ERTIES UNION attacked certain practices of welfare agencies, especially midnight investigations. The ACLU charged this was a violation of the Fourth Amendment which protects citizens against illegal search and seizure by demanding entrance to the homes of women's aid recipients. Investigators must have warrants to enter a home, but if the householder refuses entrance, she stands to lose aid.

ALL THE DOGS at the dog pound in Sturgis were let loose by some well-meaning soul Monday night. However, Miles Kirkpatrick, dog warden, was heartened when he returned to work Tuesday morning. He found all the dogs waiting outside the gate, hoping to be readmitted.

FIRE-ALARM BOXES should be equipped with loud sirens, according to Mayor Cavanagh. This would help avoid false alarms being turned in, such as the one that led to the death of a Detroit fireman. Mcanwhile, a 15-year-old youth confessed to turning in the alarm "just to see what would happen." Plans are under way to have the culprit, Maurice Fountain, tried as an adult.

With his characteristic sense of fairness, Matt left it completely up to us as to how and when to sever his connection with the paper. No official announcement was made of his resignation because uppermost in our mind was the hope that Matt would recover sufficiently to be able to return and continue to serve the paper.

We are happy to report that Mr. Goebel's health has improved and he is feeling better, but he doesn't want to jeopardize the improvement by going back to the rigorous schedule that his position demanded. With the completion of our fiscal year the first of this month, his resignation became official.

Matt Goebel joined the Grosse Pointe News staff when this paper was less than a year old. The News never had, nce ever could have an employe more loyal, nor more intensely proud of its product. Matt was the instigator of the Grosse Pointe Business Men's Association and was president of this organization during a period of its greatest growth. He had a guiding hand in the start of uncounted Pointe businesses, and was at his best while laying out a campaign that would help a new establishment obtain the recognition that is so essential in achieving success. Matt could fight at the drop of a hat with anyone in the office he felt was letting the paper down, but his temper cooled quickly. Shortly after stomping out of the building in a rage he would be back, bearing icecream, a cake and coffee, or a box of candy. No apologies ... just a quiet gesture of understanding and contrition. Matt Goebel's contribution to the success which the News has enjoyed has been a great one. He has taught us all a great deal and gave much of himself to his job. We are grateful and shall miss him. We hope his health continues to improve, that the future holds many years of happy and useful living for him, and that he comes to see us often.

How to Brew Excellent Coffee

Chances are that sometime during the holiday months ahead, you'll be called upon to serve coffee to a large group. Happily, coffee in any quantity is one of the easiest refreshment assign-ments you can draw. Once you know a few rules, you can maka excellent coffee for any number of people. Let's assume you'll be making forty average servings. Allow one pound of ground coffee to two gallons of water. Some simple arithmetic will enable you to adapt the recipe to a larger or smaller group. Even easier: empl ying any standard macquing

smaller group. Even easier: employing any standard measuring device, use one part coffee to six parts water for perfect results. If you use a coffee urn, use the suggested coffee-to-water proportions—drip grind coffee, of course—then follow the brew-ing instructions given by the manufacturer of the urn.

Coffee in a Kettle

Excellent coffee can be made in an open kettle, too. First, Excellent coffee can be made in an open kettle, too. First, measure freshly-drawn cold water into a spotlessly clean kettle and heat it to boiling point. In the meantime, measure regular grind coffee into a clean cloth sack which has been soaked and rinsed thoroughly. The sack must be large enough so that it is not more than half-full when the ground coffee is placed in it. This allows for expansion of the coffee and free circulation of the water. Tie the top of the sack tightly, allowing enough cord for fastening to the kettle handle. When the water comes to a full rolling hold reduce heat to

When the water comes to a full, rolling boil, reduce heat to hold just below the boiling point. Fasten the sack to pot handle, then submerge the sack into the water. Keep the kettle on low heat and push the sack up and down frequently to get the proper extraction. Brew 6 to 8 minutes. Do not let the coffee boil. When the coffee is ready, remove the sack, permitting all the beverage to drain into the kettle. Then, serve your delicious coffee as soon as possible. soon as possible.






