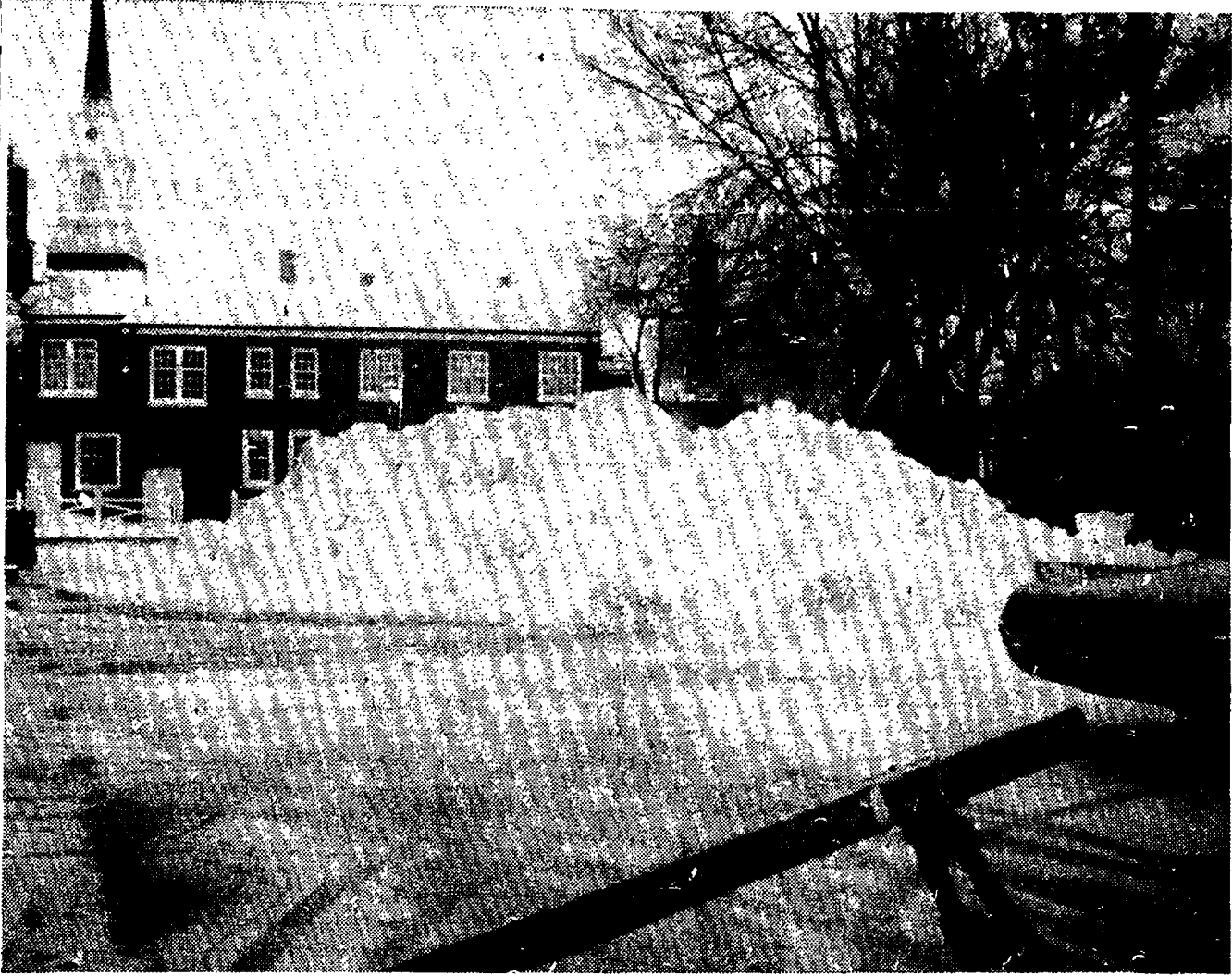

Police Free Girl Trapped Under Door

Officers and Nurses at Bon Secours Credited With Saving Life of 7-Year-Old

Two alert City Police officers saved the life of a 7-year-old Pointe girl on Friday, January 27. The officers, Virgil G. Beaupre and Richard Lanski responded to a call from Mrs. Constance Kienle of Washington road, reporting that her daughter, Catherine, was trapped beneath the garage door.

