The library staff shows a reduction of one professional librarian and health services have been reduced by the equivalent of 6.6 nurses.

Drug Abuse Costs
Included in the proposed budget is the drug abuse coordinator position and an additional special education position which provides for early identification and remediation of the pre-school child with potential learning disabilities. The provision for this position was not anticipated in the millage election but the net increased cost will be approximately \$5,000 due to the special education state aid to be received.

The operation section reflects the reduction of approximately four employees.

The capital outlay account has been reduced in the remodeling and improvements to buildings and a reduction in proposed expenditures for furniture and equipment.

In addition to the operational budget, funds in the amount of \$835,223 are earmarked for debt retirement purposes, mostly for Grosse Pointe North High School, which in June graduated its first class.

Dr. Anderson reiterated an offer he has made to community organizations to appear at their scheduled meetings in the

near future to answer questions and to discuss the system's educational goals, as well as its revenues and expenditures for the public schools and public libraries.

On Renaud, two boys started following us on their bicycles. After about two minutes, I told them to get off the street. The truck started to move on and the kids kept following us. As we neared another truck coming toward us on Renaud, the boy who was killed, missed running into the back of the truck by inches.

"Doug Heffner told him to get on the sidewalk and stay away from the back of the truck. About two minutes later, we finished the pickup for the last house.

"I started walking toward the truck cab, and Doug Heffner was closing the back end of the truck. He then came to the cab and I allowed him to sit in the middle. A few minutes later the boy was killed."

Driver's Statement
Hoholek stated: "We were picking up rubbish on Renaud and were almost finished around 3 p.m. I was on the right hand side of Renaud going toward Mack. The driver of another rubbish truck was on the left side. I backed up so he could get by me and the accident happened.

"I heard 'Oh, no! What did you do?' by the men, Doug and Jim, who were in my truck and I also heard screaming by the men in my truck. I stopped the truck and saw the boy on the street, and the men ran to call the ambulance."

A boy and his sister, who witnessed the fatal accident, said they saw Steven standing behind the truck, and the truck backing up and hitting him. They said they heard the other drivers yelling to Hoholek to stop, but apparently too late.

Funeral services for Steven were held on Monday, August 3, in the Wayne Funeral Home and from Assumption Greek Orthodox Church.

He is survived by his parents, a brother, Dymne; and a sister, Antonia.

Interment was in Forestlawn Cemetery.

personal school supplies.

"By legislative decision we are not permitted to reduce staff at this late date. The result is that a very small section of the budget must suffer cut-backs to buy the required books and materials.

"As we examine the funds we have available per pupil, decisions are difficult to make because we have no definition of what school materials are now required of the property taxpayers. Please encourage the state agencies to supply us with guidelines at once.

"Since Grosse Pointe is in serious trouble, such must also be the case almost state wide.

"The only hope we have is that you will urge the Legislature to appropriate emergency funds for the purchase of at least a substantial portion of the books and supplies which parents may no longer be expected to furnish for their own children.

"Please bear in mind that we cannot legally adopt a deficit budget, the date before which schools may reduce staff is long past, and it is too late or ill-timed for schools to seek additional revenue through referenda prior to the opening of school.

"Your help is desperately needed."

Find Drug Items In Farms Park

If the evidence is correct, someone is using the Farms Municipal Pier-Park for something other than picnicking, or all around general recreation. On Tuesday, July 28, the gate attendant turned over to the authorities, a syringe and a bindel of hashish, found while the grounds were being cleaned up.

School Board's Offices Picketed

Heat and humidity didn't deter some dozen persistent pickets, armed with signs alleging "the school system is unfair to culture" on Friday, July 31, as they marched in front of the Board Office, on St. Clair.

The pickets, all members of the Pasture Creek Players, claimed school officials refused to lease North High School's auditorium to them for their production of Gore Vidal's "Visit to a Small Planet," at the same rate they do other lessors.
However, school officials told the NEWS that they have no record of such a written request. They added that the rental fee for use of the auditorium is \$100 plus labor. Since the group wanted to use the auditorium on a Saturday, overtime help would be required and would raise the charge to some where between \$200 and \$300, depending on how sophisticated a production was planned.

