With the population of the schools approaching 12,000, the speedy construction of additional facilities is imperative. With final plans for the much-needed second high school completed last fall, with the groundbreaking in December and the successful passage of a supplemental bond issue to finance the structure approved in May, Grosse Pointe High School North moves closer to realization.

Growth of another kind has affected and will continue to affect the schools. The explosion of knowledge has created pressure for curriculum change. Plans for instructional innovations laid during 1965 will be executed in 1966 and beyond.

We assume that during 1966-1967 The Grosse Pointe district will strive to maintain its usual high quality programs. In addition, it will continue to provide various educational opportunities for children in the non-public schools. For, under recent state legislation, certain special services are provided and administered by the public schools for the entire community.

With the opening of school, this newspaper takes the opportunity to urge citizens to take an interest in the affairs of public education. The future of an increasingly large segment of our youth is in the hands of the dedicated men and women who comprise the staff of the public schools. But they need your individual support and your collective interest, both so vital to the maintenance of quality public education.

Effective two-way communication seems to us to be the most efficient means of maintaining a public school system responsive to the needs of the community it serves. The schools have sought consistently to provide the necessary communication through a variety of channels and will continue to do so. The Board of Education holds its regular meeting at 7:30 p.m. on the second Monday of every months at 389 St. Clair avenue. PTA meetings are held throughout the district on a monthly basis. An individual parent-teacher conference schedule provides for further interchange. The schools all distribute newsletters as does the Board of Education. Grosse Pointe has been recognized repeatedly as a leader in effective school-community communication by the Michigan Education Association.

Beginning this fall the Grosse Pointe News will, as a public service, run a weekly question-and-answer column about the public schools in its editorial pages. Questions may be submitted either to the editor of this newspaper or to the Superintendent of Schools. We, the schools' trustees, the administration, and teachers welcome an opportunity to serve you in this fashion.

We urge all citizens in this community to accept our invitation to find out more about their public schools. In terms of budget and personnel the schools constitute Grosse Pointe's biggest business enterprise.
