(Continued from Page 1) City Attorney Richard Rohr. Under the charter, Public Employees' Faithful Performance Blanket Position Bond, in the amount of \$10,000, must be taken out on all persons employed by the city.

Some Have Higher Bonds In addition, higher indemnity bonds must be taken out on employees authorized to sign

checks. The employees and the extra indemnities are: Treasurer, \$99,000; deputy treasurer, \$15,000; city comptroller, \$40,000; deputy comptroller, \$15,000; councilman for finance, \$15,000.

Two separate bonds of \$1,000 each cover the city's two constables under the title of Public Official Bond.

The bonds are written for three years and will become effective on Thursday, March 31, at the stroke of midnight.

(Continued from Page 1) titles in the closed stacks — other than about 200 on sex, anatomy, and art — commonly held in the closed stacks in most libraries. These 30 titles are placed in closed stacks only to prevent the immature from having access to them except through the librarians.

Every book in the closed stacks is listed in the public card catalog and is available to adults on request. Mr. Orr pointed out that in addition to this group, there are some 20,000 books in the Central Library that are in the closed stacks because there is no room on the open shelves for them.

Can't Leave Library Some 200 additional titles on the open floor are restricted for circulation among high school students outside the library. "This is out of a public library collection of more than 115,000 volumes," Mr. Orr said.

High school students may take any book on an assigned reading list. Also, any parent may send a note permitting his child to take any book in the library.

Praised by Wilson Dr. Charles H. Wilson, Superintendent of Schools, made this statement today — "Mr. Orr and his staff have my complete confidence. We have many times discussed the difficult problem of book selection and rejection, and have explored numerous ways to improve our procedure. Actually, we have been amazed and pleased that our judgments have been so generously accepted particularly in a community with such widely varying political, religious and literary tastes."

Mr. Orr referred to the rules for book selection and restriction under which the Grosse Pointe Public Library operates. The November, 1961 issue of the library's manual, "Statement of Policy on Book and Non-Book Materials" is the latest revision of the institution's policy, and states regarding book selection:

Statement of Policy "As the delegated agent of the Superintendent of Schools (with the approval of the Board of Education) the Director of Libraries has the full responsibility for book selection. In meeting the reading requirements of all the community, every effort shall be made to represent both sides of controversial issues, to select books on the basis of literary merit,

and to maintain a book collection of high quality. Criteria for informational books shall include readability, accuracy of fact, and need for subject in the collection.

"Children's books are purchased on recommendation of the Chief of Children's Service; adult books on recommendation of a Book Committee composed of Department Heads and representatives of the professional staff.

"Books which might be found objectionable for youth are marked "Restricted" and are issued only to adults. Any book which is subject to complaint is referred to the Director for review."

Grateful To Friends Questioned about the role of the Friends of the Library, Orr commented, "They have nothing to do with book selection or library policy. They have given \$3,000 worth of books every year and they have exercised no control over the titles selected by our staff. This group has made the Grosse Pointe Public Library the fine community agency that it is today.

"Because the Grosse Pointe Board of Education is the official library board and because the trustees' main interest is in school matters, the board of directors of the Friends has served as an advisory body to the library for many years," Orr said. "Our group is bigger than any metropolitan Friends organization in the nation today," he added.

Orr is chairman of the Friends of Libraries Committee of the American Library Association.

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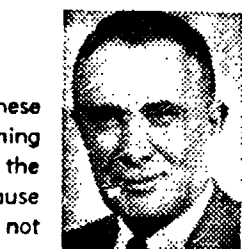


