#### Thursday, September 22

THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT to permit voluntary prayers in public schools was rejected by the Senate. The vote was 49 in favor and 37 opposed (this was nine short of the two-thirds majority needed to pass such a measure.)

Republican Leader Everett M. Dirkson of Ill., chief sponsor of the proposed amendment, promised to keep fighting for its pas-

Mich. Republican Senator, Robert Griffin voted in favor of the amendment but Democratic Senator, Philip Hart opposed it. Even if this proposal had won its two-thirds margin in the Senate, it appeared to have no chance of being acted on by the House this year.

Both youths agreed to switch vehicles. Licavoli told police that he was not aware that Schulte's license had been taken from him. Licavoli was waiting for the return of Schulte and Palazzolo in front of St. Paul High School. He did not see the

accident from this point. Schulte had the car in gear, and shifted into fourth, and was headed west on the boulevard at top speed, said to have been more than 100 miles an hour, by

A young St. Clair Shores boy, stopped at the stop sign on the corner of Kercheval. As he then edged forward, his view of oncoming traffic was blocked by trucks parked on Kercheval to his left. His auto collided with the Imperial, sending it careening to the left across the Trowbridge property.

No one was hurt, although both cars had to be towed away, tioned as the Weir House. and a builder is working again - on this white Colonial Early American home with its pillared front porch and lovely old floor-to-ceiling windows, which the Trowbridge family has been restoring ever since they bought it in 1954 from Miss Mary LaBelle.

"We bought it because I love old houses," said Mrs. Troworidge. "It has taken a long time to remodel because we did a lot of the work ourselves and because we wanted to be sure the restoration would be au-

That the work was well done is proved by the fact that the heavy automobile was stopped on Tuesday at the brick foundations of the front porch, instead of continuing into the living room. Pieces of the chrome trim of the car were lying among the scattered bricks and splintered boards of the porch. One of the pillars was knocked askew and the force of the impact has caused damage to the interior walls that has yet to be determined, Mrs. Trowbridge admitted.

Captain Raymond Snay, of the Farms fire station, said there was no flooding from the hydrant that was knocked down but failed to halt the car. "It was just a fluke that the pin (which releases the flow of water) wasn't broken; however. would only have caused mine damage before we could have controlled it."

In 1962 the house was threatened by a fire which destroyed the valet service and hardware store, known as Sydney's and Skippy's respectively, which used to stand next door. The danger of explosion from gasoline in the two filling-station pumps in front of the building prompted firemen to ask the Trowbridge family and others in nearby residences to vacate their homes.

The fire was brought under control by the Farms fire department, but the building was so badly burned that it was razed.

Again, one year and a few day later builders were within two weeks of completing major reconstruction of the house at 376 Kercheval when fire broke out again. This time it was caused by a plumber's torch in

the basement. "The fire burned for four hours before it was brought under control," said Mrs. Trowbridge. "The weather was so cold that spray from the hoses froze to the walls," added her son, Charles, now a senior at the Grosse Pointe High School.

#### Know Your Schools

By Dr. Harold Husband, Acting Superintendent The Grosse Pointe Public School System

Question: What testing and evaluation services are available for retarded children in The Grosse Pointe Public School System and what ages are accepted?

Answer: Mentally retarded children are classified for purposes of school placement as educable, trainable, or custodial mentally handicapped. The Grosse Pointe Public School System provides a staff of three psychologists to diagnose mental retardation and to evaluate children so afflicted for appropriate special education programs. Modern, universally accepted psychological instruments, careful observation and interviews are used to perform the diagnosis and evaluation.

The diagnostic service is available to all Grosse Pointe residents. However, because of a technicality in the recent Public Act 343, (auxiliary service act), children who are residents of Grosse Pointe but who attend school outside of Grosse Pointe must be referred for diagnosis to the certifying facility in the district in which the school is located. However, the psychological staff is prepared to inform interested parents of the programs that are available through The Grosse Pointe Public School Sys-

There is no age limit for the service. While a severe handicap may be evident at birth, a child who is mildly retarded may not be noticed until school entry.

We have kept the Grosse Pointe Association for Retarded Children and the Foundation for Exceptional Children informed of diagnostic and educational services and have encouraged their assistance in publicizing programs available for mentally handicapped children.




