REPORTS FROM TOKYO said yesterday that a teen-age "Red Guard" movement is sweeping China and Peking is in a state of near anarchy. Tens of thousands of Chinese civilians are said to have joined the teenagers in an effort to carry out a "cultural revolution" which is a form of cultural suicide that destroys all links with the past. Safety for foreign diplomats was expressed and the Soviet Union protested "acts of hooliganism" which included the stoning of its embassy. (Continued from Page 3) all personnel of my department to be on the alert, especially during school days, as students walk to and from school, or congregate near school grounds, to apprehend and ticket any motorcyclist or motorist who speeds, or commits any traffic violation in school areas, regardless of who that person might be. Serious offenders will be taken to court.

"Appropriate steps will be taken against high school students who operate motorcycles as a means of transportation to and from classes, if they drive in a manner contrary to law," the chief said.

After Owens turned professional, he often raced against horses in exhibitions. While Jesse grabbed the headlines, it actually was an uneven contest. The Horse was a sure winner.

My thoughts turned to Horses Against Humans again recently, when 19-year-old Jun Ryun, the amazing Kansan, set the world's record for the mile with a clocking of 3:51.3.

Ryun's great achievement came only a few weeks after Ogden Phipps' Buckpasser also set a world record for the mile. Buckpasser's time was 1:323/5

What do the comparative times mean? Just this: During his record performance

Ryun was running about FIFTEEN (15) MILES PER HOUR, while Buckpasser was traveling better than THIRTY-EIGHT (38) MILES PER HOUR.

Let's look at the fractional times of The Human and The Horse and you'll get a still better understanding of the comparative speeds:
