Plans Call for Installation of 105 Instruments in Second Phase of Five-Year Project

The Farms council at its regular meeting held on / Monday, July 21, approved the purchase of 105 new parking meters, in carrying out the city's second phase of a five-year program to replace obsolete meters.

The council gave its consent for the purchase of 75 one-hour meters, 20 two-hour meters and four meters which will limit parking to only 12 minutes. Six meters will be retained as spares, in the event of damage or break downs, according to City Manager Andrew Bremer, Jr., who recommended that the instruments be bought.

The meters will be delivered by the end of August by the Duncan Meter company of Illi-nois, with which the Farms ha. a contract, at a cost of \$50 each. The firm is pledged to hold the price line, regardless if the cost rises within the next five years, which could occur on such things as a hike in the cost of steel and labor.

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
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Getting Away With Murder

The extremely light punishment meted out this week to the seven juvenile boys, arrested in Grosse Pointe Woods June 22 for the senseless and wanton destruction of more than 30 young trees in that community, highlights one of the most vexing problems to law enforcement officials today. Namely, the juvenile "world by the tail."

In the Woods case, the seven boys admitted the destruction of the trees, adding that they just did it for "kicks." Det. Martin Trombley, Woods youth officer, pointed out that as long as the boys' parents agreed to make restitution for the damage done to the trees, no charges would be filed against the boys in Wayne County Juvenile Court. Oddly enough, the boys, and their parents, would have received an even better break by requesting a court date.

Juvenile Court officials pointed out that restitution for damages by juveniles is not mandatory in Juvenile Court cases. The only "punishment" the boys would have received in Juvenile Court would have been a stern warning. They would have been released to the care of their parents as hundreds are each week. This is true in nine out of 10 cases, according to police

Juvenile Court authorities and law enforcement agencies claim the backlog of cases is so great that prosecution for juvenile crime is almost non-existent. A Woods policeman claims youngsters realize this fact and have no fear of committing such stupid violations of the law as did the seven boys who destroyed the

It is a shame these boys could not have been made to spend their summer vacations cleaning the streets of Grosse Pointe Woods or working as part of the city's clean-up crews for no pay, until full value of the destroyed trees had been paid for in hard work.

Unfortunately, the rights of hard-working, lawabiding Grosse Pointe residents can be violated by selfish, mean and spoiled children, who choose to destroy the property of others just to have "something to do."

It is the opinion of the NEWS that a terrible imbalance in the administration of juvenile court justice does exist and that the most effective way to curb the sharply rising incidents of juvenile crime is for parents to take their children to the wood shed and instill in them a good dose of old-fashioned parental fear.
