Speaking of Advertising

Advertising takes many forms, some of them good, some bad. For a number of years we have been on the receiving end of one method that has been particularly pleasant, and it must produce or it wouldn't have been continued this long.

It all started when a letter arrived from Jerry Rideout, genial public relations head of the Buick Division of General Motors. It stated that all of us editors are fairly garrulous guys, and that was all Buick was looking for . . . someone who could and would talk. Buick knew that if it could get a mess of editors driving its product there would be talk aplenty. So it had compiled a list of some 200 scribblers from coast to coast and was contacting them to ask the privilege of putting a car at their disposal for a reasonable testing period. No obligations of any kind. Just fill in the enclosed card, saying where the car should be delivered. They'd call you when they wanted to pick it up. 