Heroic But Futile

Several of the firefighters were treated for smoke inhalations, and minor burns and injuries, when they made heroic, but futile efforts to save the children in the house.

He said that an earlier assumption that the probable cause of the fire, which started in the basement, was due to faulty electrical wiring, was discounted on Thursday, January 26, when he, Public Safety Lt. Henry Marchand, Earl Wakely, building inspector, and an agent from the State Fire Marshal's Office, went to the gutted house to check.

Andrews said that evidence showed that the fire was due to a defective chimney, where mortar had become dislodged from layers of bricks, exposing floor joists abutting the northwest side of the chimney. Flames from burning material in the basement incinerator escaped through the cracks and ignited the joists, he said.

ALL STEAMED UP

Burglar Steals Coin Collection

A burglar entered the home of Alvin Trinity, 2016 Beaufait, and escaped with a coin collection valued at roughly about \$800. Woods police were informed on Sunday, January 29.

Trinity told Patrolmen Robert Lorenz and Thomas Kerving, that at about 7:10 a.m., he heard a door slam, and he got out of bed and peered out the window. He said he saw a man walk to the front side of the driveway, carrying a white object in his arms.

Because of the obscure darkness, the home owner said, he was not able to see the man's face, but described him as being at least six feet two inches tall, weighing about 200 pounds, and wearing a dark overcoat and a dress hat with the brim pulled down. The suspect walked east on Beaufait and out of sight.

Trinity said he went downstairs and discovered that the culprit had taken assorted United States and foreign coins and bills, of various denominations and dates. The money was on the dining room table, in bowls and jars. An unknown number of loose coins of U. S. mintage, plus rolls of various coins of different values, were missing from the table.

Also missing, the resident told the officers, was his identification wallet, which contained his operator's license, car registration and social security card.

Trinity said he was interested in coin collecting, but was not a member of any collection club.

Attempt to Cash Stolen Check Backfires on Youth

Roney E. Hicks, 21, of 2623 Lycaste, Detroit, did not use a gun when he tried to get money from the Manufacturers National Bank, Mack and Lochmoor, but he did attempt it with a stolen check.

On Tuesday, January 24, an alarm was received at the Woods station, and officers raced to the bank building, with Patrolmen Donald Schmeitz and Bruce Marone arriving first.

As the policemen arrived at the scene, they observed Henry B. Ciske, of 23008 Port, St. Clair Shores, assistant manager, waving and pointing to a youthful Negro walking west on Mack avenue.

man to halt, as he and Marone gave chase on foot. Hicks was stopped at Norwood, placed under arrest and handcuffed.

Det. Sgt. Thomas Kane said that Hicks refused to cooperate, and refused to give his name and address, but an investigation disclosed Hicks' identity.

Ciske said that Hicks entered the bank and submitted an endorsed check for the amount of \$613.68, to a woman teller. The teller called him (Ciske), because of the large amount, Ciske said, and in examining it, he recognized it as one on the reported stolen list.

Hicks, becoming suspicious because of the delay, turned and walked out of the bank, just as the teller tripped the silent alarm.

Shores Bids Residents to Bond Session

Will Provide Information On Necessity Of Improving Harbor

Residents of Grosse Pointe Shores have been invited to attend an information meeting to learn the details of the harbor improvement and renovation project that has been endorsed by the Village Council. About 85 percent of the cost of the project will be financed from rents collected for boatwells.

The session will be held at 8 p.m. Monday, February 6, at Vernier School, 36 Vernier road.

Speakers will include John Huettnerman Jr., village president, and Alfred R. Glancy Jr., chairman of the village council's harbor and boatwells committee.

Glancy said, "We hope that a large number of residents will attend the meeting to get a full understanding of the need for the harbor, renovation and the economical and efficient plans that have been made to carry out this improvement."

"It is apparent to all who have visited the harbor that the catwalks along the boatwells are in an advanced state of deterioration and must be replaced. Also, the continued pounding of waves on the pier will shorten its usable 'life' unless it is soon protected."

