Police Reciprocal Aid Pact Proves an Effective Force In Fight Against Crime

(Editor's Note: Last week the NEWS published a story about the Mutual Fire Aid Pact between the five Pointes and Harper Woods, and how the people of these six communities are benefitting by receiving the best protection possible, in the event of a serious fire. This week, the story is about the Police Reciprocal Aid Agreement between these cities, which exists to give their citizens the best in police protection.)

In the early spring of 1960, the heads of the five Pointe Police Departments and Harper Woods met in session to discuss mutual assistance. In May, 1960, the last of the partners signed the Police Reciprocal Aid Agreement. The pact had been previously approved by their respective city councils.

Prior to the agreement, the various police departments, like the fire departments, had a "gentlemen's agreement" to assist each other in times of extreme emergencies. But, unlike the fire departments, police departments do not operate via "running cards." A simple phone call to the station from which help is sought is sufficient—a broadcast over the police radio, and aid is on the way.

The Pointe and Harper Woods Police and Fire Departments have a jointly operated Emergency Police and Fire Radio System, with the Farms, where the central controls are located, acting as the managing municipality.

GP Woods Police Nip Extortion Plot Against Resident

Detroit High School Honor Student Accused In Attempt To Get \$10,000 From Robert Shammus Of South Rosedale Road

Woods police played a big role in nipping a fantastic extortion plot against a Woods resident and assisted in the arrest of the 17-year-old honor student said to be involved. The arrest took place in Detroit Monday evening, April 24, in a parking lot near Ramona Theater on Gratiot avenue.

Richard N. Habib of Detroit was taken into custody as he took a package from Robert S. Shammus, 30, of 632 South Rosedale, an official of the S & G Grocer company, a wholesale grocery supply firm at 1900 Wilkens, Detroit.

Shammus had the envelope, which contained marked money, because he had been threatened in four telephone calls and in a letter, and \$10,000 was demanded in return for the extortionist's silence regarding activities on Shammus' part. The alleged activities were without foundation.

Caught In Car After 20 Years

A Woods resident, who is reported to have told police that his operator's license had been revoked 20 years ago for drunk driving, was ticketed by Woods police on Thursday, April 27, for driving while his license was revoked.

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A record combined proposed budget of over \$2,113,311 was presented to the Woods Council by City Administrator Chester E. Petersen on Monday, May 1. The proposed budget and recommendation would require an additional \$260,660 over last year's budget. This would mean that the Council has two alternatives. It either can vote for a tax increase of \$2.65 per thousand of city assessed valuation or it can consider the possibility of imposing a rubbish collection service charge of approximately 50c a week, or \$2 per month, to offset the anticipated tax increase needed.

On Monday Shammass received more calls, ordering him to bring \$10,000 in \$100 bills in three packages, two containing \$3,000 each, and one with

\$4,000, to the parking lot in Gratiot avenue. He called Woods authorities, who in turn notified Detroit police.

Shammass called Marchand from his office, stating that the person who had called him had voiced an intention of calling back again in an hour, and Detroit detectives of the CIB, who were to have set up a recording device to monitor the conversation had not yet arrived.

Marchand and Dets. Gerald Kensora and Everett Plumb

went to Shammass' office with a recording device from their station, but when they arrived, Detroit officers were already there and had their own instrument ready for operation.

Plan Strategy

The three Woods detectives met in Detroit Police Headquarters with CIB detectives to plan strategy.

Marchand was assigned to a CIB car with Detroit detectives, Plumb was assigned to another car, and Kensora, with other Detroit officers, was staked out in the Ramona Theater.

At about 10:30 p.m., April 24, Shammass arrived at the parking lot, Marchand said, "wired for sound." As Shammass entered the lot, Habib approached and took the packages away from him, telling him not to do anything because there were two men in a nearby truck with guns.

Make Arrest

The policemen converged on the lot and placed Habib under arrest. The youth was very cooperative, it was said, and directed the officers to his car. In the glove compartment were surgical tape, similar to that used to tape the bullet to the threatening letter sent to Shammass, and two rifle shells, one of which was of the same caliber sent in the letter. These were confiscated by Detroit police as evidence.

