(Continued from Page 1) the 1967-1968 school year. He quoted newspaper accounts stating that the December climb in living costs was the highest in 15 years, and that the rate of increase would be slightly higher during 1966.

The Superintendent further presented data on the effects of the building boom in the Detroit area, and the effect this could have upon the construction of Grosse Pointe High School North.

It was also revealed that the bidding documents for Grosse Pointe High School North will be available for distribution to contractors on February 16.

Named to Commission In other action, the trustees named two representatives to the study commission considering the feasibility of the establishment of a metropolitan recreation commission for the Grosse Pointes.

The school trustees decided on alternate bids on the swimming pool for Grosse Pointe High School North, contingent upon the architects' fee for planning the alternate.

The Board of Education authorized participation by the school system in Title II of Public Law 81-874, which will enable the schools to develop programs for children from low-income families.

In other business, the trustees approved the report of the Director of Business and Finance, Ray MacArthur. The Board of Education recognized the Grosse Pointe Association of Educational Secretaries and the Grosse Pointe Plant Personnel Association as the official representatives for the two employee groups.

Study Library Opening The trustees are studying the possibility of Sunday opening of the Grosse Pointe Library, a division of the school system.

In the course of action on personnel matters, Dr. Wilson presented the names of seven professional staff members who will retire at the close of the current year.

Retiring at the close of the year are Mrs. Maurine Allan, with 37 years of local service; Glenn Bray, 23 years; Kenneth Cary, 30 years; Miss Dorothy Crandall, 40 years; Mrs. Lorraine Gillespie, 30 1/2 years; Mrs. Lula Ives, 22 1/2 years; and Miss Doris Trott, 35 years.

The meeting ended at 9:30. The next meeting of the Board of Education will be Monday, March 14.

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Extortion Attempt Foiled by Police, Postal Inspectors

(Continued from Page 1) and Friday was the date set for the payoff.

The matter was turned over to Det. Sgt. Jack Mast, by the public safety director, for investigation.

Mast said that he conducted a thorough investigation and found that the alleged affair was a farce, and that Miss de Walter was using the defamatory in an attempt to extort money from the accountant.

On January 27, Mast contacted the postal inspectors, since the extortion letter was sent through the mails; and officers of the Special Investigation Bureau of the Detroit Police Department, since the alleged payoff was to take place in Detroit.

Later, on January 27, Mast and Woods Det. Gerald Kensora met with Postal Inspectors Myron Wood and Earl Wheeler, and Detroit Det. Sgt. Francis O'Connor of the Special Investigation Squad.

The officers drafted a letter, and recorded the numbers of 18 currency bills, placed them in an envelope and sealed it, in compliance with the extortionist's request. The letter was given to the accountant, who was instructed to wrap the envelope in a newspaper and told where it was to be placed at 11 a.m. on January 28.

Mast, Kensora, Wood, Wheeler and O'Connor arranged to meet at 9:30 a.m. on the 28th. Two other postal inspectors,

Charles Viculis and James Wilkenson were also at the meeting place, and the stake-out began.

Every person who ventured near the area was scrutinized and his activities were recorded, minute by minute. The first day, nothing happened. The envelope with the money was removed, and a note left for the extortionist, asking for more time.

On Wednesday, February 2, Mast, Kensora and Woods Det. Stephen Petrik, met with the accountant at the station, and all went in the accountant's car to the payoff location.

The Postal detectives met with Postal Inspectors Wood, Viculis and Robert Middel, and Sgt. O'Connor, at which time arrangements were set for planting the money and the

stakeout of Miss de Walter's home.

A few minutes later the accountant drove up to the woman's house, and placed the envelope in a mailbox.

The officers kept a close watch on the house for more than three hours, and at 3:47 p.m., they saw a young woman in her early 20s, later identified as Miss de Walter, take the en-

velope from the mailbox and run across the street to a store at 4868 East Forest.

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### Woods Council Holds Meeting

The business of the evening was conducted almost without incident at the regular council meeting of the Woods on Monday, February 7.

During the public hearing called to discuss the petition for a variance on off-street parking on the business property owned by John S. Hillock at the southeast corner of Mack and Huntington boulevard, Mrs. Jack Calis of 1615 Huntington, adjacent to the property, appeared and stated that there is congestion of traffic and problems of parking because of the already existing businesses.

Hillock showed the Council that the purposes for which he desired to build his office would not cause traffic or appreciably increase parking and that because he was already owner of this property which has some irregularity of dimensions that not being able to build with the variant two-car off street parking provisions would be a hardship. He was granted his permit.