"The harbor renovation will correct both situations and in addition will stop the damage to boats caused by rough water in the harbor, will prevent the continued accumulation of silt, and will make much more efficient use of the harbor space, allowing for 144 boatwells—twice the present number."

Glancy pointed out that the harbor renovation proposal was supported unanimously by the Village Council at a vote January 17 after the harbor and boatwells committee had worked on the project for many months. The construction plans were formed by Marine Design and Engineering, a Detroit firm of registered engineers. Ernest F. Brater, hydrologist and hydraulic engineer from the University of Michigan also made recommendations.

Grosse Pointe Shores property owner and their spouses will vote March 6 on a \$290,000 bond issue to substantially finance the harbor improvement. The total cost would be \$298,000. Surplus funds previously accumulated from rental of dock space also would be used, Glancy said.

Residents Asked to Remove Cars Following Snowfalls; Plows Need Right-of-Way

Vehicles Parked on Streets Hamper Clearance by DPW; Inconveniences Cited by Department Heads

Cars parked in the streets following a heavy snowfall, hamper Department of Public Works personnel cleaning the streets with snow plows. John DeFoe, Farms director of Public Works, urges residents to remove cars from in front of their homes during these times.

During the heavy snowfall over the weekend, many of the Farms residents left their automobiles in the streets, and when the plows went through, the operators were forced to swerve around them, with the result that the vehicles were blocked in by the snow and ice.

This is not only inconvenient for the car owners, who are forced to shovel their autos out of the piled up snow, but it is also inconvenient for the plow operators, who are unable to clear the streets properly, DeFoe said.

Winter is still with us, he pointed out, and it is possible that more snow and sleet are in the offing. When and if this does happen, residents are urged to remove their cars, so that the proper work can be done.

DeFoe's appeal was echoed by the heads of the other four Pointe DPW Departments, to their respective citizens.

Avalanche Born On Hospital Roof

With a crashing roar, a small avalanche of snow slid off the roof of the four-story Cottage Hospital on Kercheval avenue just as a reporter from the NEWS was passing on the way to work Friday morning, January 27.

"I threw down my shovel and jumped out of the way," said Groundskeeper John Bioletti, who was, fortunately, the only one in the area at the time that 24 hours' accumulated snow and ice hit the front steps and walk. "I used to work in the mines in Pennsylvania, and as soon as I heard the ice beginning to crack up there, I knew enough to move out of the way," he added.

Heeding a warning about the danger of standing under ice encrusted tree limbs that was only too justified as the storm continued, the reporter left Bioletti clearing yet another passageway to the hospital's front door.

FARMS BUYS FILTERS At its regular meeting held on Monday, January 16, the Farms council approved the purchase of three filter underdrains for the Water Filtration Plant, 29 Moross road, from the Joseph C. Wolf company, at a total cost of \$4,323. The cost of a single filter is \$1,441, according to City Manager Andrew Bremer, Jr., who recommended the purchase. The cost includes labor installation.

AFFIDAVITS by a Detroit policeman and a Tennessee man claim to have worked as Federal Bureau of Investigation wiretapper, will be submitted to the U.S. Supreme Court in Washington Thursday in answer to President James R. Hoffa's bid for a second hearing on his jury fixing conviction. Paul Quaglia, a Detroit policeman, has already testified in a federal court suit that he had tapped the telephone of William Bufalino, a Hoffa aide lawyer. He tells more details of Detroit Police wiretapping activities in his affidavit.

Friday, January 27

CHASE MANHATTAN BANK New York, the nation's second largest bank, slashed prime interest rate on Thursday to 5.5 percent from six percent. This was the first retreat from the level reached last September, although three smaller banks had their prime rates earlier this month.

Saturday, January 28

THREE U.S. ASTRONAUTS, going to pave the way for man's first flight to the moon, only 218 feet off the ground in a blazing explosion fire inside their capsule on Launch Pad 34 at Cape Kennedy. Killed were, Virgil I. Grissom, 40, hero of the Mercury and Gemini programs who blasted the first American into space; Edward H. White II, 35, first U.S. astronaut to walk in space, and Roger B. Chaffee, 31, a rookie spaceman going forward to his first mission. Chaffee was the son of Mrs. Don L. Chaffee of Grosse Pointe, a suburb of Grand Rapids.

