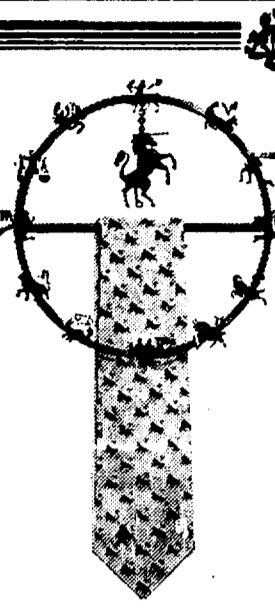


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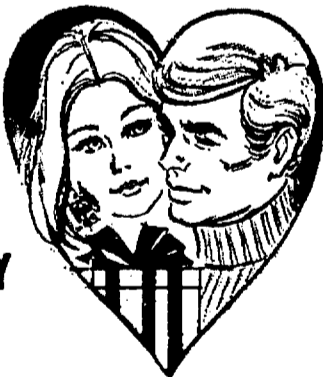
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Pointer Heads Wayne Project

Wayne State University is opening a new urban extension - in Karamursel, Turkey. Dr. Marshall Moser, 260 Chalifonte, and five other WSU professors have been chosen to participate in a special program to educate United States Air Force personnel overseas.

Dr. Moser, an instructor in the Department of Guidance and Counseling, is now spending 8-weeks in Karamursel to initiate a masters degree program in guidance and counseling for servicemen in Turkey.

It is designed to help Air Force officers and enlisted men already holding bachelors degrees to prepare themselves for positions following their separation from the armed service or to place them in a suitable position while continuing in the service.

The degree prepares the recipient for work as a guidance counselor or as a student personnel specialist in elementary, secondary, post-high school settings, and community agencies, or for personnel work in industry or other non-educational settings.

The Air Force men must follow regular application procedures for admittance to the University and receive the same courses as full-time graduate students on the WSU campus.

Karamursel is located on the Sea of Marmara, approximately two hours from Istanbul, traveling by car or ferry. Professors and their families are living in housing provided on the air base and classes are taught in Dependent High School.

Six WSU professors will participate in the overseas program; each offering two classes for an 8-week period. Moser will return to Detroit February 27.

Wayne is the fifth university to be involved in Air Force education programs of this nature. The University of Maryland is the major institution offering undergraduate programs for overseas servicemen. The University of Southern California, Boston University, and the University of Oklahoma also offer education abroad.

(Continued from Page 1) shooting a BB, or other pellet gun, or causing damage to property as a result, commits a misdemeanor, and can be subjected, on conviction, to 90 days in jail, or fined \$100, or both, at the discretion of the judge.

The matter does not stop there, LaPratt said. If damage to property totals \$100, or more, then it becomes a felony under a State law, for which, upon conviction, the person charged can be sentenced to up to a maximum of four years in State prison.

"That is something to think about," the sergeant said.

"If, and when, this vandal is apprehended, we will make every effort to see that he receives the full penalty, whether the act is prosecuted under our ordinance, or under the State statute," LaPratt stressed.

Judge Goodrow Hears 31 Cases

Woods Municipal Court Judge Don J. Goodrow cleared a court docket of 31 cases on Wednesday, February 4, including the issuing of 12 bench warrants for failure to answer earlier summonses.

(Continued from Page 1) cleared, there still remains the matter of frozen hydrant caps, held solidly by the moisture that seeps under the caps and on the threads.

Chief Beaupre said that what he was getting at was that fire hydrants should be kept clear of all snow. If drifts pile up against the fixtures, residents should shovel them away. They would be doing themselves a service, as well as doing a service for their city.

The chief said he did not like to think of what could happen if a fire broke out and fire-

men at the scene were forced to either shovel away snow, or chop away the ice-hardened stuff. The precious time it takes to do this task, he pointed out, could give a fire a good head start, which could mean greater property damage, if not injury or loss of human life.

In checking with Wendell Baker, superintendent of the Farms Water Filtration Plant, 29 Moross road, where official U.S. weather gauges are kept, it was disclosed that since their first snow fall of the 1969-70 winter, last November 19,

through Monday, February 9, a total of 28 inches of snow fell on the Pointe area, including three inches recorded Monday, as of 3 p.m., at which time the gauges were checked, as they are each day at the same time.