Marchand said that the original threatening call was traced to the 1500 block of Iroquois avenue, in Detroit. Habib lives with his parents at 5083 Iroquois.

Habib claimed that he had been paid \$10 by an unknown person to pick up the packages from Shammass.

Charged With Extortion

A warrant charging the youth with extortion was obtained from the Wayne County Prosecutor's Office on Tuesday, April 25, and Habib was taken before Detroit Recorder's Judge Donald S. Leonard and pled innocent to the charge, conviction of which carries a maximum sentence of 20 years in prison on conviction.

The youth claimed he did not know Shammass, but Richard's father, James, 57, said that his wife, Josephine, and her family have been long-time friends of the Shammass family.

Habib was to have been among 90 Detroit honor high school students to receive a Detroit Police youth citation May 16, in recognition of his scholastic achievements and good citizenship. His name has been scratched from the list.

A senior at St. Catherine's High School in Detroit, Habib was scheduled to graduate in June with honors.

Jeffrey Steiner Westgarth of 19235 Raymond, St. Clair Shores, charged with following another car too closely, was found guilty and fined \$10, and ordered to attend Driver's School at his own expense.

Robert Jacques of 739 Fairfield was found guilty of having dirt on the sidewalk. This cost him a fine of \$10.

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
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

WSU Honors Arthur Neef

Arthur Neef, the retiring dean of Wayne State University's Law School, received a Special Distinguished Service Award during WSU's annual Law Alumni Day Saturday, April 22, at the Law School Building and the McGregor Memorial Conference Center.

Dean Neef, of Lincoln Park road, who will retire as dean on July 1 but will continue at the University in a teaching role, was honored by WSU law alumni for his "long, dedicated service to the Law School and for his major role in the construction of the newly completed Law School Building."

The award to Dean Neef initiates a Distinguished Service Award program by law alumni of the University.

This is the second award received by Dean Neef from the University in the last three years. In April, 1964, he was honored by the WSU Board of Governors with the University's Distinguished Service Award.

During his nearly 40 years of service at WSU, Dean Neef guided campus planning, served as legal counsel to the Board of Governors and directed legislative relations.

Dean Neef was a practicing lawyer until he joined the Detroit City Law School in 1927 as an administrative secretary and instructor before the school became a part of the University. He was named assistant dean of the WSU Law School in 1935, dean in 1937 and provost in 1945. The title of vice president was added in 1953.

A graduate of Detroit Eastern High School in 1916, Dean Neef received an A.B. degree from the University of Michigan in 1921; and a J.D. degree from the U of M Law School in 1923.

Another example was the loan of young officers for liquor violations in Class "C" operation. When special problems involve a certain liquor establishment, it is necessary to borrow strange faces to secure evidence for successful prosecution.

Monthly Meeting
 In September, 1959, Chief Louwers initiated a monthly meeting for Detective Bureau personnel of the six departments. Each month, the participants meet to discuss current crime, and the method of operation of the criminal.

These monthly group meetings, still going strong today, have been very successful in providing each department with almost daily knowledge of all major crimes, an important factor in the success of each department's operation.

The Police Reciprocal Aid Agreement, which stirred the interests and served as a model for other cities, has generated into actual participation of problems affecting the Pointes and Harper Woods.

It proved that a small police department's flexibility of operation is limited, and crime bordering each municipality's limits is of definite interest to each department.

For approximately 20 years, the six departments have been helping each other. Today, under the approved agreement, the six departments work as a team, not only to fight crime in their own communities, but in those of their partners.

Every single man in these departments, from the patrolmen to the chiefs, is well-trained in his job, and each is dedicated to the service of his community.

