garine

1³⁄4 cups granulated sugar

2 eggs

1 tsp. vanilla 21/2 one-ounce squares unsweetened chocolate,

melted $2\frac{1}{2}$ cups sifted cake flour

 $1\frac{1}{4}$ tsp. soda

 $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. salt

1¹/₄ cups ice water

Cream together butter, sugar, eggs and vanilla until fluffy (beat 5 minutes at high speed on mixer, scraping bowl occasionally to guide batter into beaters; or beat 5 minutes by hand). Blend in coolea chocolate. Sift together flour, soda, and salt; add to creamed mixture alternately with ice water, beating well after each addition. Bake in 2 paper-lined 9x11½ inch round pans in moderate oven (350°) 30 to 35 minutes or until done. Frost cooled

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
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
