Pushing Stalled Car On completion of the report, Lyford returned to the station, and Erskine and Kraiza, returning to their cars, observed two young men pushing a car in front of 261 Lothrop. The vehicle was without lights. Freeman got into his stalled vehicle and Fitzgerald walked toward the officers, asking if they had jump cables to start the auto. Kraiza informed the youth that such cables are not carried in a scout car, but he would call a tow truck for him. Erskine, in the meantime, walked to the lad's auto. Inside, he saw two screw drivers, a flashlight and a pair of gloves. He returned to the scout car and asked Fitzgerald for his operator's license and car registration, which were produced. Kraiza approached Freeman, who was sitting in the stalled car, and when he got to the vehicle, he glanced in and saw several items of jewelry on the floor between Freeman's legs. Both Plead Innocence The policemen said that the youths failed to give a reasonable account for being in possession of the items, and both denied knowing how the pieces got in their car. The pair were placed under arrest and taken to the station for questioning and investigation. Van Tien and Miller were called. The detectives said that one of the elbow-length gloves was found in the youths' car, and the other was found in front of 295 Lothrop. A man's gold ring was found in Freeman's personal possession, but Freeman claimed it belonged to him. Under questioning by Van Tien and Miller, Freeman

talked freely, it was said, and he confessed that he and Fitzgerald had broken into the Draper residence, and many, many more homes throughout the Detroit area. The youth said he went to the front door of the Draper house and rang the bell and rapped on the door several times, while Fitzgerald went to the rear of the house. When it was apparent that no one was home, the boys broke in and started their search for money and valuables.

**Find Watch on Lawn** The screw driver, believed to be the one used in prying open the house door, was located under the seat of the youth's car. The pendant watch belonging to Mrs. Nulson was found on the front lawn of 291 Lothrop, where it was dropped by the boys. "I want it known," said Chief Roh, "that if it was not for the alertness of Patrolmen Erskine and Kraiza, the arrested youths might still be working at their illegal profession. And, if it were not for the hard work in the extensive investigation by Sgt. Van Tien and Det. Miller, who spent many hours talking to the two boys, and many more hours checking out information given by Fitzgerald and Freeman, these admitted burglaries might not have been cleared. "These police officers have done a fine job, and our citizens can well be proud of them," the chief said.

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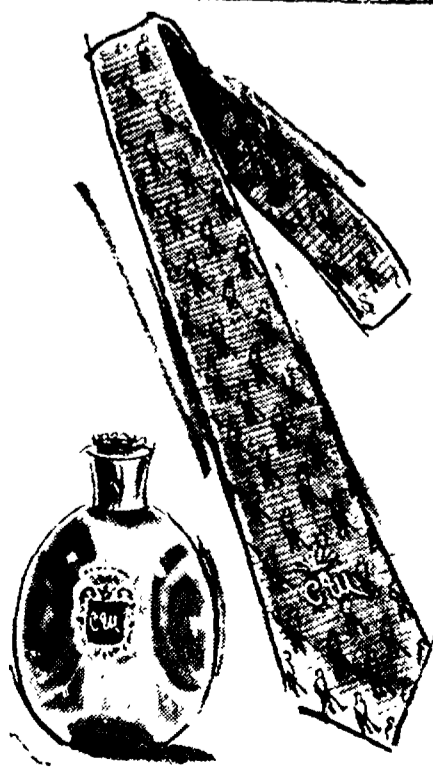

may be assessed against all property in The Grosse Pointe Public School System, Wayne County, Michigan, by one (1) mill on each dollar (\$1.00 for each \$1,000.00) of the assessed valuation, as equalized, of all property in the School District for a period of ten (10) years, from 1968 to 1977, both inclusive, the proceeds of the levy thereof to be used for the construction, furnishing and equipping of additions to existing school buildings, the remodeling and repairing of existing school buildings and to purchase real estate and repairing of existing school buildings and to purchase real estate for school purposes.

Among the proposed projects are the construction of additions to three elementary buildings (Barnes, Kerby and Maire) and improvements in the junior high schools. Some renovation of Grosse Pointe South High School is also envisioned.

