Special Proposition
Wording on Special Proposition No. 1, Transfer of 1953 and 1954 Bond Debt Retirement Fund Balances, asks voters to reply with a "yes" or "no" to the following question:

"Shall the Board of Education of The Grosse Pointe Public School System, Wayne County, Michigan, be authorized to transfer to the Building Bond Debt Retirement Fund and its 1954 School Building Bond Debt Retirement Fund (all of said 1953 and 1954 Bonds having been heretofore retired) and any subsequent additions to such Funds?"

The funds in question are interest earnings from two past tax levies. Under state law it is necessary to seek voter approval to use funds for purposes other than debt retirement.

Three Pointers Taken Off Road

The Secretary of State's Office in Lansing disclosed that the operator's license of Theodore T. Licavoli of 1154 Balfour road, has been revoked for a period of three years.

According to the latest report, dated May 19, the revocation was imposed on Licavoli on June 22, 1966, with the penalty to remain in force until June 22, 1969. The reason for the three-year lifting of the license, it was stated, was because the Pointer continued to drive while his license was previously revoked.

John H. Roy of 37 Deming lane, had his license revoked as of January 2 and he will not be permitted to operate a motor vehicle until January 2, 1969. The reason for this revocation was because Roy was arrested driving a car during a period when his license was previously revoked.

Beau R. Moss of 477 St. Clair, should have his operator's license restored by June 21. His driving privileges were suspended for two months, beginning on April 22, because of an unsatisfactory driving record.

of the registered voters of each participating district to the petitions. The required number of signatures on the petitions must be obtained within 120 days following the State Superintendent's approval.

"4. Assuming the above requirements have been met, the County Superintendent will call an election in each participating school district within 45 days after the petitions have been filed with him. The consolidation must be approved at such elections by a majority of the registered voters voting in each participating school district and each district will vote as a separate unit.

"The reorganization might also be in the form of an annexation. Under this procedure The Grosse Pointe Public School System would become a part of another school district or another school district would be merged into the Grosse Pointe System. Such an annexation would require the following:

"1. The Board of Education of the annexing district must declare by resolution its intent to annex another district.

"2. A majority of the qualified electors of the district becoming annexed must approve the merger at an election to be held within 120 days after passage of the resolution by the Board of the annexing district.

"3. Where the annexing district has in existence voting tax increases or outstanding bonded indebtedness its Board of Education may require as a condition of the merger that the voters of the district to be annexed also approve similar tax levies.

"There is no statutory requirement that in either a consolidation or an annexation, the school districts involved must immediately adjoin each other territorially.

"It is important to re-emphasize that in order to accomplish such a consolidation or annexation of The Grosse Pointe School System, the School Code requires that such be approved at an annual or a special election and that a majority of the voters of the participating school districts, each voting as a separate unit, must give their approval. The Grosse Pointe Schools could therefore, not be made a part of another district under present law without the specific approval of its own electorate."

said the thieves took a sealed box containing 50 welding lenses, a 50-foot retractable measuring tape, six master padlocks with keys, and a red blinking light, and a pair of spacers used in measuring out two-foot squares.

The light was discarded in the area and recovered by police. The total worth of the loss, sans the light, amounted to about \$98, it was said.

Dr. William Rice of 824 Balfour called police and notified them that his auto, parked in front of his house, had been entered and a woman's sweater and a box of medical slides stolen. The values of the items were not given.

In another case, which may or may not be related to the series of thefts, Chief Louwers said, is another report received from Fred Volkman of 1131 Lakepointe, who reported that an unknown person, or persons, had syphoned gas from his car, while it was parked in the alley at the rear of his property. The number of gallons taken is not known.

It was not until sometime later, when the thefts had been reported, that a citizen who witnessed suspicious actions of the two youths in a car, called police, the police chief said.

"I will continue to repeat," the chief said, "until our citizens realize the importance of calling police, that any time they observe any suspicious persons, or anything that appears to be out of the way in their neighborhood, they should call police immediately, not minutes, or hours later.

"I repeat, again and again, that people should not feel that they are bothering their police with calls of something that might not be important. Every call is important, especially if it results in the stopping of a crime, or perhaps result in the apprehension of persons committing crimes.