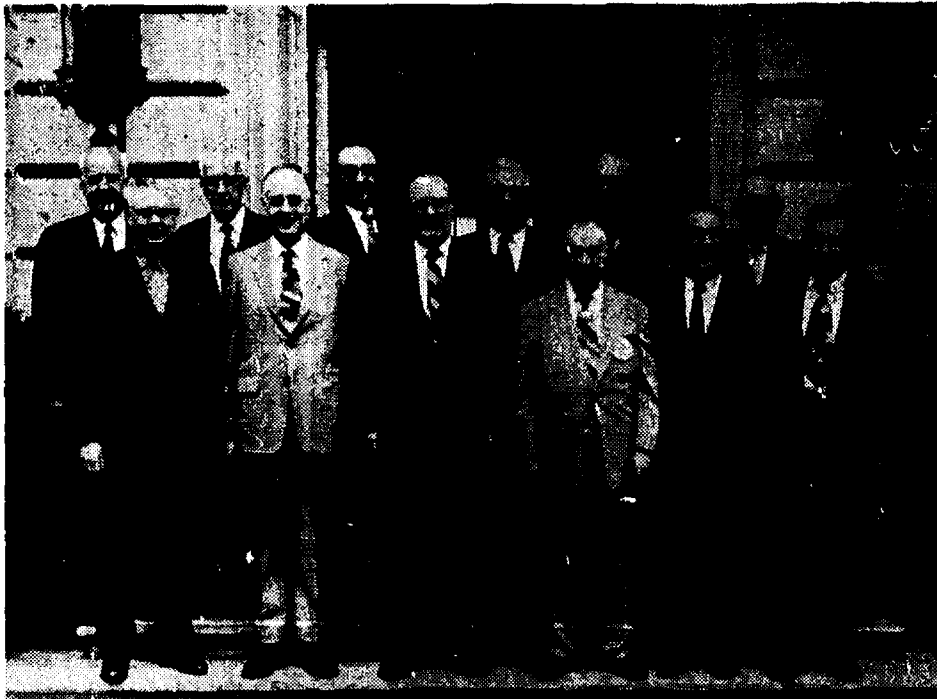

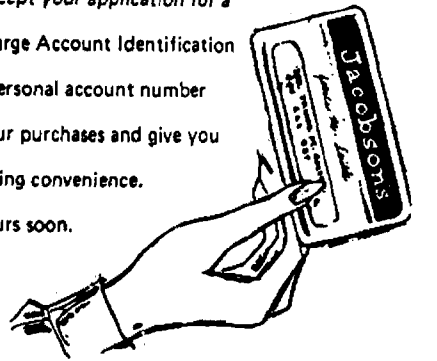

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Public Schools in Focus

By THEO. I. ANDERSON
 Superintendent of Public Schools
 With the push in the State Legislature to offer "relief" to property owners by shifting the financing of schools to "other" means, residents have called my office to ask how their current total tax rate compares with that of their neighbors in other communities in the Detroit area.
 The information needed to comply with these requests is based on data supplied by the Wayne County Bureau of Taxation, the Macomb County Treasurer's office, and the Oakland County Board of Supervisors, showing the total tax rates for 108 communities in the three-county area and which appeared recently in an article in one of the metropolitan papers.

The listing shows a low total rate of 25.66 mills (\$25.66 per thousand dollars of the taxable value of a piece of property) in Lenox Township (Anchor Bay Schools) and a high of 70.68 mills (\$70.68 per thousand) in Inkster (Wayne Community Schools).
 Where do the Grosse Pointes fall in the ranking?
 Total tax rates for our district (with our communities' comparative rankings among the 108 in the study listed in parentheses at the left) follow:
 (45) Farms 50.56 mills
 (46) Park 50.83 mills
 (49) Woods 51.24 mills
 (54) Shores 51.92 mills
 (90) City 57.59 mills
 (Incidentally, the school budget tax rate in our public school district is 31.30 mills for operation and 2.10 mills for debt retirement—for a total of 33.40 mills.)
 A sampling of those communities with higher total tax rates than our top includes Livonia (57.75), Inkster (60.22), Birmingham (60.65), Oak Park (61.77), Garden City (64.32), and Bloomfield Hills (69.52).
 Among the districts ranking between the Shores and the City are Hamtramck (52.86), Rochester (53.00), Detroit (54.11), Farmington (54.80), Highland Park (55.75), and Royal Oak (56.47).
 Among the communities with

