 were 46 applications received last year under the Veterans Exemption, and it is predicted that a large number of these will switch to the former. The absolute deadline for application for either exemption is March 29, it was disclosed.

The City revealed that 12 applications have been received for senior exemptions, and 30 for veterans. Last year, 30 applications were received under the Veterans Act, and most of the applicants under the new act had switched to take advantage of the larger reduction.

Thirty-five applications have been mailed to City residents who have inquired about the Senior Citizens Act, and found they are eligible to apply, it was said. A March 1 deadline is set for City applications.

In the Park, 20 persons applied for exemptions on the Veterans, and only six under the Veterans. About 40 applications are normally received each year for the latter.

**To Inform Residents**  
 It was disclosed that the quarterly newsletter, presently being printed, will be sent to all residents in the Park, with a full page devoted to explaining both acts, and who is eligible to apply.

The deadline for acceptance of applications is set for March 1. Any person who is eligible, but is unable because of illness, or other legitimate reasons, to apply in person, can call the Municipal Building, Valley 2-6200, and the city assessor will go to the house to assist in filling out an application.

 Dr. James Stuckey, member of Denby Club and a former Kiwanis' Lieutenant Governor will conduct the installation ceremonies.

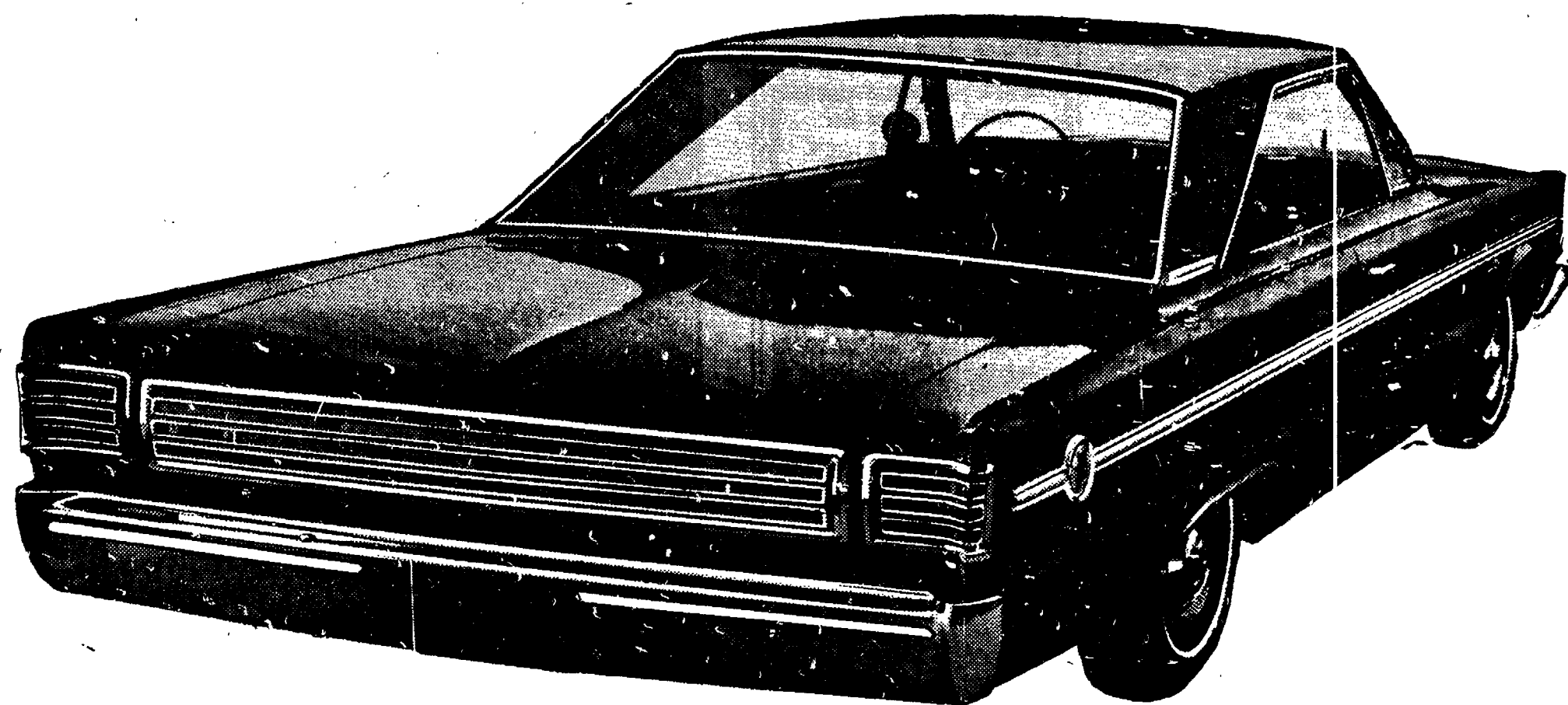

study was made, however, before Mr. Johnson began his world-wide peace offensive and the lull in the bombing of North Vietnam.

