

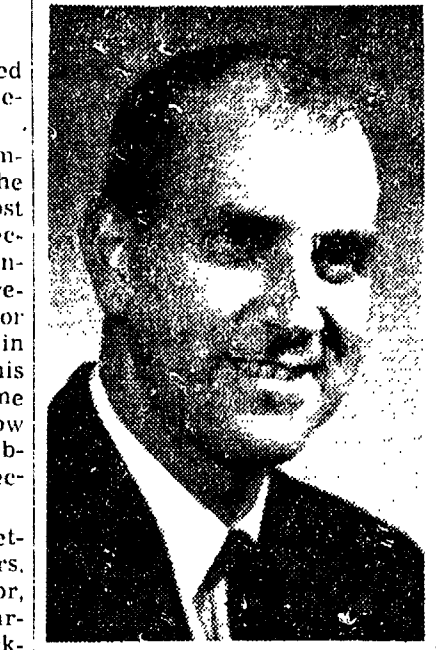
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CASES DISMISSED

The Michigan Orchid Society members collected quite a few "ohs and ahs" with their cleverly staged jungle scene with greens and orchids of every color, size and description.
Cameras were clicking away at "this or that" outstanding arrangement and among the spectators, teenagers and men, were admiring the well-staged exhibition by Mrs. William Cudlip, Mrs. Merlin Cudlip, and their committee.
It took weeks and weeks of trips up to the northern Michigan woods for the wonderful material gathered for this exhibit. A fish aquarium and a small three tiered fountain also were highlights of this exhibit.

1960, observing and doing research in a number of German national schools during 1960-61 and studying at the University of Bonn.
Since 1961, the new Barnes principal has been a member of the High School staff. His primary responsibility there has been to teach history to 10th grade pupils. Here he has helped originate and develop a seminar-classroom organization for world history classes.
Mr. O'Connor was one of seven finalists in the selection process. Five local candidates and two from abroad made up the field. Of the latter, one was a Michigan contestant and the other was from out of state.
These finalists, chosen by the Superintendent and his immediate assistants from the entire list of applicants, were interviewed by a five-member committee composed of classroom teachers and administrators. Their recommendations as to the successful candidate was concurred in by the Superintendent. The Board of Education will act on the recommendation at an early date.
Mr. O'Connor is a graduate of the University of Pittsburgh, holding the B.A. degree in History. Part of his study was accomplished at the University of Zurich in a junior year abroad program. He then earned the M. A. in History at Columbia University.
Requirements for teacher certification were met subsequently at Wayne State University where he is currently working on an advanced degree. His field of concentration is curriculum development and school administration. During his year abroad in 1960, he studied German and European education and their relations with American programs.
Active in professional organizations, Mr. O'Connor is a member of the Grosse Pointe, Michigan and National Education Associations. Also he holds membership in national and state curriculum development associations as well as in the Comparative Education Association.
Service in World War II saw O'Connor a pilot in the United States Air Force from 1943-45. The family makes its home in St. Clair Shores. He helped found and currently serves as president of the Greenwood School Parent-Teacher Club. Two daughters, Janine, 10, and Renee, 6, attend school there while son Jeffrey, 4, awaits that opportunity.

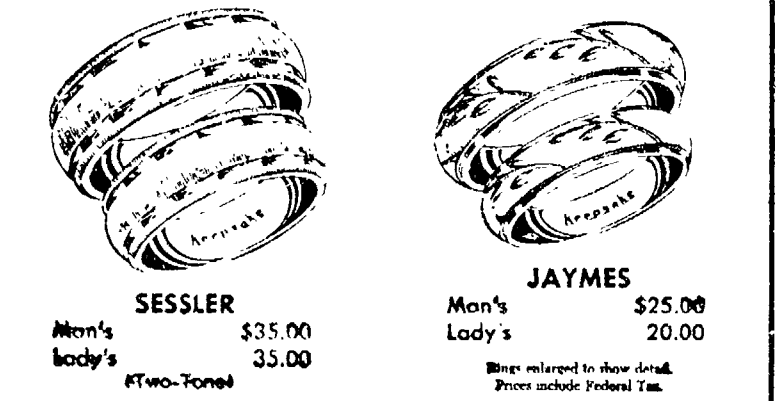
Reckless Driver Causes Accident

Both cars were damaged. Squashic's so severely that it had to be towed away. There were no injuries.



