#### Thursday, May 29

LOS ANGELES MAYOR Sam Yorty unexpectedly defeated City Councilman Thomas Bradley in Wednesday's mayoral race. A record 80 percent of the voters turned out at the polls, 53 percent of them casting their ballots for Yorty. Some observers say Yorty won by emphasizing the basic fears of white conservatives: A breakdown of law and order, militancy, communism and black people.

#### Friday) May 30

IN QUITO, ECUADOR, police vanguard forced a path for Nelson A. Rockefeller's motorcade through stone-throwing student mobs Thursday as the New York governor's arrival sparked some of the worst rioting of his Latin-American tour. The mobs hurled blazing gasoline bombs at the United States Information Service center and set off dynamite at the American-Ecuadorean Binational Center. A 60-year-old man was reported to have suffocated from tear gas. Three American newsmen were attacked and injured slightly by students. Rockefeller was guarded heavily and the disorders never came near him.

ARMY TROOPS opened fire on a column of a thousand workers and students in the riotravaged city of Cordoba, Argentina, Friday as a 24-hour students were fired on as they tried to march two miles from a suburb to the center of Cordoba, occupied by thousands of army paratroopers.

SENATOR EDWARD M. KENNEDY, D-Mass., stepped up his assaut on Nixon's Vietnam policy Saturday. Kennedy lashed out at President Nguyen Van Thieu of by lobbying in South Korea and Formosa, nations where we spent billions for defense, against President Nixon's peace

#### \* \* \* Monday, June 2

A SERIES OF thunderstorms. some of them severe, swept through Detroit and southeastern Michigan Sunday night. Trees were sheared off and streets flooded in the Michigan-Livernois area. Other trees were reported down at Concord at East Jefferson. The heavy rains and wind squalls up to 35 miles an hour pelted Metro Airport, and a sister storm felled trees and wires in Flat Rock.

FRENCHMEN VOTED Sunday and sent Georges Pompidou, the former premier, and Alain Poher, the interim president, into a run-off presidential election June 15 in which communist votes could decide which of the two middle-of-the-road candidates would replace Charles de Gaulle. Pompidou polled nearly 45 percent of the votes and Poher received 23.6 percent.

# Farms Solons Okay Kerby Field Project

Improvements Recommended by Recreation Committee to be Done Over Four-Year Period

held on Monday, June 2, the Farms council approved proposed improvements for Kerby Field, Kerby and Thieves Steal Chalfonte, with the costs to be spread over a four-year period. Total cost of the project is estimated at more

City Manager Andrew Bremer, Jr., was authorized to prepare plans, specifications and engineering estimate costs for the complete program and present them to the council in six weeks.

The field improvements were studied and recommended by the Recreation Committee appointed by Mayor William Butler in November 1967. The proposals submitted were about the same as those given to the council in May of 1968, except plans do not call for tennis courts, which were installed at the Municipal Pier-Park with the Roland Gray Youth Fund and the city sharing the cost.

I'm certain that policies in the future will clearly define the school's responsibility in these areas.

"I am deeply concerned over the attack made on the program and staff at Pierce. We should stand inspection and should be held resonsible for mistakes we make.

"However, it seems to me that to be falsely accused with evidence printed in California and supposedly shown in a school in Minnesota represents more than a routine inquiry into the functioning of our school. I had discussed this problem with Mrs. McInnis before her presentation to you As you know, she was not satisfied with my answers.

"Now that we have shown the movies and at least five of the Board members (or their spouses) have seen them and know the material submitted is not in them, I respectfully request that the Board of Education exonerate Pierce's personnel of the charges of using such material.

"I have to assume that we came close to having a moratorium or cancellation of our program because of the charges of Mrs. McInnis. We have now and have had a responsible, professional program of sex education at Pierce. The professional staff at Pierce sincerely hopes the Board will set the record straight."

# The Stork Brought You

ENCOURAGED BY their success in leading their neighbors to the rear by deteating the Grosse Pointe Farms open housing proposal ,the John Birchers are moving in on sex education in Grosse Pointe schools with the same type of innmendoes and the same dark rage.

And James F. O'Neil, treasurer of the Michigan State Board of Education, is complaining that the State Department of Public Instruction has approved the use of barnyard examples in instruction of boys and girls about sex. His criticism may come as a shock to farm parents.

The John Birch Society is working nationwide against sex education for chil-dren as a "filthy communist plot" and the Grosse Pointe local has taken up the dirty business with enthusiasm.

#### No Impropriety

TO THOSE who would remonstrate with the astronauts because there was an occasional burst of pool hall language on the flight of Apollo 10, we would reply that they were entitled to it.

There are some situations when the usual restraints do not apply. To quote from "The Nightmare," by Sir William S. Gilbert:

"When you're lying awake, With a disma! headache And repose is tabooed by anxiety, I conceive you may use Any language you choose To indulge in without impropriety."

Or when forsooth, one is bouncing around the moon in an unearthly machine that seems bent on going out of control.

These are not the only forces which would like children to believe they were found in cabbage patches. There are Mothers for Moral Stability; and Parents Assume Responsibility, Act Now; and People Against Unconstitutional Sex Education, and others.

Our suburbanites are organized into a group with the ironical name of Friends of the Grosse Pointe Schools. They were the sponsors of a recent meeting at Grosse Pointe High North at which the policies of the American Medical Association and the American Psychiatric Association recommending sex education were denounced as an attempt to destroy the family. Professional educators favoring sex education, which is most of them, were accused of being subversive and perverted.

The whole business comes as a jolt to mostly at the insistence of parents who were worried about the rise of venereal disease and illegitimacy and either did not know how to cope with the problems themselves or needed help.

It is bad enough that the Grosse Pointe roughnecks are subjecting parents to abuse and downright physical intimidation to turn the clock back.

But what is really hard to take is that they are attacking an educational process which was added to school instruction when the program the Birchers are so fond of-no program, that is-was resulting in a genuine decline in the ability of our young people to handle this big

The die-hards are, in effect, going on record in favor of more emotional disturbance, more gonorrhea and more unwed mothers.

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
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### Public Schools in Focus

By Dr. Theos I. Anderson, Superintendent The Grosse Pointe Public School System

Because of a series of disturbing rumors about the public schools' instructional activities in the realm of family life education. I wish to call the attention of the readers of this paper to certain sections of the "General School Laws" of the State of Michigan. I urge every thinking resident of the Grosse Pointes, whether a parent of school-age children or not, to read the statutes that follow. At a later date I shall take the opportunity to comment upon the place of family life education in the curriculum.

FROZEN AVOCADO SALAD Contributed by Mrs. E. W. Jackson 3 small tomatoes

2 tsps. Worcestershire sauce fsp. Tabasco

½ tsp. salt ½ tsp. minced onion

½ cup mayonnaise or salad dressing 2 avocados lime juice

Peel tomatoes; chop finely. Add Worcestershire sauce, Tabasco, salt and onion. Stir in mayonnaise. Turn into freezing tray of refrigerator; chill one hour. Do not freeze hard; do not stir while freezing. To serve, cut avocados in half lengthwise; remove pit. Brush cut surface with lime juice. Spoon mixture into cavities. Serve immediately. Serves four.


