Thursday, July 25

THE BODY OF SOL C. BRODSKY, 43, was found sprawled in a lane leading to a summer cottage in Macomb County Wednesday. There were eight bullet wounds in Brodsky's back, plus one in the back of the 'con artist's' head, all fired from the same .38 caliber automatic pistol. Perennially in trouble with the law, Brodsky had never been jailed. He was implicated in the recent bankruptcy of a Detroit trading stamp firm, in an alleged swindle involving a Chrysler Corporation-developed glue product, in a Vernon's Ginger Ale Company stock deal, and in a Korean War defense account scandal. Convicted of purchasing favors to gain the defense account orders (his sole criminal conviction), Brodsky was placed on two years' probation. Police describe the murder victim as a man with hundreds of enemies.

Friday, July 26

MICHIGAN'S NEW Civil Rights Commission will be empowered and directed to stop discrimination in both selling and renting of private housing. Attorney General Frank J. Kelley, speaking yesterday in Lansing, said the new Constitution clearly provides a civil right to buy, lease, rent or mortgage private housing without discrimination. The Commission, with power to issue cease and desist orders and to secure compliance, will be Michigan's first agency created specifically to enforce civil rights, and will be an eight-member group appointed by the Governor, subject to Senate approval. After January 1, 1964, the Commission will also be empowered to investigate alleged discrimination and enforce civil rights in education, employment and public accommodations, Kelley said.

Saturday, July 27

YUGOSLAV RED CROSS officials fear the death toll in Skopje, scene of a devastating earthquake Friday, may reach 5,000. Damage to the Macedonian capital is reported "catastrophic." The tremor, slightly stronger than one which struck at Agadir, Morocco, in March of 1960, killing over 12,000 persons, centered in Skopje's downtown area. Buildings toppled "like cut trees," an 80-room hotel crammed with tourists was completely destroyed, and 80 per cent of the city is leveled. "Numerous rescue teams are clearing away the rubble under which screams are still heard," according to Tanjug, the official Yugoslav news agency.

Sunday, July 28

AT LEAST 45 PERSONS, spectators at the Women's Wolverine open golf match at Hillcrest Country Club near Mt. Clemens, were injured when a suspension bridge plunged into the Clinton River yesterday. Approximately 100 men and women had jammed shoulder to shoulder across the bridge when a heavy steel cable snapped. Spectators were pitched heading into the five-foot deep river. Some persons rode the bridge down, then had to disentangle themselves from the wreckage; others ran to help those in the water. Special duty doctors and nurses are on call at Mt. Clemens' two hospitals, St. Joseph and General, and one of the match's leading golfers, Jo Anne Prentice, is among the injured.

Monday, July 29

A UNITED ARAB AIRLINES jet plane, with 62 persons aboard, plunged into the Arabian Sea off western India yesterday. Hope for survivors has been virtually abandoned. The plane was piloted by Mahmoud Mohammed Shouara, who often flew President Gamal Abdel Nasser on official trips.

Tuesday, July 30

A THIRD UNITED STATES soldier has been killed by Korean communists. Two other GI's were slain earlier in the week, bringing total U.S. casualties in this latest series of border skirmishes to three dead, two wounded.

Unlighted, Stalled Car Demolished

S. S. Livingstone Escapes With Slight Injuries; No Tickets Issued

A passing car collided with a stalled, unlighted sports car on the Lake Shore shortly after midnight Friday, July 26, resulting in the injury of a prominent Pointe resident. Injured was Seaborn Scherer Livingstone, 40, of 207 Lake Shore. He was treated at Bon Secours hospital for a cut near the left eye. The operator of the stalled car, Jeremiah Lee Lynch, of 29000 Champlain, St. Clair Shores, told police the car he was driving ran out of gas, and that he had stopped the car in the right hand lane while his wife, in another car, went for assistance. Lynch said he had stationed himself behind the car and was directing northbound traffic around the stalled vehicle. Lynch's car was a 1951 Jaguar roadster owned by John Weller, of 861 Roslyn road. Livingstone stated he was driving north on Lake Shore when the car in front of him suddenly swerved from the right lane. Unable to see the unlighted obstruction ahead, Livingstone said he struck the Jaguar before he could stop or swerve. His car struck the rear of the Jaguar and continued up over the deck lid and stopped on top of the small car, with his bumper even with the windshield, the police report said.

School Vacation Enables Custodians to Go to Work To Protect Big Investment

Summer Maintenance Program Very Important in Caring for \$20,000,000 Worth of Buildings and Varied Equipment

The summer recess of the Grosse Pointe Public Schools, which provides teacher and student with the opportunity for other pursuits, is regarded by the system's custodial and maintenance personnel as a major work session.

