which separates Grosse Pointe Woods from Grosse Pointe Shores, thence extending north to the north rear lot line of Willison, thence extending east to Lake Shore; East, Lake St. Clair; South, by the line which separates Grosse Pointe Farms from Grosse Pointe Woods and Grosse Pointe Shores from Chalfonte to the Lake Shore; West, east side of Chalfonte from the line which separates Grosse Pointe Farms from Grosse Pointe Woods, extending northerly to Cook Road, thence to the middle of Milk River, continuing northerly to the southerly rear lot line of Oxford Drive, thence west along the rear lot line of Oxford Drive to Mack Avenue, thence north to the northerly rear lot line of North Renaud Road, thence easterly to the middle of Fairway Drive back to the point of beginning.

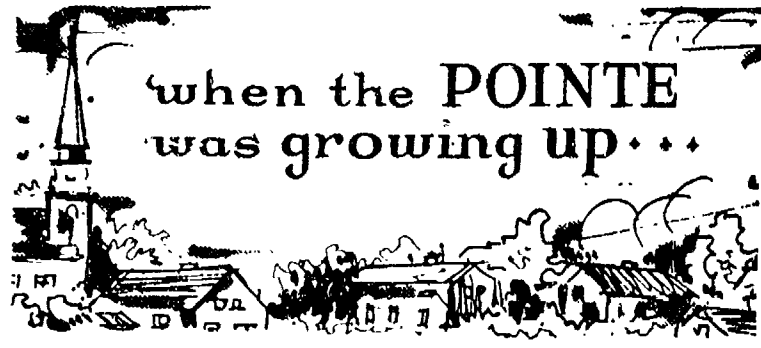

when the POINTE was growing up...

By Patricia Talbot

Detroit had barely recovered from the disastrous fire of 1805, when every building standing within the stockade walls but one was destroyed, on the outbreak of the war of 1812. Detroit was in British hands in August, 1812 and remained under occupation until September, 1813.

No business of any account was done during this period, farms were ravaged by Indians, and American citizens driven from the post by the British General Henry Procter. An illustration of the state of affairs can be glimpsed in a letter written to Judge Solomon Sibley by Col. John Anderson, who lived in River Raisin, but spent the winter of 1813 in Detroit.

"Dear Sir — I received your letter of 20th Nov. and paid due attention to the contents. I am sorely to find that the prospects is so gloomy for your progressing in your journey home. I was in grate hopes that you would have arrived to take possession of your house and property before we left it . . . seeing the grate destruction which was made by the soldiers wherever they was quartered, houses, piquets, stables, palisading etcs., all destroyed. Col. Brush, Macombs, Bobeans (Beaubiens) etc., farms all striped of fences, also the two graveyards."

"I would have stayed longer but wood, hay, all other articles was so hard to come at that it was impossible, as wood small lodes, 10s., bread 2s., pork 2s., beef 1s., butter 4s., flour 48s., and non of them lade in as I was expecting you every day. I think the reason how I saved your property was we had two goods cows, which gave a good lode of milk to the seek and I took two officers to live with us, and every night I went out and cautioned them about the property; but all the Indians had left in the gardens they took; Mrs. Anderson had it in contemplation two or three times last summer to leave the house on account of the Indians, who lived in the Council House and round the governors . . . but she when she thought of the house and property, how it would be destroyed, she was determined to hold out."

"I delivered the kees to Col. Brush, I left in the house all your salt, two barks of sugar, three loves of sugar one of the barrels of Cherey bounce is lost, the hoops in one end give away and it all run out, which was the first knowledge Mrs. A had that their was any liquers in that place, it run out to the other apartment, and also by the smell, the ballance is all to the good except two gall. of whiskey which I took on my arrival and will replace it to you when we meet."

"Yesterd evening Col. Brush's life was despaired of . . . John Whistler died since I left town—one third of the people from River Raisin is dead, so I think if you remain until the season is good it will be for the best, as the frost will kill the privelad disease."

Col. Anderson wrote to Judge Sibley, who was temporarily living in Cleveland, about his house which stood at the northeast corner of Jefferson and Randolph street. Col. Brush, referred to in the letter, died eight days later. The Whistler he speaks of was the uncle of the famous artist. The governor's house, erected by Henry Hull in 1806, had been used as a hospital by the Americans. Sibley did not come back to Detroit for the first session of the Supreme court in September 19, 1814, for Judge Witherell was the only advocate present. Governor Lewis Cass appointed Col. Anderson sheriff later in 1813. His wife, Mrs. Julia Anderson, was one of the donors of the first Mariners Church in 1849.

Reynoldses, Jr., rode last Saturday in the lead line class at the Hunt Club and received an award as "a championship junior rider," the youngest ever to win this title.

- 2 pkgs. frozen peas
- 1/4 head lettuce broken into small chunks
- 2 green onions, chopped
- 1 tsp. M.S.G.
- 1 tsp. sugar
- 1/8 tsp. cracked pepper
- 1 bay leaf (optional)
- 4 Tb. butter
- 2 Tb. parsley
- 2 Tb. chives

Unwrap peas 15 minutes ahead of time. Melt 2 Tb. butter in frying pan; add all ingredients except parsley and chives. Boil quickly for 5 minutes. Let simmer for about 20 minutes or until tender. Turn off heat and steam 1 minute. Add chives, parsley and rest of butter. Serves 6 to 8.

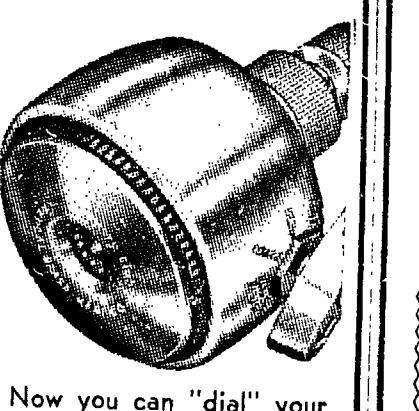
