



CITY INCREASES WATER RATES

Celebrate Library Week By Helping CRIA



As part of its promotion of National Library Week, April 17 through April 22, the Grosse Pointe Public Library will make a donation of all the overdue fines collected during the week to the Committee to Rescue Italian Art for use in its work of restoration of libraries and manuscripts. Butler And Kirby Elected To Top Posts In Farms

Returned Councilmen, New Judge Administered Oaths of Office by City Clerk Peter Caputo in Municipal Chambers

Two provisions in the Farms City Charter were given correct interpretations at the regular meeting of the Farms council on Monday, April 17, when re-elected incumbents were given their oaths of office and a newly-elected judge was sworn in by City Clerk Peter Caputo.

Following the swearing-in ceremony, the council went about the job of electing a mayor, and mayor pro tem, as provided by the charter. It was previously disclosed that the councilman picked as the city's chief executive serves for one year, but a provision in the charter states that whoever is elected serves for a two-year period, that is, until the next regular city election, which is held every two years.

Another provision, interpreted by City Attorney George McKean, left William F. Connolly, Jr., who resigned his seat on the council, having served in the capacity of mayor since the Farms incorporated as a city in 1949, to take the post of municipal judge, without any job.

Connolly was appointed by the council to take over the judgeship, provided that he seek the post at the next regular election, to fill the unexpired term of former Judge Grant E. Armstrong, who resigned late last spring.

Connolly was defeated for the judicial office by Robert H. Pytell on April 3, by a vote of 1,154 to 893, a surprise upset.

Following Connolly's defeat, it was assumed that he would serve as judge until July 4, 1967, but this was disputed by the winning candidate, who said he should take office without delay.

McKean, asked for a legal opinion, said that the Farms City Charter provides that the successful candidate for an unexpired term assumes the post immediately.

Pytell Sworn In
Pytell became the new judge when he took the oath of office administered by City Clerk Caputo. The term expires July 4, 1969.

Also administered the oath of office as councilmen were James H. Dingeman, William G. Kirby and William G. Butler, all of whom, by virtue of receiving the highest number of votes will serve for four years; and Henry E. Bodman, II, and Benjamin S. Warren, who, although successful in their campaigns for re-election, received less votes than the others and will serve for two years.

Butler Elected
After being sworn in, the council, as provided by the charter, elected a mayor and mayor pro tem. Picked were Butler and Kirby by the respective offices.

They were elected to these offices last year when Connolly resigned from the council, and their colleagues decided to continue their tenure, which runs to April, 1969.

Among the first order of business, Mayor Butler appointed

Council Votes To Approve 55-Cent Raise

Additional Funds Needed To Maintain Service And Finance Various Improvements

The City Council approved an increase in water rates at its meeting of April 17. The present water and sewage disposal rate will be revised from \$2.20 per thousand cubic feet to \$2.75 per thousand cubic feet, effective for the January-June 1967 billing period.

The rate is to be divided into a water component of \$2.09 per thousand cubic feet and a sewage disposal component of 66 cents per thousand cubic feet.

Council also approved a water meter replacement program which would consist of the annual installation at city expense of approximately 100 remote reading meters.

Result of Study
The raise in rates was a result of a thorough study of the financial position of the City's water and sewage disposal system. This study revealed the need to revise the combined water and sewage disposal rate.

This need was supported by the latest income statement which showed a net loss of \$5,292 for the six-month period ending December 31, 1966.

The last increase in the City's water and sewage disposal rate was made in January, 1959. During the eight-year period since, the city has experienced various cost increases. More recently, the need for greater system maintenance has become abundantly clear.

All of these factors were carefully considered and evaluated when arriving at the recommended rate.

22.6 Percent Rise
Since 1959, the cost of water purchased from Grosse Pointe Farms has increased 22.6 percent. This results from the Farms' 1961 rate jump and their more recent rate boost which took effect last July. As a result, water costs have increased approximately \$8,500 annually.

Since 1959, City labor costs charged to the water and sewage disposal system have increased. Presently, they are about \$9,000 higher than the 1959 level.

In fiscal 1968-69, the annual debt cost for outstanding water revenue bonds will increase nearly \$5,000. It will continue near this higher level until its expiration in 1976.