Another public hearing will be scheduled for the next regular council meeting in two weeks to consider the petition of Charles J. Merrill, co-owner of the Berkshires co-operative apartments regarding the height of the brick wall surrounding the property and the size of the sign.

### Pointes to Share \$99,119 From State Highway Fund

The Department of State Highways has begun its distribution of fourth quarter results of the 1965 Motor Vehicle Highway Fund collections, to Michigan counties and incorporated cities and villages, it was disclosed by Howard E. Hill, State Highway director.

Hill said that net receipts of the fund during October, November and December, amounted to \$62,124,339, an increase of \$3,594,979, compared to the same period of 1964.

The five Pointes will receive a total of \$99,119, as their share of the collection funds, according to information released by the state highway director.

The Woods will receive the biggest slice of the amount allocated for the Pointe, \$32,486, with the Park getting the next biggest bite, \$26,891. The Farms share will be \$22,920; the City, \$12,409; and the Shores, \$4,413.

Under provisions of State law, after deduction of collection costs, and the Waterways Commission's share, 47 percent of the fund goes to the State for use on state roads; 35 percent goes to the State's 83 counties, for use on their roads; and 18 percent is distributed among the 520 incorporated cities and villages for use on their roads and streets.

Based on this formula, the State highways will receive \$29,198,439; counties, \$21,743,519; and incorporated cities and villages \$11,182,381. Hill revealed that the amount

paid to counties includes snow removal funds of \$671,523, distributed on the basis of snow fall in each county during last winter.

The amount of the fund to be received by Wayne County is \$4,216,592, it was stated.

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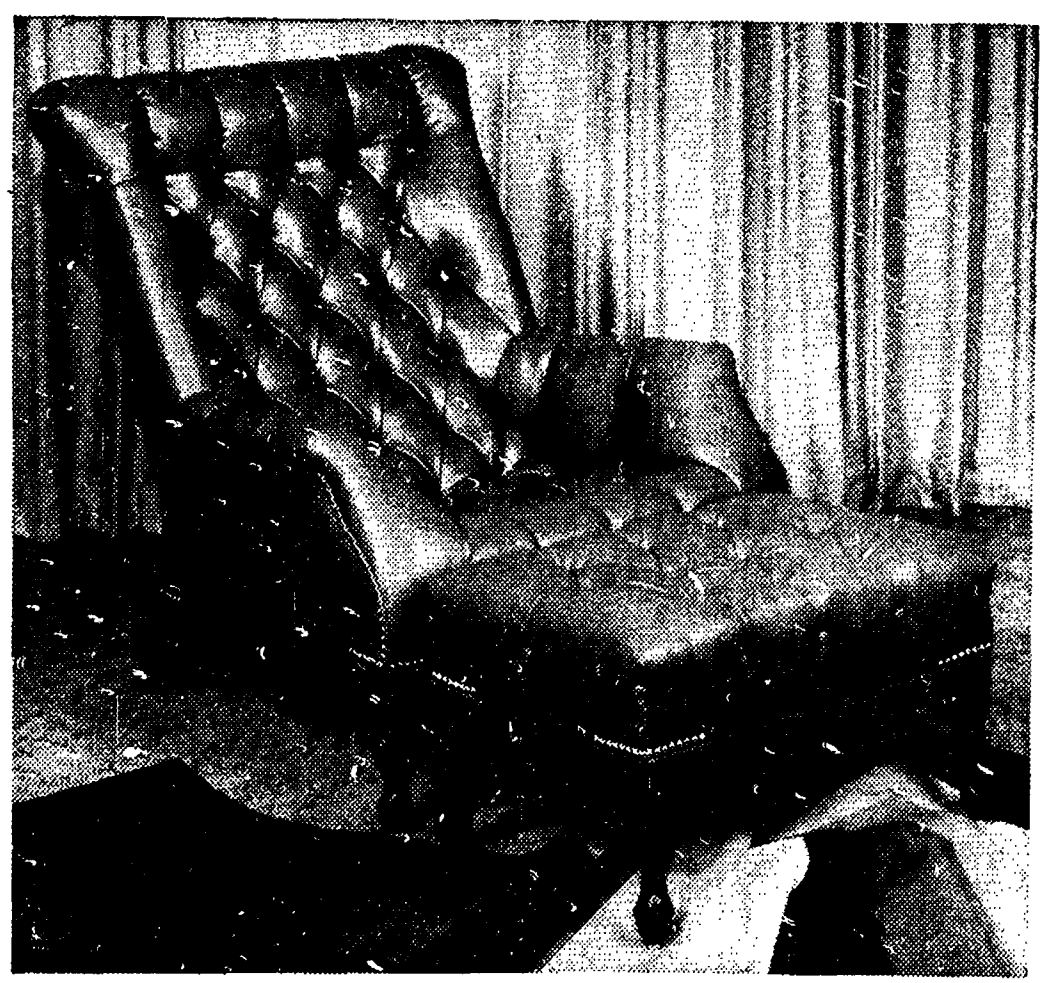
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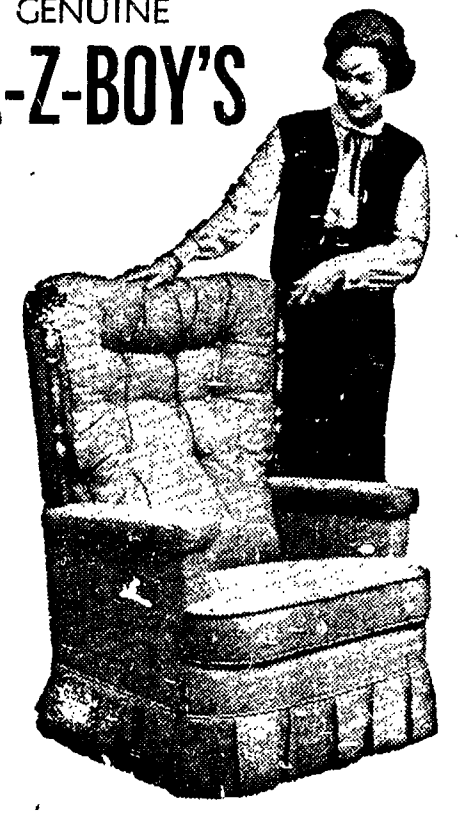


