

Hike in Boat Fees Bring Protest

(Continued from Page 1) —26 feet by 12 feet 9-inch well size, a flat \$125 fee for each well; 2. Side docks—31 feet by 15 feet 3-inch well size, a flat \$175 fee for each well; 3. Sail-fish craft—a \$10 fee for all craft in this category beginning with the 1966 boating season.

In Line With Others According to Kirby's and Hudson's study report, the recommended rates compare favorably to the average charges of the other Pointes and more closely follow those of the new sections at the Park's waterfront park.

The proposed new rates, the report stated, are estimated to realize approximately \$16,000 a year in the new section, and about \$10,000 in the old section, if the Farms marina is fully utilized, as compared to the \$6,600 collected each year on the present facilities.

In the light of the protest of the attending boat owners, Mayor William Butler appointed Kirby and Hudson to set a meeting date with the boaters to discuss an amiable solution as to what fees should be charged.

The two councilmen set this Saturday, February 26, at 3 p.m., as the date and time for the meeting which will be held in the Farms council chambers, 90 Kerby road. All interested resident boat owners are invited to attend and express their views.

Whatever solution is arrived at, will be presented to the council at its next meeting on Monday, March 7.

(Continued from Page 1) where an additional one million-gallon water reservoir is under construction. The cost of this is \$108,000.

When completed, the Farms will have a reservoir storage capacity of 2.5 million gallons.

The city manager said that the new reservoir construction is on schedule and is approximately 75 percent completed.

The cost of both the reservoir and main installation is being paid for out of Water Revenue Funds, Bremer pointed out, and does not involve any increase in taxes.

Another project, improvements of and including the roofing of the municipal garage at Chalfonte and Kerby, was discussed by representatives of an architectural firm hired by the Farms.

The representatives, outlining illustrated plans, disclosed that additional and necessary features will boost the cost of improvements another \$20,000. The original estimated cost of the project was \$70,000.

It was discussed by the city manager that additional monies to pay this extra cost will be included in the 1966-67 fiscal budget.

GPHS Student Conduct Drive

To initiate this year's AFS fundraising drive at Grosse Pointe High School, American Field Service and Youth for Understanding foreign students and returnees will model traditional costumes and school uniforms, discuss national customs, and sing folk songs in assemblies Friday morning.

The drive will continue through next week, with the sophomore, junior, and senior classes competing to raise the largest portion of the \$1500 goal.

"THIS SUM of \$1500, for which the Grosse Pointe High School Foreign Exchange Club is responsible, is only half the total amount needed to sponsor the traditional four AFS students — two boys and two girls — next year," said AFS president, Kathy Jens '66.

Each AFS scholarship is for \$750. The remaining amount is contributed by the Rotary Club, Mothers Club, and private donations collected by the Grosse Pointe Foreign Exchange Adult Committee, according to Miss Margaret Casteel, Foreign Exchange Club sponsor.

This year, the AFS will also receive ten per cent of the profits from a special foreign student program to be held in March to benefit the Mothers Club college scholarship fund. This AFS program will replace the annual spring-tea, said Miss Casteel.

Grosse Pointe High School waives tuition, the cost of textbooks, and daily lunches for foreign students. The Mothers Club pays the price of symphony series concert tickets for all AFS and YFU exchangees.

Any supplementary money collected during next week's fund raising drive will go toward small scholarship aids for Grosse Pointe High School students participating next year in the AFS Americans Abroad program.

BEGINNING MONDAY, money will be collected in homerooms, and at noontime in the cafeterias, said Kathy Jens.

AND EVERY morning next week, foreign students will speak over the P.A. system, explaining the cause of the AFS and letting students know which class is ahead in competition.

The winning class will get as a reward free admission to a film to be sponsored by the Foreign Exchange Club the evening of March 16 in the gymnasium. Others attending the movie will pay 50 cents for tickets purchased in advance and 75 cents for tickets sold at the door. Ticket money will also go to the AFS fund.

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
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Congressman Nedzi Tells Results of Questionnaire

Congressman Lucien N. (D. Mich.) commenting on the results of a questionnaire he had distributed to his constituents said:

"The conflict in Vietnam overshadows every other issue. It is foremost in the minds of my constituents, just as it must be foremost in the thinking of all Americans. Seventy-five per cent of those responding listed Vietnam as the No. 1 problem our nation faces.