**Library Proposal**

The third proposal is a \$2,450,000 bond issue for the improvement of public library facilities. This is estimated to cost 3/4 of one mill over a .5-year period.

A basic feature of the program is an addition at Grosse Pointe Central Library. The proposed construction would consist of expansion of reading rooms, stack areas, offices and service facilities and the addition of a conference room.

Second library project is the construction of a 13,000 square foot building to house the Woods Branch Library to replace the facilities now located in Parcels Junior High School.

The third proposal is the construction of a comprehensive 10,220 square foot branch library building to serve the southern part of the community. A possible location is Jefferson avenue and Femberton in Grosse Pointe Park.

#### Wording of Ballot

Wording of the ballot for the library expansion bonding proposition follows: Shall the Grosse Pointe Public School System, Wayne County, Michigan, borrow the sum of not exceeding Two Million and Four Hundred Fifty Thousand (\$2,450,000) Dollars and issue its bonds therefor, for the purpose of providing funds to erect, furnish and equip an addition to the existing Grosse Pointe Central Library building, to erect, furnish and equip two (2) new branch libraries within the School District (to replace the two existing branch libraries), and to acquire an additional site for one of such new branch libraries?

All qualified registered voters, whether property-owners or not, may vote for the first proposition. Property owners only may vote on the second and third propositions.

findings did not meet with the full accord of the parents, however.

The survey, made by Sgt. Parsons, who the chief said spent considerable time in this task, was given to the council, as follows:

1. A traffic stop and go light (not recommended). Statistics prove that there are more accidents at intersections with traffic signals, than at intersections without. It should be noted that the intersection of Chalfonte-Lothrop is only two-tenths of a mile from the existing Brownell school light.

**Flasher Rejected**

2. A four-way flasher (not recommended). From personal experience and from consulting other officers of the Department, it has been proven without a doubt, that many motorists are not even aware that they are required by law to stop for a flashing red light.

3. A stop sign (not recommended). The intersection is too close to the Brownell light, and might be too close as to result in the backing up of traffic to this light. Also, a stop sign will not be needed before or after school traffic hours, or, on days when school is not in session.

4. A portable sign with red flasher (not recommended). Same reason as explanation No. 2.

5. Adult crossing guards (not recommended). The cost is prohibitive (six dollars a day). Grosse Pointe Woods has 12 crossing guards. This amounts to \$72 a day, or \$1,440 a month, or approximately \$12,960 a school year. Requests have already been received for this many or more crossing guards in the Farms.

6. Safety patrol boys (recommended). A painted cross walk is also recommended. The survey shows that children can be safely helped to cross the street

during breaks in traffic. These breaks are more than sufficient in both length of time and frequency.

7. Pupils cross at the Brownell light (recommended). Pupils have been asked to cross at the Brownell light as this is the safest route to school.

**Called Safest Route**

Although the parents seemed not to be in accord with the recommendation brought about by the survey, the sergeant said that many reasons point out that the latter is the safest route to school. He cited some of the reasons, which are:

The Brownell light is located in front of the school—not at a corner—but in the middle of the block; automobile traffic flows

### Holiday Safety Campaign Sponsored by Auto Club

Michiganians who plan to host a party and motorists attending parties or visiting bars over the Christmas-New Year's holidays are all targets of a "First a Friend, Then a Host" traffic safety campaign announced today by Automobile Club of Michigan.

"Last Christmas season for the first time we abandoned the traditional 'If you drive—Don't drink' admonition," said Auto Club General Manager Fred N. Rehm.

"We are now re-emphasizing that liquor is involved in over half of all Michigan traffic deaths. We don't condone mixing alcohol and driving.

"But we are recognizing that 80 percent of motorists do drink and then drive. That is why we are aiming this campaign at holiday hosts and bartenders to encourage them not to let guests overindulge before getting behind the wheel."

Rehm noted that the 44 Christmas and New Year's 1966 weekend traffic deaths in Michigan comprised a 30 percent drop when compared with the same period of 1965.

