Lt. Telep Awarded **Two Purple Hearts**



The encouraging part about last week's announce-ment was the disclosure that these meetings have been going on for some time, and were not a by-product of the July riots. Rather than being a creation of fear and the realization of a common need for protection, they were prompted by the knowledge that an exchange of ideas could be highly beneficial to all of the participation parties. It was fortunate that such a cooperative effort had been made far in advance of July's eruption, for with the outbreak, it was much easier to make the association of the municipalities much tighter knit and to quickly formulate plans for emergency action, if such was required.

Heads of the public safety departments convened with city managers and mayors and preparations went forward, efficiently and fast, to meet any threat of a spreading of the disorder into the Pointe area. There was шист conjecture at the time of the rioting as to what would happen should this community be chosen as a target. It is comforting to know that our law enforcement agencies, working together, and with the federal and state military enforcements sent in, were far better prepared to cope with the threatened emergency than any of the citizens thought possible.