Improvements Needed
A need also exists to undertake certain system maintenance and improvements as pointed out in the recent Water Report by the George Jerome Company. The most important of these is a water meter replacement program. Many of the city's meters are so old that it is difficult to obtain spare parts. Further, it would be more economical to install new meters than attempt to repair the old meters.

It is felt that the newer placement meters should be installed at City expense, and that these new meters should be equipped with new remote (outside) reading registers. Such a program should reduce the city's "unaccounted-for" water percentage and thereby increase revenues. Replacing 100 meters each year would cost approximately \$7,500.

The program of fire hydrant repair and replacement that was started last fall will be continued at an annual cost of approximately \$2,000. Certain other items such as additional gate valves on Jefferson and gradually replacing valve boxes with gate wells will be budgeted annually, as funds permit.

Projected Expenses
The raise in rate is required to meet projected system expenses. This includes the water meter replacement program.

The minimum semi-annual consumption should remain at 3,500 cubic feet. Based on a rate of \$2.75, the minimum semi-annual bill would increase from \$7.70 to \$9.63. It is hoped that the rate would be satisfactory for a period of years, however sizeable increases in the cost of water purchased, the sewage disposal rate or City labor would require a rate revision or reduce the City's ability to undertake system maintenance.

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Assistant Manager's Tip Leads to Apprehension Of Suspected Forger

Jackson Parolee Held On \$2,500 Bond; Caught Attempting To Pass Forged Check At Sears Branch Store, Mack And Moross

A Jackson Prison parolee was arrested by Farms detectives for investigation of attempting to pass a forged check at the Sears Branch Store, Mack and Moross, on Friday, April 14.

Robert A. Kolcon, 22, of 30025 Manhattan, St. Clair Shores, who had been released on parole last month, was taken into custody by Det. Sgt. George Van Tien and Patrolman Joseph Belanger, who is assigned to the plain clothes detail.

Van Tien and Belanger said they received a call from John Wurmburger, assistant manager of the branch store, that a man was trying to pass a check in the amount of \$175.22, drawn on a closed account in an area bank.

One of Several
The officers said that the check was one of several reported stolen from the Auto City Demolition company of Detroit. The checks were for an amount that had been closed out by the firm, it was said.

The check was made payable to Robert Polcon, the policeman said. They said that Kolcon erased the letter "K" from his last name and substituted the letter "P". When an attempt was made to cash the paper, Kolcon was detained on some pretext, and was still in the store when the officers arrived.

Held On Bond
Kolcon was arraigned before City Municipal Judge Douglas Paterson, presiding in the Farms court, and held on \$2,500 bond. Kolcon was remanded to the Wayne County Jail in default of bond. Examination was set for yesterday, April 19.

Under the ordinance, new dog tags are due on May 1 of each year. Notices have already been sent to owners informing them of this obligation.

Death Claims Leading GP Citizen At 91

Services for James Holden, Prominent Philanthropist and Humanitarian, Held Yesterday

A long-time resident of The Pointe, James S. Holden, 91, of 320 Washington road, died in his sleep after entering Bon Secours Hospital on Friday, April 14.

The 91-year-old philanthropist left a legacy of music and laughter, especially for children. His gift to the Detroit zoo have delighted generations of Detroit children. Mr. Holden was named to the Zoological Park Commission in 1924 by Mayor John C. Lodge when the commission was formed.

He was reappointed for successive terms until illness forced his resignation in 1962.

Through the James and Lynelle Holden Fund, the Children's Zoo at Belle Isle was presented to the City in 1947, the Amphitheater and Great Ape House at the Detroit Zoological Park in 1954 and a building to house the Museum of Living Reptiles in 1959. The fund has also given elephants and a 100-bell carillon to the zoo.

Son of Editor
The son of a newspaper editor, Mr. Holden graduated from old Detroit High School. He attended Michigan State College for two years and was graduated from Detroit College of Law in 1897. He was admitted to the bar in 1898, although he never practiced law.