"The citizens of the community have an investment of over \$20 million in the school plant. It is our never-ending responsibility to keep it in the best possible condition," states J. Harold Husband, Assistant Superintendent-Administrative Services. "When people say to me, 'Now that school is out, you can take it easy,' I don't know what they're talking about," claims the veteran educator. "For most of our custodial staff, summer is the busiest time."

The summer maintenance program that is carried out is one

of dual phases, with preventive maintenance accorded as much priority as renovation and alteration. Projects high on the 1963 agenda include renovation of the High School boys' locker rooms, replacement of the boilers at the Board office, the improvement of classroom and corridor lighting in several buildings and the addition of acoustic tile in some of the older schools.

Project at Richard
Due for remodeling is the general office at Richard. Concrete work, which includes sidewalk repair and some hard surfacing, is scheduled for six schools. Asphalt repairs and additional blacktopping are on the list for nine buildings.

Classified under the heading of preventive maintenance are such projects as the overhauling of pumps, motors and traps throughout the system. Clocks, office and audio-visual instructional equipment get a going-over. Daily, a crew goes out to assist in the maintenance of 150 acres of grounds, trees and shrubs. And as might be surmised, the summer program includes extensive painting. An example of the careful instructions issued to workers include a checklist of 41 items, some of which are:

- #1 Clean boilers, turbine tubes, scrape tank and prepare boilers for inspection.
- #27 Scrub gyms and mop with vinegar water before varnishing. When necessary use steel wool to remove synthetic rubber burns.

Prevention Important
"We feel that this preventive part of our work is extremely important. Careful inspection of our facilities can eliminate costly breakdowns that might interfere with the educational program of the boys and girls during the year," says Husband. "Satisfactory maintenance is essential to the protection of Grosse Pointe's investment in its public educational facilities. Good maintenance is not a hazardous accident."

The proof of this last statement is found in the detailed manual that Husband and his staff have compiled and dis-

Start Drive To Buy Piano For Center

Music Festival Committee and Chamber Music Players Sponsors of Campaign; Need \$3,760

A community-wide campaign to provide a second concert grand piano for the Grosse Pointe War Memorial was launched last Friday at the final program of the Grosse Pointe Summer Music Festival. Festival founder Alex Sucek announced that the festival committee and the Chamber Music Players of Grosse Pointe—a resident group of performers and chamber music enthusiasts affiliated with the War Memorial—have joined in a project to purchase the beautiful Baldwin piano which was used in the concert. The piano will be presented to the War Memorial as a gift from the community.

This piano has been enthusiastically endorsed by concert pianists Bela Szilagi and William Doppman. It will be used in future festival performances, and, with the piano already owned by the War Memorial, will make possible the performance.

Youth Ticketed For 'Forgetting'

A 20-year-old Centerline motorist, who purchased a new car and "forgot himself," was arrested by Shores police on Thursday, July 25, and charged with reckless driving on Lake Shore drive. Arrested was Harold E. Meier of 7285 Helen, who was taken to the station where he was issued a violation ticket and released after posting a bond of \$75.

Patrolman Chester Painter, patrolling north on Lake Shore, said he observed Meier traveling in the same direction, but weaving from side to side, causing other drivers to stop and go, and forcing others to veer sharply to avoid collision. The officer said he stopped Meier at Edgewood. Painter asked the youth for a reason for driving in such a manner. Meier, the policeman said, acknowledged that he was in the wrong, and that he had a bad driving record, but he had recently purchased the car and "forgot himself," and started "playing around."

The young motorist readily followed the officer to the station, where he was charged and ticketed.

Woods Population Soars; Building At All Time High

Census Figures Show City Has Gained Residents; Construction for 1963 Expected to Double That of Last Record Year of 1954

The Woods' population is increasing and building construction is booming, according to official information released by City Administrator Chester Petersen.

The latest preliminary 1963 census figures show that the city's population now stands at 20,577, a gain of 810 over that of 1962. Petersen disclosed that building construction in the Woods will pass all records before the end of the year.

He said that from January 1 through June 30, the Department of Building Inspection has issued building permits totaling approximately \$3,000,000, with an additional \$4,000,000 in building permits anticipated during the next six months.

High Set in 1954
This, Petersen said, will make a total of \$7,000,000 in building permit valuations, almost double that of the previous record year of 1954, when \$4,216,743 worth of permits were approved.

Home building will account for about 75 percent of the record construction for this year, the city administrator said.

The largest single construction permit will be for Liggett School, to be located at Briarcliff and Moorland, which will have a nonassessable valuation of \$1,500,000.

