The business owners said that people have been parking between the curb and sidewalk, to avoid receiving violation tickets, and that unauthorized parking has greatly increased in the parking lots of two of the establishments during the fourhour on-street ban. As a result,

Federal Civil Defense Program which investigates facilities for possible use as Air Raid Shel-

ters.

Bon Secours Hospital was checked in July, 1966 and, according to the requirements established by Civil Defense, was judged capable of handling 1,769 persons, which makes it the largest Civil Defense Shelter in the City of Grosse Pointe. Robert J. Maurer. Administrator of Bon Secours, stated that, "Bon Secours, as a community health care facility, is fully aware of its responsibility to this community in the event we are needed if this country is attacked with nuclear weapons." Though lacking in storage space, nevertheless, this hospital would be in a good position to care adequately for the basic needs of those people who would seek the hospital as a shelter for that period of time necessary to avoid nuclear fall-out from the atmosphere.

"In addition to the Civil De-fense Program," Mr. Maurer said, "to test the readiness of Bon Secours employees to cope with such emergencies, Disaster Drills will be staged by the Hospital this month and again during National Hospital Week held the week of May 11 to May

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An Interesting Question

What good are laws unless they are employed and enforced? The Pointe has been subjected to the multiple inconveniences of a cessation of bus service since the employes of Lake Shores Coach Lines went on strike on February 28. This paper has carried stories of the demands made by the bus drivers and of the arguments advanced by management. But no mention was made of the legality of the strike by any of the communications media, to our knowledge.

John R. Starrs, prominent attorney and expert on labor law and also a resident of the Pointe, expressed concern in a phone conversation with us Monday afternoon. He pointed out that there are specific state laws which outlaw such situations and wondered if we had any knowledge that they had been repealed ... or why they had not been resorted to in the case of the Pointe bus strike.

Pleading our usual ignorance in such intricate legal matters, we prevailed upon him to supply us with more information. The following letter, delivered to us on Tuesday morning, is ample testimony that he went to a great deal of trouble to comply with our request. We are grateful.