"I imagine the position we would be in, if all this snow had not melted," Chief Beaupre said. "All I am asking is that when there is a heavy snow fall, that residents give us a hand, and keep the white stuff away from the hydrants. They will be doing us, and themselves a favor."

Norsemen Win Music Honors

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Division IV will represent a poor performance which is lacking in many essential qualities.

Division V will represent an unsatisfactory performance.

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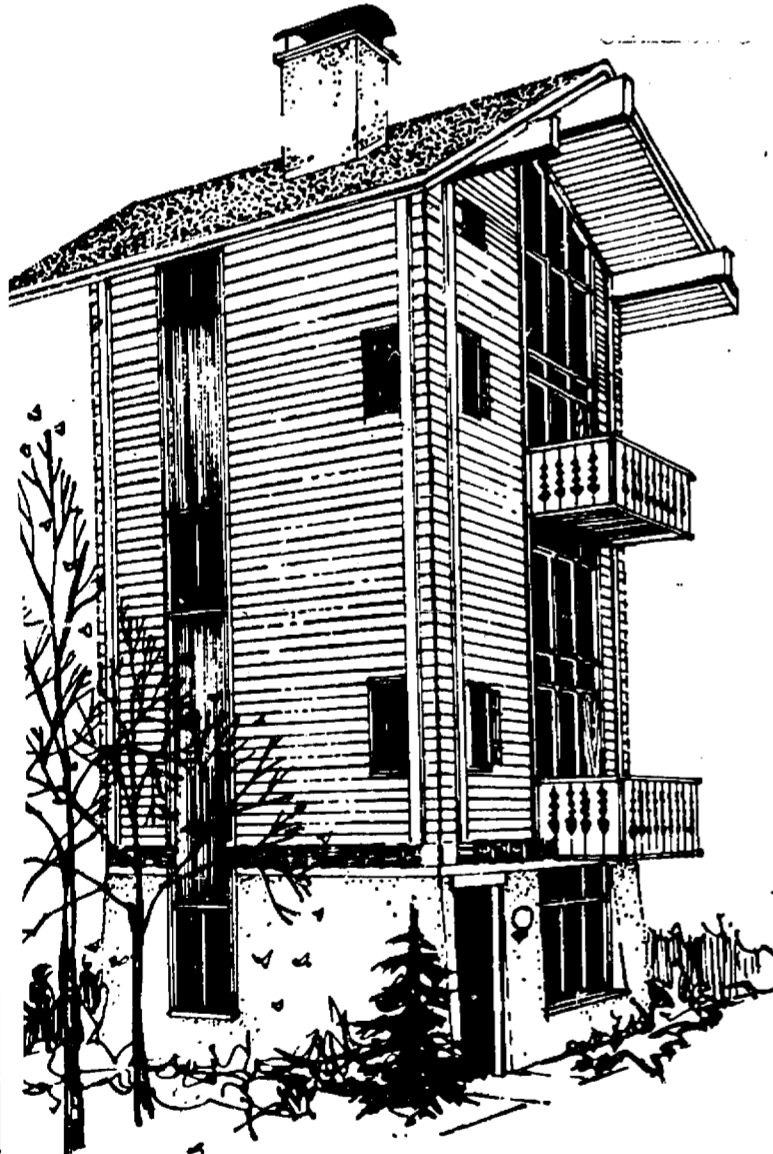

Police Urge Precautions To Prevent Home Breakins

Burglaries have become a major problem, and appear to be on the increase. Most of the breakins are almost certain to be tied in with drug addiction, in that they are committed by addicts who sell their loot to raise cash to purchase drugs.

Only recently a burglar, a confessed drug user arrested by Park police, admitted to breaking into more than 150 homes in the Detroit area since last July, averaging about \$800 worth of valuable items from each home. The man said that he traded his loot to feed his heroin habit, and that this habit cost him \$150 a day, and sometimes more.

Drug users, unless they are "loaded" with their own personal funds, mostly do not have sufficient income to take care of their habits, so they resort to burglaries, armed robberies, muggings, and other crimes, to get money.

