"1. The Board of Education of the annexing district must declare by resolution its intent to annex another district.

"2. A majority of the quali fied electors of the district becoming annexed must approve the merger at an election to be held within 120 days after passage of the resolution by the Board of the annexing dis-

"3. Where the annexing district has in existence voted tax increases or outstanding bonded indebtedness its Board of Education may require as a condition of the merger that the voters of the district to be annexed also approve similar tax

"There is no statutory requirement that in either a consolidation or an annexation, the school districts involved must immediately adjoin each other

"It is important to re-emphasize that in order to accomplish such a consolidation or annexation of The Grosse Pointe School System, the School Code requires that such be approved at an annual or a special election and that a majority of the voters of the participating school districts, each voting as a separate unit, must give their approval. The Grosse Pointe Schools could therefore, not be made a part of another district under present law without the specific approval of its own electorate."

It was not until sometime later, when the thefts had been reported, that a citizen who witnessed suspicious actions of the iwo youths in a car, called police, the police chief said.

"I will continue to repeat, the chief said, "until our citizens realize the importance of calling police, that any time they observe any suspicious persons, or anything that appears to be out of the way in their neighborhood, they should call police immediately, not minutes, or hours later.

"I repeat, again and again, that people should not feel that they are bothering their police with calls of something that might not be important. Every call is important, especially if it results in the stopping of a crime, or perhaps result in the apprehension of persons committing crimes.

'We want to be bothered. Call your police department regarding anything out of the way. As I have said before, it is better to check out suspicious acting persons or events, and find nothing amiss, than not receive a call, and have a crime committed, possibly a very serious crime.

"We earnestly request the cooperation of our citizens. Our police officers cannot be everywhere at the same time, but they can be dispatched to any given area within a matter of minutes," Chief Louwers added.


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
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School Board Election

All qualified voters face a very great responsibility next Monday, June 12, when the annual school election will be held. Six candidates are in the field running for seats on the Grosse Pointe Board of Education. There will be but two vacancies. The lead news story on page one of this issue gives brief summaries of the backgrounds and experience of these candidates. Paid political advertisements have been appearing for weeks, further extolling the virtues of each. Handbills, personal appearances at a multitude of meetings and door-to-door solicitations have provided electors with ample opportunity to size up these aspirants for this most important office of school trustee.

There have been occasions when a hot-head or two has accused this paper of being a tool of the Grosse Pointe Public School System. This is far from the truth, even though in all conscience we couldn't feel insulted ways been proud to be considered a contributing agent to by such an appellation. On the other hand, we have alsome of the very great accomplishments of our Board of Education. The community has been blessed by continually having an exceptional type of citizen willing to give of time and talent to create, maintain and develop one of the finest public school systems anywhere. The reward for this selfless giving of service is more often damnation than praise.

It is true that we have been very close to many of the personnel of the school system, trustees, administrators, teachers and staff members. During the last six years the Grosse Pointe News has won five School Bell Awards, presented by the Michigan Education Association. It has almost become a source of annual embarrassment, for the cooperation afforded by the school system in providing information in words and pictures, nominating us for the honor and preparing the required presentation, makes us feel that, rather than we being a tool, we have a beautifully-honed implement working in our behalf.

No reward is expected... let alone demanded. We are deeply concerned over Monday's election. In our opinion, education in The Pointe is at its highest level in history. We have been close to it for the 26 years of our existance and we have never known a greater period of progress than in this last year. It is a transition period, with the Middle School under study, the new high school under construction, new teaching methods and subjects being attempted and proven out. It is particularly significant that while other systems in the area are bickering over teachers' pay and sundry subjects, our personnel are one big happy family, with the salary package agreement already signed to the completely mutual satisfaction

It takes quite a while for a new trustee of the Board of Education to become really useful. It is big business with myraid ramifications. It involves more than 12,000 children, the greatest asset any community can posssess. ith the decision of Dr. Robert Whitely not election, it means that only one incumbent will be running, the present president of the board, Dr. Frank Parcells.

This talented, dedicated gentleman, has been one of the greatest leaders we have been privileged to have serve us. We feel it would be a tragic loss to the community and the cause of education were he not returned to office.

For the other vacancy on the board we unhesitat-ingly endorse Brandon Rogers. His educational and business background, his enthusiasm, sincerity and intellectual curiosity and determination qualify him as being capable of making an immeasurable contribution to the preservation and continuing development of the standards of the Grosse Pointe Public School System. We hope everyone who is privileged to cast a ballot, will get to the polls Monday.

Wedding announcements . . . should be submitted at least one week in advance of the actual wedding date Like engagement announcements, they are printed as soon after they are received as possible, on a first-come first-serve basis-but they take space precedence over engagement announcements, (in other words, some weeks our space is limited, but brides ALWAYS come first . . . if it's a choice between running two engagement announcements or one wedding announcement, the wedding announcement goes in; the engagements are "held" until space becomes available).

Wedding "forms" . . . are available at the NEWS office. We have no engagement forms; we advise out readers to use engagement announcements that have appeared in last week's paper as their "form," (there's really only one way to announce an engagement).

ALWAYS . . . include a telephone number, where information can be checked during the day, when submitting ANY item to ANY newspaper!!!

It's not necessary . . . to write up your own engagement or wedding announcement. You supply the facts, we'll supply the sentence structure, (of course, if you find it easier to submit your announcement in "story" form, by all means do so; sometimes you make a far better jeb of it than we do . . .).

But, PLEASE . . . type your information or, if you're filling out a form, PRINT proper names. Americans are not noted for their legible handwriting, and we have no resident cyptograph decoder on the NEWS