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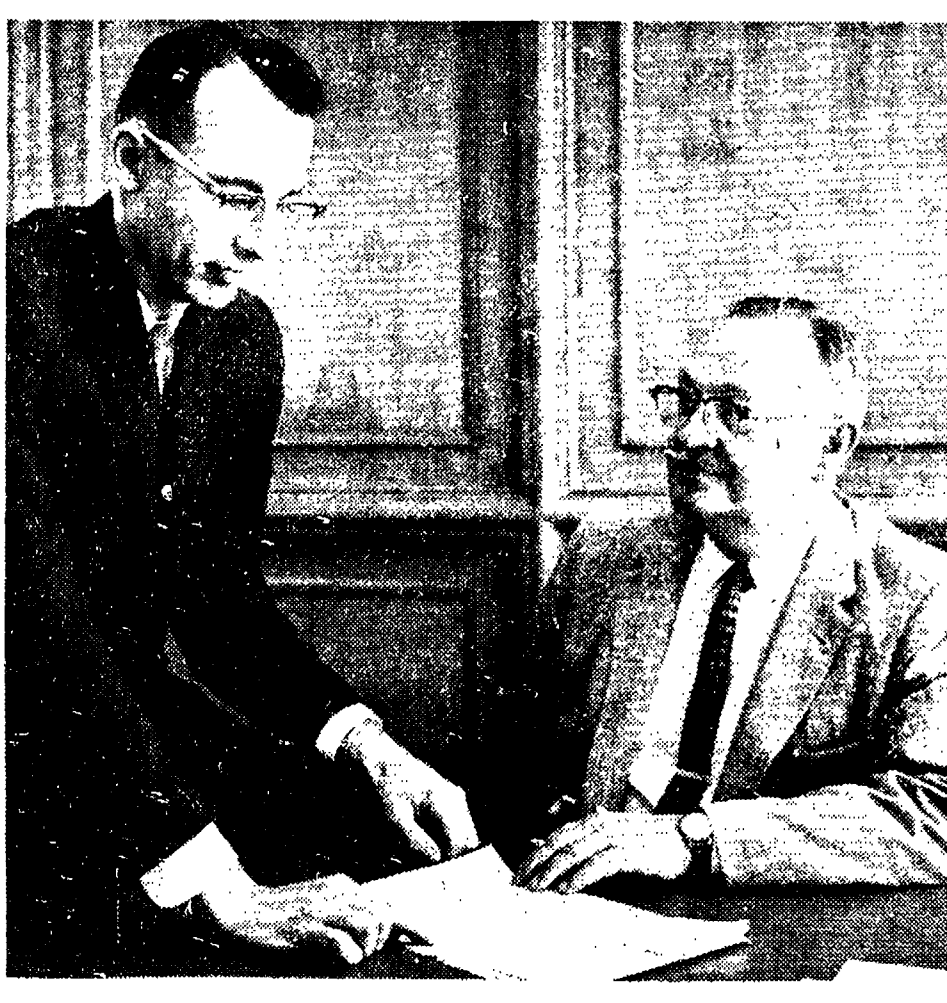

The Grosse Pointe American Legion Post 303 baseball team won two one-run games this past week to move into a first place tie with East Detroit, following Friday's games. Both teams have a 4-2 record.

Wednesday night 303 played undefeated Northwest Post and won 3-2 behind pitcher Jay Yeckley. Northwest scored a run in the third but GP scored three in the sixth on two infield hits, a mental error, and some heads-up base running.

Friday Grosse Pointe scored four runs in the top of the ninth to win a come-from-behind victory from Stitt Post, 4-3. Stitt scored 2 in the seventh on a walk, the first given up by Bob Critchfield, and back to back doubles, and again in the eighth on a double and a single. Post 303 had 2 singles and a walk to load the bases in the ninth followed by J. Yeckley's single for 2 runs.

Then Ron Irwin's single to left drove in the tying and winning runs. Critchfield pitched an outstanding game allowing one walk, 6 hits, and striking out 15. He did allow a double in the ninth with one out but Jeff von Schwartz came in to bat and retired the next two batters easily to end the game. von Schwartz' appearance in relief marked the first time in six games that any help was required.

Sunday's game with Livonia was cancelled because of wet grounds. This week's schedule calls for 303 to meet Phillips Post Wednesday night at 8 at Manz Field. Girl Hit by Car Suffers Injuries

Sharon Kail, 16, of 377 Moross, was injured on Monday, June 3, when she was struck by a car as she ran across Moross road, after getting off a bus.

The girl was conveyed to St. John Hospital by Farms firemen, where she was treated for a broken right wrist and forearm, and abrasions about the head.

She was struck by a car driven by Aloysius Cadieux, 69, of 29124 Parkwood, Inkster, who was driving north on Moross at about 20 miles an hour.