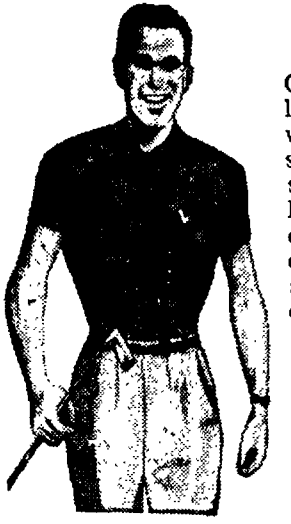
"We want to be bothered. Call your police department regarding anything out of the way. As I have said before, it is better to check out suspicious acting persons or events, and find nothing amiss, than not receive a call, and have a crime committed, possibly a very serious crime.

"We earnestly request the cooperation of our citizens. Our police officers cannot be everywhere at the same time, but they can be dispatched to any given area within a matter of minutes," Chief Louwers added.

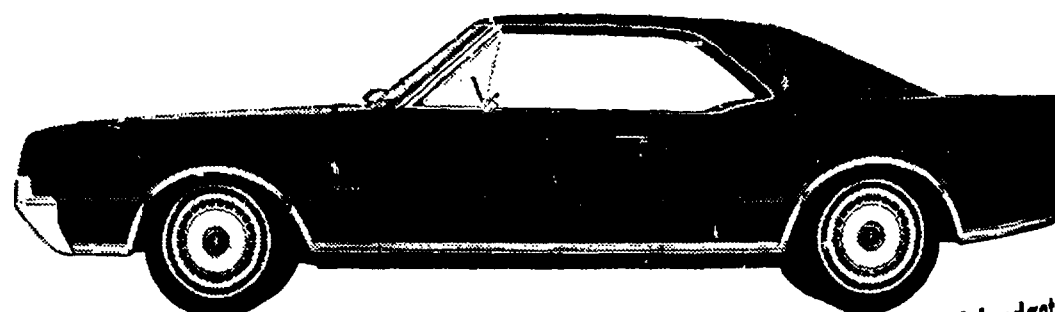

Handicraft and games, song and story periods, are among the regular program activities, with special events such as picnics, costume parties, talent shows and treasure hunts included.

Vincent and Mrs. Couvreur thanked the youngsters for their quick action which prevented serious property damages.

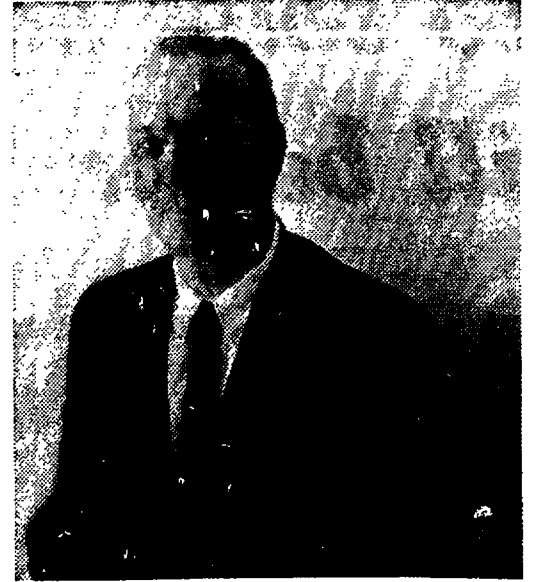

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Disabled Boat's Motor Removed

GPHS Teacher Citation Winner

Miss Frances French has been cited by Michigan State University for "significant contribution to the improvement of vocational education" through work as a research associate in an MSU pilot project in office education.

Miss French was awarded a "certificate of participation" by officials of MSU's College of Education and the university's Research and Development Program in Vocational-Technical Education, a large-scale effort supported by a grant from the U. S. Office of Education and in cooperation with the Michigan State Department of Education.

Grosse Pointe High School is one of 39 schools participating in the program's office education project. Its aim is to use the "block-time" approach to prepare persons for office occupations.

The program uses two and three consecutive class periods to provide instruction through a class simulating an office environment for high school seniors. It is an alternative to the traditional single-period approach to the teaching of office skills.

The "block-time" approach emphasizes three areas of instruction: normal classroom instruction (shorthand and typing); laboratory experiences (use of office machines); and problem-solving exercises (data processing, office organization and procedure, and human relations).

Leading the project are Dr. Peter G. Haines, professor of secondary education and curriculum, and John McBeth, occupational research specialist.

The Research and Development Program in Vocational-Technical Education at MSU is administered through the Department of Secondary Education and Curriculum with Dr. Haines as director.

Its work is centered in three broad areas:

-Program development through clinical school sites in Michigan and in Florida, Arizona, New Jersey and Washington.

-Vocational teacher education

through clinical school systems, in which schools prepare personnel under the direction of experienced professionals.

-Allied research and development activities, such as evaluation systems, workshops, conferences and seminars.