Sunday, January 29

SEN. CLINTON P. ANDERSON, D-N.M., announced that the Senate Space Committee will investigate the accident which took the lives of three astronauts on Friday. The Senate inquiry will follow a probe by a grand jury set up by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA).

GOVERNOR GEORGE ROMNEY, from his office in Lansing, where the official snow depth is 22 inches with drifts up to seven feet, called Saturday for "big" help. He said "if those people of helping would do so, a great deal of suffering and fatalities could be avoided." Romney noted that public works were working on an "out-of-emergency basis" but could not begin to clear all the snow from the streets and roads.

Monday, January 30

ROBERT G. (BOBBY) BAKER was found guilty Sunday of larceny, fraud, conspiracy to evade income tax evasion. After 10 hours and 17 minutes of deliberation the six men and women of the jury filed into the courtroom and their foreman, John M. Buchanan, a Census Bureau technician answered the clerk's question, "guilty." Baker betrayed no emotion as he listened to the verdict. If the conviction is upheld, he could face as much as years in jail and \$47,000 in fines. It is considered unlikely that the maximum would be imposed, however.

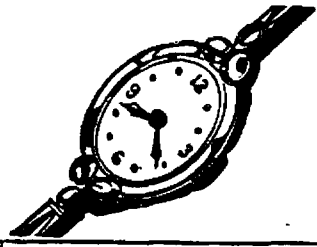
Tuesday, January 31

THE U.S. COURT OF APPEALS held Monday that two New York draft boards exceeded their jurisdiction in reclassifying as available for service to University of Michigan students who took part in a sit-in demonstration against U.S. policy in Vietnam. The demonstrations took place on October 15, 1965, at an Ann Arbor draft board office.

U.S. MILITARY officials disclosed that American aircraft losses in the Vietnam War have been greater than reported. The disclosure left the actual cost of the U.S. air war in doubt. A spokesman disclosed that not all the American aircraft losses included in the latest official tally of 618 U.S. planes shot down in North and South Vietnam.

and Michael Gates, a Shores volunteer fireman.

Woods Public Safety Officers Donald Sun and Stephen Petrik were treated for minor injuries. Sun, for a cut finger, and Petrik, for an injured leg, suffered when he kicked in the locked front door of the burning house.

Died of Asphyxiation
An inquest held at the Wayne County Medical Office, officially disclosed that the three Charley children died of asphyxiation by carbon monoxide, the result of the fire. The inquest was held Wednesday morning, January 25, a few hours after the fatal fire.

Lt. Marchand, in a report, disclosed that he returned to the scene of the tragedy at about 7:30 a.m., the morning of the tragedy and spoke to Charley, who related the following:

At about 9:30 p.m. he retired to his bedroom on the second floor to watch television, and closed his bedroom door so that the noise would not disturb his children. Nancy and David were downstairs.

Wakened by Smoke
Charley said that he turned off the television set about 11:30 p.m. and fell asleep. Later, he woke up, smelling smoke. He opened his bedroom door and found the hallway full of smoke.

He said he heard Nancy screaming for help, in her bedroom, and he told her to break the window and climb out on the roof. At this point, he got down low and entered John's room, and shook him to wake him up. While he was doing this, Rick

came screaming down the hall and into his arms.

The father said he grabbed his son, and started down the stairs, but was forced back by the terrific heat and smoke.

Gets Son To Safety
Charley said he broke a window and climbed to a ledge, and dropped his son to the ground, and then tried to return for his other children, but was driven back by the heat and smoke. He then climbed out of the window and dropped to the ground and ran to the home of a neighbor, George Spalding, 1010 Vernier, who called the Woods Public Safety Department. The time was 12:50 a.m.

The frantic father then ran back to the house, where he grabbed a shovel and tossed it at the second floor windows, hoping to break the glass so his children could get out.

When Woods firefighters arrived within minutes, they found Charley on the front lawn in his pajamas, running back and forth, screaming, "My God. My children are in there," and pointed to their bedrooms. Smoke was billowing through the roof, but flames were not yet visible.