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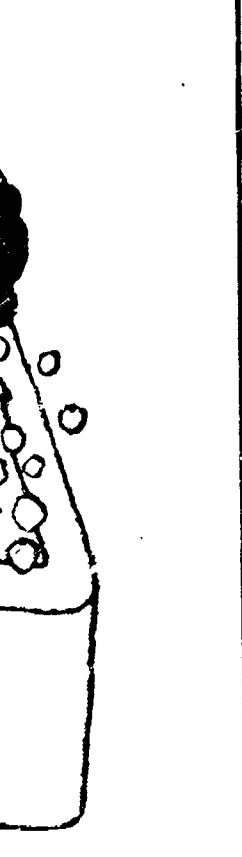
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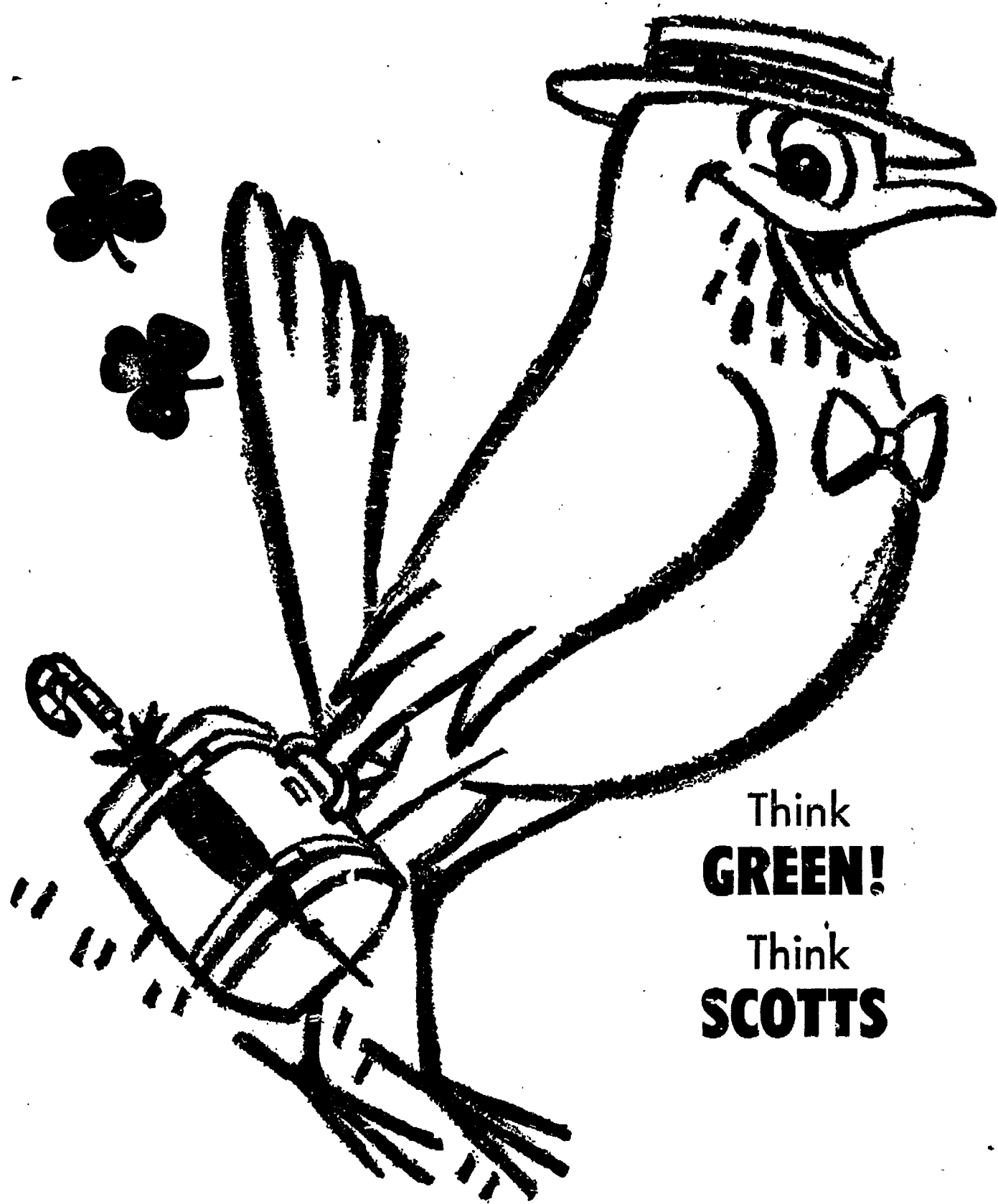
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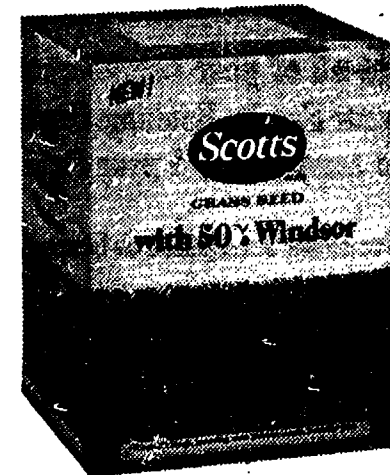
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### 5 Persons Hurt In Park Accident

**Woods Patrolman Honored  
As FOP Officer of the Year**

Woods Patrolman Steven Petrik, immediate past president of the Fraternal Order of Police, Grosse Pointe Lodge No. 102, was honored as The Policeman of the Year for 1965 by his colleagues of the Lodge.

Following a regular meeting, attended by regular and associate members, Monday evening, March 7, Petrik was presented a plaque by Park Det. James LaPratt, current president, who proclaimed the evening as Steve Petrik Night. More than 100 policemen and associates witnessed the presentation.

LaPratt stated, as he presented the Policeman of the Year award, the Grosse Pointe Lodge No. 102 has come a long way under Petrik's leadership.

Petrik, who was caught by surprise, was hardly able to speak but he did say that if there is any service that he can render to the Lodge, or to its members and their families, he would be happy to do all he can.

Inscribed on the plaque is the legend: "To Steve Petrik, Officer of the Year, 1965, for his Outstanding Contribution and Vigorous Leadership in Lodge Activities. Fraternal Order of Police, Lodge No. 102."

Petrik who was president of the organization in 1962, 1963, 1964 and 1965, initiated the Lodge's Widows and Orphans Benevolence Fund, set up to aid widows and children of police officer-members who died while still in the service of their respective communities. Regular members are comprised of policemen of the five Pointes and Harper Woods; associates are citizens interested in helping their local police.

Since the Widows and Orphans Benevolence Fund was started several years ago, it has grown to \$70,000, and increases

each year through the various activities sponsored by the members of the organization. The maximum goal set over a period of years, is \$500,000, to be wisely invested, with the resulting interest and dividend being used to aid members of families of deceased Lodge members.