Another nonassessable construction permit, valued at \$375,000, has been issued for an addition to the Municipal Building, 2025 Mack avenue, which will house the Public Safety Department.

Ceremonies Held
Ground breaking ceremonies were held on Saturday, July 27, with local and Federal government officials participating.

Work on this construction is expected to start without delay, with the completion date set for some time in April.

In addition to the tremendous building construction activity, another estimated \$1,000,000 is expected to be spent this year for various subdivision developments and other public improvements.

Real property in the Woods has a local assessed valuation of \$58,739,000, according to figures released by Petersen.

More Vandalism Near Brownell

Two more incidents of violence have been reported in the area of Brownell Junior High at Chalfonte and Cloverly road. The two bring the total reported to six in the last three weeks.

An upstairs window and a glass on a lawn light were broken at the Grosse Pointe Congregational Church, Chalfonte and Lothrop, sometime between July 19 and July 21. Damage was estimated at \$16.

Vandals struck again on the night of July 23 at Brownell. This time a brick was thrown through the front windshield of a car in the parking lot used in the Driver Education program.

Windows at Brownell had been broken twice previously, on July 16 and July 20. Two homes on Lothrop road near Brownell were also reported damaged by BB or pellet gun shots on July 16.

Two Detroit Youngsters Confess to Many Thefts

Two Detroit boys, one 14 and the other 11, confessed Saturday to Park police that they had committed a string of robberies and illegal entries in the City and Park in the last two weeks.

They also confessed a series of crimes committed outside of the Pointe, ranging from Burkemo's Drive-In in St. Clair Shores to the Detroit Yacht Club on Belle Isle, between July 11 and July 17.

The confessions were gained by Park police Lt. Arnold Hough and Detective James LaPratt. The two boys were released to Detroit police juvenile authorities.

The 14-year-old, it was revealed, will be committed to a Catholic Youth Home.

Truck Brings Supplies for Four Places

Bon Secours, Jacobson's, Maire School, Pumping Station OK'd by Govt.

Grosse Pointe City has four public survival shelters, stocked and ready in case of atomic war.

A truckload of supplies from the Federal warehouse in Livonia was unloaded in the City on Tuesday, July 30. Stops were made at Maire School, Jacobson's, Bon Secours Hospital and the City Pumping Station, only four locations in the municipality to meet Federal requirements for stocking and designation as Public Fallout Shelters.

Maire is equipped to take care of 150 refugees. Jacobson's can handle 190, Bon Secours 154, and the Pumping Station 64. With space for only 558 persons, the shelters will be available to the general public on a first come, first served basis.

Cooperative Effort

Eugene Guido, Civil Defense co-ordinator for Wayne County, explained the City shelter program is a cooperative effort, involving the Federal Government, which provides food supplies and stocks at Federal expense; Wayne County, which furnishes manpower and does all the administrative work; and the City itself, which pays for transportation of the stocks and supplies.

As a community of less than 10,000, Grosse Pointe City qualifies for this cooperative program; larger communities make their own arrangements directly with the offices and agencies involved.

All Civil Defense activities in this area are under the general supervision of the Wayne County Civil Defense office, and all supplies are drawn from the Federal warehouse in Livonia.

To meet the Federal criteria for stocking, a public shelter must provide space for at least 50 persons and must have a "protection factor" of at least 40. (In other words, persons within the shelter area would receive 40 times less radiation than persons outside.)

Engineers Make Surveys
Shelter licensing is under the direction of the Army Corps of Engineers and the Navy Bureau of Docks, which employ private local architectural engineering firms to survey possible shelter facilities and determine their suitability.

In the case of private establishments such as Jacobson's and Bon Secours, shelter setups are voluntary. Civil Defense officials insist no part of the operation of a private building be changed in any degree by a shelter installation, and for this reason Walton-Pierce Co., with much of its business and storage operations in its basement, was deemed unsuitable.

Shelter stocks include "survival crackers," which look rather like graham crackers but have an individual calorie count of approximately 25; water drums, holding 17½ gallons per container; medical kits; sanitation kits; and a radiological detection kit.

1200 Calories Daily
County Civil Defense co-ordinator Guido, who recently spent 27 hours in a Battle Creek shelter eating the "survival crackers," describes them as tasting rather like animal crackers.

Park police chief Arthur Louwers said investigation by his department had begun on July 16, and finally brought the two boys to the station for questioning on July 26.

The boys were seen as good suspects, Louwers said, because they had been caught last summer after stealing a boat from the Park's lakefront park.

The two were questioned Friday, spent Friday night at the Juvenile Detention Home in Detroit, and were questioned further Saturday, at which point they gave their confessions.

