Thursday, August 28 THE STATE DEPARTMENT suggested Wednesday that North Vietnam might be reducing its forces in South Vietnam by scaling down infiltration into the South and, in effect, invited Hanoi to indicate whether this was a deliberate step.

Friday, August 20 THE SOVIET UNION suggested Thursday that a war with Communist China would inevitably involve the use of nuclear weapons and "would not spare a single continent." The opinion appeared in an editorial in Pravda, the Communist party newspaper. This was one of the most open efforts by the Soviet Union to gain worldwide support for its often-stated claim that Peking's leaders were pursuing a reckless course that endangered not only Russia, but the peace of the world.

By Pepper Whitelaw Judge James Canham Blasts Citizens Trying to Prevent Renting Space in North High

Circuit Court Judge James N. Canham ruled Thursday, August 28, that the Grosse Pointe Board of Education has the authority to lease space in North High School to Wayne County Community College.

A citizens committee which included Steven and Eleanore Gordon, Matthew E. Connor, Ulenna G. Doerr, Mariana Von Gruenigan, Edith Wilson, and Palmer T. Heenan contended that the Board of Education had no power under the School Code of 1955 to permit the use of its facilities by the WCCC and asked that the Board be permanently restrained from doing so until such a time as it obtained the consent of the electors of the school district. They were represented by Paul C. Gracey and Oliver Nelson.

Ordinance Revised The Park also revised a city ordinance, making it mandatory to spray all elm trees either through the city's public service department or through a private contractor.

Thomas Kressbach, Grosse Pointe City manager, claims his community is running slightly below in the number of condemned trees, when compared to last year. More than 80 frees were condemned last year, as compared to 68 so far this year.



Researchers Plan to Take Water Pollution Pictures

University of Michigan re- portant contribution to water searchers are going to "take a pollution control. picture" of water pollution in the Detroit River.

They hope to find out whether their special aerial picture-tak ing-or airborne remote sens ing with the University-developed multispectral sensor-can detect water pollution and identify the pollutant. In theory, they say, it should be possible.

Although little such work has been done in the past, "airborne surveillance techniques appear to be particularly suited in areas with large bodies of water, such as the Great Lakes," explained Prof. Chester T. Wezernak of the U-M School of Public Health, who will direct the project. It is being supported by funds awarded the U-M under the National Science Foundation Sea Grant Program.

Remote sensing is the term commonly applied to electronic means of mapping from afar, usually from airplanes and satellites. In essence, it is based on the fact that, just as each man has his own unduplicated finger print, each material has its own "spectral signature." That is, each substance is unique in its radiation and reflection of visible, infrared, and ultraviolet waves.

Thus, any body of water that varies in its physical, chemical and biological properties should yield corresponding differences in spectral signatures. The ability to precisely detect such spectral signatures has been greatly increased by the "multispectral" sensor, developed by the U-M Institute of Science and Technology.

Working with both the data from aerial scanning and the data collected simultaneously at water level. Prof. Wezernak will assess how well the multispectral sensor can detect, dentify, and monitor sources of water pollution.

Industrial effluents - from chemical plants, steel produc-ers, automotive plants—will receive major attention, according to Prof. Wezernak. The main test sites will be along the Detroit River down to Lake

"Only airborne techniques appear to offer the scope and timeliness to meet the challenge of monitoring the numerous and varied industrial waste discharges into the Great Lakes and their tributary waters," Prof. Wezernak noted.

"Additionally, airborne tech niques could provide the background information which would serve as evidence of the effectiveness of the pollution control program and detect changes in large bodies of water such as Lake Erie and Lake Michigan."

Prof. Wezernak explained that remote sensing has been used successfully as a research tool in forestry, geology, agricul-ture, and other fields. A number of reports, he added, have own that aerial imagery has the potential to make an im-

In this age of raucous, kidney-jolting sports cars, is there a place for a roadster that offers brilliant performance with comfort?

Heart? A sophisticated, single overhead-cam, 6500-rpm engine with Bosch 6-plunger fuel injection and 7main-bearing crankshaft—built and bench-tested for 60 minutes to cruise above 100 mph on Germany's autobahns for hours on end without grief.

ields of Vietnam to the antiseptic battlefields of hospital rooms Marine Private First Class Gary Cunningham has fought for his life in both arenas . . . and won

Gary was wounded twice within 30 days while in Quang Nam Province of Vietnam. The first time Gary received superficial wounds, was treated and returned to battle. Just 30 days later, he was wounded once again. This time he sustained fragmentation wounds in both legs and his right arm from a hostile explosive device.