He entered the real estate business as a clerk with the Daniel Rowen firm and in 1898 established his own real estate business. He built hundreds of homes on West Fort, Michigan, Grand River and Mack and served as broker for the Pennsylvania Railroad in buying the property it needed to enter Detroit. In 1905 he was elected to the board of directors of the Michigan Savings Bank.

Director of Banks
He later served as director of the Wayne County and Home Savings Bank, the Peoples-Wayne Bank and the First National Bank.

Mr. Holden was a member of the first board of directors in the organization of the National Bank of Detroit. He was also a director and chairman of the board of the Security Trust Company and later the Detroit Trust Company.

(Continued from Page 1) Schulte, who has a bad driving record, and whose license was suspended twice and finally revoked by the Secretary of State's office in Lansing, was riding a motorcycle on Grosse Pointe boulevard when he met Peter Licavoli, Jr., of 1154 Balfour, who was driving the Stinger, and both agreed to switch vehicles.

At the time, Licavoli told officers that he was not aware that Schulte's license had been revoked. He was sitting on the motorcycle, waiting for Schulte to return, at the time the accident occurred. The wait was in front of St. Paul High School.

According to police, Schulte was traveling west on the boulevard at a speed of more than 100 miles an hour, and as he approached the Boulevard-McKinley place intersection, dropped the gear shift from fourth to second. At the terrific speed, the action froze the rear wheels and the car went out of control.

The vehicle skidded 298 feet, turned partly around, jumped the curb and the rear end of the car smashed into a tree on the property of John Spargo, 44 Beverly, bounced off and smashed sideways into a stone pillar on the property, shearing the pillar from its base and knocking down a section of iron fence.

The car, valued at \$6,400, was a total loss; damage to the Spargo property was about \$400.

Dr. R. B. Frahm of 1005 Bishop, who was waiting for a red light to change on Fisher at the boulevard, heard the sound of smashing metal and drove to the scene. He is credited with saving Palazzolo's life, pulling the youth out of the wrecked vehicle and taking immediate measures to prevent the teen-ager from drowning in his own blood, which was gushing into his mouth.

Schulte, after being treated at the hospital for his injuries, was issued a ticket for driving while his license was revoked, and another for not having his car under control and causing an injury accident.

(Continued from Page 1) ance and improvement from net earnings.

Many costs related to water supply and sewage disposal are not charged at all to the water fund, but are borne by the general fund.

This includes the sewage pumping activity budgeted at \$11,900, the cost of sewer cleaning performed by the public work crews, plus sewer equipment costs. These costs are presently being supported by general property taxes although they could legitimately be charged against water and sewer rates.

The present breakdown of combined water and sewer (2.20) into its water component (1.84), sewer component (0.36) does not correlate with a prorating of actual expenses between water and sewer operation.

Such a prorating shows approximately 76 percent of annual expenses attributable to water operations, and 24 percent attributable to sewer operations. Using these percentages, the proposed rate of \$2.75 per thousand would be broken into a water component of (2.09) and a sewer component of (0.66).

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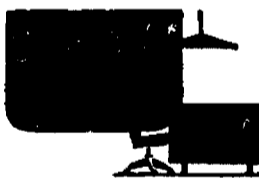
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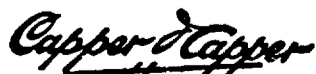
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Pointe Children's Theater Do 'Daddy Long Legs'

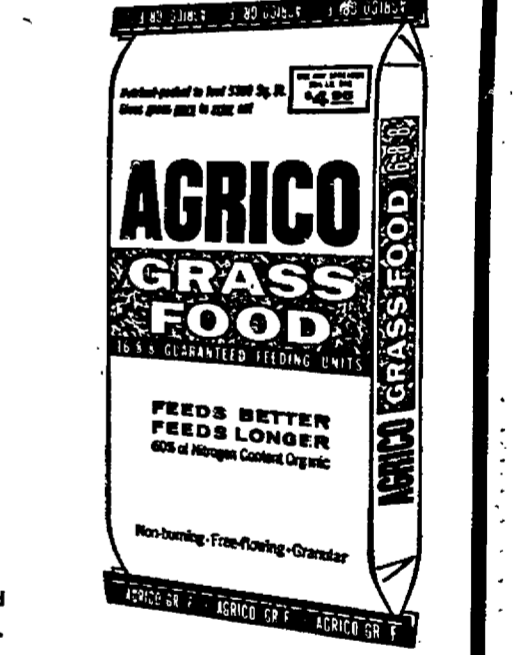

DeFoe said on Monday, April 17, that the material to be picked up need not be placed between the curb and sidewalk, but in the same areas as in the past, if so desired. However, the material must be in proper containers.