Louwers said the boys were frequent runaways from their homes, and had committed about 20 crimes in Detroit, Harper Woods, and St. Clair Shores.

Included in these was the theft of \$12 cash from the trampoline center at Burkemo's, 24000 East Jefferson, St. Clair Shores; a strong-arm theft of money from a small child at the corner of Mack and St. Clair; and larceny of clothing, bathing trunks, and a life guard's wallet at the Detroit Yacht Club on July 10.

Chief Louwers said the father of the 14-year-old had cooperated fully with police, and that he had promised to make restitution for all stolen property.

The wallet, some clothing, and other loot was recovered, but a great deal was unaccounted for, Louwers said.

tribute to the entire plant group. A constant reminder of work to be done, it lists the duties of personnel in this particular classification—custodians, custodian-engineers, assistant and head engineers—to name but a few.

Entitled "A Manual for Plant Personnel," the 51 page booklet includes general instructions and a timetable such as the following for custodians: sweeping rooms (daily); dressing gymnasium floors (twice weekly); mop kindergarten linoleum floors (twice monthly); wash and polish furniture (vacation periods).

His Job Harder Too

If the load of his work crews increases and diversifies to some extent during the summer, the same might be said of the activities of the Assistant Superintendent himself. For in addition to the regular summer work which comes under his general supervision, two building projects require his attention. In addition to the classrooms at Ferry that are scheduled for completion this fall and the high school library building, Husband looks to another deadline next month. Bids on the two-room Maire addition are due for consideration by the Board of Education on August 12.

The story of plant maintenance seems to indicate that summer is indeed a busy time in the schools.

Juveniles Pilfer Delivered Mail

Two juveniles, an eight-year-old girl and a seven-year-old boy, were referred to the Postal Inspectors Office on Monday, July 22, when it was found that they were stealing mail from private mail boxes in the Shores.

Police Chief Fred Duemling said that the girl, visiting here from New York, and the boy, came to the station, and turned in a check made out to a Shores resident, in the amount of \$191.96. They claimed that they found the check.

Patrolmen Joseph Vitale and Ronald Klotz checked the area where the children claimed to have found the check. They talked to the boy and girl, who finally broke down and confessed they took the letter from a private mail box at 69 Greenbriar.

The officers recovered the letter that had contained the check, in a field at 80 Fontana. They said the children led them to other letters that they pilfered from mail boxes in the area, including one that had been torn and thrown away.

The matter was referred to Police Lt. George LaForest, Shores juvenile officer, who gave the girl and boy a stern lecture on how wrong they were in doing what they did.

The lieutenant turned the matter over to postal authorities for further disposition. The children were released to their parents.

Each person in the shelter is allotted a daily ration of approximately 1200 calories.

The water drums are filled after they are installed, with one teaspoon of bleach added to each container, making the water potable for approximately five years.

Stocks for Maire School's 150 survivors include 31 cartons of crackers (totaling 750 pounds); 30 water drums (to be turned into sanitation facilities after they are emptied; three ready-to-be-used sanitation kits; three medical kits (each with sufficient supplies for 50 persons); and one radiation detection kit.

Guido advises persons unable to use public facilities to "take the best shelter available."

Basements of private homes usually provide a 15 to 20 "protection factor;" and this can be substantially increased by use

of sandbags at window openings and other simple safety procedures.

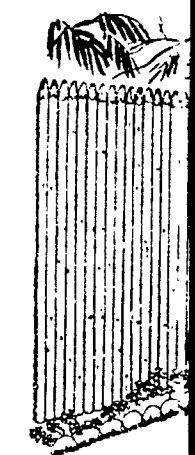

Highlights of her stay so far have included five "fabulous days" at the seaside, a trip to the city of Ypres, a famous World War I battle sight, and witnessing an ancient pageant of nobility in Brussels.

Ann told her parents in a letter that she had been invited to spend a week with another Pointe exchange student, Claire Wilcox, daughter of the O. R. Wilcoxons of Radnor circle. Claire is a Michigan Council of Churches student spending the summer in Amsterdam, Holland.

Ann also passed along to her parents the sad news that while at the seaside she had gained 10 pounds in five days. Needless to say, she commented that "the food is great."