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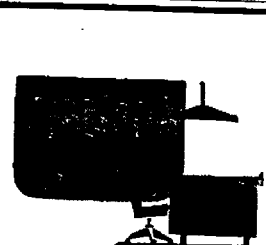

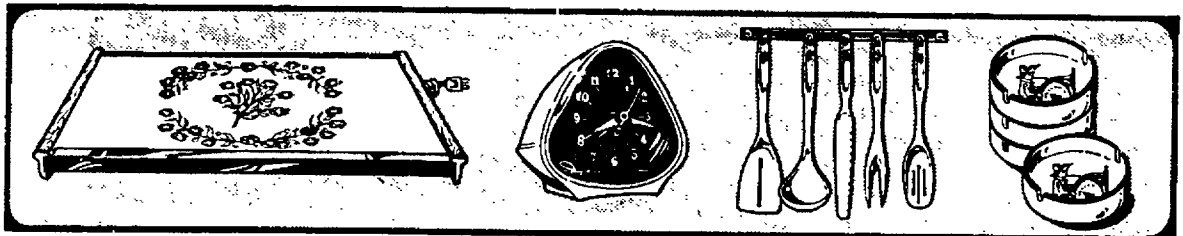

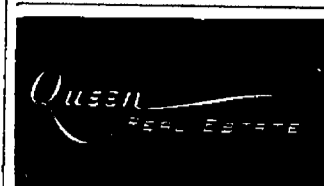

SOMERVILLE PINKNEY TUCK
Somerville Pinkney Tuck, of 180 Country Club Lane, Paris and Geneva, former U.S. Ambassador to Egypt, Veteran Diplomat and Near Eastern Specialist, died April 22, at the American Hospital in Paris at the age of 75. He had been in ill health for the past year. Ambassador Tuck's diplomatic career, which embraced the period of both World Wars, and postings in five continents, began and ended in Egypt. He was appointed Deputy Consul at Alexandria in 1913, and retired as U.S. Ambassador to Egypt in 1948. After his retirement he was a Director of the Suez Canal Company, the first American to sit on the Board of this organization. He spent the World War I years in the Near East, where

he served without interruption until 1923, an area which he knew from childhood. His father, Judge Somerville Pinkney Tuck, was for many years a Judge of the International Court of Appeals in Egypt, and through his mother, Emily Marshall Tuck, he was descended from Chief Justice John Marshall. After brief assignments to Vladivostok and the State Department, he was transferred to Europe in 1924, and Europe was the center of his activities for the next 20 years, interrupted only by a posting to Buenos Aires, where he served as Counselor of Embassy and Charge d' Affaires at the beginning of World War II. His posts during that period included Geneva, Budapest, Paris, Prague, Brussels and Vichy. Ambassador Tuck's last assignment in Europe was his wartime service with the American Embassy in Vichy as Counselor under Admiral Leahy and as Charge d' Affaires after the Admiral's recall in 1941. It was he who represented the United States in France and played a key role in the critical months preceding the Allied landings in North Africa in November, 1942. He subsequently was interned by the Germans with his staff and was exchanged in early 1944 to be immediately chosen by President Roosevelt as his envoy to Egypt. After his retirement in 1948, Ambassador Tuck divided his time between Paris and Geneva, between his duties with the Suez Canal Company, where he remained on the board until 1957, and his friends and hobbies. A long time member of the Brook and Racquet Clubs in New York, Whites in London and the Travellers' and the Jockey Clubs in Paris, "Kippy,"

as he was universally and affectionately known to his many friends throughout the world, took part in the activities of all these clubs and served for a period as President of the Travellers in Paris. He was also a member of the directors of the hospital in Paris. His name is a permanent honor in the Honneur. (Continued on Page 7)

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



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Find Many Innovations At Poupard Elementary

Next time you are leaving the Ford Expressway at the Vernier exit, look to your left and you will see Poupard School. Poupard is rooted in the early history of the Grosse Pointe School System.

Long before there was a community called Harper Woods, in the 1920's, our school district was set up. The building, its staff and students, although not located in one of the Grosse Pointes, are an integral part of our school district.

Poupard's principal, Jack Mc-

Mahon, a sincere and dedicated gentleman, explained to this reporter some of the different approaches they are using at Poupard in dealing with elementary school children.