Not too long ago, one officer's widow was given \$4,500, and recently, another received \$3,000 all to be used in helping the widow to pay outstanding bills and to send their children through school.

The Fund is also used to further the education of children of deceased members, by sending them to college. Scholarships are set up for these children, on a continuous basis, provided they maintain B average, or better, in college work.

Petrik, and the members of the Lodge, gave a big share of the credit for the building up of the Widows and Orphans Benevolence Fund, to the citizens of the Pointe and Harper Woods, who enthusiastically contribute to the fund each year, and support the fund raising activities of the Lodge.

Petrik, besides being the immediate past president of Lodge No. 102, is chairman of the Widows and Orphans Fund Committee; chairman of the Associate Membership Committee; a trustee of the Lodge; chairman of the Lodge Election Committee; and is a trustee of the State Lodge of Michigan, Fraternal Order of Police.

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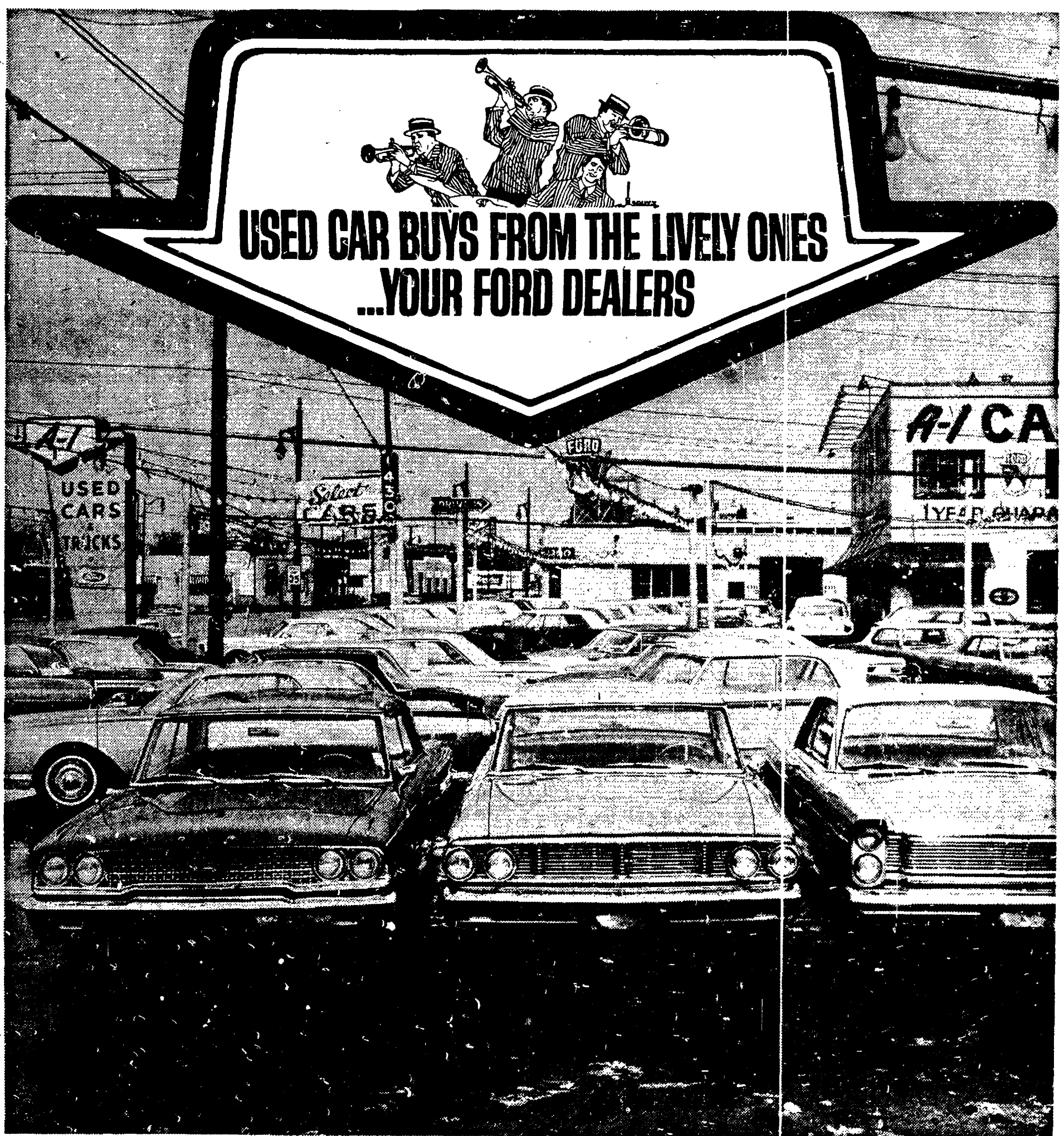

