

## Father, Son

Sister and Two Brothers Asphyxiated; Efforts to Rescue Them are Futile

Death called for the second time in weeks at the home of Floyd A. Charley, 50, 1005 Vernier road, takearly Wednesday morning, January 25. Firemen from the Woods, Shores, Farms and Harper Woods battled the flames, which had a big start before they arrived.

Charley, general manager for Chrysler Canada, Ltd., Windsor, lost his wife, June, several days before Christmas. Her death was attributed to leukemia.

Victims of the fire, who were pronounced dead on arrival at St. John Hospital, were Nancy, 21; John, 15; and David, 12. A fourth, child, Rick, 9 was rescued by his father.

Heroic But Futile

Several of the firefighters were treated for smoke inhalations, and minor burns and injuries, when they made heroic, but futile efforts to save the children in the house.

In combination with other letters, the vowel A traditionally will have fifty different sounds. In I.T.A. it has one.