For example, in the sixth grade, boys and girls take their science and gym classes separately. Currently, while Tom Teetaert, physical education teacher, is reading his boys for the intramural volleyball tournament, the girls are comfortably ensconced in their science classes.

In these classes the approach to science is geared to girls. Greater emphasis is placed on chemistry applicable to household products, nutrition is studied in detail and more emphasis is put on the study of plant life.

The boys' science classes are slanted for more detailed study in the history of machines, the construction of weather detecting instruments, electronics and space travel. While the boys are in their science classes, the girls are behind the nets practicing for their volleyball tournament.

Sounds simple doesn't it? Yet it is an approach not ordinarily used at the elementary school level.

Wandering over to Mrs. Betty Gray's kindergarten room we found an interesting tool for use with kindergartners, a tool that Mrs. Gray wouldn't be without: the "sandtable."

A "sandtable" is a movable table about six feet long and three feet wide that can be used for a myriad of purposes. Currently, it was neatly planted with individual gardens. The children had selected and planted their favorite flower seeds.

Cleverly, Mrs. Gray anticipated the impatience of the little ones and in the corner of each of their gardens she planted an already germinated seed, which would pop up more quickly than the rest. As we entered the room the children were all huddled around the table looking for their first sprouts.

The kindergartners at Poupard also have use of the library and are brought there as a class one day a week. What a thrill to watch these little ones rushing to the bookshelves! We must admit they weren't too selective but they all got a book and immediately sat down with it and looked for all the world as if they were reading.

Mr. McMahon believes these library visits help the children form the habit of using the library properly and make them

aware of the wonders it contains. It also teaches them the proper handling of books and the mechanics involved in taking a book home to read.

Mrs. Caryl Kerber, another of Poupard's ingenious teachers, has an unusual approach with her first and second graders, (she has her children for two years).

Her method of introducing reading to these children is her own invention. She sets up a table with eight earphones connected to a tape recorder. The children sit at the table with the earphones and listen to tiny primer stories the teacher has taped in advance. Although they don't know the words, they follow Mrs. Kerber's taped instruction along with the book and in this manner develop visual discrimination.

Mrs. Kerber tapes about five stories a week, (she only has five tapes so it's quite a job to change them weekly). While she is working with another reading group some of the children are listening to the tapes and following the story that correlates with them. Mrs. Kerber admits that a total stranger coming into the room and hearing the group respond to questions that they cannot hear asked is somewhat bewildered.

As the stories became more difficult the good readers pick up words from the teacher's reading and sounding out of the words. By the second grade these children can answer in writing the simple questions put on tape.

Mrs. Kerber started this system in her classroom about two years ago and feels she has had an infinite amount of success with this approach. Some of its advantages are that it helps develop a keen ability to concentrate on the part of the children, it eliminates room distractions and because it's an exciting and different approach it completely fascinates the little ones so their interest remains at a peak.

It also gives Mrs. Kerber an "assistant teacher," so to speak.

As the stories get more difficult Mrs. Kerber finds she must continue them, so in a manner not unlike the daytime soap operas, many of her tapes end "and so until tomorrow when we will see what happens to Dick, Jane and Spot at the grocery store" . . . interesting, different.

Just another way our school system is approaching the education of our children. Progress in education through devoted teacher efforts.

Poupard . . . you know that school you see on your left as you leave the Ford Expressway at the Vernier exit . . . Don't forget it!



