

NADWARN, nation-wide natural disaster warning system, a new means of early warning in the 1965 campaign. on tornadoes, or even nuclear attack, is the goal of the Weather Department, it was announced Saturday by P. The new system will consist of a device that will automatically turn on the radio as a severe weather warning is being broadcast. Every city that has a radio station or a newspaper will be included in the network of the system. Records of 912 tornadoes were made last year, and it is hoped that better communications will prevent a repetition of the "Palm Sunday disaster" of 1965, when 37 tornadoes struck the midwest, killing 271 persons.







When the bids on Grosse Pointe High School North were opened on March 30, they amounted to more money than was authorized for the project on March 22, 1965. The cause of this is the tremendous rise in construction costs thoroughout the nation, and an especially inflationary situation in the building industry in the Detroit metropolitan area. After much study and consideration, the Grosse Pointe Board of Education set May 9 (in conjunction with the Wayne County Community College election) as the date for a special school election to raise the additional funds for the desperately needed facility.

On Monday, May 9, 1966, the property-owning taxpayers in the Grosse Pointe school district will be asked to authorize the sale of bonds in the amount of \$2,750,000 to complete the building. Completion of the structure as it was originally designed will do much to alleviate overcrowding at all levels throughout the entire school district.

## Vote Yes on Monday

\*10:00 Qualified voters will go to the polls next Monday to make known their decisions on two very important \*11:30 issues having to do with education. We hope the ballot-\*12:30 ing will give official approval to the completion, as originally planned, of Grosse Pointe High School North, and to the establishment of a Wayne County Community College District.

So much has been written about both of these proposals that there is no need to get into the details here. In addition to all the dissemination of information in newspaper articles and through special brochures and \* 9:30 reports which have been given wide circulation, there have been innumerable meetings, rallies, panel discussions, presentations and question and answer periods \*10:00 available to all interested. A summary of the situation is contained in the lead story on page one of this issue.

Concerning the great discrepancy between the estimates and the bids on the new high school, we grow weary of the gripes of the few who are prone to take cracks at the trustees of the Board of Education and place all the blame on them. Being a member of the School Board is a pretty thankless job, and it should be just the opposite. These dedicated men and women serve for a pittance and enlist the talents of the best experts available in making any major decisions. The estimates which were so far below the bids, were made by the architects, not the members of the Grosse Pointe Board of Education. The same shocking disparities have been experienced by school systems and institutions all over the country which are trying to expand their physical plants. For a few examples we refer again to today's lead story. The critics of the School Board would be far closer to picking suitable targets if they threw a few stones in the direction of the groups who organized in an attempt to change the site selected for the new high school building. Had the Board of Education not been interminably delayed in getting about the business of starting construction, it is highly possible that the costs of the school might have been kept within the original estimates. The frightening spiral in building costs has come very recently.