What he had asked was that grass clippings, branches and other materials NOT be dumped in the streets. Large tree branches and other heavy items not normally picked up on regular pick-up days should be left between the curb and sidewalk for easier removal by DPW personnel.

The NEWS regrets the confusion caused by last week's story.

Mason Parents Plan Program

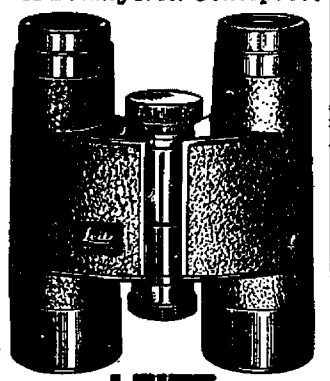
The Mason School P-TA will present two United States government documentary films on Tuesday, April 25, at 8 o'clock in the school auditorium.

The public is invited to attend. Refreshments will be served following the films but there will be no classroom visitations.

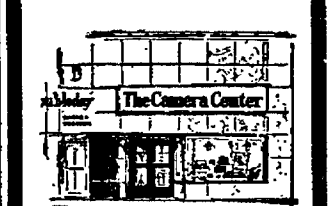
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Austin Named N.C.A. Member

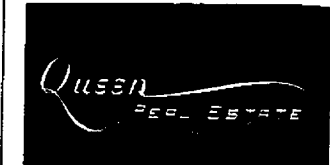
Forum Offering Film Classic

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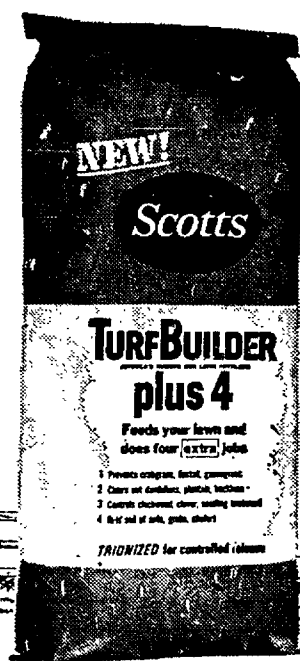

Last week we explained that ITA (Initial Teaching Alphabet) was an approach to reading that was developed in England by Sir James Pitman and that was brought to the U.S. by Philip G. Hilaire, Oakland County's Reading Consultant, and to The Pointe by Helen Zissis of Ferry School.

Presently there are four ITA classes in the Pointe system: Two classes at Ferry, taught by Helen Zissis and Helen Cahuff; one at Trombly taught by Eleanor Pawluk and one at Maire School taught by Shirley Kirk.

The class we observed last week had made the transition from ITA to Traditional Orthography (TO) without difficulty. Part of the reason for this is that 24 of the characters in ITA are the same as those in TO. Another factor that made the transition an easy one was that

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the children had developed a "reading pattern," which was brought about by their exposure to more varied and advanced books than are customarily read by children of this grade level.

In other to evaluate ITA more accurately, the Grosse Pointe Board of Education asked Miss Zissis to conduct a survey of schools all over the U.S. that were using ITA and find out their feelings on this approach.

The consensus of opinion was that ITA was a swift, easy and painless way in which children learn to read, not simple primers but books of good and mature language.

Secondly that the fluency of speech and writing came simultaneously with the reading.

Thirdly, that the "behaviour pattern" was remarkable. The children were never bored and consequently were rarely naughty.

Part of the success of the ITA program is the enthusiasm of its teachers. One of these enthusiastic teachers is Helen Cahuff of Ferry School. She says the creative writing ability of her first graders is remarkable and adds that they never are afraid of a blank sheet of paper.

"Their thinking and handling of language and of ideas is much more mature . . . often I have to remind myself that I am dealing with first graders. They express themselves so freely and easily . . . this is an ability that will stay with them throughout their lives."