Breaks Door In
Petrik, who was the first to reach the front door, found it locked, and kicked it in, injuring his leg in doing so. He tried to enter the house, but was forced back by the blast of heat and smoke.

Sgt. Allen Selby, and Hinz and Collins, tried to get to the top of the stairs, but were driven back to the first floor. Hoping the children might be on

the first floor, the officers started a search, but without success.

AT 12:56 a.m., a call was sent to the Shores and Harper Woods for ambulances. A few minutes later, a second, third and fourth alarm were sounded and the Shores, Harper Woods and Farms in that order, responded with men and equipment.

There were seven pieces of firefighting equipment, four ambulances, and 56 firemen at the scene, an official report disclosed.

Find John on Floor
When they were able to enter the house, firemen found John on the floor of the front center bedroom, face down. Also found dead in the room, was one of the family's pet dogs.

John was carried from the room, and Harper Woods Sgt. Carson Shirley gave mouth-to-mouth resuscitation, but without success. Oxygen, too, was used, en route to the hospital but the boy failed to revive.

David was found in bed in the rear east bedroom, and given oxygen and taken to the hospital by Harper Woods ambulance. Nancy was found slumped on the floor, with her back to the window of the front east bedroom.

Director Andrews said that there were actually two fires in the home; the one caused by the defective chimney, which ignited the joists and burned down and across the wall partitions, and another, which burned through to the second floor, through the walls between the hall closets and the entire hallway.

Treated in Hospital
Charley and Rick were taken to Bon Secours Hospital, where they were treated for minor burns about the face and hands.

Several of the firemen at the scene openly cried as the bodies of the victims were carried from the house.

The fire was brought under control and extinguished at about 2 a.m., and all firefighting equipment and men returned to their stations by 3:35 a.m.

Nancy devoted most of her time in caring for her father and brothers during her mother's illness, and after her death. She was a part-time art student.

John attended Grosse Pointe High School, and David was a student at Parcels Junior High School.

Charley has another daughter, Mrs. Edwin Wagner.

Funeral services were held on Saturday, January 28, at the Clyne Funeral Home, 23222 Gratiot avenue, East Detroit. Burial was in Cadillac Memorial Gardens East cemetery, Clinton Township.

Ferry School Troop 34, Boy Scouts of America, with Scoutmaster Richard Wallace, attended the funeral services, in tribute to John, who was a member of the troop.

In response to the many inquiries of friends and neighbors in the Woods, and other areas, the Dexter M. Ferry P.T.A., is accepting contributions in the name of Floyd Charley, it was disclosed by David Fairless, president of the Parent-Teacher Association of the school. Gifts will be used for the family's benefit, to help ease the burden of the tragedy.

one out of four trees in The City were affected by the storm. They plowed around the clock and used about 120 tons of salt. Young Douglas G. Allor was rushed to Bon Secours Hospital where he had 12 stitches taken on his head after the snow plow which he was operating hit the curb causing his helmet to fall off and his head to hit the motor. Phone service was disrupted in a number of areas, in some cases for more than three days.

The City had substantial power failures with as many as four Edison crews working in the area at one time. The City did more plowing than they did salting during this storm. Most of the limbs and trees have been cleared away but the crews are still working.

At this writing The Pointe is once again beginning to look like normal... but the damage done to the trees will be felt for many years to come.

Cottage Hospital Holds Elections

Mrs. Nelson Holland, president of the board of trustees of Cottage Hospital, announced at the hospital's annual meeting on January 25, the election of William E. Baubie and Earl I. Heenan, Jr., as trustee.

Mr. Baubie, 529 Lakeland avenue, is vice-president in charge of corporate financing of the E. F. Hutton & Company, Inc., as well as a member of the Education Committee of the Detroit Board of Commerce. He also serves as a director of Vernors, Inc.

Mr. Heenan, 54 Touraine road, is president of the Detroit Mortgage & Realty Company, and a trustee of the Visiting Nurses Association. He is also president of the Board of Trustees of the Grosse Pointe University School, as well as trustee of the First Presbyterian Church.

This brings to a total of six the number of men on the Cottage Hospital Board of Trustees, since the election of the first in 1962.