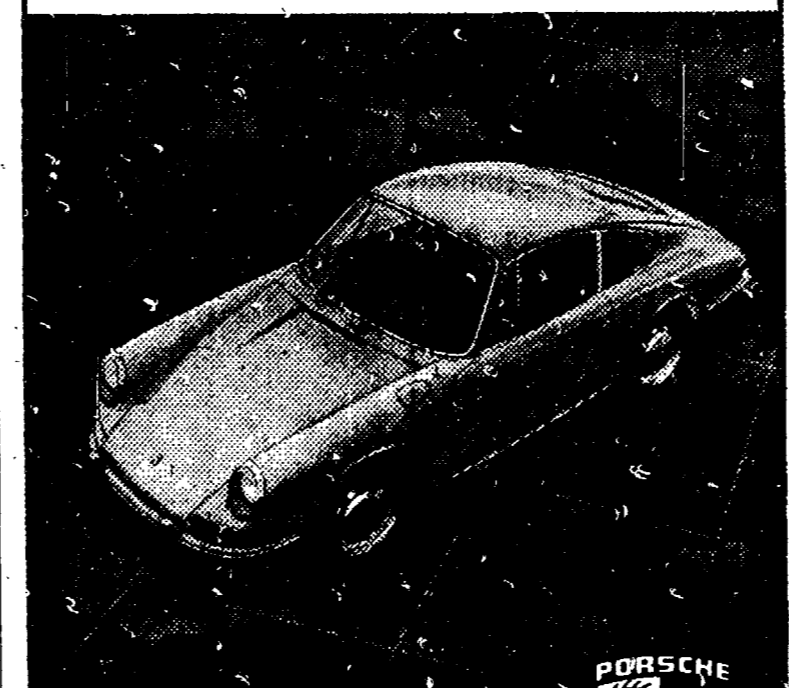

Orr, director of the library system, and the Friends of the Grosse Pointe Public Library.

Mr. Orr has been given the opportunity to speak out in rebuttal in the lead story on page one of this issue of the Grosse Pointe News. He has a great deal more to say in a letter to the publisher of the Detroit Free Press, written the day after the article appeared, protesting against its accuracy and hoping for a chance to clarify the picture given the reading public.

One of the things which most distresses us is the damage that might be done to the organization known as The Friends of the Grosse Pointe Public Library. With a dues-paying membership of more than 1,300, this is the largest single library-supporting group in the entire nation, which is a mighty fine tribute to us we see it. Such a membership is bound to contain all kinds of characters, a few extremists, middle of the roaders, etc., but the large majority are those who pay their fees simply because they want to evince their confidence in the library system. It would be a great pity if any substantial number should be influenced by such publicity and withdraw their support from this organization which has done so much good.

