DEFENSE SECRETARY Melvin R. Laird, appearing before a closed session of the Senate Armed Services Committee, said American commanders in Vietnam think the present 540,-000-man commitment should remain at that level unless North Vietnamese troops withdraw. He offered little hope for an immediate reduction of United States manpower in Vietnam.

AMERICAN AIRLINES ground employes ratified a new contract Wednesday to end the three-week strike against the nation's second largest domes-tic airline. The first flight from Metropolitan Airport is scheduled to take off at 11 a.m. today for New York.

#### Friday, March 21

EIGHT CHICAGO POLICE-MEN and eight demonstrators were indicted Thursday in Chicago by a federal grand jury on criminal charges stemming from the police-demonstrator clashes during the Democratic convention last August. The eight civilians are the first per-sons indicted under the anti-riot provisions of the 1968 Civil Provisions Rights Act.

GOVERNOR MILLIKEN AN-NOUNCED Thursday that he Cash-Prone plans to support at least part of Mayor Cavanagh's tax in-crease package for Detroit, It was learned that Milliken will probably support that part of the mayore program which the mayor's program which would raise the resident income taxes in the city from two to two-and-a-half percent.

By this direct approach, small self-propelled vacuum machine, to be used in picking up litter and debris from the sidewalk and landscaped areas adjacent to the municipal parking lots and similar areas at the Neighborhood Field and Neff Park. The machine is a labor saving device in that it permits litter to be picked up much faster than sweeping and

raking it by hand. The Grosse Pointe Commerce and Civic Association has indicated that if the city would make the machine available to them they would initiate a pro-gram to vacuum the sidewalks in the village business areas on a daily basis. Under this program the merchants would furnish the manpower and assume the operating and maintenance costs for the machine as re-lated to their sidewalk clean-



Opposing Voice Heard

Since its opening in 1949, 31,110 groups including 2,194,788 people have used the Center. Usage has grown to over 215,000 a year.

With this growth in usage and our inflationary economy, operating costs have continued to rise. The Center has always been able by careful management to be 65% self-supporting through activities and services supplied at reasonable cost together with dividends and interest from its invested endowment. 

Not only have the costs of goods and services increased. but the inflation in property values has caused many to lose the senior citizens exemption. 



Eighteen prominent educators from all parts of the United States are participating in a program to increase interest in the humanities in the secondary school systems of four American cities under a program of the National Humanities Faculty, Concord Mass

Undertaking the program are the school systems of Gainesville, Ga.; Grosse Pointe; Min-neapolis, Minn.; and Utica,

## Improvements Nearly Done at Park Recreation Site

ing applied to the Park's \$720,-000 recreational improvement, which mainly applies to the \$570,000 General Obligation city's Waterfront Park, at the bond issue authoried by Park foot of Alter road, it was disclosed by City Manager Robert Slone on Monday, March 24.

The program pertains to such projects as the installation of catwalk surfacing and electricity in the new marina, and the completion of landscaping in that area of the filled in old marina and old swimming pool. Residents and users of the Waterfront Park will have a difficult time locating the sites of these old facilities, when the park officially opens.

The improvements are expected to be completed soon, the city manager said, but if by some unforeseen circum-stances, this is not so, the citizens will still be able to avail themselves of the new bathhouse and the new olympicsized regulation swimming pool, and the kiddies can glory in the new wading pool at this park, and at the Three Mile Drive

Slone said that it is expected that by the time the boating season opens on May 1, the resident-sailors will be using the wells of the new marina. The fees for the wells will range from \$125 to \$350, depending on the size of the boat.

All 228 wells, regardless of size, will have water and electricity, it was pointed out. Boaters will be asked to abide by the rules and regulations governing the use of the wells.

The filled in old marina and old swimming pool, plus the sale of a strip of land sold to the Grosse Pointe are Bartlett Park, with the approval of Haves in art from Andover; Detroit, has added four more acres to the park area.

Eighty-seven trees of varied species will be seen at different locations, especially at the filledin spots. The old gate house at the foot of Alter road has been replaced by a planter with a cement edging.

A new gate house, measuring 12 feet by 24 feet, has been located within the park itself, north of the parking lot, and near the new bathhouse.

There will be plenty of room for parking. Spaces at the Waterfront Park have been doubled, from 150 to 300. At the Three Mile Drive Park, the increase is to 115, from 75

Keep up the good work, and carry on such grades, schools, and department OR COURSES OF STUDY (emphasis mine) as it shall deem necessary or desirable for the maintenance and improvement of public education."

Section 340,882 says; board of each district SHALL the conduct of the various SELECT AND APPROVE (emphasis mine) the textbooks to
