THE ARMY ANNOUNCED Wednesday that it has revoked

the Distinguished Service Medal awarded in 1968 to Major General Carl C. Turner, who has been accused by Senate investigators of improprieties while serving as the Army's provost marshall.

Friday, October 10

THE SENATE JUDICIARY Committee voted 10-7 Thursday in favor of putting Clement F. Haynsworth on the Supreme Court. The votes feil as anticipated. Afterward each side declared that it intended to take the issue of Haynsworth's al-leged conflict of interest onto the Senate floor.

GOVERNOR MILLIKEN PROPOSED more than \$300 million in property tax reductios in 1971 Thursday as a lure to a quick start on Michigan educational reform. Milliken, in a special message to the Legislature, called for boosts in the state income tax, including a 1.5 percent increase in 1971 to 4.1 percent on individuals, more than offsetting the property tax cuts.

Saturday, October 11

LT. GENERAL LEWIS B. Hershey, 76, was fired by President Nixon on Friday as director of the Selective Service System. Just five days before the Vietnam Moratorium, a planned nationwide anti-war protest, the White House announced that Hershey was being promoted to full general and given the title of assistant to the president for manpower to the present mobilization.

STATE BUDGET ANALYSTS said Friday that Detroit is in line for a \$35 million increase in state aid to schools under Governor Milliken's school proposal for 1970-71. Approximately \$10 million will go into teacher pensions and \$25 million toward school operating expenditures. Detroit's share of the recommended school aid allocation will total \$155 million.

Crimes and Violence are Low in the Pointe: Statistics Show Chances of

Citizen concern over the alarming increase in violent crime in the United States - an increase which the Federal Bureau of Investigation claims has escalated at a rate 11 times faster than the population in the last decade — is at an all-time high throughout the nation, yet Pointe residents can take solace in the fact that they live in one of the country's safest communi-ties when it comes to crimes Many Pointe Athletes

of violence.
The FBI's violent crime index is compiled by comparing such crimes as murder, forcible rape, armed robbery and aggravated assault, with the pop-ulation of the community. Although the FBI report is prepared only for those communities boasting a net population of 25,000 or more persons, thus excluding each of the five Points individually, a crime index for the Points can be established under the FBI system by taking a collective look at the total Pointe population

By the population-crime comparison, the chances of a Pointe resident being involved in a violent crime within the community is one in 2.140. This figure would place the Pointes collectively in the "third safest" community in Michigan

> "Too many persons find the facts are slightly cloaked, when they talk about the rise in crime in the suburbs of Detroit," claimed Shores Director of Public Safety Tom Cochill. It may well be true that crime in the Pointe has risen in the past few years, paralleling the national trend, but it is not turning to crime.

Non-Residents Blamed

"We have found that most of those persons arrested for crime in our community are not from the Pointe, but are from other areas — usually high crime centers," he continued, "The availibility of transportation has enabled more persons bent on crime to hit in the Pointe area and then get out fast."

William P. Ellenberg, director of Public Safety in the Park, claimed that the more depressed "I would not consider The

Pointe a depressed area and I wouldn't claim that we have a high crime rate,' he said. "Our overall crime-rate picture is very favorable."







Lollis, Commanding General of the United States Army Tank-Automotive Command (TACOM), Warren . . .

of the Army, presented the Department of Army Certificate of Appreciation for Patriotic Civilian Service to Mr. Eaton, of Audubon road, who since his retirement as Board Chairman of the Eaton Chemical and Dyestuff Company in December 1963 has devoted most of his efforts to public service and civic affairs. . "By his actions and deeds . . . he has contributed to greater public appreciation in the Detroit area of those American fighting men who have sacrificed so much in defense of their country . . .

... "He has worked diligently . . . with various military and veterans organizations to commemorate Veterans Day in remembrance of the brave men and women who served in all our Nation's wars . .

"His outstanding efforts . . . have made a commendable contribution to public understanding of military personnel who have offered up their lives on the altar of duty and those who have returned to civilian

.. Invitations to the memorial ceremony . . . which this year will be held on Sunday, November 16, are extended to personnel at all Detroit area military installations and to representatives of more than 40 veterans and civic organizations. They annually crowd the Cathedral. And that makes Mr. Eaton happy, and proud, not personally but of his country and his countrymen . .



> . . Other military organizations . . . with which he is associated include the Military Order of the World Wars and the Retired Officers Association. Because he did not qualify for ordinary Army retirement the Secretary of the Army in 1965 added his name to the list of Honorary Retired Officers with the rank of Lieutenant Colonel. He was appointed Executive Reservist Emeritus of the Business and Defense Services Administration Unit of the National Defense Executive Reserve in 1967 when he reached retirement age . . .