It was disclosed by Park authorities, following the arrest of the burglar, that when he was driven around the Park residential areas, to point out the homes he had entered and looted, he did so without error, remembering each house he had visited.

Not only that, police said, the man had become so proficient in his illegal trade, that he was able to point to other homes, almost as fast as a snap of the fingers, and state whether or not anyone was at home.

The detectives who accompanied the burglar-drug addict, said that they themselves were appalled as they passed a number of residences to note how many garage doors were wide open, with houses darkened, showing not a single ray of light anywhere on the property. This is a virtual invitation to be robbed, the officers said, whether this is during the daylight hours, or during the nighttime.

Burglars spend their daylight hours, or during the nighttime hours canvassing neighborhoods, looking for signs indicating the absence of occupants. They spend their evening hours looking for darkened houses, or inside lights that are left on too long.

It is a known fact that thieves-in-the-night hate to do their work where there are lights because they can be easily seen, authorities state. The cheapest insurance a householder can have, is to turn on outside lights, as well as a lamp or two in the house. Also, to stimulate a someone-home atmosphere, leave a small radio on, in the family room, or den.

Sure, police say, this may up your electric bill a little each month, but what is this compared to losing money and valuables, especially irreplaceable family heirlooms, to the nocturnal visitors. Add to this, the trouble of putting things back in order, or possibly paying the cost of probable damage to property.

"And, for pete's sake" the garage doors closed and locked. If a lock is broken, replace it, or if you do not have one, get one and use it!

Another thing police stress, ALWAYS report suspicious persons, and questionable or dangerous actions, even if you think they might not be worth reporting. It has been said before, and it will be said again and again, that the police officers greatly prefer to respond to a call and find nothing remiss, than not receive a call and later find a crime had taken place.

Keep the telephone number of your police department near your phone, and other emergency call numbers, for that matter. If you cannot recall the number of your police department, dial "0" for operator. She will be glad to connect you with your department without delay.

If you are leaving home for an evening, or extended period of time, here are some more rules to follow, depending on the situation:

1. Cancel all daily deliveries;
2. Leave a lamp or two connected to an automatic timer, so that your lights turn on at dusk, and turn off again at bedtime to create a "lived-in look" while you're away.
3. Discontinue newspaper deliveries, or have the paper forwarded to wherever you are;
4. Notify your police department.

Young Shoplifter Nabbed in City

ist five, while serving with Headquarters Detachment of the 71st Transportation Battalion near Long Binh, Vietnam, as a supervisor.

