JUSTICE ABE FORTAS faces the threat of impeachment with suggestions that more information about his relationship with financier Louis Wolfson is about to break. Rep. Robert Taft, Jr., R-O., and Senator Robert P. Griffin, R-Mich., predict developments "within a few days." ** * *

Friday, May 9

DAVID TOUCHTON, 30, former intern at Civic General Hospital, 610 East Grand boulevard, accused hospital officials of using derelicts as human guinea pigs in surgical training courses for podiatrists. Some of the men claim they were lured into the hospital with promises of money, alcohol and cigarets. Some claim their feet were misshapen and in some case partially paralyzed. Assistant Wayne County Prosecutor Richard Padzieski has been assigned to the investigation.

A MAJOR INCENDIARY fire destroyed an auditorium in a City College of New York student center Thursday just as the college was trying to reopen after Wednesday's bloody racial battle. CCNY President Buell G. Gallagher said "adventurers in guerilla tactics" had taken over from responsible Negro and Puerto Rican students. He has resigned as president.

SEVERAL THOUSAND young people, many of them college students, wreaked havoc in the tiny community of Zap, N.D., Saturday. National Guardsmen were called in to oust the revelers after they turned mainstreet into a shambles. This shattered the dream of some Zap businessmen who expected a \$100,-000 profit, and dubbed the city Fort Lauderdale of the North.



Wayne County Supervisor William Bryant, Jr., of Mt. Vernon avenue, said the county does not recommend the widening of Mack avenue from Somerset to Cadieux" - mainly for

Bryant, along with N. E. Gunderson, County Road Comalssion engineer, presented the views of the Commission and supervisors at the Park council meeting on Monday, May 12.

Gunderson suggested instead that only the two-block business area between Grayton and Cadieux be widened, either by adding a recessed parking lane or another driving lane. In either case it would mean an additional 12 feet.

Mayor Matthew Patterson and he councilmen preferred another driving lane so the widening would be uniform if another lane were sometime added between Somerset and Grayton. Also, if a recessed parking lane were added, it would have to be financed by the private enterprises along Mack. Gunderson said the county does not usually pay for parking areas.

The traffic problem during rush hours, between Grayton and Cadieux where Mack narrows into a two-lane road, was alleviated last November when tion. Complaints of businessmen, who said they have lost between 15 and 35 percent of their busicause of the parking restriction, prompted the Park council to attempt to get Mack widened.

If the county approves an additional driving lane, it will pick up 60 percent of the contract bill. The remaining 40 percent would be billed to the Park. However, there would be a possibility of receiving Federal aid.

The council asked Gunderson to figure an estimated cost for the two-block widening and also for the widening between Somerset and Cadieux and present his study at the July 14 council meeting.

ORDINANCE NO. 40 ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER 16 OF TITLE III PARKS AND PUBLIC GROUNDS

THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE PARK ORDAINS:

Section 1. Chapter 16 of Title III—Parks and Public Grounds, is hereby amended to read in its entirety as

CHAPTER 16 THE LAKESIDE, PARKS 3.20. OFFICIAL NAMES. The park located at Alter Road and Windmill Points Drive heretofore established is continued and officially named Windmill Pointe Park. The park located at the foot of Three Mile Drive heretelds, established is continued and officially named Three Mile Drive Park. Said parks and any additional areas added thereto by landfill or acquisition of adjoining property are hereinafter referred to individually as "the Park" or collectively as "the Parks."

3.21. ADMITTANCE TO PARKS. No person shall be admitted to the Parks except persons having and exhibit-ing valid permit cards entitling to admittance the holder and guests in the company of persons holding and exhibiting valid guest permit cards.

3.22. PERMIT CARDS. Application for permit cards shall be made to the Director of Public Service, upon such forms as he shall prescribe and shall be issued in accordance with the following rules:

(1) Permit cards may be issued upon application of any resident of the City and shall entitle the applicant and each member of the applicant's family to be admitted to the Parks upon presentation of said permit card.

(2) Permit cards shall be issued annually and shall expire on the first day of May following the issuance thereof. If the holder thereof shall cease to be a resident of the City, such permit cards shall thereupon be void and shall be surrendered to any Park employee or to the Clerk, for can-

(3) If any person to whom a permit card has been issued or any member of such person's family or household, or any guest accompanying such per-son, shall violate any of the provisions of this Code regulating the conduct of persons in public places, such person shall be ejected from the Park and the permit card may be taken up and cancelled. Such permit card shall not thereafter be reinstated except by order of the City Council upon application made to it.

(4) No person shall make any false statement or false representation in his or her application for a per-

(5) The household of each family resident in the City shall be entitled to one family guest card which shall authorize the admittance of guests in the company of one or more members of the family in such number as may be permissible according to the terms of any resolution regulating the number of guests to be admitted by such card,

adopted by the City Council. (6) Organizations, clubs and groups, consisting principally of residents of the City, may be granted exclusive use of any Par't building upon applica-tion to the City Clerk and approval by the City Manager, upon such terms and conditions as may be established by the City Manager, and subject to such rules and regulations as may be prescribed by the City Council.

(7) Application for permit cards may be made by nonresidents who own personal property or unimproved real estate in the City and who have presented proof that the City taxes for the current year for such property, if such taxes have been levied, are paid, and if such taxes have not been levied at the time application is made, then proof that the taxes for the immediately preceding year for such property have been paid. Non-residents shall not be entitled to a family guest card.

