The much-talked about construction of a Grosse Pointe Sports Center, which would include a much-needed artificial ice surface, is still in the talking stage among City administrators, but the NEWS strongly feels that the Steering Committee of the Grosse Pointe Hockey Association (GPHA), that group which has spent countless hours on the project and more than a little money, deserves a break at this point.

The Pointe needs a sports center and there is no better location for such a complex than W. George Elworthy Field, the area selected by the GPHA committee. As it now stands, the field is owned by the Grosse Pointe Board of Education and is intended for the use of all Pointe residents. Unfortunately, the field has deteriorated and the four tennis courts, currently in use at |. the field, are in terrible condition. The Board of Education can do little to correct the situation because they are overly-pressed for funds at the present time and the financial future appears to be just as dim. The GPHA committee claims it has the funds for the sports complex and that it could make the entire operation a self-supporting endeavor. Its very presence would enhance the community's image and provide much-needed recreational facilities for Pointers of all ages. To the best of our knowledge, the School Board wants it and so do the . majority of Pointe residents. It is time that positive steps be taken to make this dream a practical reality.

The NEWS urges all Pointers to rally behind the GPHA and throw their support in the direction of this worthwhile project. The community has the need for a sports center. It has the desire for it and it can have it at no cost. There is no more time for delay.