He was flown out of the area by helicopter to Danang then to a hospital in the Philippines. He was treated there for six weeks. During that time his mother Mrs. Bruce Cunningham, of Fisher road, and his fiance Shiela Rappaman flew there to see him and cheer him up, (al-though Mrs. Cunningham said Gary has been in wonderful spirits throughout his ordeal). Gary was then flown to Great Lakes Naval Base, and after another six weeks, to Veterans

Hospital in Ann Arbor, where he is currently staying. Gary has undergone a series of operations that have ultimatehis right leg. It won't be too long before he will be fitted for his artificial limb. Now he is just delighted that with the aid 14 through November 6. Bene-

Now, it has been the experience of centuries that men move beyond their small loyalties and limited concepts of community very slowly, and that without these smaller loy-alties no great allegiances are possible for the majority of men. When people are suddenly uprocted from their immediate world they oftentimes turn lawless and destructive. Many of the inner-city blacks have been transplanted from small, rural communities with traditional structures and recognizable black leadership to an unfamiliar and unstructured environment. Many have been moved again as the result of urhan renewal attempts. Few of the blacks who commit criminal acts in the cities would have done so in environments, however poor, in which they felt themselves part of a commun-

The vandalism so prevalent among coddled Grose Pointe kids may someday be discovered to be triggered similarly. Much of the population here is transient. A few years ago a high school counselor in East Detroit, which is much poorer than Grosse Pointe but just as white, told me that the kids who have grown up in that community rarely get into trouble. The kids who have been moved around a lot are far more likely to get crosswise

with the law. Grosse Pointe is a community in trouble, as our vicious van-dalism clearly attests. It is hardly strange that some people would wish to protect what remains of community identity and hence of community separateness that may be salvaged. These people are not necessarily racists, and they are not necessarily phonies. They may well believe that no good would be served by having nonresidents troop in and out of the area on a regular basis. Nonresidents would very likely feel less obligation to behave well than the residents feel, and some residents (at least some residents' children) feel very little obligation to behave well as it is. Moreover, the greater part of the anarchy in the nation as a whole has been the work of college "students" and of blacks, for these groups esjecially have been brainwashed with the doctrine that their notions of a better world are so exalted that a community, or a country, that does not conform to all their standards deserves only to be destroyed.

Many people have dreamed of a better world. One of these people was known as Lenin. I am quite sure that Lenin did fessors. This is the history of want to build a better world, as he imagined a better world would be. But human nature was always in his way. It was so much in his way that he felt forced to shoot a good many people whose presence he felt obstructed the coming of better

Yet Lenin was forced to tell the assembled Communists of other nations that they could not imagine how difficult it is to efefct change in the basis of society. The bourgeois mentality, he told the too-eager revolutionaries, is born again and again, even when one thinks the bourgeoisie as a class has been wiped out. What Goes On Your Library

If you think libraries are merely collections of books, you are wrong. If you think that li-

Your Grosse Pointe Public Libraries have attempted to provide the community with a wide range of services both print and non-print. During the past year Super 8 mm. silent films have been added to the collection at Central Library. Thanks to a thousand-dollar grant from the friends of the Grosse Pointe Public Libraries, collections of four-track pre-recorded stereo tapes will be established at both the Park and Woods Branch Libraries. Within the limits of our hudget, new tapes, records and films are added throughout the year.

One of the Library's most popular services is the circulating 16 mm. sound film collection. Each year we are able to add thirty to thirty-five new or replacement films. While our permanent collection totals only 250 films the library is a member of the Michigan Library Film Circuit, Inc. which en-ables us to have twenty-eight additional films each month.

Many groups, organizations and chools are now planning film programs for the months ahead. Some new acquisitions that will have program appeal

THE COMING OF CHRIST, a thirty-minute color film, is narrated by Alexander Scourby and produced by the National Broadcasting Company. Paintings plus views of the Holy Land tell the story of the early life of Christ. The film ranges from His birth to the meeting with John the Baptist, choosing the Twelve Apostles and the Sermon on the Mount. Church groups and those interested in art will find this film of particular interest.

In telling the story of Dr. King, the civil rights movement of the 1950's and '60's plays an integral part. This is a thirty-five minute film produced by CBS News.

Two NBC produced films that vere first presented as teleision programs are MARK TWAIN'S AMERICA and TWISTED CROSS.

The Mark Twain film recreates the life of Mark Twain and the age in which he lived. Historical highlights include the frontier towns, New York City in the 1890's and Twain's stagecoach journey through the West.

TWISTED CROSS used the tory of Adolf Hitler and the Nazi Movement to trace the rise and fall of a dictator. Many of the scenes are extracted from a captured German film. Both films are fifty minutes long.

A film that is being hailed by some as the greatest documentary film of all time is the TOKYO OLMPIAD. The Library has purchased the thirtytwo minute, color version of this film record of the XVIII Olympiad in Tokyo. Directed by Jan. an's Kon Ichikawa, the film is more than a record of the sports events it shows, it is a masterpiece of film making which captures as no other film has before the spirit of the Olympic Games.

The film that probably most merits the appellation of the greatest documentary is Robert Flaherty's film masterpiece LOUISIANA STORY showing the impressions made on the life of a young Cajun boy by the drilling of an oil well near his home in Louisiana bayou country. The running time is seventy-seven minutes in black and white.
