## Traffic Group Urges Safety

The Grosse Pointe Traffic and Safety Committee, cognizant of the fact that winter will still be with us, at least for a few more weeks, urges motorists not 9 election will still have these to be winter misfits.

To avoid being misfits, members of the council agreed, motorists should drive at reduced speed during winter's severe storms, or when pavements are coated with ice and snow. Drivers should always be alert in such situations.

Cars should not be winter misfits, either, but should be kept in good winter-driving condition.

"Peep-hole" driving should be avoided. Clear away all snow, ice and frost from the entire windshield and the side and rear windows.

George E. Measel, manager of the Pointe Branch of the Automobile Club of Michigan, and secretary of the Traffic and Safety Committee, recommended the following:

Replace or refill dead, streaking wiper blades with live, new ones that wipe clean; and make sure headlights, tail lights and directional signals are working properly.

Titles of these League materials are: "Rights of 'Another Nation' " and "Development for Distressed Areas". Together they bring the reader up to date on pertinent national developments.

Taking its name from a statement of President Johnson in which he said, "in far too many ways American Negroes have been another nation," Rights of 'Another Nation' covers three areas of the League's equal opportunity study.

Although the Civil Rights Act - the "most important federal law" directed toward creating equality of opportunity - is believed to have eliminated in its first year more legally based racial discrimination than all previous court decisions, congressional acts and presidential orders, the eight-page booklet points out deepseated and unsolved questions which are being raised as the law begins

These questions include: "Are more federal laws needed to cope with de facto segregation? Does a system of priorities need to be established regarding excellence in education first, and then racial balance? 