"About her stay at the seaside she wrote her parents: 'I am spending my last day at the seaside. It is a rather romantic place, and I mean romantic in the scenic sense. I have stood in a German bunker and seen the lights of Dunkirk. I have seen sunsets over the ocean, the lights from ships at sea and the waves turn a luminous green as they break upon the beach. 'Yesterday I went to Ypres,' she writes, 'and I fell in love with the city. It has a beautiful cathedral and a magnificent town square. During the First World War the town was completely destroyed and over a million British, Canadian and Australian soldiers died there. 'The town has erected a beautiful monument to the 670,000 soldiers who have unknown graves in the nearby countryside.' She also writes of a commemorative pageant in Brussels held in memory of a visit of a princess to that city in 1549. 'I was impressed,' she writes, 'by the list of actual dukes, countesses and princes who passed before me.' 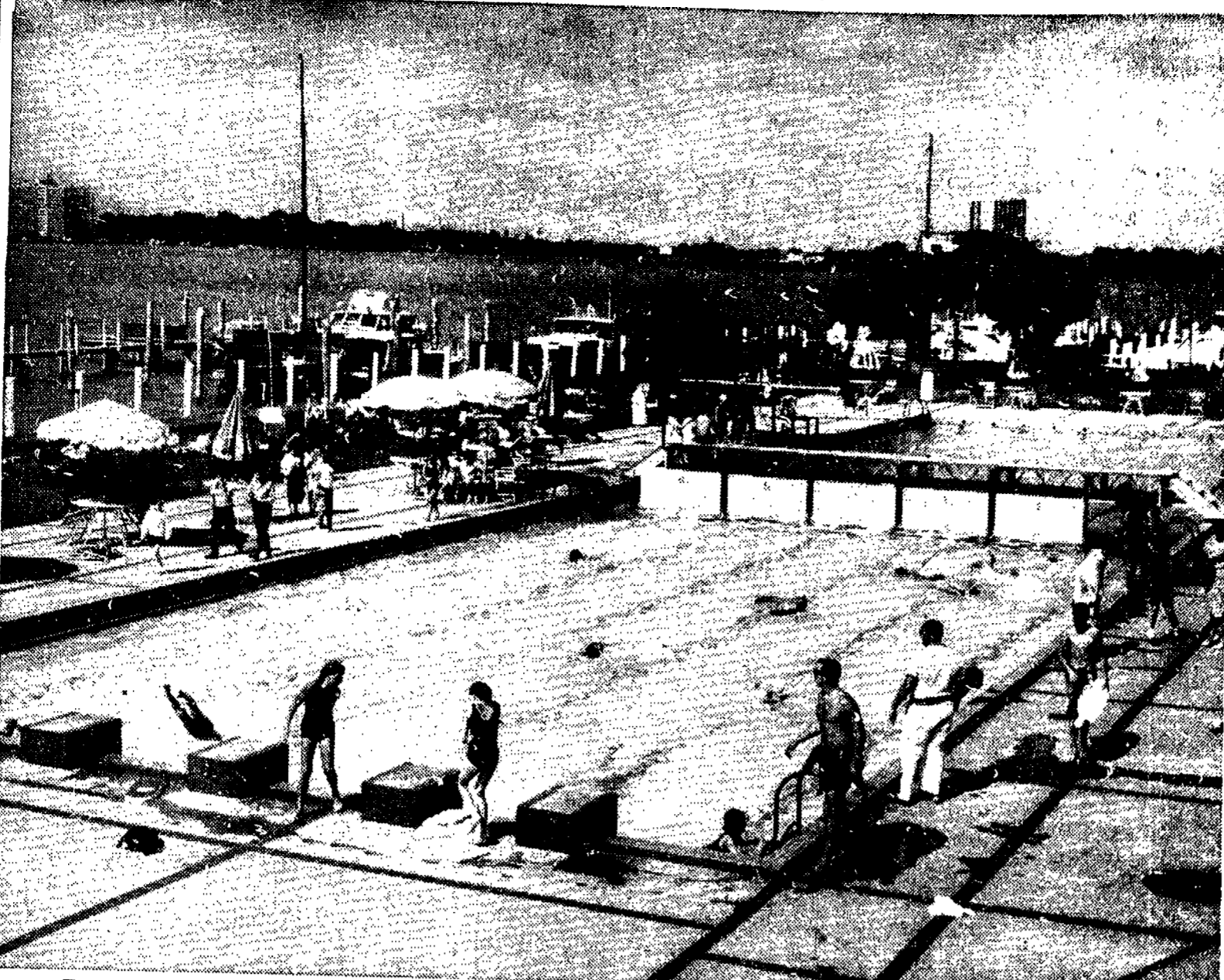

GPHS Coach Enthusiastic Over His Boat Club Team

"Start 'em young; keep 'em going."
This, in a nutshell, is Bob Kinnear's philosophy for building winning swimming teams.

In his first year as head swim coach at the Detroit Boat Club he has put this theory into practice by initiating what he believes to be the only swimming "farm club" system in the Detroit Inter-Club swimming league.

