Among the proposed projects are the construction of additions to three elementary buildings (Barnes, Kerby and Maire) and improvements in the junior high schools. Some renovation of Grosse Pointe South High School is also envisioned.

Library Proposal

The third proposal is a \$2,450,-000 bond issue for the improvement of public library facilities. This is estimated to cost 34 of

Pointe Central Library. The proposed construction would consist of expansion of reading rooms, facilities and the addition of a

Second library project is the construction of a 13,000 square foot building to house the Woods Branch Library to replace the facilities now located in Parcells Junior High School.

# Criticism and Cheers

Christmas shopping time always puts the spotlight on the abundance or inadequacy of parking spaces provided by the Pointe municipalities which have business districts. This includes all except the Shores. Having a ring-side seat on the lot serving the Kercheval-on-the-Hill area, we are particularly aware of the variance of conditions which prevail there.

At this pre-yuletide period, with shoppers swarming everywhere, there are many occasions when one is hard put upon to find a vacant parking space. This is generally true only at this time of year, but there are few other special occasions pertaining to this lot. At times these have caused critical comment from some of the merchants in the block, with the barbs aimed at St. James Lutheran Church.

Some of the special events sponsored by St. James do contribute a large number of cars to the parking lot capacity, and this has elicited some caustic comment from merchants who would like to see all the spaces preserved for the exclusive use of prospective customers. These objectors are either short in their knowledge of local history, or lacking in memory. It is Christmas time, and what better excuse could we have to rise to the defense of a

Recalling that some years ago, during the development of this municipal parking lot, the church had made a substantial contribution to the program, we asked for details of the transaction. The church officials were not interested in claiming any credit, but were finally persuaded to provide the information contained in the following letter from members of the Board of Trustees of St. James.

"It has come to our attention that, on occasion, availability of parking spaces in the metered public parking lot behind St. James Lutheran Church has been less than adequate. The parking area is conveniently available to the patrons of the business establishments located on "The Hill," as well as other parties who have reason to be in the vicinity.

We have been informed that several members of "The Hill" business community have expressed indignation over the use of these metered parking spaces by members of St. James Lutheran Church while attending functions at the church during business hours. In that connection, we believe it proper and desirable to set forth several pertinent facts surrounding the establishment of the present parking area.

"In March 1953 the City of Grosse Pointe Farms contacted the church to explain the need for increasing the size of the then available parking lot.. Acting on the request in good faith, St. James Lutheran Church offered to the Farms, without charge, a parcel of land about 15 feet wide with a depth of well over 100 feet.