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Cisler Honored In California

Elevation of Walker L. Cisler to "Fellow of the American Nuclear Society" was announced at the 13th Annual Meeting of the Society held in San Diego, Calif.

This high token of professional esteem and recognition is reserved for acknowledged attainment in the nuclear field by notable original research or invention; by technical leadership of substantial scope; or by outstanding leadership as a teacher.

Cisler is Chairman of the Board and Chief Executive Officer of the Detroit Edison Company. His Fellow citation reads, "for his significant contributions, both here and abroad, to nuclear engineering by his continuing leadership in its development and advancement of peaceful uses of atomic energy."

Cisler has participated actively in industry, education, government and civic affairs. He is past president of the Edison Electric Institute, the Engineers Joint Council, the Fund for Peaceful Atomic Development, and the Atomic Industrial Forum. He holds numerous professional honors including the George Westinghouse Gold Medal, the Henry Lawrence Gantt Gold Medal, the Washington Award, the George W. Goethals Award, and the Hoover Medal Award. Cisler resides at 1071 Devonshire Road.

The American Nuclear Society is a non-profit scientific, engineering, and educational organization which was founded in 1954. It comprises 7,000 scientists, engineers, corporation executives, university professors, students, physicians, and persons in public service, who have common interests in the development of peaceful uses of nuclear energy.

FRANCIS J. McCANN, affectionately known as "Coach" will retire after forty-eight years of teaching and coaching at the Grosse Pointe University School.

He was born in Boston 74 years ago. He attended public, grammar and high schools, and earned his A.B. degree at Boston College.

When World War I broke out, he enlisted in the Navy in November, 1917. He went in as a seaman and received a commission in the Supply Corps.

He joined the staff of the predecessor school, Detroit University School, in September, 1919.

The new teacher had an extremely full schedule. Besides teaching Latin, ancient history and eighth and ninth grade mathematics, he was pressed into service to coach football and baseball. He continued coaching for 20 years. Twenty-eight years after he stopped directing athletics, he is still affectionately known as "Coach."

"There are too few men or women who truly deserve the title of 'Master Teacher,' certainly Coach is one of them." These words express the admiration of the present headmaster of the Grosse Pointe University School, Hugh C. Riddleberger. His "Docket System," widely admired by teachers everywhere, permits each student to progress at a pace dictated by his ability and ambition.

Coach McCann possesses that wonderful gift of personality that attracts boys and extracts from each his finest qualities. This impact has been felt by an important segment of Detroit's business and professional community.

In the winter of 1966, the Francis J. McCann Rink was built and dedicated in his honor. It was a gift of the Shelden family to the school and community.

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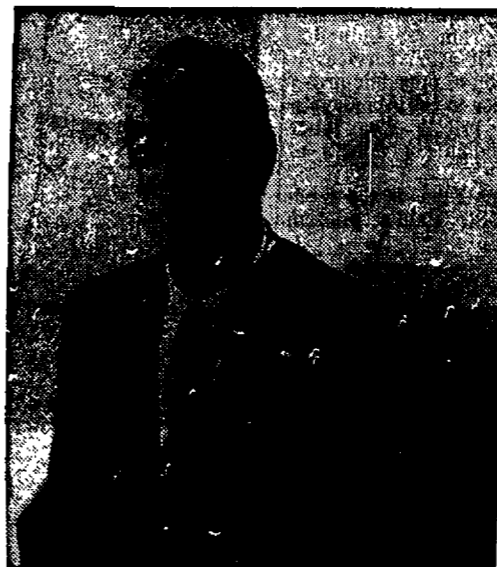