3,23. GUESTS. Persons who are guests of residents of the City may be admitted to the Parks when they are in the company of a resident who has in his possession a valid resident permit card and a valid family guest card. The resident upon whose resident permit card any guest secures admission to either Park, shall be responsible for the conduct of such guest during the time he is in such

3.24. PARK RULES. The following rules and regulations shall govern the conduct of all persons using the

(1) No person shall conduct himself in a loud, boisterous or indecent manner, and it shall be the duty of the person to whom the permit card has been issued under the provisions of this Chapter, to see that each member of his family or household, conducts himself in a proper and orderly manner.

(2) No person shall make any unwarranted or un-reasonable use of any recreational equipment in either Park.

(3) No person shall be permitted to enter either Park except through the entrance provided therefor, expect that the occupants of any water craft lawfully docked at a Park pier may enter the Park from said pier.

from said pier.

Each person using any of the responsible for any damage caused to such equipment as a result of unnecessary, rough or unwarranted usage, and shall be responsible for the return of such equipment to its proper place or to the employee of the Park frem whom such equipment was obtained.

The Park Supervisor shall have authority to restrict the use of any recreational equipment so as to assure it reasonable availability to all persons using the Park and desiring to use such

recreational equipment.

(6) The use of the Parks shall be restricted to such hours as may be designated from time to time by the City Council.

(7) At the closing hour of either Park, all persons within the Park shall immediately depart therefrom. No person, having been directed to leave said Park at the closing hour by the Park Supervisor or any Park employee, shall fail to depart therefrom immediately.
(8) The City Manager, subject to the approval of the

Council, shall from time to time make and publish a list of sports and games which may be engaged in within either Park. No person shall engage in any other game or sport within either Park except those listed as permitted by the City Manager, with the approval of the City Council. (9) No dogs shall be permitted within either Park.

3.25. MOTOR VEHICLES. No motor vehicle shall be driven within either Park at a speed in excess of ten (10) miles per hour and no motor vehicle shall be operated in either Park other than with due care and caution. No person shall park any motor vehicle within either Park other than within a space or area provided for parking and designated as a place where parking is permitted.

3.26. DOCKING PRIVILEGES. No person shall dock or store any boat or water craft at any Park pier or in any Park harbor until a permit therefor shall have been obtained from the Director of Public Service and the fee, as established by resolution of the City Council, for such permit has been paid. Applications for dock permits shall be made to the Director of Public Service on forms prescribed by him. Each person having a valid dock permit shall have dock space assigned to him.

3.27. BOATS AND WATER CRAFT. No person shall dump or discharge any refuse, sewage or bilge water from any boat or water craft, or use any toilet on any boat or water craft, while the same shall be docked in any Park pier or shall be in any Park harbor. The Director of Public Service shall furnish each boat owner with a copy of this section of this Chapter, and every person to whom a dock permit is issued shall post a copy thereof in a conspicuous place on the boat for which such permit is

3.28. RECKLESS BOAT OPERATION. No person shall operate in any Park harbor any motor boat, launch or other water craft in a reckless manner or at an excessive rate of speed so as to endanger the life or property of any person in or on said waters, having due regard to the presence of other boats, bathers, persons engaged in fishing, or objects in or on such waters and of any other conditions then existing. No person shall operate any motor boat on said waters at a rate of speed greater than will permit him to bring it to a stop within the assured clear distance ahead.

3.29. ENFORCEMENT. The Park Supervisor and the Park employees are hereby designated as special police officers for the purpose of maintaining peace and good order at the Parks and to enforce the provisions of this Code within the area of either Park.

3.30. ADDITIONAL RULES. The City Manager, subject to the approval of the City Council, shall make such additional rules and regulations concerning the operation of the Parks and promoting the health, safety and welfare of the persons using such Parks, as he may deem proper. No person shall fail to obey any such rule or regulation. Section 2. This Ordinance shall be effective May 30, 1969.



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



It's A Complicated Problem

The recent arrests of a number of young Pointers for the possession or sale of marijuana has brought forcibly to the community's attention the presence of a bewildering and frustrating problem. No longer can we hide our heads in the sand and hope that the problem

Even with the fact of the arrests before us, the presence of drugs is difficult to accept. Drugs used to be something associated almost exclusively with the beatniks of the late 40's and 50's in Greenwich Village or more recently with the hippies of San Francisco's Haight-Ashbury district. Now Grosse Pointe, as well as almost every other similar community, has found itself forced to face the fact of not only the presence of drugs, but also of their apparent ever-increasing use.

As more and more parents agonize over the "why?" of their children's involvement with drugs, it is obviously a time for re-appraisal in many area.

What kind of people, for example, use drugs? Are they hippies? Do they come from broken homes? Are they educational dropouts? Do they lack parental discipline? We can answer yes only infrequently and must say no almost emphatically. Teenage drugs users represent a pretty fair cross section of their group, from the weekend "taster" who is in essential action from the values of his parents, to the kid who totally rejects con-

No longer can the user be conveniently and realistically relegated to the inner city ghetto or to bohemian fringe groups.

Going on the assumption that a problem can best be handled only after it is understood, we offer the following questions: What, from a definition standpoint, are drugs? (Is there a difference, for example, between the teenage drug user and the suburban housewife who takes a pep pill in the morning, a tranquilizer in the afternoon and a sleeping pill at night?)

What are the motivations of the drug user? What studies are you aware of that have tried to answer this

What are the health effects of taking drugs? Are drugs habit-forming? How many become addicted?

We can do nothing to solve the drug problem until we understand it and its many complexities. And we cannot understand it until we are willing to approach it responsibly. We would have to look far afield to discover a subject that stimulates feelings of such intensity and irrationality as characterize the drug problem. Information vies equally with misinformation.

Students do not exist in a vacuum; they are the products of their society. As the teenage population becomes better educated and more politically aware, its members see too many examples of the discrepancy between the ideal and the actual.

In considering the teenage drug problem, therefore, we can make little real progress until we are willing to consider the problem in the context of the overall