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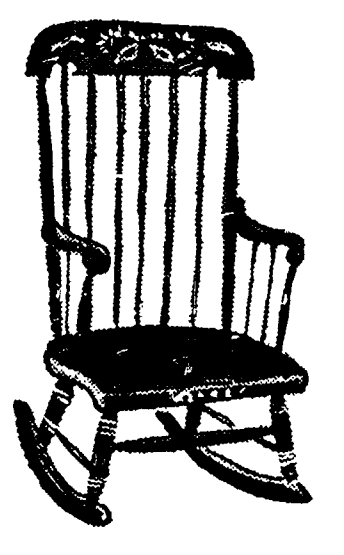
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### Series Traces Movie History

University School Notes

Earl Kimber, Chairman of History Department, is teaching Modern History beginning with the present and studying into the past. Instead of taking the usual approach of spending one year studying Medieval History and the following year Modern History, he has revised the approach in order to include a half year on Afro-Asian Affairs. Since it was impossible to predict how much Medieval and Modern History he could cover in a year and a half, he decided to teach Medieval History in the first half of the freshman year and Modern History in the second half. In the sophomore year he teaches a half year of Modern History and a half year of Afro-Asian Affairs.

The result of studying history "backwards" is that the student first studies the results and then the causes. Similarly Mr. Kimber has his students study most of their book by reading from the back to the front.

Although this is a completely new approach to history at the school, the end result seems to be a much greater interest in major historical events. Mr. Kimber has his students "post-hole" by studying the causes, results and ideas of a major historical event, and he does not necessarily try to cover a whole period of history. Mr. Kimber feels that as a result of this approach, he is better able to prepare his students for Advanced Placement History.

Mrs. Edward Lynch, Chairman of the French Department, has had three guest lecturers speak in French to her advanced French classes. Mrs. Robert Fabre, Mrs. Charles Bachroch, and Mr. Jean Mesritz have spoken on life in France, French customs, and the French system of education. In addition to the students getting training in oral comprehension by listening to the speakers, the students have also exercised their oral self-expression through questions at the end of each talk.