"There is widespread frustration over the war. The feeling relates less to whether we are right or wrong than to the simple fact that a war exists. This I believe accounts for the rather surprising response to the question, 'Do you favor the overall record of the Johnson Administration?' The results showed 49.9 per cent answered No; 37.9 per cent answered Yes, and 12.1 per cent were undecided. I hope, and I believe, that this is a temporary phenomenon.

A word of caution should be given here. The response was unscientific. We mailed questionnaires to every household in the 14th Congressional District. We have received 11,060 responses. However, it can be fairly stated that Republicans responded in larger numbers than Democrats, and that certain areas of the district responded more heavily than others. The Grosse Pointes, for example, which have 13 per cent of the population, submitted 25.7 per cent of the responses. Detroit, with 74 per cent of the population, submitted 85 per cent of the responses.

"Nevertheless, if my district approximates the national attitude, it can be readily seen why the Republicans have been so quiet lately. They can sit back with the hope, or expectation, of gains in the fall elections as the public vents its frustration and the Democrats cut each other up.

"Regarding Vietnam, there is a feeling of 'Let's get it over with. Either blast 'em or get out.' Where there is disagreement with present policy, the disagreement is directed in favor of taking an even more militant position.

"The tally shows 60.2 per cent want to escalate if there is no early settlement. Among those who wish to withdraw, 19 per cent, an examination of their added written comments discloses that most are old-fashioned isolationists rather than critical liberals. The majority of the people do not disagree with the announced purposes of the war, but they want an early solution. And this puts pressure on the President as we approach the Fall election.

"A substantial number, 40.3 per cent, favor admission of Red China to the U.N., although a majority does not. The minority feels that Red China might be less intractable if included in the world body.

"The continuation of the draft is favored, 78.9 per cent to 14.1 per cent, with 6.9 per cent undecided. It was interesting to note that over 28 per cent would favor a tax increase in the event inflation threatens, 49.5 per cent would favor no change in taxes, and 22.2 per cent would favor a tax cut.

"The need for federal action or water and air pollution has dramatically caught the public imagination; 90.8 per cent favor such action, 5.6 per cent are opposed, and 2.5 per cent are undecided.