Mrs. Eleanor Pawluk, who teaches ITA at Trombly, had some interesting comments on ITA. She says, "for the beginning learner of reading ITA is a real contribution. The augmented phonemic alphabet does simplify the complex task of learning to read.

"I feel the ITA program thus far has been a successful and gratifying experience.

"From the standpoint of teaching the program has been interesting and stimulating. There is available more highly diversified reading material with far more sophisticated content and vocabulary. Problems with word attack skills are minimized, and more time can be devoted to comprehension and fluency. Motivation is far more spontaneous. Creative writing is made possible at an earlier stage of development. There is improved quantity and quality of reading.

"From the standpoint of the beginning learner the phonemic approach to word attack skills is more rapidly grasped, retained and applied. Children gain independent reading ability far more readily and rapidly.

"Confusion is minimized, and interest level is higher. Whatever the child's competency, some measure of success is attainable. The world of literature opens up to them."

Maire School has as its ITA teacher Shirley Kirk. Miss Kirk said, "ITA is so consistent that there is little chance of failure or discouragement in the early stages of reading. Therefore the children are knee-deep in reading and loving it before they are

exposed to the inconsistencies of our language.

"ITA also makes creative writing possible at the first grade level. The sooner children begin expressing themselves in writing the greater is the likelihood of their remaining uninhibited in expressing themselves in later English courses. Through their creative writing they learn sentence structure, punctuation and capitalization also.

"One interesting sidelight of what ITA is doing for our children is an experience I had just recently. A mother of one of my pupils was thrilled over her first grader being able to take a name, address and telephone number message for her, in ITA, when mother wasn't available . . . something it ordinarily isn't possible for a first grader to do."

The ITA enthusiasts however are quick to add that ITA is not a panacea nor is it a simple medium to use. They also add that it is an approach to reading, not a method-a better way perhaps to explain it is that it is an attempt to "decode" the traditional orthography.

For a newcomer on the educational scene ITA has made great inroads on the educational scheme of things. More and more schools all over the country are introducing it into their school systems.

Patrollers Get Washington Trip

Grosse Pointe Park and Woods will be represented by two local youths at the 31st Annual National Safety Patrol Rally in Washington, D.C., May 11-14.

These school safety patrollers will be among 133 boys and girls from 103 Michigan cities who will be guest of Automobile Club of Michigan on the four day, all expense-paid trip.

Schools chosen to send representatives to Washington now are being notified of their selection, according to Ernest P. Davis, Auto Club's director of safety and traffic.

Each school is selected on the basis of its safety patrol's performance during the school year. The schools name the patrollers who will take the trip.

Davis estimates that each safety patroller in Grosse Pointe Park and Woods this year has

donated 180 hours of his time as a public service while protecting classmates at school crossings. He adds that patrollers are at their assigned posts on school days rain or shine, with no other reward than the satisfaction of a job well done.

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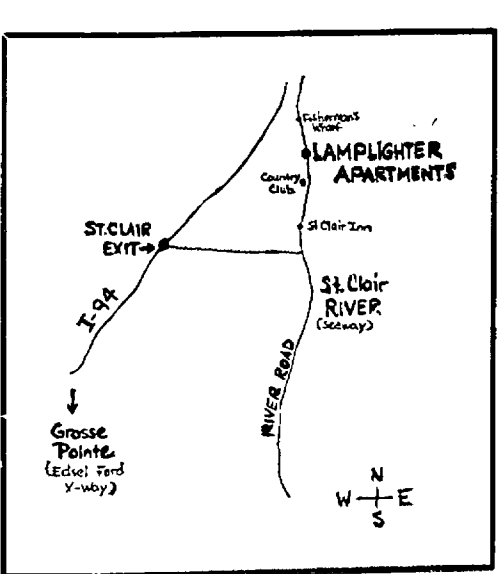

Juveniles Learn By Punishment

Two Pointe juveniles, arrested in a stolen car on Wednesday, March 29, will not have to go to Juvenile Court because the owner of the vehicle did not want to sign a complaint. However, the youngsters, one 15, and the other 14 years old, did not escape punishment.

