Attention, Animal Lovers

Myriad pets owned by Pointe families are evidence, (sometimes not so mute), that there are among us many who are much concerned with the lack of laws governing humane treatment of animals. We are constantly iolted by stories pertaining to cruelty in connection with | slaughtering, harboring of creatures consigned to vivisection for scenitific experiments, etc.

The 89th Congress passed, by an overwhelming majority, P.L. 69-544, the Laboratary Animal Welfare Act, and humanitarians presumed that relief from intolerable conditions on premises of those who deal in selling such animals, in transit and in research laboratories, was about to be realized. But it developed that opposition, spear-headed by Sen. Jacob Javits, has been at work behind the scenes to delay and nullify the progress made.

Javits has bombarded the Senate with a letter, seeking co-sponsors on a draft of a new laboratory animal bill, which would repeal much of the regulation of conditions in research laboratories and medical centers specified in the bill which Congress approved. Javits calls his proposed bill an "extension of P.L. 89-544."

He says that he and Congressman Paul Rogers will introduce the new bill concurrently in the Senate and House. The new bill would take the enforcement of humane standards out of the hands of the Department of Agriculture and put it under the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, which would require a new set of standards to replace the good regulations now in use. Inspection and accreditation of animal laboratories would pass to outside groups which have an interest in maintaining relatively lax standards of care. One visit would serve to accredit a laboratory for five years, without a second inspection.

The proposed Javits-Rogers bill should be rejected and not attract any co-sponsors in either Senate or House. Those interested should lose no time in contacting their elected representatives in Washington. Letters, wires or phone calls should be directed to Senators Philip A. Hart and Robert P.