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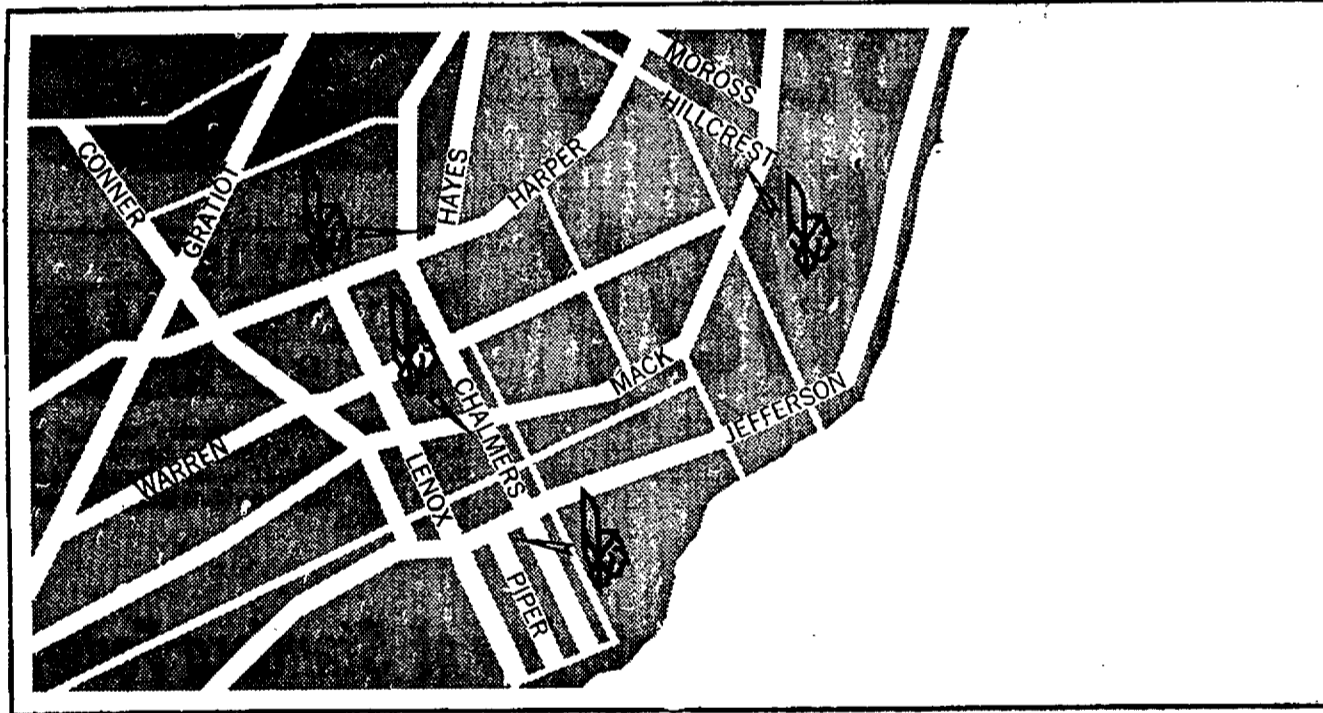

Is Maronite She is co-chairman of the National Association Convention of Maronites which will take place in late June and early July. She explains the Maronite rite is a Catholic rite. The majority of its members are Syrian and Lebanese.

The purpose of the convention is to help promote social, cultural and religious activities among Maronites. Perhaps the best-known Maronite is Danny

Thomas, whom Mrs. Dawood has come personally in contact with on a number of occasions, in her work for St. Jude Research Hospital, in Memphis, Tenn. She leads 18,000 teenagers on a doorbell-ringing campaign for ALSAC, (Aiding Leukemia Stricken American Children).

Teen March Chairman The first year she was chairman of this Teen March she was instrumental in raising the \$150,000 for the maintenance of St. Jude Hospital... the year prior to her chairmanship the collection amounted to only \$32,000. The sum she raised is reportedly the largest sum ever raised in the history of the Teen March.

One of her favorite mementoes is an ALSAC photograph taken with Danny Thomas. She has been chairman of ALSAC-Teen March for the past three years.

Mrs. Dawood did almost all the recruiting of the 103 teen chairmen involved in selling ALSAC. She visited various schools and recruited and excited the teenagers. "Their response was overwhelming," she happily relates.

"I love to get in on the ground floor of a charity and build it up... you see I'm not a re-laxer... I'm happiest when I'm working for others."

More Work With Teens She also organized the Keep Detroit Beautiful Teen Campaign. "It took a year and a half of hard work to organize, but it was well worth it," she says.