According to a police report, Cadieux slowed to 20 miles when a Lake Shore Coach bus stopped at Piche. The girl got off and looked one way and then darted across the street, and ran into the side of Cadieux's car. The girl fell to the pavement.

Lawrence W. Fournier, 52, of 4133 Barham, Detroit, driver of the car, told police that he saw her walking to the front, but did not see her get hit. When he got off the bus, Fournier said, the girl and car were about 15 feet away.

Another witness, Keith L. Broeffle, 19, of 11697 Laing, Detroit, told police at the scene that he was waiting to make a left turn from Piche to Moross, when he saw the girl get off the bus and run across the street and into the side of the car.

At the hospital, Miss Kail said that she looked only one way as she ran across the street. She failed to see the oncoming car, she said.

Cadieux was released after making a statement. He was not charged.

Robert Waldron Gets GOP Post

Peter B. Spivak, Wayne County Republican Chairman, has announced the appointment of State Representative Robert E. Waldron as Vice-Chairman of the Wayne County Republican Committee.

Representative Waldron was appointed by the Executive Committee to replace James H. Sterrett, prominent Detroit insurance executive who resigned May 31 to accept the position as Agency Manager of the Chicago office of the Detroit Insurance Agency.

I cannot think of anyone else in our metropolitan area who has become so familiar with the problems of our people and who has earned the respect and admiration of so many in a relatively short time in the legislature. I feel that his appointment will give our committee a balanced political tone which is invaluable in this day and age."

Representative Waldron will serve until August, 1964, at which time Committee full-term elections will be held.

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

Rotarians Hear Dr. Selmeier

The Grosse Pointe Rotary Club heard an excellent talk on "Teaching American Ideals and about Communism" by Dr. H. Leroy Selmeier, Assistant Superintendent for Instruction for the Grosse Pointe Public School System, last Monday.

He outlined the program now underway which aims at seeing that Pointe boys and girls will: Strengthen their appreciation and understanding of American ideals and the American way of life.

Understand the principles and practices of Communism so as to know its evils and weaknesses.

Recognize their individual responsibility for expressing themselves as informed citizens in the defense of American institutions and culture.

Dr. Selmeier recalled the comment made by Dr. Robert Hutchins of the U. of Chicago when asked "Are you teaching about Communism at the U. of Chicago?" "Yes, we are teaching about Communism and also about cancer and we hope to get rid of both," was Dr. Hutchins' reply.

The program now in use was prepared as a joint effort on the part of some 60 of the professional Grosse Pointe school system staff, which numbers over 500. The basic objective was to start with the beginners in school and in one form or another continue throughout the schooling of the students in the area.

The more teaching of itself is not enough, according to Dr. Selmeier, but in every case what is taught must be applied continually. "We teach spelling and we teach driving, but due to lack of application on a continuing basis we still have unfortunately many who cannot spell and some who might drive better."

In the program stressing such things as audible repetition of the Pledge of Allegiance, singing the "Star Spangled Banner," use of all aids possible such as television to see history in the making, all are playing an important part.

The bid of Demuelenaere General Contractors in the amount of \$5,326.50, being the low bid for the repair of catch basins and manholes in the City, was accepted. The bid of Alfred F. Steiner Company in the amount of \$8,136.56, being the low bid for furnishing the City with an ambulance, was accepted. The bid of the Otsego Ski Club in the amount of \$451.00, being the high bid for a used ambulance, was accepted. Authorization was given to participate with the Board of County Road Commissioners in the cost of installing a traffic signal light at Mack Avenue and Moran Road. Approval was given to refund Edward Person the sum of \$20.00, Thomas R. Squire the sum of \$20.00 and Denis L. Luther the sum of \$25.00, the fees paid by them for their boat mooring space which they will be unable to use during the coming season. A communication from Mr. William R. Mahoney of 251 Lothrop expressing appreciation to the Fire and Police Departments for services rendered on the morning of April 2, 1963, was received and ordered filed. The City Manager was directed to request the firm of Regrow & Brown, Architects, to have a representative of their firm attend the Council Meeting of June 17, 1963 to further discuss the proposed additions and alterations to the Municipal Building. The City Manager was requested to obtain a copy of the City of Grand Rapids' Hospitalization Plan and to compare the benefits in the Plan to those of the Blue Cross-Blue Shield Plan. Mr. Jack A. Thompkins of 139 Tonnacour was granted permission to erect a 5'6" brick fence along the Kercheval Avenue side of his property from the rear lot line to the building line and a 4' brick fence from the building line to the front of his property with the understanding that the fence will be set back a distance from the front lot line so that it will in no way become a traffic hazard.