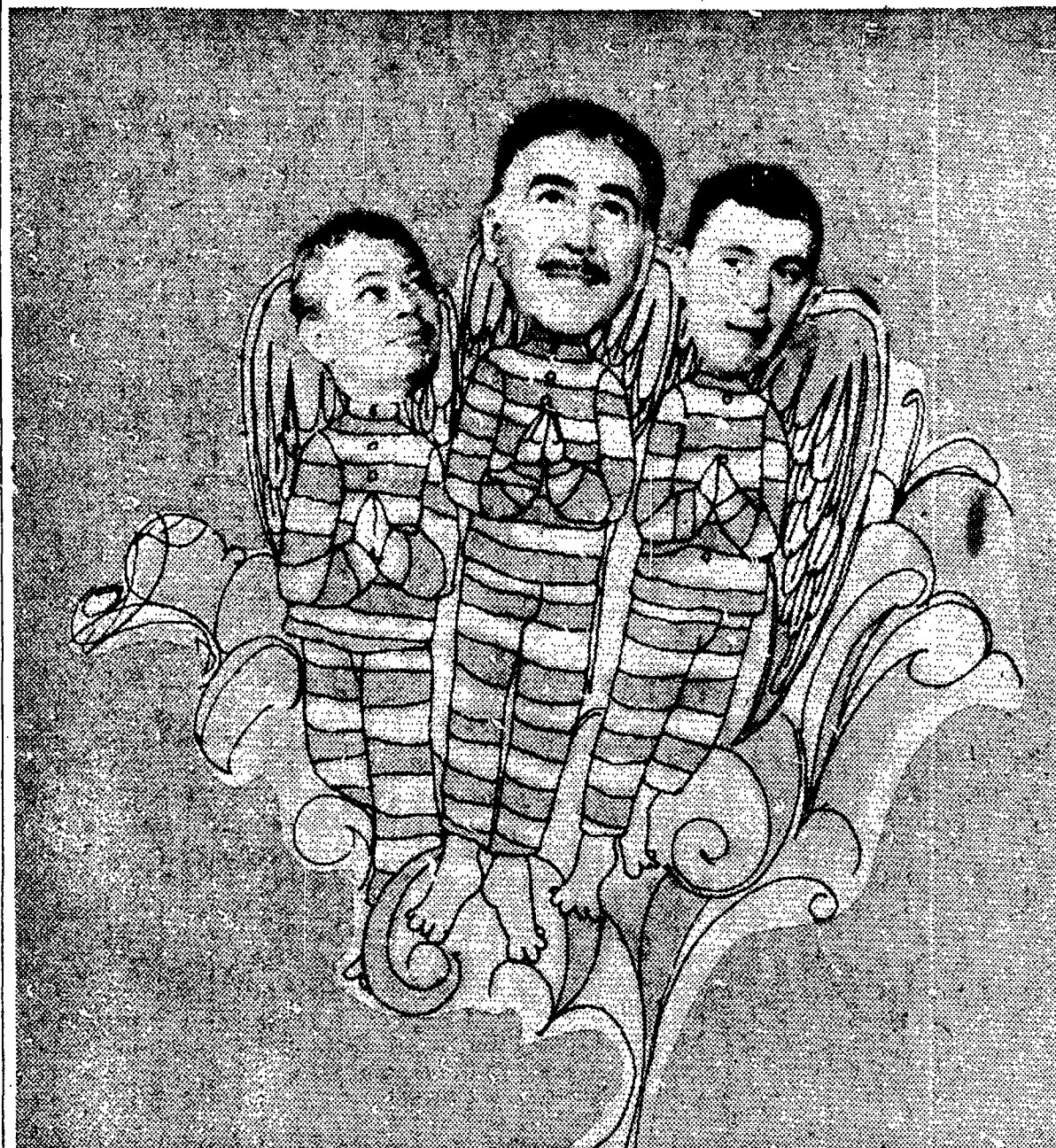

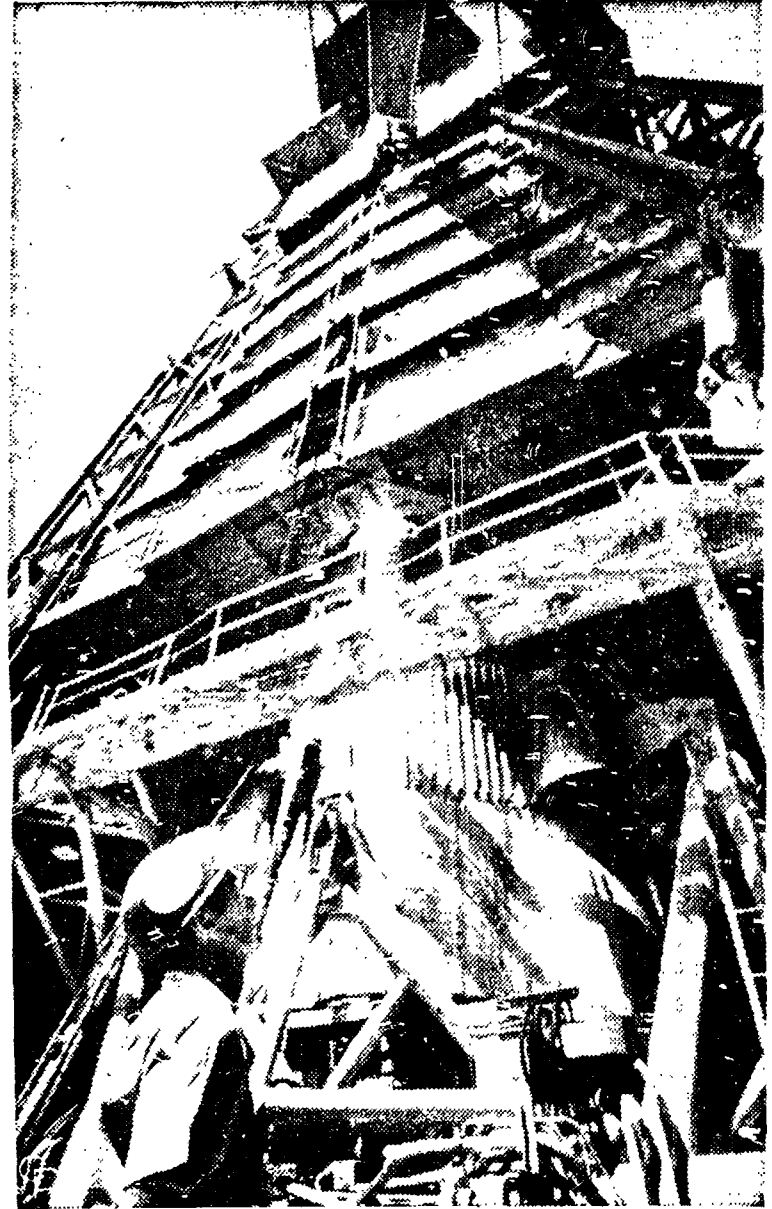

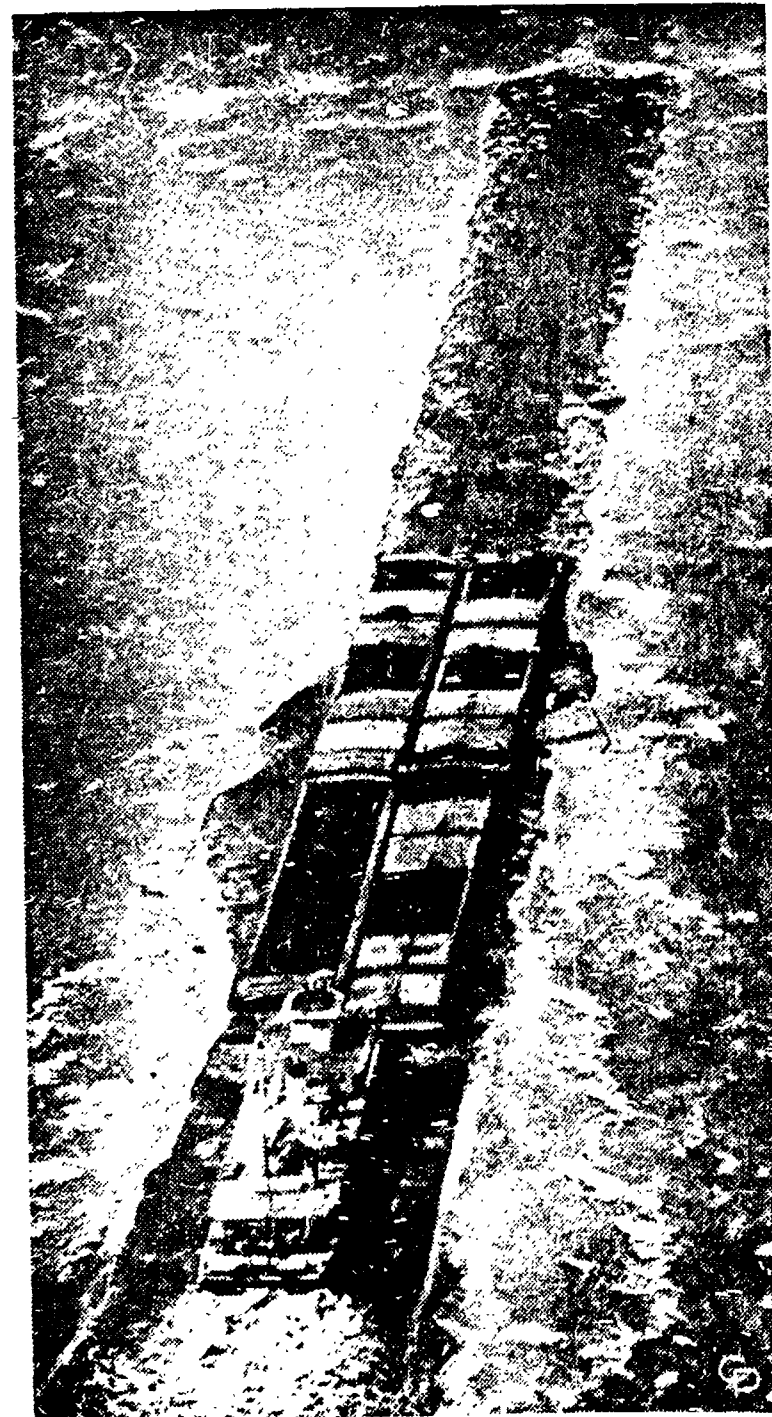

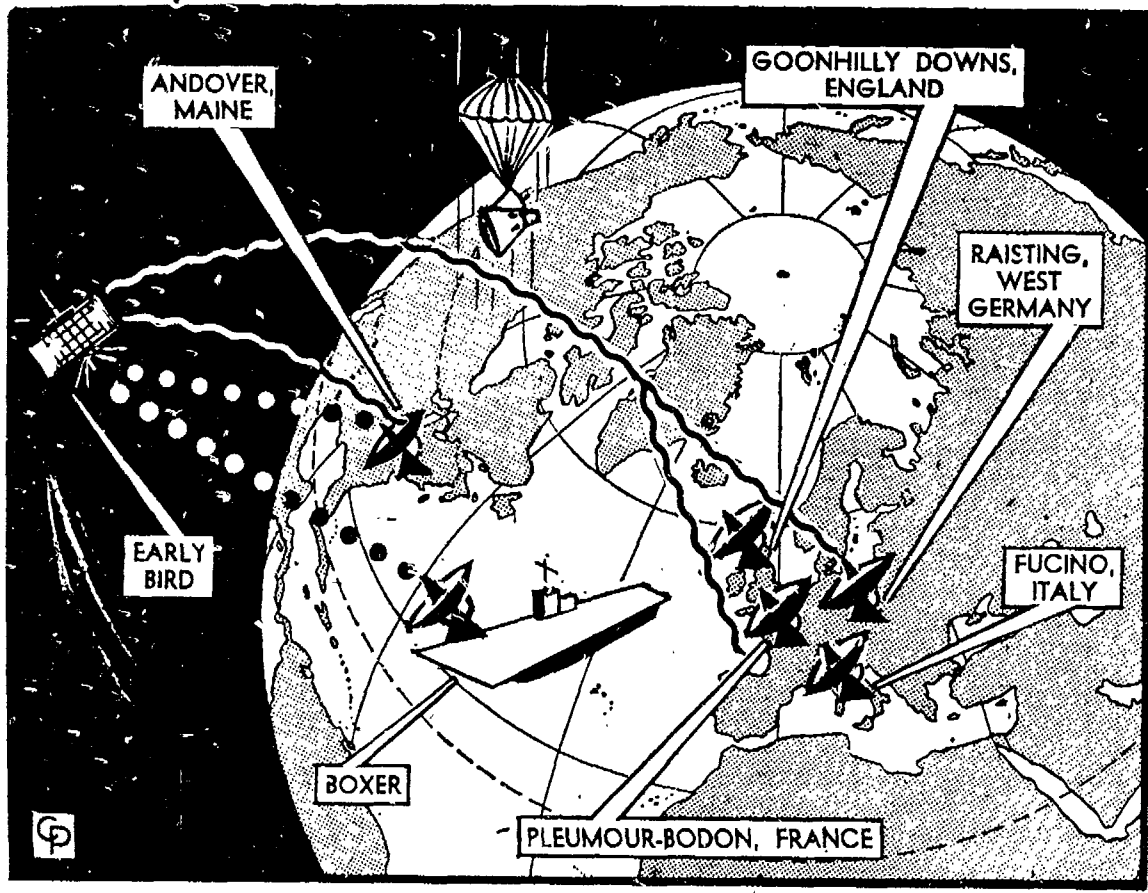

