# GROUPS ATTACK DRUG PROBLEM

ISPAEL ATTEMPTED to dispel fears Wednesday night that it might be planning military reprisals against Iraq for the execution by Iraq of 14 alleged Israeli agents, nine of them Jews. Defense Minister Moshe Dayan told his countrymen: "We must provide no excuse for the rulers of Iraq to further harm the surviving Jews."

CHAIRMAN ALBERT J. ZAK of the Wayne County Board of Supervisors, announced his committee appointments Wednesday. Thirteen supervisors who helped elect him chairman got 12 committee chairmanships and seven vice-chairmanship. The 11 supervisors who voted against him in the battle for board chairman were given two committee chairmanships and five vice-chairmanships.

Friday, January 31
PRESIDENT NIXON has directed the Pentagon to work out a detailed plan for ending the draft, it was announced by the White House Thursday. This was an initial step toward fulfilling his campaign promise to seek an all-volunteer military establishment.

DAYLIGHT SAVING TIME appears headed for defeat in Michigan again. With only 55 precincts in four Upper Peninsula counties left to be checked, in the recount of ballots cast in last November's election, fast time trails by approximately 550 votes. The recount was asked after the proposal appeared to have been defeated by 1,501 votes.

JORDAN HAS SENTENCED to death two alleged spies from Israeli-occupied Bethlehem in spite of worldwide indignation

THE SENATE LEADERSHIP agreed Friday to allow fulldress debate and a recorded vote on a proposed \$12,500 a year congressional pay raise which had been geared to take effect automatically. The agreement was a victory for Senator John J. Williams, R-Del., who balked at letting the lawmakers accept a salary increase without having to vote for it openly.

Sunday, February 2 WAYNE COUNTY SUPER-

VISORS voted, 15-7, Saturday to pay themselves \$12,500 a year, plus fringe benefits, plus \$40 per diem for committee meetings. If none of the supervisors attended any committee meetings the package could cost \$407,000 a year. However, if each supervisor spent two days a week at committee meetnigs, plus a day at board meet ings, the annual cost to county taxpayers would exceed half a million dollars. 

# Fair Housing

"Shall the Council of the City of Grosse Pointe Farms adopt an Ordinance prohibiting discrimination in the sale or leas-ing of real property in the City; and providing penalties for the violation of the provisions of this Ordinance."

The text of the proposed ordinance was approved at Monday night's meeting. So that the eople of the Farms will know exactly what the proposed ordinance will contain, it is printed as follows, in its entirety:

The Full Text Section I. No person shall discriminate against any other person because of religion, race, color, sex, age or national origin in regards to the advertis-ing, showing, sale or lease of real property in the City.

Section II. This Ordinance shall not require a person to offer property to the public at large before selling or renting it, nor shall it be deemed to prohibit any person from giving preference to prospective tenants or buyers for any reason other than religion, race, color,

sex, age or national origin.
Section III. Any person, persons, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall, upon connot exceeding Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00).

Section IV. This Ordinance shall take effect twenty (20) days after adoption or publication, whichever is later.

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# Federal Jury Convicts Rubino of Tax Evasion

A Federal court jury of six, men and six women, deliberat- verdict after deciding that Ruing less than four hours, found Matthew (Mike) Rubino, 57, of times as much money as he re-1068 Bedford, guilty of incometax evasion. The guilty verdict was given on Wednesday, January 29.

Rubino was found guilty of failing to pay the government \$130,129.33 for the years 1958 452.20. The argument swayed through 1961, during which, the the jury. government claimed, Rubino reported a total income of \$101,- six Internal Revenue Service 423.81, and paid taxes totaling agents took five to six months only \$34,322.87.

Rubino, reputed to be an im-portant figure in the Detroit Maria, faces a maximum of five years in prison and a \$10,000 fine on each of the four counts of his indictment.

Federal Judge Damon J. Keith referred Rubino to the court's Probation Department for a presentence investigation, and is expected to pass sentence in about two months. The judge released Rubino on \$5,000 bond, pending the sentencing date.

The trial lasted 11 weeks, during which the government called more than 200 witnesses and offered more than 2,000 exhibits. Rubino offered no wit-nesses in his defense.

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The jury reached its guilty bino had made more than three ported during the four years in question.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Howard O'Leary argued that Rubino actually made \$331,731.76 and should have paid taxes of \$164,-

O'Leary told the jury two to to dig out and present about 1,200 cashiers' checks and money orders. The IRS has been investigating Rubino for years, O'Leary said.

Rubino's financial habits made him hard to catch, the government attorney said, since Rubino did not have a personal checking account.

The Park resident's conviction is his third. He served five years in prison, 1934-39, for counterfeiting, and 18 months, 1941-42, for violating the Federal Narcotics Law.

