JUDGE JAMES A. BOYLE, Massachusetts district judge, has concluded that Senator Edward Kennedy, D-Mass., was not telling the truth in his explanation of the Mary Jo Kopechne accident and that his negligence contributed to her death last July 8. Judge Boyle, who presided over the inquest last January into the death of Mis Kopechne added that there was not enough evidence to charge Kennedy with a crime.

THE UNITED STATES provided military advisers and other support Wednesday for a South Vietnamese attack on communist forces just inside Cambodia, provoking charges in Congress that President Nixon might be widening American involvement in Indochina.

#### Friday, May 1

IN A DEPARTURE of potentially enormous significance from the normal conduct of the Vietnam War, President Nixon announced Thursday night that he was sending combat troops into Cambodia for the first time. White House sources indicated that even as the President was addressing the nation on television, several thousand United States troops were mov-ing across the South Vietna-mese-Cambodian border to launch an attack on what he described as "the headquarters for the entire communist military operation in South Vietnam."

ALEXEI N. KOSYGIN, Russian premier, rejected a new Geneva Conference on Indochina and said the Soviet Union "calls on all the people of the world to stop the aggression in Cambodia." He made this statement at his first news conference since he succeeded Nikita S. Khrushchev in 1964. Kosygin accused the United States of a 'crude violation" of the Geneva agreements in Indochina and of trying to drag Southeast Asia into its military bloc. He spoke in a government guest house in the Lenin Hills on the edge of Moscow. He charged that the American action "is a crude violation of international law and as such it should be denounced''.

Questions Accuracy of Measurement of Increased Sewage Treatment Flow

Faced with the prospect of continuing to operate its water and sewage system in the red, the Woods City Council at its regular meeting on Monday, May 4, reluctantly agreed to hike its water and sewage rates to comply with those rates in effect in Detroit.

Although Detroit boosted its rates last year, the Woods de-cided at that time to attempt to operate without an increase, but, because of the pressure being applied by the Northeast Sewage District, it has found it impossible.

The rates have been increased to 32 and one-half cents per cubic feet, which will reflect a hike on average residents' water bills of about 65 cents each month.

In January 1969, the Wayne County Road Commission prom-ised to install a separate flow meter in the Woods to more accurately measure the Woods flow of sewage treatment. To date, no such meter has even been ordered and the county can offer no explanation as to why there is such a delay.

The proposed budget, which will be aired before a public hearing at the Woods City Hall on Friday, May 15, is set at \$2,053,794.00. This represents a hike of \$119,729.00 over the past budget of \$1,934,065.00. The Woods sewage flow is currently measured by meters located in the Farms and in the South Macomb District's Peak Meter Flow area. The flow from South Macomb and the Farms is subtracted from the whole and the difference is charged to the Woods and Harper Woods. Some apparently glaring differences in increases Woods is seeking answers to the problem. No answers have been given yet and the Woods

"The Farms has always held quite steady in its readings and that presents no problems," said Chester Petersen, Woods City manager. "However, since January 1969, the South Ma-comb District has reported decreases in its flow - from 106,-600,000 cubic feet to only 44,-500,000 cubic feet our flow has reportedly increased by leaps and bounds from 38,000,000 to 78,000,000. This strikes us as more than mere coincidence."