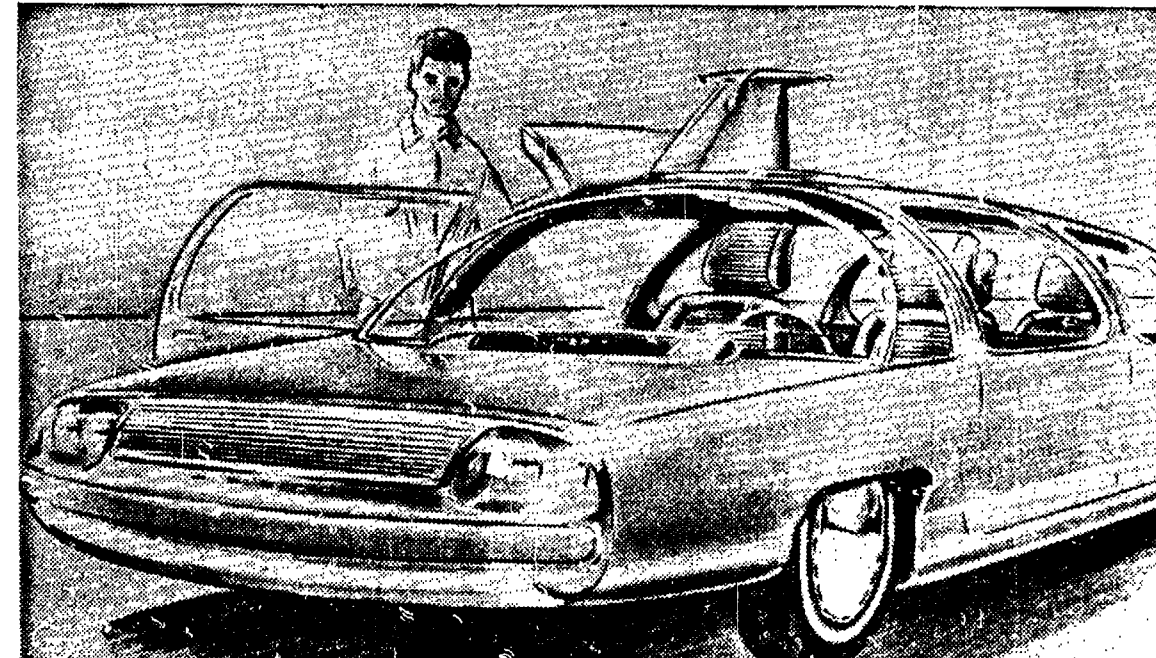

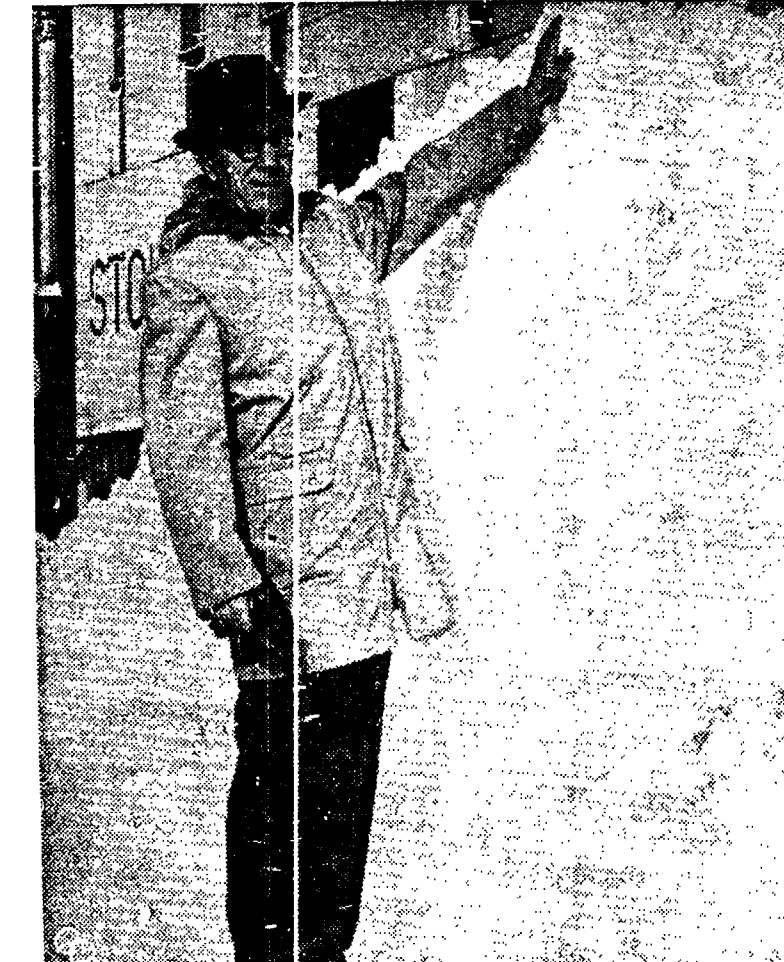