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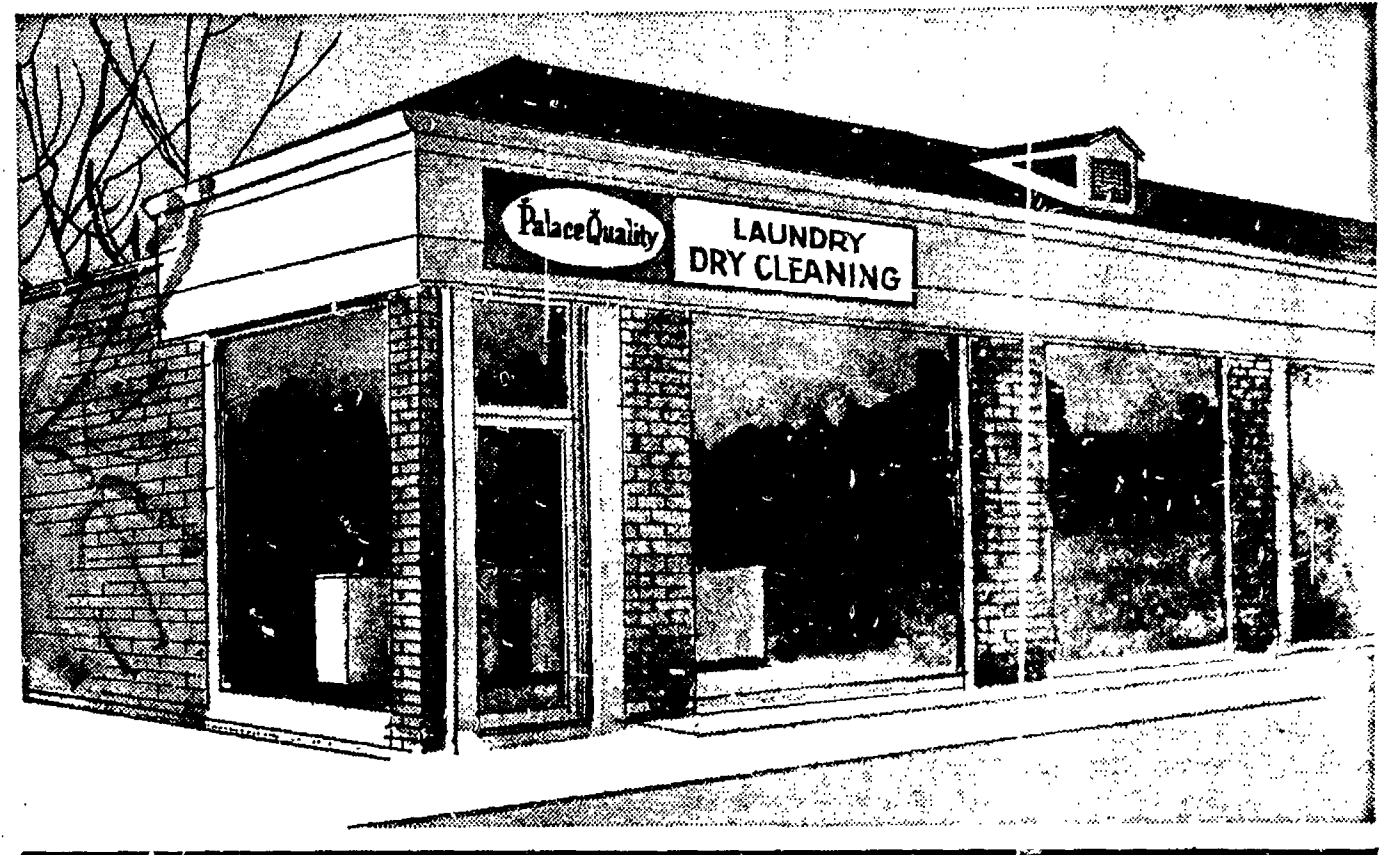
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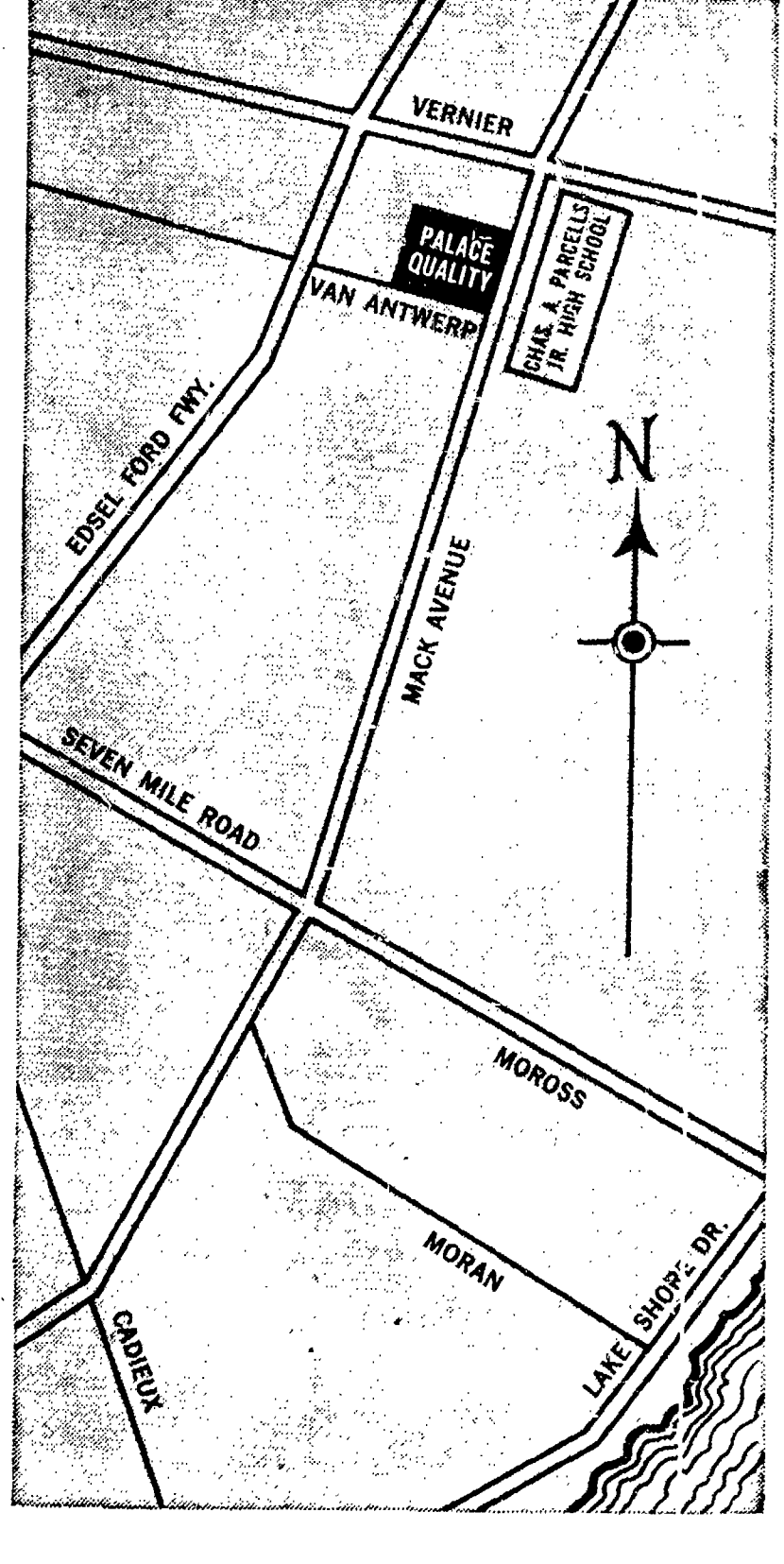