Park Det. Lt. Stanley Enders said that the boys, one from the Park and the other from the City, entered the garage on the property of Nicholas Coraci, 1018 Audubon, and stole his car which was parked inside.

The teenagers were arrested at Vernor and Beaconsfield by Patrolman Robert Cory for investigation of unlawfully driving away an automobile. The boys were spotted by the officer, who was on routine patrol, as they were parked at the intersection. Patrolmen Ralph Moore and Andrew Meeker assisted in apprehending the lads.

Enders said that the owner of the vehicle did not want to prosecute the boys.

The lieutenant said that rather than let the juveniles escape punishment, he placed them on three months probation to his department, and ordered them to submit three 1,000 word essays each, one a month, on themes he will suggest to them.

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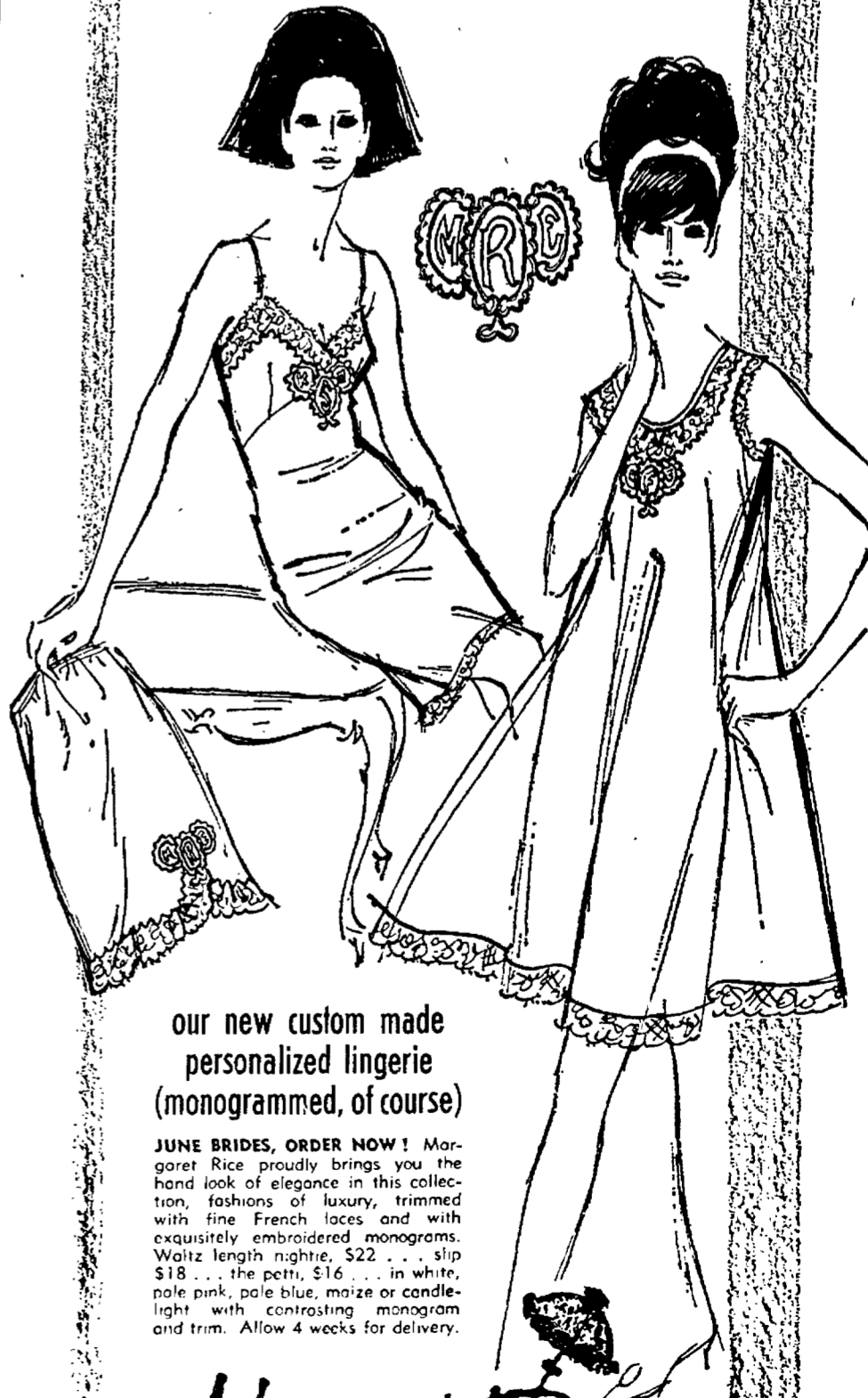