"No one can say why this happened. But if hosts and drivers will be moderate in use of liquor, last holiday's reduction can repeat itself," Rehm said.

Part of this year's holiday program, which will reach its audience over television, radio and through newspapers and other educational materials, is to point out that the new implied consent law can affect more motorists during the holidays than at any other time, Auto Club states.

Through it is "First a Friend, Then a Host" campaign, Auto Club is placing the responsibility for keeping impaired and drunk drivers off the road joint-

ly on party hosts and others who serve liquor during the holidays and on drivers themselves.

One of the promotional items Auto Club is distributing statewide as part of its "Bring 'Em Back Alive!" campaign is an educational folder which can be made into a sleeve and slipped over a bottle of liquor. It is free to all at all Auto Club offices, along with posters which will be distributed to bars and restaurants.

The sleeve emphasizes Auto Club's "Bring 'Em Back Alive!" slogan and gives these pointers to hosts and others for getting guests home sober and alive:

- Refuse service to minors.
- Encourage car pools, with drivers abstaining.

- Arrange taxi or bus service for large groups.
- Don't press drinks on guests who say "No thanks."
- Refuse to serve "one for the road."
- Explain the drinking rules of your party beforehand so guests will understand your refusal to serve alcohol past a pre-established cut-off period.

"If you want to be the host with the most this holiday, give friendly consideration to your guests' ability to get home safely," adds Rehm. "Allow at least an hour for the effects of alcohol to wear off by serving a mandatory meal with a ban at the end of any party."

Hodgson's civic activities include trusteeship of Detroit United Foundations Capital Gifts Committee and Keep Detroit Beautiful, past presidency and present executive committee membership of Detroit's Central Business District Association. He is a director of Detroit Metropolitan Industrial Development Corporation and of Detroit Citizens Redevelopment Committee.

as a member, or it will not be able to join.

Butler told Mrs. Ann D. Heenan of 54 Touraine, who presented the council with the 300-name petition at the last meeting, and the interested citizens in the audience, that the Council of Governments forum is similar to the United Nations, or to a Regional Planning Board.

He pointed out that COG is powerless to pass laws or impose taxation, and that no community that joins the group will lose its identity.

He said he felt that the Farms would be remiss if it did not at least see if it will benefit by

membership, and the city officials must decide, now, if the community is to become a member.

The 5-1 vote makes the city a part of COG, but only on a

temporary and trial basis, Butler pointed out. If at any time, it is felt that the Farms is not benefiting from the membership, it will resign immediately, a privilege given to all participating communities.

Following the decision to join,

the council authorized appropriation of \$540 to be paid as its annual dues for 1968.

Kirby, who was recently appointed as a member of COG Executive Committee, by the city body, was instructed to pre-

sent a quarterly report to the council and the public, to keep the officials and citizens posted on what is going on. The reports will be made in April, July, October and the first council meeting after January 1 of each year.

- 1 cup white flour
- 1 cup brown breadcrumbs
- 3/4 cup beef suet grated
- 3/4 cup dark seeded raisins
- 3/4 cup currants
- 3/4 cup chopped fresh apple
- 1/2 cup candied lemon peel (Chopped)
- 1/4 cup fresh orange peel grated
- 3/4 cup dark brown sugar
- 1/4 tsp. nutmeg, mace & ginger
- 3 fresh eggs
- Pinch of salt
- 1/2 cup of brandy, rum or whiskey

Method: Mix all dry ingredients together. Add the brandy, whole eggs and beat thoroughly. Grease pudding basin with butter. Fill with pudding mixture and cover with tinfoil. Press foil firmly around lip of basin tightly. Place in large pot with water 3/4 up side of basin. Steam for 3 1/2 hours. Turn pudding out of basin on warm dish and pour a little brandy over top and side of dish. Set this alight and carry to table. Serve with hard sauce or whipped cream. Serves 6.