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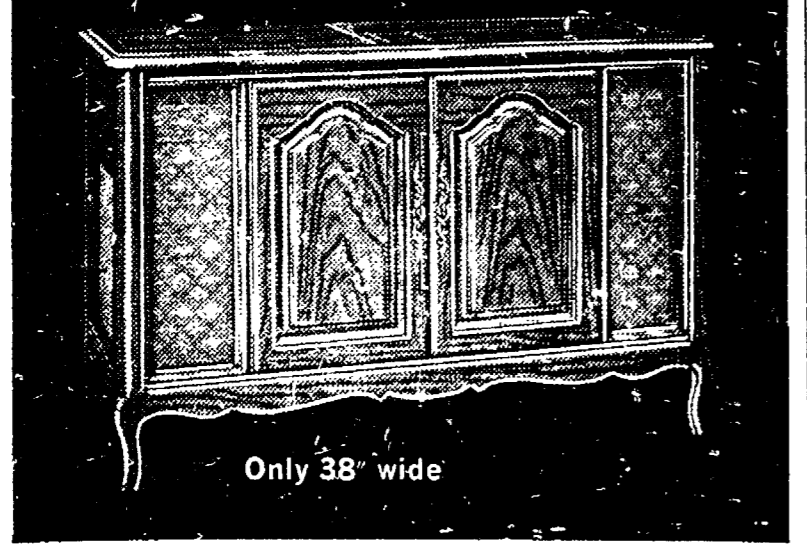
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Court, Traffic Fines Net Woods Treasury \$22,985

An annual report submitted to the Woods council and to City Administrator Chester Petersen by Municipal Judge Don J. Goodrow, disclosed that a total of \$22,984.95 was collected in court fines and costs and from fines paid to the Violation Bureau during 1965. The total included \$60.45 collected in State paid fees for State cases heard in municipal court.

Judge Goodrow revealed that a total of \$9,062.50 was collected from fines and costs in municipal court, and \$13,862 was paid to the Violation Bureau, for various law infractions.

The busiest month of the year for the Woods court, the judge stated in his report, was September, when 140 cases were heard and \$1,323.50 in fines and court costs collected. The busiest month for the Violation Bureau was July, when 556 matters were settled and a total of \$1,649 in fines was collected.

In State cases heard by Judge Goodrow last year, 13 were for uttering and publishing (bad checks); 11 were for larceny; two were for traffic offenses; four were for being disorderly persons; two were for malicious destruction of property; two were for assault, one for window peeping; and five that were remanded to Wayne County Circuit Court for further proceedings and trial (felonies).

Six of the nine regular monthly meetings of the Wayne County Municipal Judges Association were attended, as were two traffic conferences conducted by the Association.