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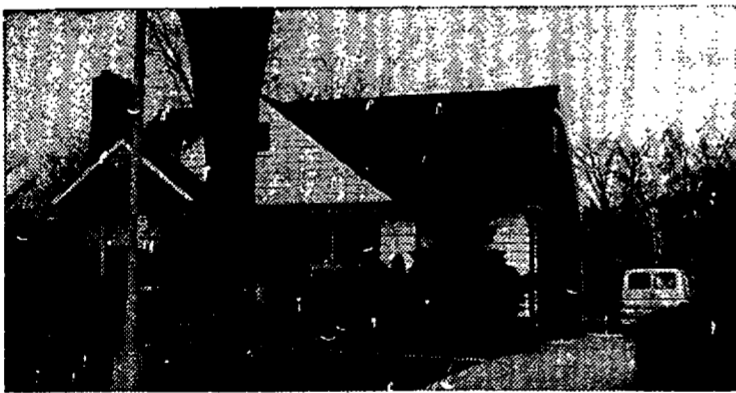
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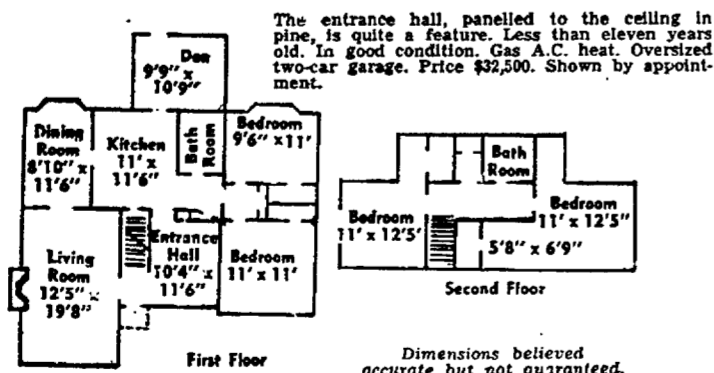

It is, they agree, a good place to work. "It" is the Grosse Pointe Public Library, Central Branch, where Todd, 15, started as a page a little more than a month ago. Twenty-year-old Dianne's page days are behind her; after five years with the Library, she's "graduated" to assisting at the Circulation Desk.

Todd, a Grosse Pointe High School sophomore, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Harry William Keller, Jr., of Beaconsfield avenue, youngest of the Kellers' four children.

His sister Beth, 18, is a freshman at Eastern Michigan University. Another sister, Judy (Mrs. John) Fleck, who lives in Farmington, recently became the mother of Todd's first niece, Janette. ("If she'd been a boy, they were going to name her Jason," Todd explains. "They want to keep the 'J's' in the family . . .").

Todd became interested in working at the Library through his brother, Bill, now 19 and a sophomore at the University of Michigan.

Brother Was Page
Bill started as a page himself a few years ago, worked his way up until he was custodian of the building. He never planned to make a career of Library Science, (as a matter of fact, Bill's "library days" are now pretty much behind him; he'll be working with the Corps of Engineers Lake Survey this summer vacation), but he liked his job at The Pointe Central Branch.

Todd saw Bill liking it. And so, when he began to think of getting an after-school job himself, Todd turned naturally to the Library . . .

Dianne, a Grosse Pointe High School graduate in her third year at Wayne State University, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. Dwight Dilloway, of Lakeshore avenue.

She has two younger brothers, Dennis, 19, in his second year at Macomb Community College, and Donald, 13, an eighth grader at Pierce.

A "best friend" is responsible for starting Dianne out at the Grosse Pointe Public Library.

