ANY REFERENCE to peace negotiations in Vietnam was absent from the speech President Johnson made to the American Association of School Administrators in Atlantic City on Wednesday, Johnson defended more strongly than before America's position to defend Vietnam against the threat of a Communist take-over, making it clear, however that the U.S. is also pledged to help the Vietnamese people fight "terror, disease, hunger and ignorance." He told the assembled school administrators that the U.S. will help build 2,800 classrooms, train 13,400 teachers and distribute nearly six million textbooks in the impoverished na-

DR. THOMAS E. BROWN with two assistants operated on a tumor of a 50-year-old patient with melanomic skin cancer at Children's Hospital in Cincinnati, O., using a laser beam. The type of beam used was a gas laser developed at Bell Telephone Laboratories in Murray Hill, N.J. Because the easily controlled, intense beam of light cauterized blood vessels while it bleeding. Dr. Brown, who devised the operation, was reported to be jubilant as he said. 

# Mack-7 Area

Residents to Be Spared Anticipated Inconvenience By End Of March

Pointers and residents of nearby areas will not have to go extreme distances to get their operator's license, but first they must have a little patience. The Secretary of State's Office in Lansing revealed that it is expecting to open a licensing station at a convenient loca-

tion at Mack and Moross. A happy Farms council was informed by Councilman William Kirby on Monday, February 21, that a station site at Mack and Moross is being studied by State Officials, with a tentative opening date set by the end of March. An exact date was not given because once the site is selected, it would take time to procure equipment and staff the station.

At a regular meeting held on February 7, the Farms council was notified that the police chiefs of the Pointe and Harper Woods met on January 28, and set a deadline of February 28,