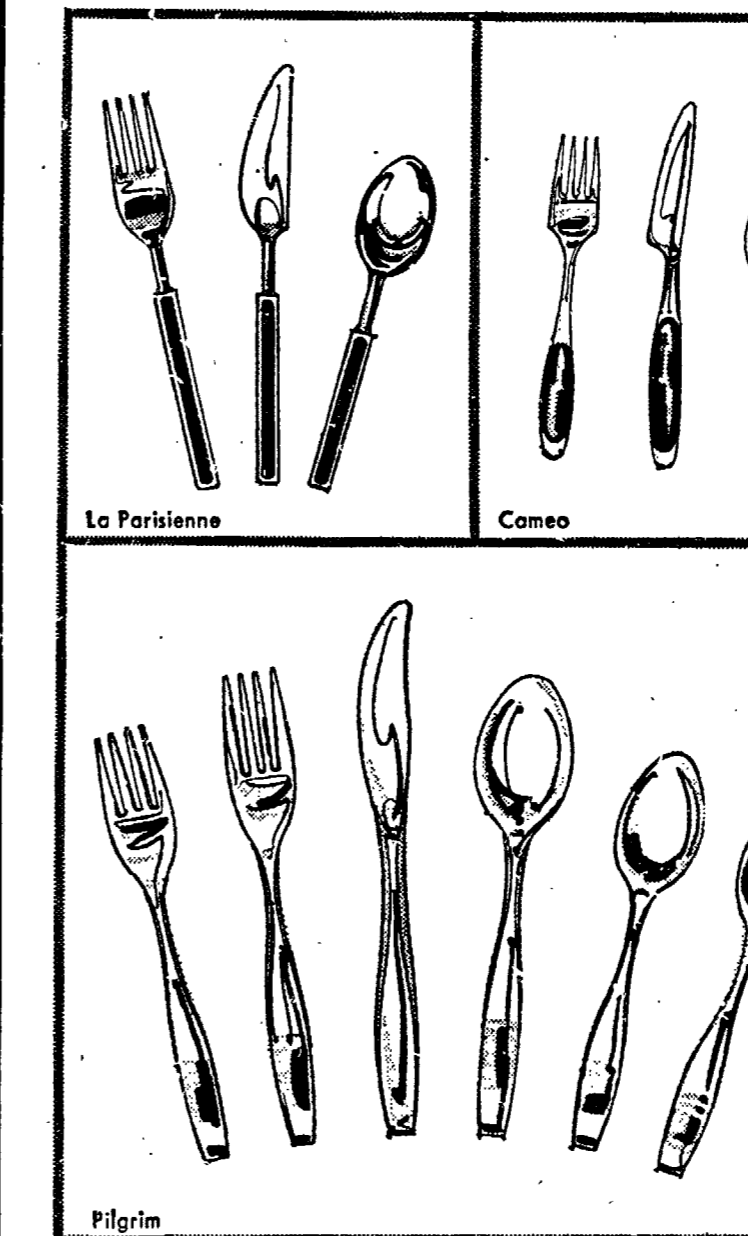

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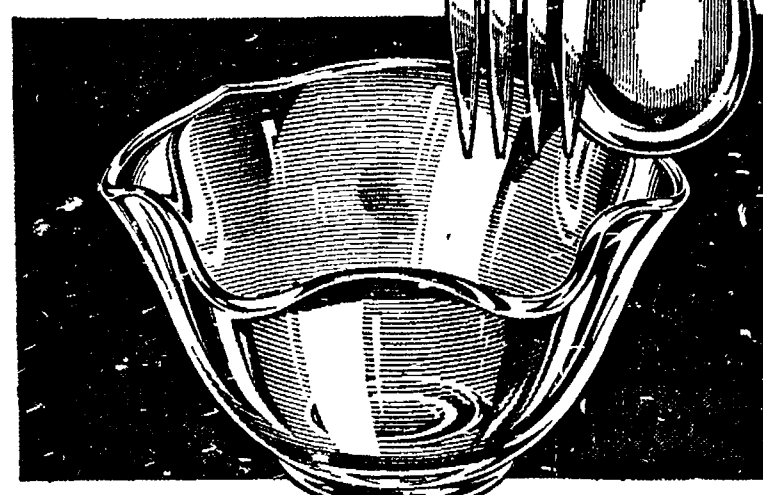
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Annual Contest Now in Progress