"This was a real challenge—I worked from early morning until it was time to pick my daughters up at school and then I returned to the Teen Office in the Cadillac Tower and worked until 11 o'clock at night.

"Six teens won trips to Miami. Two of them gave their winning trips to orphans instead of going themselves."

That year Detroit was voted one of the top 12 cleanest cities in the nation, and a good bit of the credit for this award goes to Betty Dawood, worker par excellence. Through her work in this campaign Mrs. Dawood met Lady Bird Johnson, whom she found to be a charming and gracious lady.

Nile Party Chairman Betty is also general chairman of a Bon Secours Hospital party recently. It was called "An Evening by the Nile," and was given to raise funds for the hospital. "It was a huge suc-

cess, complete with ocelots, a boa constrictor, the river Nile and Cleopatra," she laughingly remembers.

PIME is still another charity that is dear to Betty Dawood's heart. She was chairman of PIME's recent fund-raising party, proceeds from which were donated to some 7,000 orphans from foreign missions, many of whom are children of lepers. PIME is the Pontifical Institute Mission Extension; its territories include Latin America, Hong Kong, India, Burma and Africa.

Among other national figures Betty has met through her charitable endeavors are Senator Griffin, King Hussein and Governor Romney.

Recently Betty was appointed chairman of the Women's Advisory Council for the Tri-County March of Dimes. This involves assisting and overseeing the March's future campaigns—Quite an ambitious project!

Still Another Project Betty is also chairman of the board of the S and L Ladies of Charities. This is an old-age home for ladies of Syrian-Lebanese descent.

"At the moment we are trying to build a new home on the boulevard for the ladies. I thought it would be nice for the young to help the old, so we are using teenagers in working with the ladies and generally boosting their morale," she says.

With all these diverse activities you probably wonder when Betty Dawood spends time with her family. Well, she picks up her two daughters, Antoinette, 13, and Geraldyn, 8, from St. Clare school every days.

Her husband, Charles, who deals in electric motors, likes good hot Lebanese meals and Mrs. Dawood makes sure he gets them. She does all her own cooking and specializes in stuffed grape leaves, kibbee and other Lebanese dishes.

(When queried as to vacations, she counters with, "I don't have time for vacations, I'm too busy... and I don't miss them either. I'm never happier than when I'm knee-deep in a project. I like to utilize every minute of the day."

Loves To Decorate Betty also loves to decorate. (witness the lovely job she has done in her own home), so when she was named decorating chairman for Bishop Francis Zayek, (the first Maronite Bishop appointed in the U.S.), she was naturally delighted.

The Bishop's house, at Three Mile drive and Jefferson avenue, was purchased for him by the Maronites.

Mrs. Dawood bubbles with enthusiasm about each and every one of the projects in which she's involved. She has lost track of all the good she has done in the past because she is so involved with the present.

Betty Dawood plans to continue her work with charitable organizations, continue to be a fabulous cook, fine wife and mother... and we are willing to bet that she will still have energy to burn even after accomplishing all this. Yes, dynamic, delightful, devoted, dedicated... that's Betty Dawood!

FISH CHOWDER

Contributed by Mrs. Walter Rundle

- 2 1/2 to 3 lbs. haddock
- 1 large onion, chopped fine
- 2 slices salt pork, cut very fine
- 2 cups potatoes, cut in small cubes
- 1 qt. milk
- Butter, size of an egg

When ordering fish for chowder, have it skinned. Cut all fish off bones. Put bones on with 1 1/2 cups cold water and let cook slowly for 25 minutes, (if you can get extra bones from the fish dealer, it makes a better stock). Remove from fire and strain stock.

Fry pork with onion, being careful to cook slowly — if it becomes brown it will darken the chowder. Cut fish into small pieces. Wash fish and let drain. Put stock in kettle, add fish, salt pork and potatoes. Cook very slowly 25 to 30 minutes, being careful not to burn. Add milk, which you have scalded, and butter. Serve at once, seasoning with pepper and salt if desired. A dab of whipped cream may be placed on each serving.