lower rates than ours are St. Clair Shores South Lake (35.55), Mt. Clemens (41.24), Ecorse (47.72), Romulus (49.33), and River Rouge (49.67).
 We are often reminded especially when a millage vote is scheduled, that school taxes are only part of the residents' local burden. We are also told that the rate is meaningless until it is applied to an assessment. State laws have, for several years, assured uniform rates of assessment throughout the state, (providing for taxes based on assessment of 40 to 50 percent of sale value). Thus, a local resident is assured of fair treatment in this regard or at least, as far as his neighbors in other communities receive for comparable real estate.
 As I indicated in last week's column, if the State Legislature approves an amendment to the Michigan Constitution to limit property taxes and to levy a graduated income tax (and if voters approve these proposed amendments in November), most Grosse Pointers will pay more for education than they are currently paying—with the increase not used locally—but rather as part of a plan to "equalize" educational opportunity for children throughout Michigan. So, although a small minority of our residents conceivably could benefit from passage of the two amendments, their approval could very seriously curtail the quality of education available to our youngsters—at the same time diminish our local citizens' control of education.

What Goes On at Your Library

 (This column has been written by one of our high school student assistants. It is unexpurgated and represents a refreshing point of view.)
 We, the library pages, (definition—those who shelve books) at the Central branch of the Grosse Pointe Public Library System, are tired of being taken for granted. We have quietly stood in the background while the librarians have gotten all the credit for having such a well-organized library. We have discovered that, in order to gain our due recognition, we must stop being an underground working organization. So this article is our first exposure. It will not be a story depicting a typical page shelving a typical book on a typical shelf, but rather a behind-the-scenes article.

Being stuck in the Children's Room for two straight days was a bogey, and three straight days was a double-bogey, but getting out of it was a hat-trick.
 That backroom is also the place where we have our rap sessions while putting the books in the carts to be shelved. There, Nancy Ceravolo, (more commonly known to us as Lettie Geespy) and I have had many back-slapping, more tongue-lashing, and tooth-decaying arguments over the Women's Liberation Movement. The argument usually winds up with Lettie Geespy viciously attacking me with a copy of THE FEMININE MYSTIQUE.
 The backroom has also provided Mark Collinson and Bob Johnson with a chance to play tricks on unsuspecting patrons who need old magazines. When they knock on the door to get a page to find the magazines they need, Bob will hide behind the door and slowly open it, while Mark will start walking to the door. This gives the effect that the door opens by itself. Mark has handed many a wide-eyed and puzzled person his magazines.
 Once, I was just coming to work and went to the backroom to take off my coat. Sue Patterson was there and was due to finish with my cart. As I started to fill in my hour with books to be shelved, I noticed a loud hum coming from Sue. Soon I detected a medley of Christmas carols. This is fine in itself and I might have joined in if it hadn't been for one thing—she was humming these carols in the middle of May.
 Basically we have a musical page staff. That is, we have had no formal training—we just hum or sing when we feel like it. Since we were idle at the moment, we went through the book and sang every song we knew. I must admit—we formed a formidable challenge to Elvis Presley singing "You Ain't Nothin' But a Hound Dog." The next day we were joined by Bob and sang "Yakety Yak." Sue walked in, and as soon as she saw and heard us, she ran out screaming, "You're all crazy."
 Our page staff is also an exploring one. There is an elevator in the backroom that is used

to transport books to the Processing Department. It doesn't have too big an elevator box—about three feet all the way around. Naturally someone was bound to just happen to fall into the elevator and be sent up and down the shaft. Finally, Nancy, with a little coaxing from Bob and one of our custodians, broke the ice and took a ride on it. Bob and the custodian just happened to forget Nancy was on the elevator; so there she was—going up and down and up and down and up and down. Finally they happened, (yes, just happened), to remember she was in there and they let her out.
 On another day, there was a scaffold set up in the main reading room that was used to reach a burned-out light. After being ignored by the first six people we shouted at, we found a fairly shy college kid who stopped to listen to us. After hearing that we wanted to give him a free pizza, he walked away, thinking we were just a bunch of mouthy kids having fun at the expense of his pride and integrity. We talked him into coming back, and on seeing that we really did have a pizza, he agreed to accept it. We didn't really feel like running downstairs to give it to him, so we carefully dropped it into his waiting arms. Thus—our First Annual Pizza Drop.
 So, as the first page exposure draws to an end, we have but on thing to say: remember, love thy local page.