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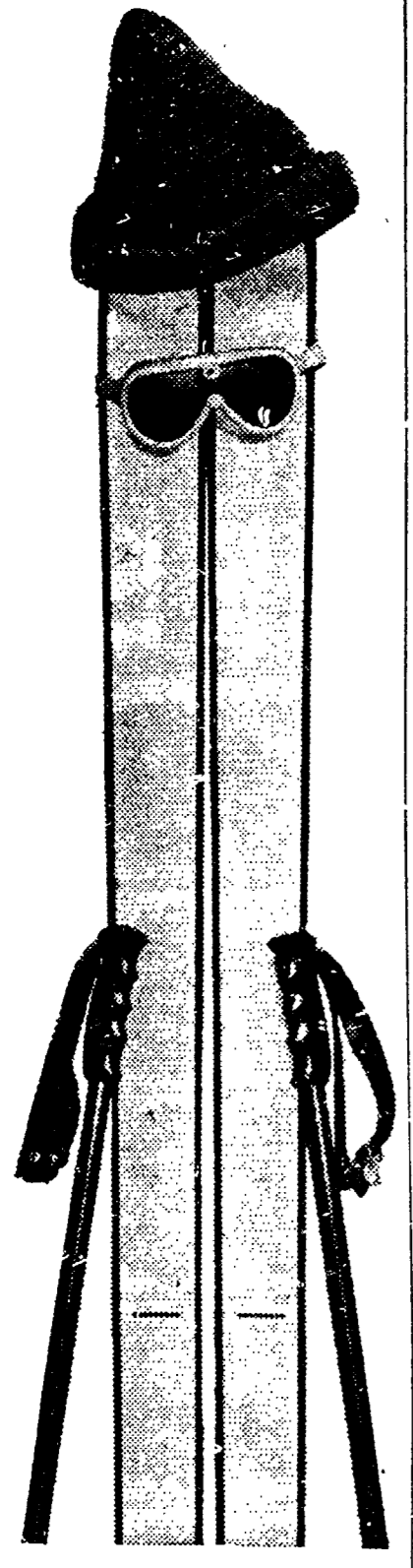
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Pierce Giving One-Act Plays

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WSU Professors Receive Awards

Two Wayne State University professors received the annual Probus Club Awards for Academic Achievement Saturday night, February 19, at the Club's annual dinner at the Sheraton-Cadillac Hotel. Sydney M. Feinberg, 885 Covington, president of the Club, made the presentation.

Honored were Dr. Harry Maisel, 19980 Renfrew road, Detroit, an associate professor in the department of anatomy at the School of Medicine, and Dr. Jacob E. Nyenhuis, 1418 Lakepointe, Grosse Pointe Park, assistant professor and acting chairman of the department of Greek and Latin. Both received \$500 grants without restrictions.

The presentation marked the fourth time that the Club, an organization of 100 Jewish business and professional men, has honored WSU faculty members. Other gifts and grants have been made to individual Detroit hospitals and charities, while more than 50 students have been assisted in the completion of their college careers by the Club.

Dr. Maisel, who joined the WSU School of Medicine faculty in 1961, received an M.Sc. degree from McGill University, Montreal, and a medical degree from the University of Cape Town, South Africa. Before coming to WSU, Dr. Maisel was a research assistant and demonstrator in anatomy at McGill University. He has conducted extensive research in the differentiation, development, growth and aging of the lens of the eye. The work is aimed at better understanding of the formation of cataracts — one of the problems of aging.

At WSU, Dr. Maisel is secretary of the Curriculum Study Committee for the School of Medicine.

Dr. Maisel is the author of several papers and articles in the field of anatomy. Married, he and his wife, Ray, have one child.

Dr. Nyenhuis, a member of the WSU faculty since 1962, and named acting chairman of his department in 1965. He received a B.A. degree from Calvin College and M.A. and Ph.D. degrees from Stanford University. Dr. Nyenhuis has been the recipient of many scholastic awards during his academic career.

At WSU, Dr. Nyenhuis is director of the Liberal Arts Honors Program and a member of the Religious Center Board, the General Education Committee and the Miles Poetry Committee.

In the past year, Dr. Nyenhuis has experimented with new approaches to the teaching of elementary Latin and has published a study of nomenclature problems of polymer chemistry with Professor H. K. Livingston of the WSU department of chemistry. Married, he and his wife, Leona Mae, have three children.

Criteria for the selection of Dr. Maisel and Dr. Nyenhuis included their academic and professional background and exceptional scholastic and research work.

The Club, in granting the awards, is also hoping to encourage young professors to remain in the community by recognizing their accomplishments and potential in fields contributing to civic welfare.

Award winners in 1965 were Dr. John M. Dorsey, the University Professor, and Dr. Calvin L. Stevens, professor and chairman of the department of chemistry.

The clinic which received donations last year from all the Point Councils has grown from two donated offices on Mack avenue to ownership of a building and parking lot and has been approved by the Act 54 Board for some state funds. The Council will take Mrs. Glancy's request under consideration when it reviews the budget.