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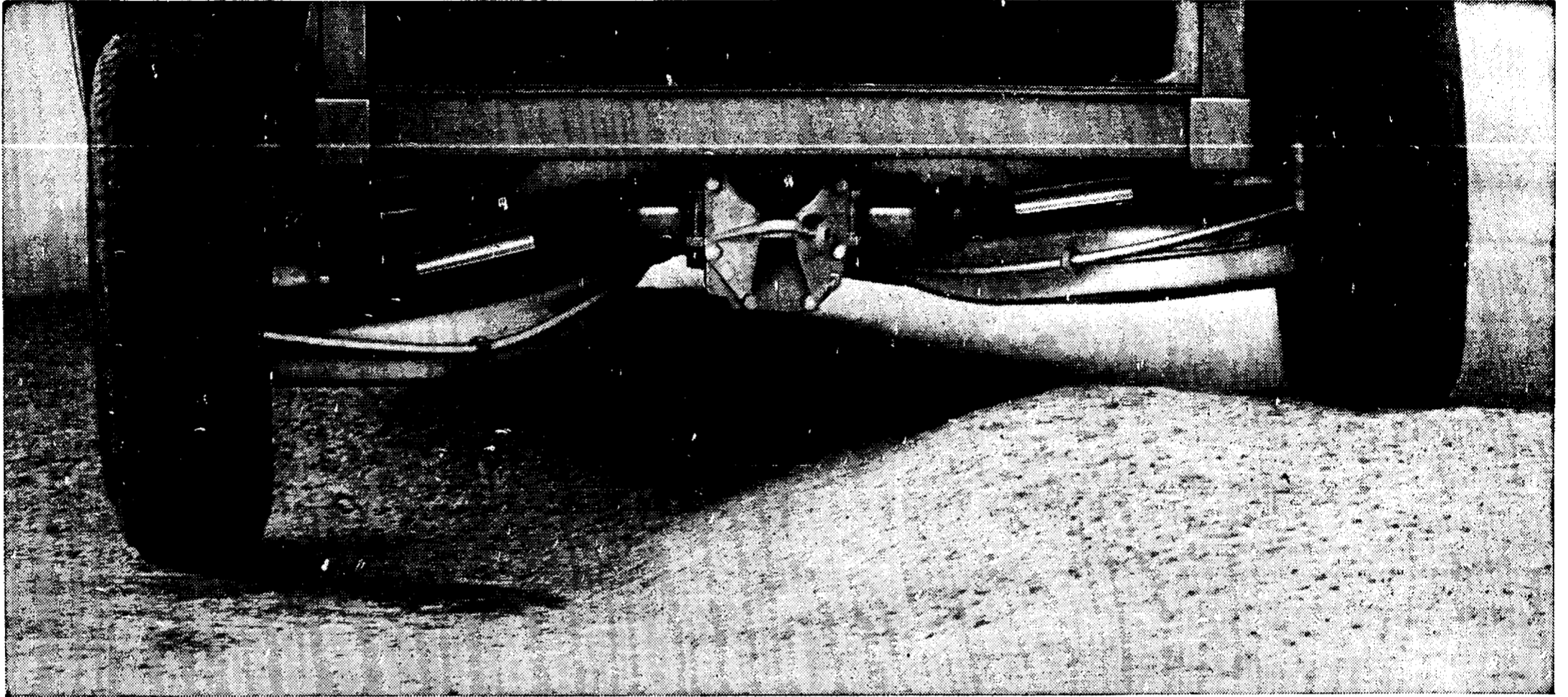

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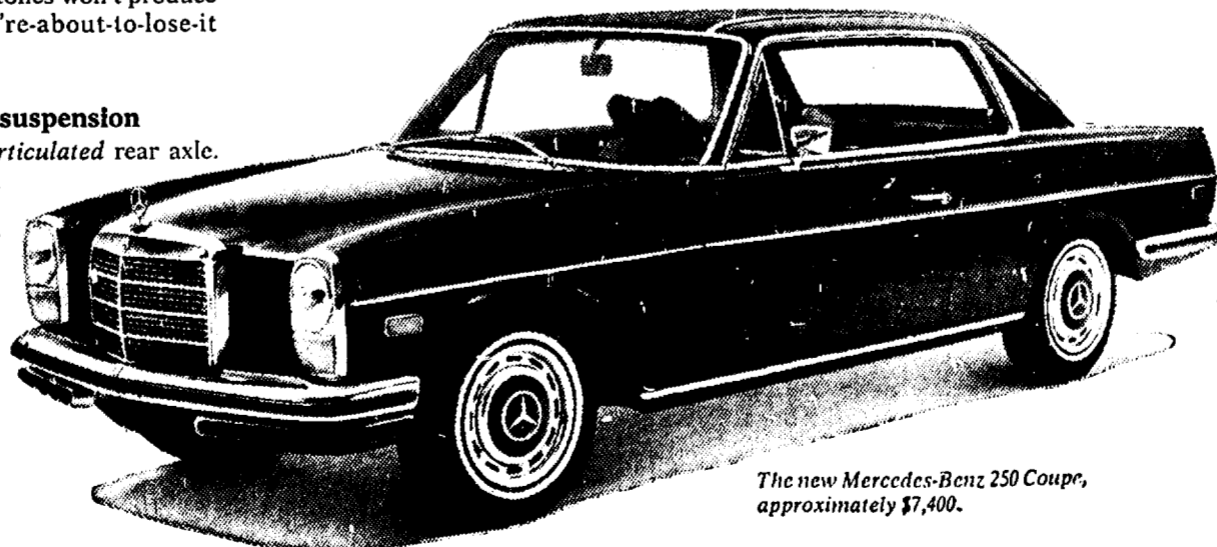
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Short IRS Tax Return Form Makes Confusion Costlier

You are a better man than I am, Gunga Din, if you are able to figure out the new "simplified" version of the Internal Revenue Service's short, federal income tax form for the past year.