He has formed classes for over 60 youngsters ranging from four up to 10 to teach the fundamentals of competitive swimming. These youngsters aren't good enough for the Club's team yet, but Kinnear hopes they will be next year or the year after.

"The time to start swimming seriously," Kinnear says, "is at age six or seven. By eight you should be winning races."

When he came to the DBC, Kinnear brought with him one of the finest groups of college swimmers around. Among his life guards and coaches he can count four former high school All-Americans now swimming in colleges.

In this group are Mark Marsh, Grosse Pointe High All-American, swimming now at the University of Wisconsin; Bud Blanchard, from Dearborn High School, now also swimming for the University of Wisconsin; Neal Bauer, GP high alum now at Western University; and Mike White, Captain of Austin Prep School's team a few years back, now swimming and playing football at Michigan State.

Also on his coaching staff are Jack Teetaert, an outstanding member of last year's GP High swimming team headed for Wisconsin in the fall, and John Candler, diving star for the University of Michigan. John was on the English Olympic Diving Team in 1960 before coming to the U. S. to go to college.

The DBC has a young team this year, Kinnear said, with a few consistent stars, but more important, good depth that is responsible for all-important seconds and thirds in meets that add up to victories.

"These kids are aware of the team's potential," Kinnear said "and they know that this year they could go all the way in the Inter-Club meet."

Planning for "the big one," the Inter-Club finals that take place August 17 and 18 at the Detroit Yacht Club, Kinnear has his 60-member team in the water two and a half hours a day, six days a week.

Each day his team swims a combined distance equal to the water route to Algonac from the Club and back, and then some. Some members swim over three miles a day, none less than a mile a day.

The practice schedule is split up with an hour and a half in the morning and another hour in the late afternoon, and many team members end up swimming almost all day.

Another "big one" for the team comes tomorrow night, when they host Lochmoor Club at a home meet at 5:30 p.m. This meet is billed as just one of the events marking the DBC's huge 125th Anniversary celebration, running from July 29 to August 4.

Tomorrow night's meet will be followed by the awarding of a special Quasiquinquennial Swimming Trophy to the winning club, and a buffet supper in the Club Ballroom, followed by a dance for the younger set from 9 to 11 p.m.

On the committee for this big evening are Kurt Keydel, DBC director, chairman; Orvil R. Aronson, chairman of the swimming committee, of Newberry place; and Erwin H. Haass, of Stephens road, David Aronson and Barbara Warmbold are co-chairmen of the junior committee.

Looking beyond tomorrow night to the Inter-Club meet coming up, Kinnear said he knows the team will produce in practice sessions in the following weeks.

Consistent winners this year have included John Barlow, 16, 50 meter freestyle; Bob Gaff, 15, 50 m. freestyle; Sandy Haass, 12, 50 m. freestyle and backstroke; Thad Galvin, 8, 25 m. freestyle, and Dave Aronson, 16, 50 m. freestyle, backstroke, and butterfly.

Behind these people, Kinnear says, is the solid depth that makes a winning team. It is this kind of tough, intense swimming that Kinnear hopes will make the DBC a real threat in Inter-Club meets.

He hopes that his team can help the Boat Club on her 125th birthday to show that the country is still as young and as spry as the rest of 'em.

Twenty per cent of urban renewal projects undertaken with federal money have been abandoned before completion.

Seventy per-cent of land cleared on urban renewal has not been devoted to the intended use, which means that plans were impractical.

For every tax dollar sent to Washington, you get back only seventy-five cents in projects such as these.

The moral is "Do it yourself and make use of 100 cents on the tax dollar."

The attached page from the

July 17 edition of the Washington Star shows \$75 million dollars in new government buildings. This is only a small part of what is going on here. It is time to stop this growth of big central government.

What Goes On at Your Library

A new book has appeared on our desk this week—and by a local author, no less! EXPLORING THE LOIRE CHATEAUX is the title; its author is Irvin Long of Renaud road. Mr. Long is a lawyer connected with a Detroit law firm, and has followed the legal profession for over fifty years. Until now his publications have been limited to articles in law journals.

However, he has always been interested in France, its literature and history, and has spent many vacations there, particularly in the Loire Valley, where most of the great chateaux are concentrated. Exploring these old castles and orienting them to their historical backgrounds has been a pleasant diversion and hobby for the author. His book describes thirty-nine chateaux, with enough detail to show principal architectural features and other physical data, but the greater emphasis has been on fascinating information concerning the great families and personages identified with them.

Mr. Long's bibliography shows many sources, but cannot portray the vast amount of other information obtained by personal contacts in the region and from governmental sources. Truly this book represents a labor of love.