# What Goes On Your Library

the scene, with this arresting and out of 164 listings, 70 refer title: AN EXALTATION OF LARKS: OR, THE VENEREAL teenth century. Think over "a GAME, by James Lipton. Now hold on a minute-it's not at all what you may be thinking it is. The word "venereal" in this sense is derived from "venery" which refers to the art or practice of hunting. And the "exalta-tion of larks" is only one of many examples of phrases, such as "a school of fish" or "a pride of lions" with which we are all familiar. The author has brought to-

gether many of these collective nouns, (with most ingenious and delightful engravings), common and most uncommon, which have come down to us from medieval Books of Venery. These were used to teach young gentlemen the proper terms to be used to designate the groups of their quarry. In addition to listing many, many terms of medieval origin, Mr. Lipton, entranced by his unusual, poetic and delightful discoveries, has gone into the business of inventing some venereal terms of his own, to fit the modern world. Let's explore this book further. If you are a lover of words, a dictionary-reader, an amateur etymologist, you won't want to put it down!

Ordinarily, these venereal terms have an onomatopoetic quality ("a murmuration of starlings"), indicate a characteristic ("a skulk of foxes"). the appearance ("a knot of toads"), or the habitat ("a nest of rabbits") of an animal, perhaps comment on his nature, from the observer's point of view, ("a cowardice of curs"), or may represent an error in the transcription of the printer or scribe, such as "a school of fish" (which should have been 'shoal").

Part I of Mr. Lipton's book concerns the well-known terms, such as "a host of angels," "a flock of sheep," "a swarm of bees" or "a bevy of beauties." No one, by the way, really knows the origin of this latter term "bevy." Part II includes what the author considers unknown terms. Here are included "a sloth of bears," "a crash of rhinoceroses," "a siege of her-ons," "a drift of hogs," "a clowder of cats," and "a shrewdness of apes."

Part III, Mr. Lipton feels. contains examples of the unexpected, and it is here that we begin to see the use of social terms, rather than descriptions of animals. THE BOOK OF SAINT ALBANS, printed 1486, contains probably the

game has been played with gusto by all word-lovers. Mr. Lipton says that at first your impulse will be to make your expression alliterative, as in "a gaggle of geese." C. E. Hare, in his LANGUAGE OF FIELD SPORTS, produced "an obsti-nacy of buffaloes," "an erudition of editors" and "a tower of giraffes." In a recent issue of the BULLETIN of the Mensa Society, a doctor came up with "a brace of orthopedists," "a flutter of cardiologists" and "a guess of diagnosticians" among

In conclusion, the author lists many terms which he has encountered or made up himself. find them all so irresistible that it is hard to pick the best. However, I'll share some of what I consider the best with you. "A slouch of models," trip of hippies," "a wince of dentists," "a wrangle of philos-ophers," "a sneer of butlers," a crunch of wrestlers," rise of miniskirts," "an unction

of undertakers" (an even larger group: "an extreme unction of undertakers"). To be fair I must list with emphasis "A SHUSH OF LIBRARIANS"! There are others that I relish: "a song of sit-ins," "a shrivel of critics," "a tabula rasa of classicists," "a brood of chess-players," "an ambush of wi-"a persistence of parents" and "a transplant of suburbanites." The final three in the book are very pice too: 'A descent of relatives," "an overcharge of repairmen" and 'a galaxy of astronomers."

James Lipton seems to have

dabbled in many fine-arts areas. He is an author, playwright, lyricist, translator, director, choreographer, actor, and equestrian. At 12 he was a published poet, at 18 a profes sional actor. He is the author of both book and lyrics of two Broadway musicals. He has written television dramas, translated, adapted and directed plays and choreographed ballets. It is a great wonder to me that he had any time at all to spend on venereal terms, either medieval or modern!

Now, what contemporary terms can you think of! It might be fun to get hooked on this sort of a hobby and add to Mr. Lipton's fine collection.

HAM AND PORK LOAF WITH MUSTARD SAUCE Contributed by Mrs. William Potter From the Congregational Kitchen Cook Book

C. cracker crumbs 1/2 C. tomato sauce or undiluted tomato soup 1 egg, beaten ½ C. milk

1/2 lb. smoked ham or 1 C. leftover ham Ib. ground pork
Mix first four ingredients in

blender. Add to meat and mix. Shape into loaf and bake 1 hour and 15 minutes at 400°. Pour off grease as loaf is baking. Use 9"x5" loaf pan. Serves four with the following sauce:

1/4 C. condensed tomato soup, or tomato sauce 4 C. salad mustard 1/4 C. vinegar and water, half and half

1/4 C. white sugar 1/4 C. margarine 2 beaten egg yolks

Mix ingredients in top of double boiler and cook over medium heat until hot and slightly thickened. Serve over the ham loaf. Leftover sauce can also be used over vegetables. Note: This does not freeze well, but keeps for weeks in the refrigerator.