FOLLOWING WHAT seemed a military revolt in the Dominican Republic, the United States renewed its support yesterday for Hector Garcia Godoy, the provisional president of that country. The rebellion led to two riots in Santo Domingo which were quelled by American paratroopers. The inter-American peace team members also supported the Godoy government in a formal statement. It said any threat to the stability of the government would be considered "an open challenge" to the forces of the OAS.

MAYOR CAVANAGH SAID yesterday that Detroit will join other Michigan cities in pressing for legislation to furnish State matching funds to fight water pollution. Under the new Federal Water Pollution Control Act, the U.S. government would furnish up to 60 percent of the cost of some projects and 50 percent of others. A law now being drafted to be submitted to the State Legislature would provide for the amount above the Federal grant to be split between the State and the municipal governments.

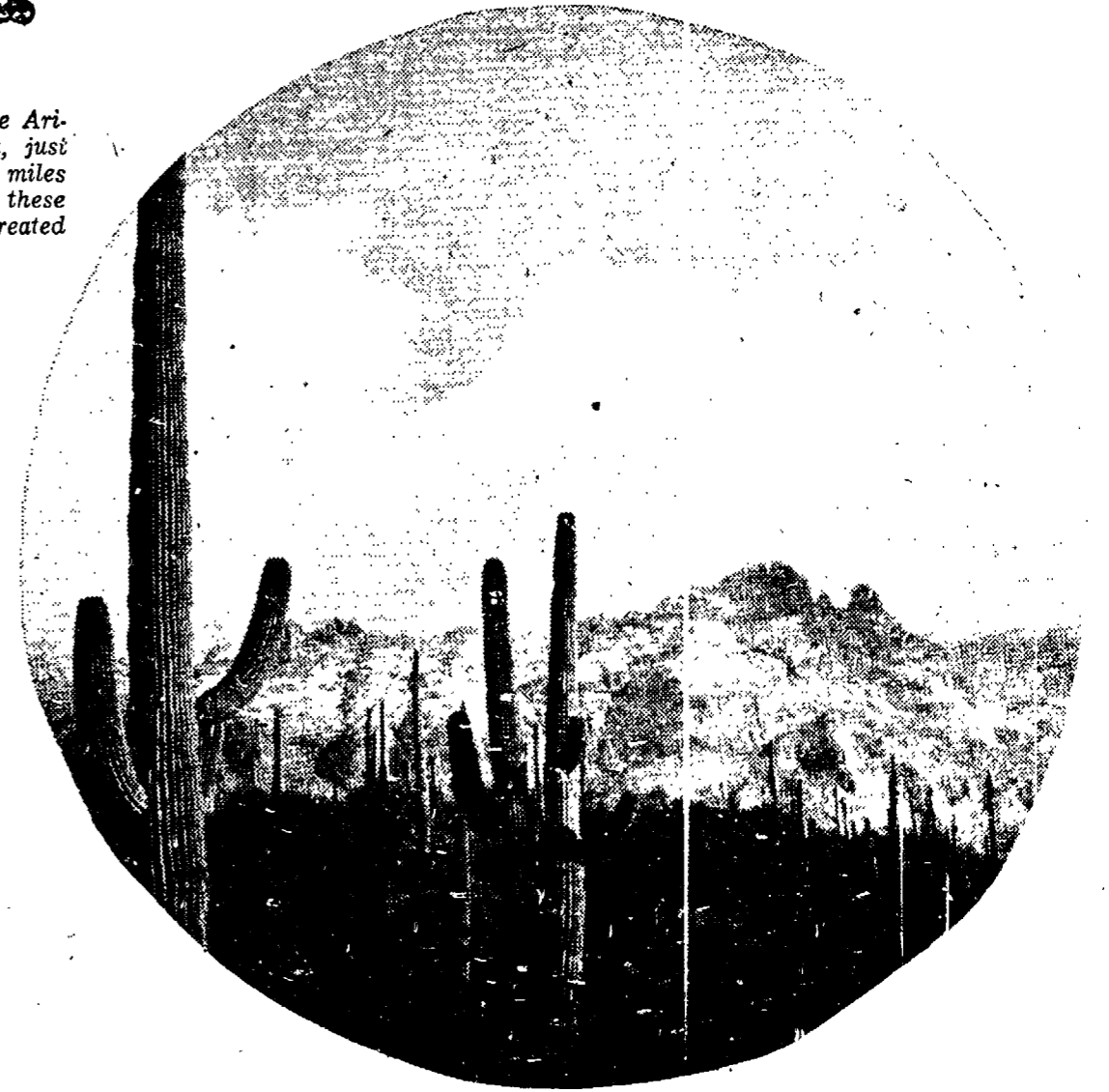

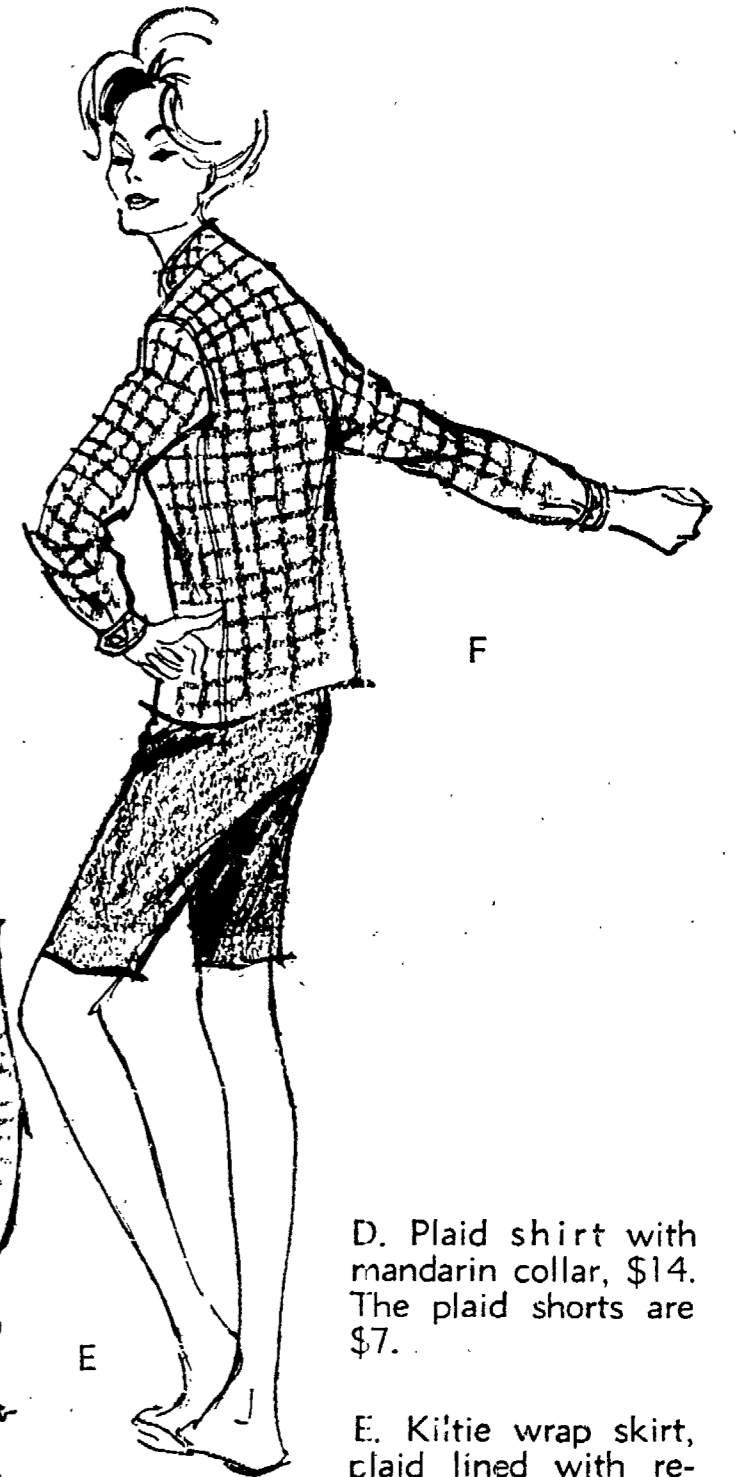