Our contact with Mr. Long sent our mind off on several tangents: other material on castles, French personalities and information on France available in our Library.

As to the first, we didn't find much (bearing out the contention on the blurb of Mr. Long's book that not much material was available). Ralph Dutton has written a book entitled: THE CHATEAUX OF FRANCE, published in 1957. This is a simple exposition of chateau architecture and a guide to the country houses themselves. The author writes sympathetically and his learning is quite extensive. A much older book by Henry Debray is TOURAINE AND ITS CHATEAUX—one of the Picture Guides series.

Another older one is E. J. MacDonald's CASTLES OF ENGLAND AND WALES; but age in neither case nullifies or detracts from the basic information and lovely illustrations.

Mr. Long's bibliography re-

minds us that much of the excitement of examining a period of history may come from biographies. Two of these deal with the colorful life of "La grande Mademoiselle," daughter of Gaston d'Orleans, younger brother of Louis XIII. They are LA GRANDE MADEMOISELLE by Francis Steegmuller, and DAUGHTER OF FRANCE by V. Sackville-West. Nancy Mitford has given us MADAME DE POMPADOUR, the life of the mistress of Louis XV. A very new biography is Philip Ziegler's THE DUCHESS OF DINO, the life of Dorothea of Courland, niece of Talleyrand.

Books on France are too numerous to consider in detail. Rather I shall limit myself to some of the more recent ones available.

Olivia de Havilland has written a breezy one entitled: EVERY FRENCHMAN HAS ONE—(a liver, that is!) Here is an account of her adventures and misadventures married to a Frenchman. Freda White's THREE RIVERS OF FRANCE considers the Dordogne, Lot and Tarn Rivers, giving a detailed description of the people and topography of the regions through which they flow. Denis Brogan has contributed FRANCE — one of the fine series of Life World Library. He starts off with a historical resume and then takes up the factors which have made France what she was and is today. Art Buchwald has given us the witty DON'T FORGET TO WRITE—a collection of articles from Paris which originally appeared in the New York Herald Tribune. They are humorous, frivolous and sometimes rigged, but pure Buchwald.

More specifically Paris, we have Cornelia Otis Skinner's ELEGANT WITS AND GRAND HORIZONTALS: "a sparkling panorama of 'la belle époque,' its guided society, irrepressible wits and splendid courtesans." Here is aristocratic life in the Paris of the 1890's. For the gourmet, we can offer W. L. Root's FOOD OF FRANCE, which, while concerned with good eating, also serves up ample helpings of history, geography, anecdotes and incidental information on France.

JAMES PASSANANTE, OF BUCKINGHAM ROAD

Fourteen years ago James Passanante became a gardener to help his arthritis. Today he has a complete eleventh century paved garden at his Buckingham road home and has given some of his rare plants to grateful members of the Grosse Pointe Men's Garden Club.

From all over the world Mr. Passanante has gathered seeds and bulbs to plant in his garden. He is searching now for a hardy cypress to form the center of a grove to St. Anthony. He has several pieces of Di Gropi staturary including a figure of St. Francis and St. Fiacre, the patron saint of gardeners.

Mr. Passanante, who began his garden in 1949 with dwarf fruit trees, has had some amazing successes. One of his most

and planted rare varieties of fruit trees.

Mr. Passanante does all the garden work himself except for lawn cutting. He is a great believer in compost heaps, develops one to feed his rare plants. He has a greenhouse complete with all electrical gadgets in which he experiments with hybrid plants. This summer he has been labeling all his plants with green tags bearing the Latin and common name.

Eleventh Century Copy He planned his garden as a miniature eleventh century European garden with the focal point a stunning fountain and well designed especially for him. He has also a small rose garden copied from one he found and admired in Baden Baden. He did all the paving of his unusual paths himself. His wife shares his love of gardening and particularly enjoys the rose garden.

He has had some failures. He has never been able to grow a palm tree successfully in this climate but his successes far outweigh his disappointments. His herb garden, with fresh tarragon and sage is a delight. He never sprays his plants and trees with DDT because he loves birds. For evening parties in the summer he uses the candles which repel bugs.

Mr. Passanante says he owes a great debt of gratitude to Vincent De Petris, who has advised him about most of his plants until he became an expert himself.

Grosse Pointe is a bower of distinctive and beautiful gardens but there are few with the remarkable charm of the Passanantes' old world arbor which has brought hours of contentment and health to its owner and enjoyment to his friends and neighbors with whom he shares it bountifully.

unusual specimens is a salad tree, which grows nectarines, plums, peaches and apricots all at the same time. They are ripe now and delicious eating.

