THE CALIFORNIA Senate voted overwhelmingly Wednesday to ban all cigaret advertising in the nation's most penulous state. The measure would prohibit cigaret ads in newspapers and magazines published in California, including the reg-ional editions of national periodicals. Cigaret commercials also would be forbidden on the state's radio and television stations. On national network programs, California's TV outlets would be required to substitute local ads for national cigaret

PRESIDENT NIXON is prepared to resume the bombing of North Vietnam, sans restrictions, if the communists escalate the war in response to the United States troop withdrawals. Top administrators said he would do so reluctantly and only as a military necessity.

THE NIXON ADMINISTRA-TION, after weeks of delay and debate, proposed Thursday that most of the provisions of the 1965 Voting Rights Act be applied to all 50 states. That would mean that literacy tests for prospective voters would be abolished all over the country, not just in the seven southern states currently under the act.

A PANEL OF NINE judges from outside Oakland County was appointed yesterday to decide whether the county will have a one-man grand jury to investigate charges of official corruption. In what could be an unprecedented move Chief Justice Thomas Brennan of the State Supreme Court temporarily assigned Oakland County judges to other parts of the state while the out-county judges hear the request for the