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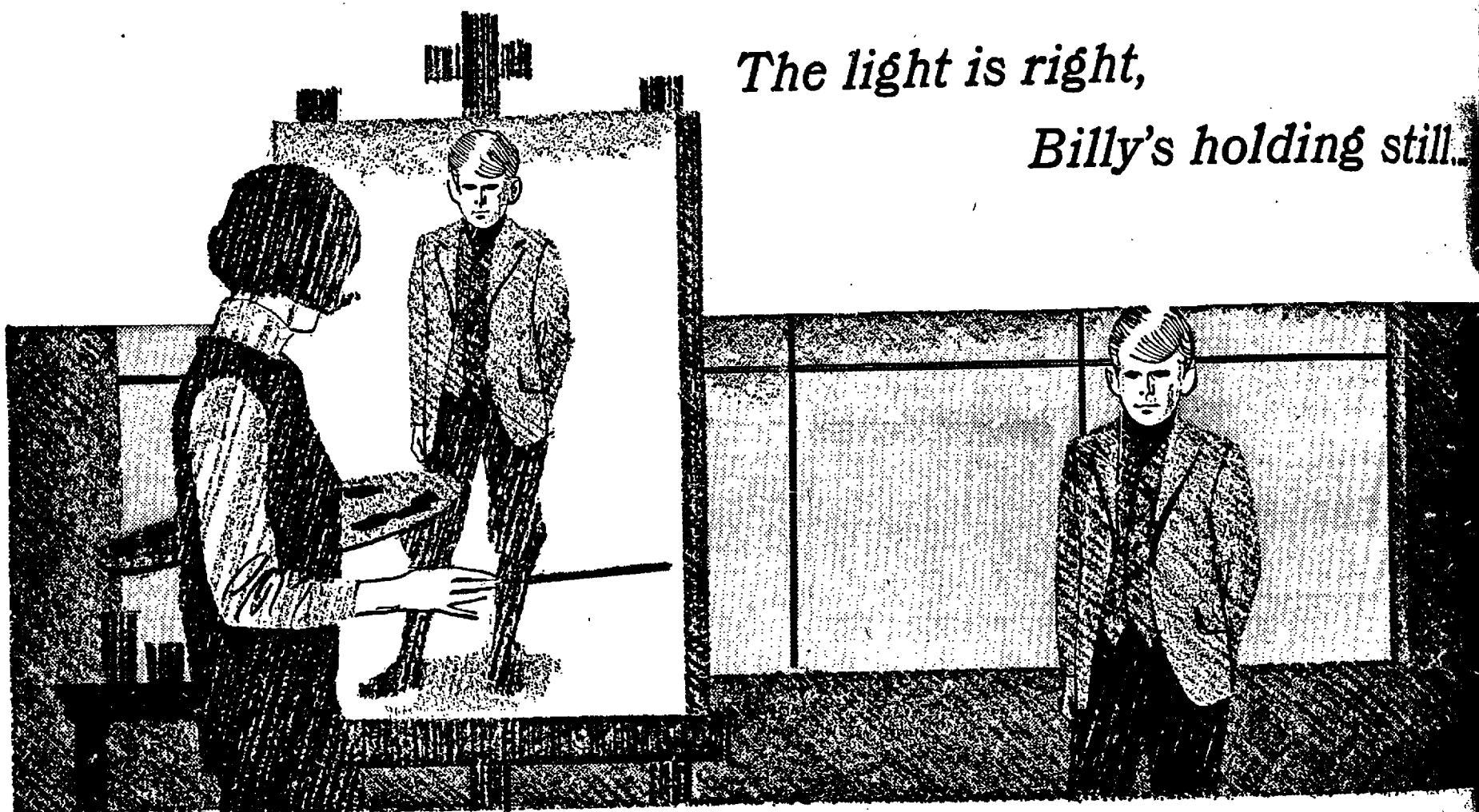
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Thief Helps Self To Roll of Bills

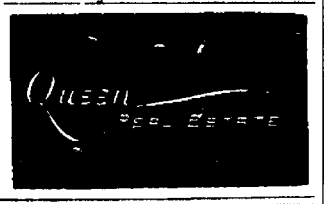

Good news for garden lovers: It's almost time for the Garden Center's annual "pilgrimage" through the Pointe, and this year's nine local Tour gardens among the loveliest to be found ANYWHERE in the metropolitan area.

The rose beds circled by more-than-a-foot-high boxwood hedges at the Henry C. Bogles' home in Lakeland avenue are in roses, lilies and peonies, and shading the garden are a ginkgo and a linden tree.

At Mrs. Frederick W. Campbell's home in Beverly road, Japanese maples conceal a small upper terrace. The present owner spent a year in Japan where lilies are planted. The back garden is filled with semi-circular rose beds, edged with clipped hedges, and clematis grows on iron umbrellas.

ALWAYS-popular stop on the Tour is the Pointe War Memorial, where paths lead from the parking lot through the box parterre garden to the lake.

There are located the famous Trial Gardens, maintained by various Grosse Pointe Garden Clubs, featuring introductions of marigolds, petunias, verbenas and geraniums, as well as permanent plantings of iris.

The Christ Church Memorial Rose Garden is a stop this year, (the Church itself, in Grosse Pointe boulevard, will also be open to visitors), and the Church it's just a short walk to Benjamin Warren, Jr.'s home in Lakecrest lane.