"Because of the growing administrative complexities of today's hospitals, and because of the weight of policy decisions and financial accountability which falls on the shoulders of a board of trustees," said Mrs. Holland, "we feel extremely fortunate to have acquired the talents of two additional male trustees who are prominent in the field of finance."

Also considered was the statistical achievements of Cottage Hospital in 1966. Admissions to the hospital increased slightly as did days of care. "This is an indication of two things," said Mrs. Holland. "Use of the hospital by elderly patients is steadily increasing, and these patients require more care."

An unusual accident happened to Val Slear, 1740 Anita avenue, Grosse Pointe Woods, Thursday night, January 25.

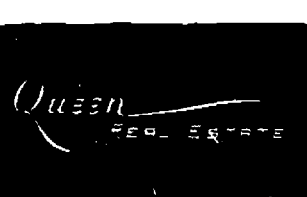

Initial Teaching Alphabet Course Offered to Adults

I.T.A. is the abbreviation for Initial Teaching Alphabet, a relatively new approach to the teaching of reading. Developed and introduced in England by Sir James Pittman in about 1961, it has found wide-

spread attention from educators throughout our American schools.

In 1965 the Grosse Pointe Schools introduced I.T.A. in one class at Ferry School on an experimental basis. Under the capable direction of Miss Helen Zissis, the program has flourished, and three additional sections have been added in other schools in Grosse Pointe.

The Initial Teaching Alphabet is a phonemic approach, using a 44-symbol alphabet, 24 of the symbols coming from our traditional alphabet. The beauty of this innovation is in the elimination of the many inconsistencies found in the traditional orthography. In combination with other letters, the vowel A traditionally will have fifty different sounds. In I.T.A. it has one.

The Department of Community Services of the Grosse Pointe Public Schools will offer a course to adults who wish to learn more about this exciting new development. Miss Zissis, with over 18 years of experience as a reading teacher and a recognized authority in I.T.A., will be the instructor.

The six-week survey class will begin on Tuesday, February 7, and will be held in the Community Services Building from 7:30 to 9:30 p.m. The fee for the class is \$7.

QUESTION:

When is the election for school board trustees held?

ANSWER:

In our school district trustees are elected on the second Monday in June. Anyone wishing to run for a four-year term must fulfill these requirements:

- 1. Be a property-owning taxpayer.
- 2. Be a qualified registered voter.

For a resident to have his name on the June ballot, he must file a petition with the Secretary of the Board of Education no later than 30 days prior to the election. School trustees take office at the annual meeting of the Board of Education, held the first Monday in July. A trustee's term begins officially July 1 following the election.

VETERAN HOMESTEAD TAX EXEMPTIONS

The following persons may qualify for this tax exemption, provided they do not own taxable property in excess of \$10,000 State Equalized Valuation (The 1966 City Assessed Valuation of \$7,092 equals the \$10,000 State Equalized Valuation) and meet the state residence requirements:

1. Persons currently serving in the Armed Forces
2. Unmarried widows of former servicemen who served in World War I, World War II, or the Korean Conflict
3. Disabled veterans currently drawing disability compensation
4. Blind persons meeting the statutory definition for blindness

Disabled veterans occupying specially adapted housing may qualify for total tax exemption without meeting the valuation limitation or residency limitations.

SENIOR CITIZENS TAX EXEMPTIONS

Certain persons may qualify for this tax exemption provided the following qualifications are met:

1. Own and occupy property as a homestead on December 31, 1966
2. Be of the age of 65 or over
3. Have been a resident of Michigan for at least five out of the last ten years immediately preceding application
4. Have a gross income, combined with the income of a spouse, for the immediate preceding calendar year of not more than \$5,000
5. Do not own taxable property in excess of \$10,000 State Equalized Valuation (The 1966 City Assessed Valuation of \$7,092 equals the \$10,000 State Equalized Valuation)

A person shall be allowed to file one exemption, either Veterans Homestead Tax Exemption or Senior Citizens Tax Exemption. Senior Citizens are allowed a \$2,500 reduction in their assessment at State Equalized Valuation whereas Veterans or Widows are allowed a \$2,000 reduction under the Veterans' Homestead Tax Exemption.