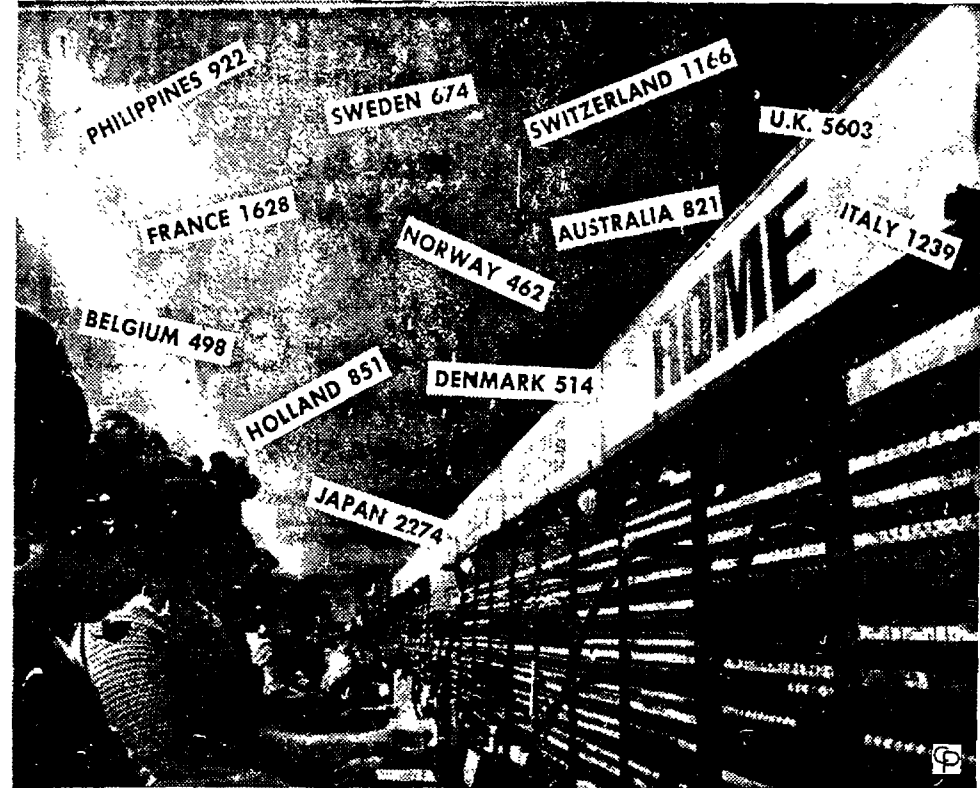

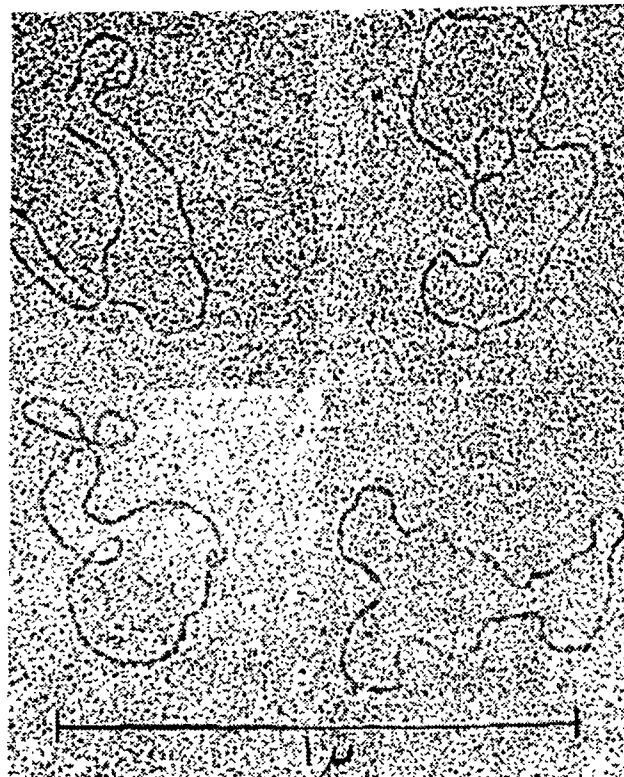