Rare Fruit Trees He has rare boxwood, locust trees, a double mock orange, seedling apricots, German tomatoes, which reach an enormous size, a Chinese orange, an Italian olive and a ginkgo. He is constantly changing his plants, all perennials. When he has grown an unusual plant he gives a graft to one of his fellow garden club members. Every August the Garden Club meets in his back patio where he has a complete summer kitchen and barbecue area and can serve over 100.

This year the annual cookout and meeting was earlier, for the Passanantes will leave in August for Europe where he plans to search for seeds in England, Holland and Switzerland and visit some of the world's most famous gardens. He is a member of Grosse Pointe Rotary and International Rotary which has brought him many friends in his travels.

Winter Home in Florida During the winter the Passanantes live in Bel Harbour, Fla., where they own a co-operative apartment. They usually leave in January and return in April, just in time for Mr. Passanante to get his garden in shape for summer. He hates to leave his hobby which takes up between 20 and 30 hours of his leisure a week. For years the family has had a Florida home and he remembers when he first took up gardening he filled in their swimming pool

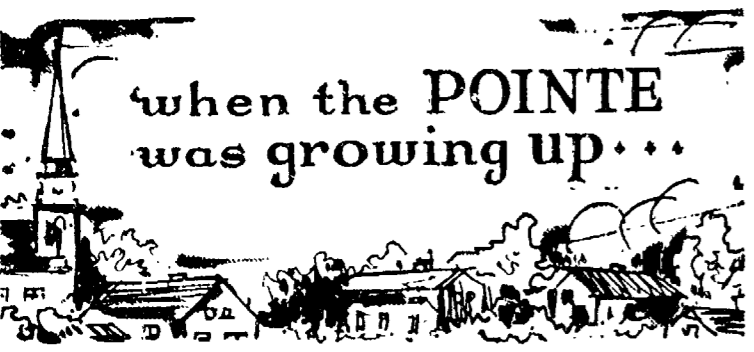

For forty years Herbert V. Book has been collecting family letters and documents to compile a record for this and future generations of Books. This summer his work was privately published in "Family Records" a detailed account of a family whose history is woven with Detroit's and such clans as Campau, Palms and Dequindre.

The first Books, of German descent, settled in Ontario just before the turn of the nineteenth century. It was the first J. Burgess Book, a noted surgeon, who came to Detroit soon after his medical education in the year following the Civil War. Dr. Book was married in Detroit in 1869 to Clotilde Palms, daughter of Francis Palms and the author of "Family Records" is one of their three sons.

In delving into the Palms records Mr. Book has discovered some delightful stories about the early Palms founders. They are descended from Ange Palms, who migrated here from his native Belgium about 1835. His wife died of cholera in Detroit and after several years he moved his family to New Orleans, where he established a manufacturing business and died in 1876.

He left behind in Detroit a son, Francis Palms, who is listed in the first Directory of Detroit in 1837 as living in Congress street above Woodward avenue. He had married the year before Martha Burnett Larned, "a great-granddaughter of Aniquiba, Chief of the St. Joseph Potawatomi." She died in 1838 leaving a small son, Francis F. Palms, who was brought up by his father's sister, Marie Palms, in New Orleans. F. F. Palms grew up in the South and served in the Confederate Army. His father remained in Detroit and became an American citizen in 1848. In 1842 he married again, Catherine Campau, a daughter of Joseph Campau and Adelaide Dequindre, and their daughter, Clotilde, became the wife of Dr. Book, and the mother of Herbert Book, the compiler of "Family Records".

In doing his research Mr. Book discovered some letters kept by his mother which reveal fascinating stories about Francis Palms, who remained in Detroit when his family went south with his son.

His fortune was in timber and real estate and he kept many of the records of his transactions in his memory. He would never buy a newspaper but would stop each morning at Biddle House downtown on his way to the office and read the hotel paper.

When his first son, F. F. Palms, returned finally from the South about 1880 the long years of separation had made the two strangers. There is a family story that the father and son failed to recognize each other. By this time Francis Palms, the first, owned about 150,000 acres in Wisconsin but was frugal with money. The doors on his house in Congress street had faulty locks but in order to secure them he would place a stick of firewood beneath them at night rather than buy a new lock. His New Orleans raised son, who spoke English with a French accent, lived in a nearby house.

Catherine Campau Palms spent some of her married life in Montreal, where the couple's only surviving child, Clotilde, was educated in a convent. She returned to Detroit in 1869 with her daughter, although they lived apart from Mr. Palms. He died in 1886 leaving his fortune to his first son, F. F. Palms, Clotilde Palms Book and Michael W. O'Brien.