It used to be that you simply filled out your short form in a

matter of a few minutes, hammered on the old stamp and dropped it in the mail.

This year, the IRS, overwhelmed with guilt at having denied many of us "short form" citizens the many of the advantages of the itemized tax return, decided to improve their standard 1040 and give us a break. Evidently, their guilt was tempered with a bit of old-fashioned IRS attitude.

"If we are going to give these folks a break, let's camouflage it," they seem to say. "We'll make it a game. If they can solve our riddle of the form, they get the benefits. If not, we still come out on top as usual."

I tried for the break, but I really don't know what I got, save for red eyes, an aching writing hand and about six sleepless hours.

The form starts out sneakingly easy. You write in your name and social security number and that of your spouse. Drop a line and add your occupation. So far, so good.

The next three lines are used for your regular exemptions and that seems easy enough, but then you get trapped off base with the next set of instructions.

"Take \$200 of line 3, page 1, add \$60 plus cost of living (if estimated, see schedule Z, line 14a and divide by 361.889 or 653.98 if over 50 and driving a car less than three years old. In the case of newer cars, skip this schedule and go on to page 3, line 6 or line 8, depending on your disposition) or, take the standard 10 per cent deduction, or the lower of the two divided by 17 and cross-multiplied."

Under the new plan, one is supposed to be able to take advantage of any additional medical, dental and business-loss deductions and a number of other tax deductible items. Scheduling is just the right deduction is enough to hike your medical payments for high-blood pressure.

"Make sure you deduct all expenses paid for dental care, with the exception of X-rays, teeth-cleaning, filled cavities, teeth-made or repaired and all other dental bills not included in the list contained on page 3 of special schedule R, which can be obtained by writing Box 711, Buckytooth, Wyo., prior to receiving this form. If you have failed to apply for this schedule, forget it and pay an additional \$10 dental fees."

The heck with it. I've figured my return out and it is in the mail. The only thing that concerns me is the fact that, under the old system, the government owed me a small bundle of green, but, with their revised and helpful form, I owe them my car, home, boat and an additional \$35 for the privilege of using the new form.

Lenten Series Explores Family

The many pressures in our society today have caused a breakdown in the family unit. Family members often fail to remember that though they are individuals, they are part of a "whole" which is the FAMILY.

Members of the Grosse Pointe Memorial Church care about maintaining the family unit as a base from which other worthwhile relationships should be formed. Because they care they are planning a series of "Lenten Conversations" to explore the family unit.

The first of these is slated for Wednesday, February 18, and features Dr. Ester Middlewood, retired director of the Michigan Mental Health Association. She will focus the question, "Families Are Here To Stay—Or Are They?" Participants will discuss how pressure groups undermine the family solidarity, why youngsters learn to drug, sex and alcohol, turning how to listen to our children, what are the rights of children to privacy and free time, and what are they doing as Christian families to correlate the needs of all family members. A film called "Astertick", which gives a view of life in suburbia, will be shown.

The February 25 session will ask, "Are the Children in Their Suburbs Short-Changed in Their Marshmallow Ghetto?" Does living in suburbia allow the youngsters enough opportunity to acquaint themselves with different ethnic and racial groups, their ideas and traditions? Do we place too much emphasis on material rather than spiritual things? Leading the conversation will be Luther Flanagan, elderman of Highland Park Presbyterian Church, four Pointe youngsters and four Highland youngsters.

Richard Kay, of the Department of Community Services, will discuss "God, Sex and Your Child", on March 4 and the responsibility of the Christian family in sex education, sexually as an essential part of daily living, and the effect of mass media's use of people as sex objects. Participating in this session will be a minister, a psychologist, a teacher and a young adult.

"How About A Good Fight?" a conversation about conflicts in the home, will be the topic on March 11. Here all the problems faced by families daily will be brought to light. They include conflicts over money, father's work versus family demands, the wife and mother's position in the home and husband and wife decision-making. Three couples will lead the conversation. They will represent age groups in the 30's, 40's and 50's.

