# Judge Rules Second Time

Constitutionality Decision Affects Lots Along Jefferson Avenue; Remain Residential

The constitutionality of the Park's Zoning Ordinance which places six lots in Jefferson avenue under Circuit Judge Raymond Fox day, November 3.

Judge Fox, who was visiting in Wayne County, was initially assigned to hear the case in 1963, when two Detroit families sought to upset the Park's Zoning Ordinance, after one family was refused a permit to construct a gasoline station at Jefferson and Westchester, on one of three lots it owns. The second family owns a lot at Pemberton and Jefferson, adjacent to the Michigan Bank branch.

Named as plaintiffs in the matter were Edgar, Elma, Hilda and Louis Brandau; Mary S. Harmes; and William J. and Jessie McBrearty, and William R. and Barbara McBrearty. The McBreartys initiated the suit

In June 1963, Judge Fox entered a judgment of dismissal of the case on the grounds that the plaintiffs had shown no right to relief. The families asked for a motion to amend

The McBreartys took the matter to the Michigan Supreme Court, which referred the case to the State Court of Appeals, which in December 1966, reopinion.

On rehearing, in an opinion filed in February of this year, the Court of Appeals remanded the matter for trial and a delermination of factual issues. Judge Fox was re-assigned to hear the case, and render a

decision in the merits. In their suit, the McBreartys claimed that the lots, all in the Windmill Pointe Subdivision. on the grounds that several properties in the subdivision, and facing Jefferson, already had commercial buildings erected on them.

In rendering his opinion, Judge Fox stated that on the basis of testimony offered by the Brandaus and McBreartys, it was heretofore found that witnesses, the lots have value

The judge said he based his opnion on a decision rendered by the Court of Appeals, in the Beasley drove to Mack and She called police, who in turn case of Warner vs. City of Muskegon (1945), "In determining the reasonableness of a zoning ordinance, each case must be determined on its own facts. The ordinance must be reasonable and its reasonableness becomes the test of its legality

The burden of proving the unreasonableness of the ordinance was on those who filed suit, and in the opinion of the court, it was said, the plaintiffs had not done so.

The court ruled that the lots in question, 625, 626 and 627 (McBrearty) may be developed as residential lots, and cited a witness, Nicholas J. Leto, a builder in the Park, who testified that the lots would definitely sell for residences. Leto, in fact, had indicated he would purchase the lots and build homes on them.



When the women were together, Powers drew a snubnosed steel revolver and said, 'This is a hold-up. Give me George's and Tony's money." Mrs. Evelyn Nehra denied there was any money in the house.

The bandit ordered the three women to a second floor bedroom, where the maid was forced to lie on the floor, and the other women were made to lie on the bed, while Powers reached into his pocket and withdrew pieces of wire to bind the women's hands.

He again demanded money, and when the younger Mrs. Nehra said there was none, Powers beat her repeatedly about the face, causing her mouth to bleed. The woman finally consented to give him the money, approximately \$5,000, which was in a brown

While Powers was beating her daughter-in-law, the elder woman managed to run out of the house undetected. She ran across the street to the Village Building, and told her tale of