The Council approved the offer of the Neighborhood Club to act as agent of the City in conducting a summer tennis clinic for all residents of the Pointes (Grosse Pointe School District) in 1966. The program will be similar to the one conducted in 1965, running for approximately five weeks, Monday through Friday, 9 a.m. to 12 noon. Reports of other details being worked out will be made later.

Shock Bros., Inc., was awarded the contract for spraying 2,492 City-owned elms on the basis of the \$2,242.80 bid submitted. City residents, who must have privately owned elms sprayed under Ordinance 84, may use the Shock Bros. service if they will notify the company before March 10.

Robert Bendzinski was designated by the Council to act as authorized agent in all negotiations with the Federal Sewage Works Grant WFC Mich-932.

The Council recommended the bid of the J. F. Cavanaugh Co. for sewer pumping station work be accepted pending approval by the Federal Government. Bids could not be obtained on a phase for the work involving reconditioning of gate and check valves, which was to have been part of the work for which the City is receiving Federal funds, and there is some question if this will jeopardize the grant.

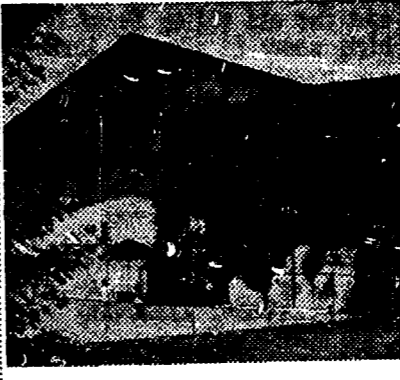

What Goes On at Your Library

WHAT GOES ON AT YOUR "Tolle, lege" — "take up, read"—this was the injunction issued by the translators to the reader of the authorized version of the King James Bible in 1611.

If you haven't seen this interesting brochure, you might like to know what some of these "significant" books are; the range is quite diversified, the annotations so good that I shall quote them rather than try feebly to equal them.

CRIME AND PUNISHMENT by Fedor Dostoevski, published in 1866, will be my first. "His heroes and heroines are walking miseries — victims of their own pride, their own resignations, their own lusts, their own mistakes . . ."

In another field is William James' important book, PRINCIPALS OF PSYCHOLOGY (1890). THE NATION, at this time, was prudent enough to indicate that this vast work could not be judged definitely for quite some time, but felt it would be an important contribution in years to come.

There are also note-worthy books in the juvenile category. What better example could we give than Potter's THE TALE OF PETER RABBIT? This 1902 clever story, with equally clever drawings "depicts the exciting incidents connected with a day in the life of Master Peter, his hair-breadth escapes, and returns to the bosom of his virtuous family."

It hardly seems possible but THE STORY OF MY LIFE by Helen Keller dates as far back as 1903. The fame and impact of this book make any annotation superfluous; I'm sure you have all read it at one time or another in your life.

Back again in the arena of children's literature, but this time more specifically in the

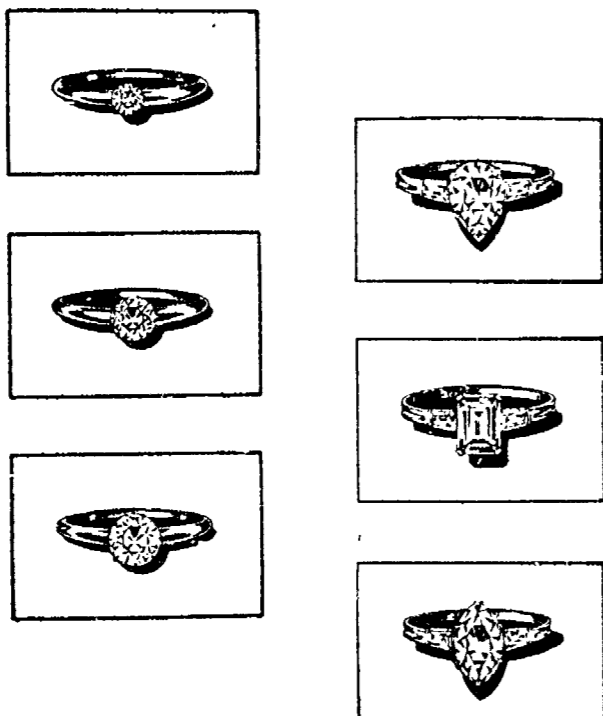