This series is unique in that it involves parents, grandparents and young adults in an exchange of ideas in an informal atmosphere.

All sessions are free and begin at 7:30 o'clock in the Youth Lounge of the church. Dinner will be served prior to each session, at 8:30 o'clock, \$1.75 for adults and \$1 for children.

Don't bother rubbing your eyes. Those WERE sails that you saw off of the Crescent Sail Yacht Club last weekend. In fact, a handful of hardy sailors upped their mainsails and cruised the lake from Crocker boulevard, near Mount Clemens, down to the Crescent, ate a warm meal and sailed back up the lake.

Incredible? Hardly! For the past 40 years, members of the Detroit Ice Yacht Club (DIYC) have been participating in the weekend races in ice-craft that range from 12 to 24 feet in length and hit speeds in excess of 100 miles per hour under good ice-boating conditions.

Gaining Popularity

George S. Hendrie, Jr., of 330 Merriweather road, an ice-boating enthusiast for the past 30 years and the present DIYC commodore, this week told the NEWS that the sport has gained popularity at a rapid rate during the past few years and that his club now claims a membership of more than 50 persons from the tri-county area.

"At least 20 of our members are Pointers," Hendrie pointed out. "Most of them participated in that weekend jaunt to the Crescent, which is the first time we have had such perfect ice conditions in the past 25 years."

Ice-boating is a Hendrie family affair. On any given weekend, one can find seven Hendries plying the Lake St. Clair ice, training and preparing for the club's Sunday races or one of the five International Invitational races, which are held on local ice or in another state.

Hendrie and his two sons, Paul and George, III, both students at South High and his brothers Mike and Jack, and Jack's two sons, make up the Hendrie racing team. Hendrie's father, George, of 267 Hillcrest, has been involved in the sport from its glory years. 63 years ago to the present, though his visits to the lake are less frequent these days.

Call Bayview Home

Although the club holds its weekend races off Crocker boulevard, it calls the Bayview Yacht Club "home," meeting there on the second Tuesday of each month to lay plans for each race.

There are five classes of ice-craft — the DN, Arrow, Arrow Jet, Renegade and Skeeter. All five classes compete each Sunday in races of three heats and once a year in an invitational. 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Inside The Mothers Club

The February Executive Board meeting of the Grosse Pointe South High School Mothers Club, chaired by President Mrs. Douglas Smith, reflected an optimistic, on-going determination to improve the education of each High School student.

Guest speakers Jerry Gerich, South Principal and chairman of the Secondary Commission of the North Central Association, and John Coury, Social Studies teacher and chairman of the Association's Steering committee, presented a description of the self-study program planned during the week of February 16 through 20, a requirement for membership in this Association.

"This evaluation is a pre-condition to growth," according to Mr. Gerich. "It is an opportunity through total staff sharing and interaction to determine effective learning situations which best enable each student to accept responsibility and to experience teamwork, competition and leadership."

Mr. Coury will prepare a report of this self-evaluation experience involving all teachers and administrators to be submitted to a visiting team coming to GPSHS April 14 through 16.

While here, this team of impartial educators will objectively measure the School's self-evaluation. They will also examine materials, look over facilities, visit classes and talk with both teachers and students. GPSHS has been a member of the North Central Association since 1927, when the original purpose for accreditation was to qualify high school students for admittance to the more restrictive colleges.

The Association has grown in importance. It influences prospective citizens to buy homes in an accredited school district as well as influencing businessmen to give prime consideration to hiring graduates from an accredited school.

During the business meeting Mrs. Smith commended the School staff on their total dedication to the cause of good education for our children. Mrs. Smith reported that these same teachers and administrators are keeping a constant vigilance over the drug problem in the School.

She urged all parents to attend the Panel Discussion on Drug Abuse Wednesday, February 18 at 7:30 o'clock in the War Memorial when Wayne County Circuit Judge John Swainson, Dr. Ralph D. Rabinovitch, director of Hawthorne Center, and Detective Martin Trombley, Grosse Pointe Woods Police Department, will analyze the problem.
