Patients rushed to hospitals having these units receive immediate care and their heart action is monitored by electronic equipment. In this way, many lives are saved.

When a patient's heart action is being monitored for rhythm disturbances, he can be given drugs or electric shock treatment within seconds after the disturbance has been noted on the monitor.