Mr. Warren's garden, entered through gateposts of weathered brown brick, features pink chestnut trees, rhododendrons and a small pool, plus a green-filled with home-grown orchids and carnations.

From a terrace with hanging begonia baskets at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph G. Standart, there's a vista of wide lawn studded with magnificent elms and oaks. Along the woodland walk are in shrubs, including three Japanese Kousa dogwood and an enormous yew.

Terraces encircle Mrs. John N. Lord's new tri-level home on Cloverly road. Fashion roses border the swimming pool on the upper area, Japanese iris flourish in the lower area, and annuals add bright touches of color.

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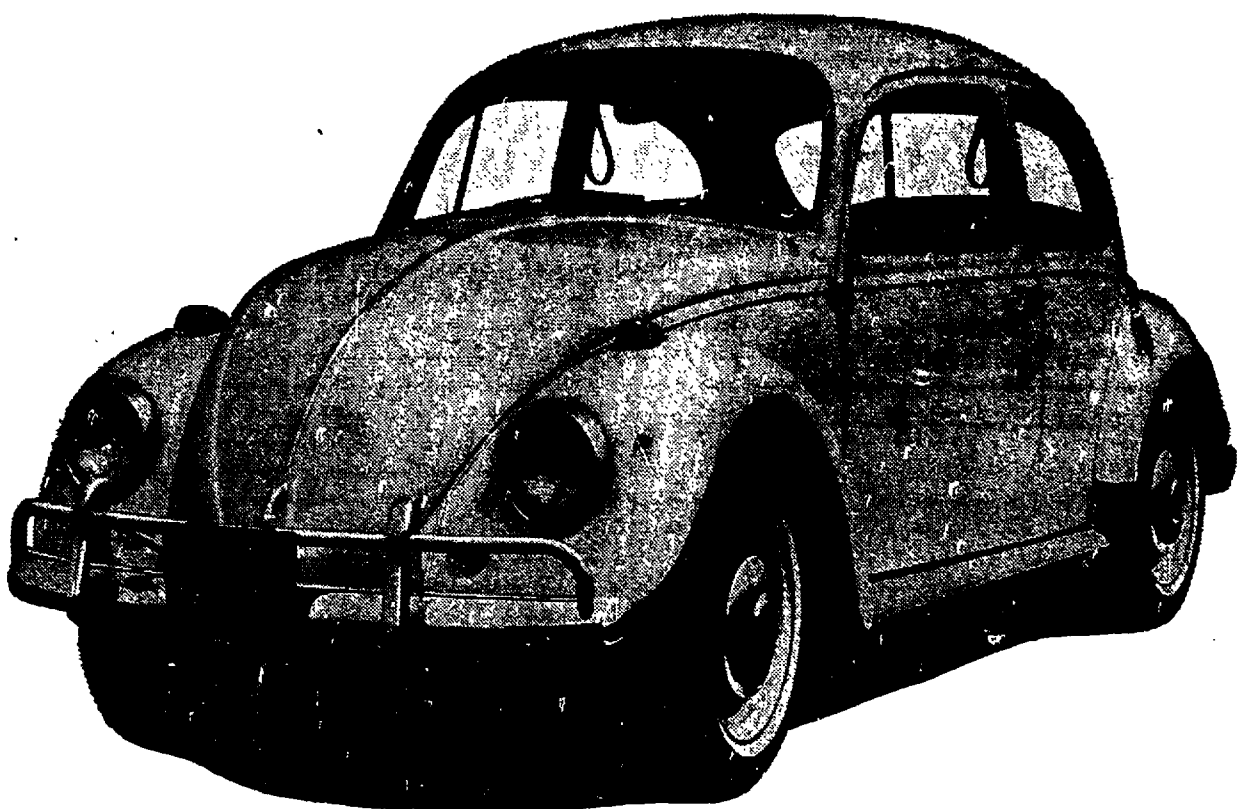

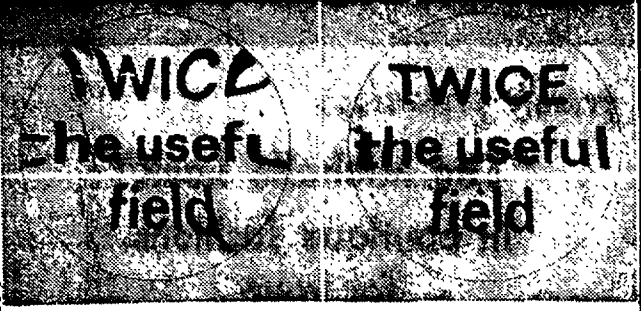