"Why Not Try?" "My friend was already working there," Dianne explains, "and one day I said to myself, 'Why don't YOU try that?' So she applied, followed up her application by 'coming in a couple of times—to let them know I was still around,' and was eventually hired . . .

Page jobs at the Library are not easy to get. "When I first applied," Todd recalls, "they said there was a waiting list of about a year . . .

"There are plenty of applicants," Dianne concurs. "Reasons for the positions' popularity are multiple. 'It's close to school,' Todd notes, (about half the pages are students at Grosse Pointe High School half come from other schools in the area).

"You can pretty much name your own hours," Dianne observes. Her WSU class schedule determines her library working hours; she reports for duty in the Children's Room Thursday evenings, serves behind the Circulation desk three hours every Friday and all day Saturday.

Full-Time In Summer
Summers, she works full-time at the Library — "and sometimes I'm lucky enough to get full-time work during the shorter, (Easter and Christmas), vacations," she notes.

Todd's on call at the Library about three hours every day, five days a week—always after school or on Saturdays, of course.

The young Library aides earn while they learn. Dianne used her early paychecks for "extras," (i.e.: Special clothes, "luxury" items). Her more re-

cent earnings are sending her to Europe.

"I'm traveling with a friend; we'll spend three months abroad this summer," she says, anticipation bringing a smile to her eyes and lips.

"We started planning this trip about a year ago . . . I earned all the money for it at the Library . . .

Bank Account Nice
Todd's earnings aren't earmarked for anything special—"I was thinking of a motorcycle, but my dad said 'No!'" he admits, rather wryly. Of course, it "feels good" just to make some money, "it's nice to have a bank account . . .

There aren't, when one comes right down to it, all that many opportunities for a teenager to earn money on his own . . .

As a page Todd is low man on the Library totem pole. He knows it; he doesn't mind.

"A page show books, magazines, takes care of odd jobs," he explains. "Pages do a lot of 'shelving' (returning books to their proper places in the Library)."

In connection with this "shelving," Todd has developed the pages' Occupational Disease: A marked antipathy toward the Children's Room. "You can fit three times as many kids' books on a Return Cart as you can adults' books," he shudders. And that means three times as many books to put away per cartload . . .

But Todd doesn't intend to stay a book page forever. "I hope to go into A-V (the Library's Audio-Visual Department); there are four people working there right now, but there might be an opening next fall . . .

Rose Through Ranks
After all, Dianne has risen through the ranks.

"Every job I've held at the Library has been a marvelous experience," she maintains. There's no doubt that the Library influenced her choice of a career; she plans to get her Bachelors degree from Wayne, with a major in History and minors in English and "probably" Psychology, then go on to the University of Michigan to work toward a Masters degree in Library Science.

Neither Todd nor Dianne feels an after-school job robs a teenager of needed free time.

"I didn't have that much to do after school anyway," Todd observes. "Neither did I," says Dianne.

They're not speaking of homework — there's always been plenty of THAT—but of "something different" a "change of scene" . . .

"It's hard to explain," Dianne muses, "but I've gotten so I kind of look forward to coming to work BECAUSE it keeps my mind off studying. I—we all get so wrapped up in studying . . . Working here is sort of a 'break' . . .

Other Interests
Naturally, there are lots of other things in Dianne's life besides work and school. She likes to knit, does crewel work, plays the guitar . . .

Todd, too, has plenty besides his work-school routine to keep him busy—especially his model railroad: The Kellers moved back to The Pointe last November after a year in Texas, and Todd is STILL trying to get

that model railroad set up in his new/old home! Basically, both Todd and Dianne work at the Library because they enjoy it, because they want to . . .

"It's fun," Dianne says. "It's nice seeing people I knew in high school, friends coming in to get books. It's nice learning to recognize the regular library users."

Funny Things Happen
"And, sometimes, funny things happen: I'll never forget the father who came in, when I was at the Return side of the Circulation Desk, carrying his little daughter. The girl had a piece of the last page of a book, with half a book pocket still in it, clutched in her hand. "Tell the lady what happened to the book," the man commanded.

"The little girl hung her head. 'It got tired,' she whispered, disclaiming in one sentence, ALL personal responsibility for the accident.