**A PRE-LAUNCH LOOK** at the Atlas-Agena rendezvous target vehicle for Gemini 8 at Cape Kennedy.



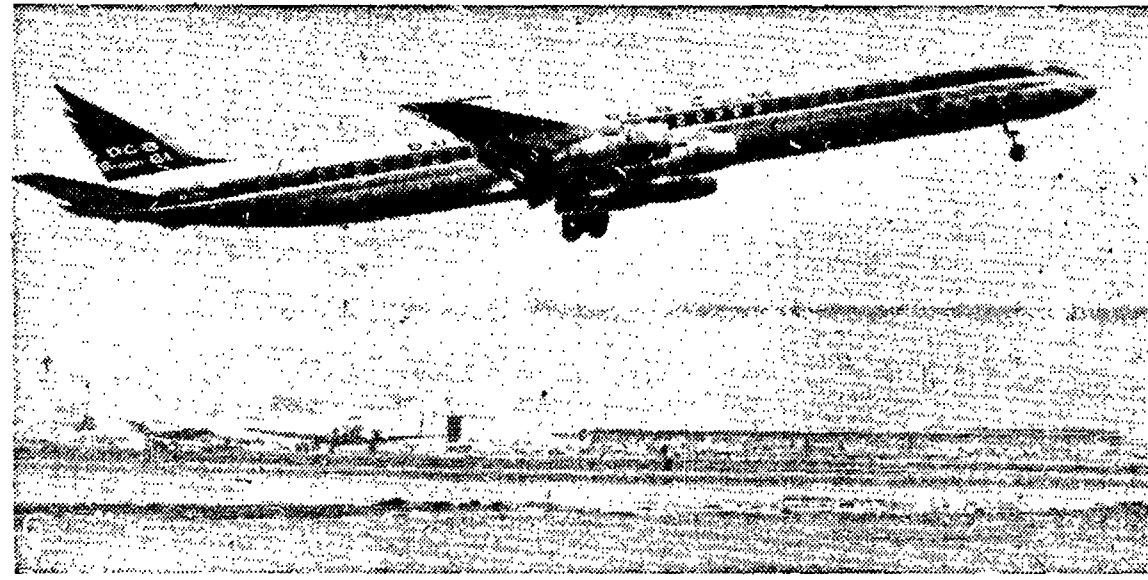

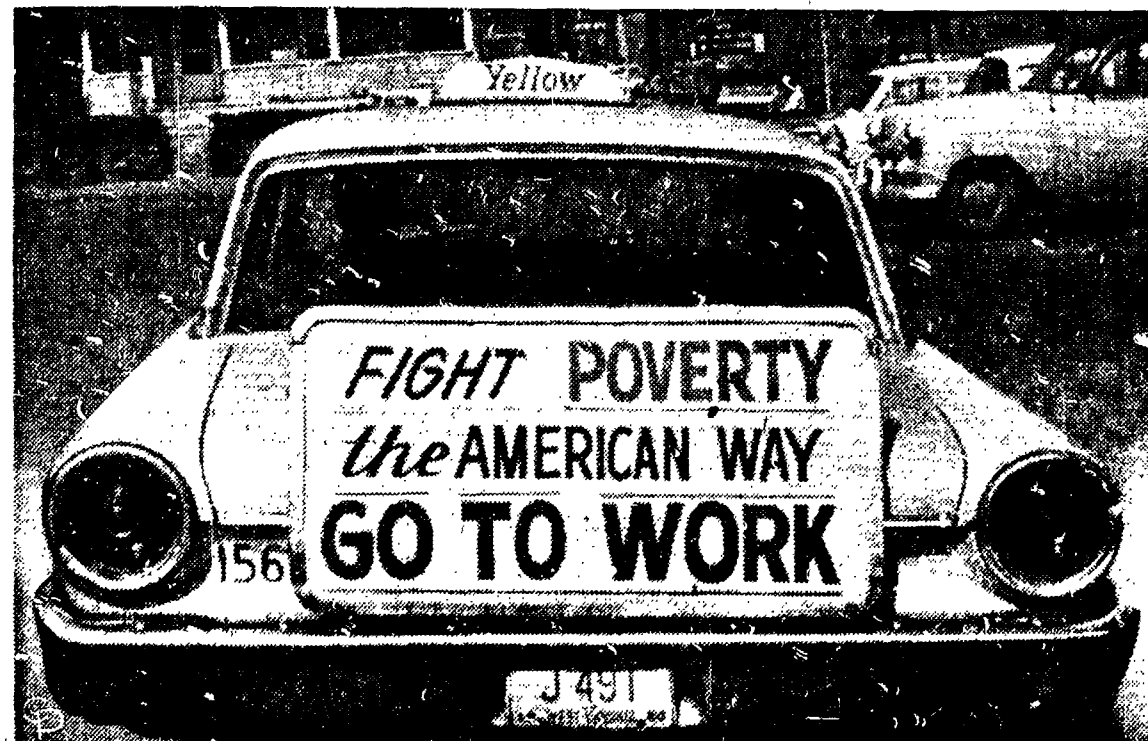

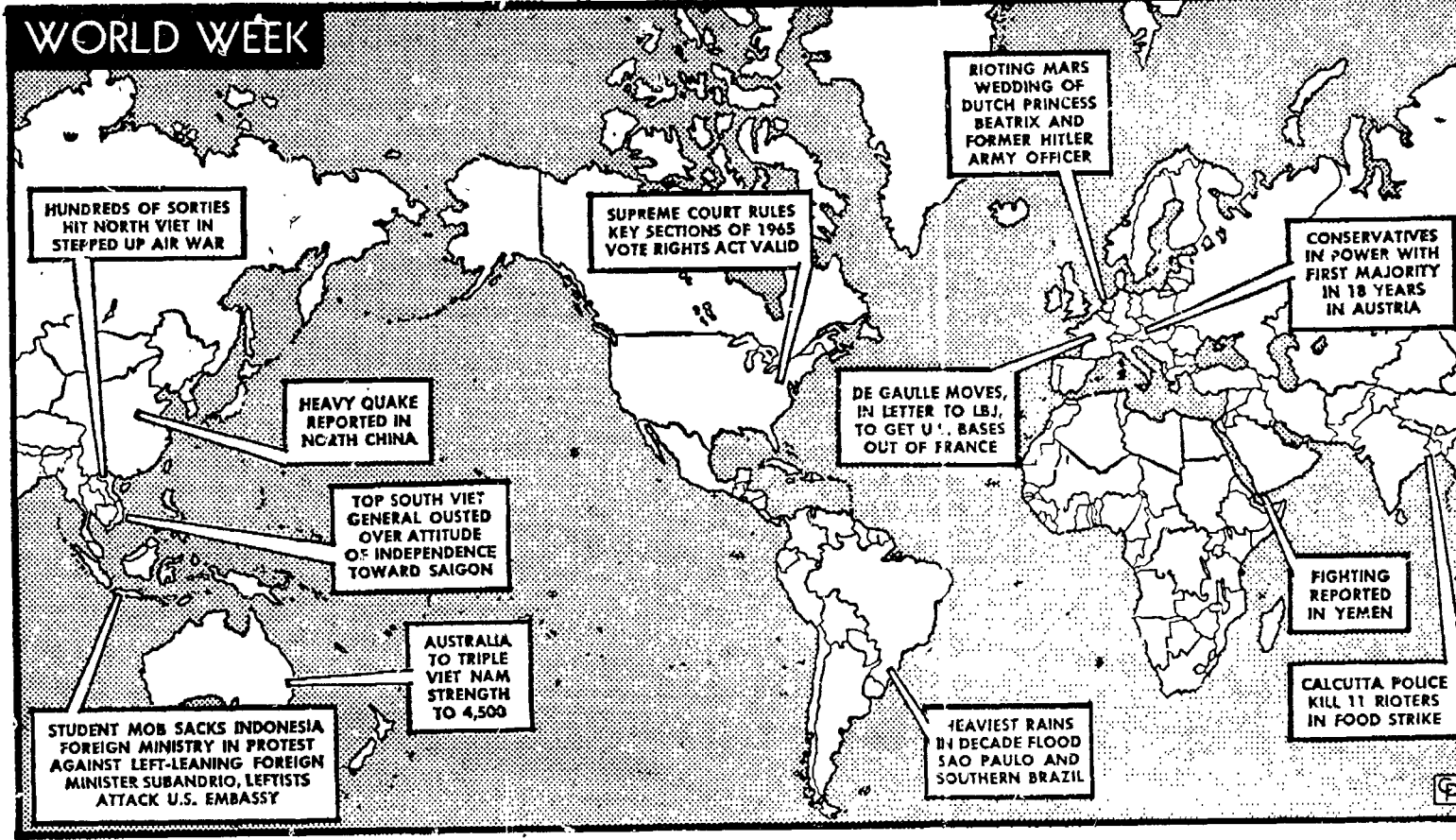

**IT'S A CHILL WIND AND BLOWS NO GOOD**, you might say, when you figure out how cold it really is by using this U.S. Army wind chill chart. Find the wind speed in the left-hand column and the actual temperature in the top row. Where these two intersect in the "with wind" table is how cold it really is, just like you felt.

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