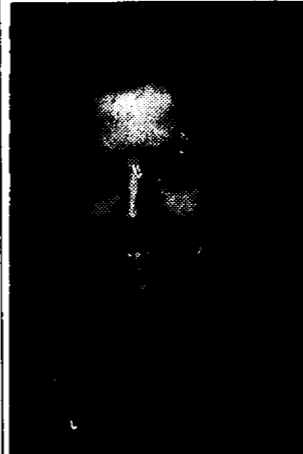



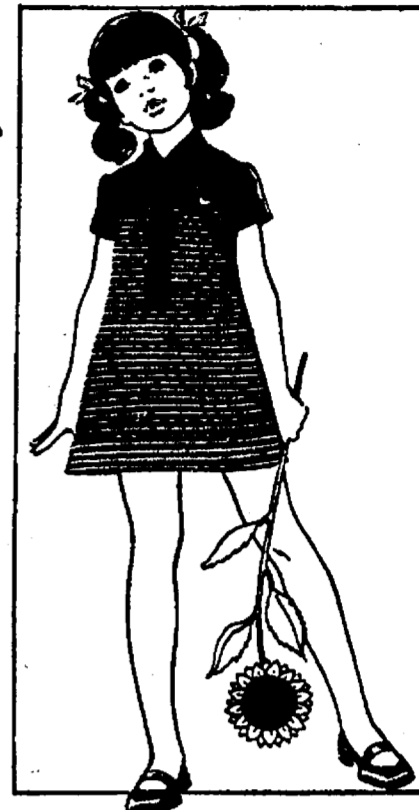

He became president of Walsh College of Accountancy and Business Administration June 9. He's both a lawyer and a Certified Public Accountant, although he's never practiced as the latter. A man qualified in the two fields operates as either a lawyer or CPA, never in combination, and Jeff chose to practice as an attorney.

He has a birthday coming up August 17. He'll be 32 years old. That's two full years past the Age of Aquarius cut-off point, but it's STILL pretty darn young for a college president.

"My age," Jeff admits, "is a factor that has to be considered. Jeff considered it himself . . . and decided the only practical way to deal with it is to forget about it, to concentrate on the real task of the presidency as one of leadership and the continued development of a quality institution providing a quality education."

Only One of Kind

"Walsh College," he explains, "is the only college of its kind in the United States: A private, non-profit, Bachelor degree-granting Upper Division College of Business Administration."

Upper Division Colleges are those which teach only the junior and senior years.

"The whole Upper Division concept came about because of the great success of the Community Colleges. Community Colleges do an excellent job of teaching the first two years. And we feel we do an excellent job of teaching Business Administration."

Is Native Pointer

Born in Grosse Pointe, ("My parents have lived here since 1935; I've been in and out all my life"), he completed his undergraduate studies at Albion College, took his Law degree at the University of Michigan and worked toward his Masters in Law and his CPA at Wayne State University.

His wife, Jane, is an "outlander"—from Birmingham. The Barrys have two children, six-year-old Lydia and Jeffery, Jr., two-and-a-half, with whom Jeff admits he's "unfortunately" not been able to spend a great deal of time. (The situation should improve with the arrival of two additions to Walsh's administrative staff, including a specifically designated Assistant to the President . . . at any rate, Jeff's hoping.)

Why Site Was Chosen

"The choice of the Troy site was arrived at after a lengthy study of the Community Colleges. We're centrally located between all the major metropolitan area Community Colleges, with access from east and west and from Flint and Detroit, only one minute off I-75 at Big Beaver."

"We have about 500 students now. We will be able to accommodate approximately 1,000 on the new campus—all in Business Administration, which will make Walsh one of the larger centers of Business Administration in the country."

Affords Second Step

For certainly the Community College concept has been successful. And it stands to reason that the Upper Division College, the logical second step for Community College students who, after two years' grounding in the Humanities, want career-oriented specialized programs leading to degrees, should be successful too.

And, given the requirement that all CPA candidates hold Bachelor's degrees, what future would there be for Walsh, despite its excellent reputation in the Detroit business community and its almost 50 years' experience in training young Detroiters for successful business careers, if it continued to exist as a non-degree granting institution?

It's a new world. The calculated risk has GOT to be intelligently undertaken. But the new world's built on the old, and the calculations involved in

should be off the ground by September 1."

Jane's invited along on every trip Jeff takes. But with two young children she can't go very often. So she goes as often as she can, wishes she could go more often . . . and so does Jeff.

"I had been teaching one course, Tax Law, for about five years at the University of Michigan's Dearborn campus. I think, during those five years, I got more satisfaction out of teaching than just about anything I have ever done."

Education as a career field attracted him, the concept of the new Walsh College intrigued him. When the opportunity to become Walsh vice-president arose, he took it.

One year later he's president of the new Walsh, located in Troy now instead of downtown Detroit, expanding, developing, still governed by a Board of Trustees three of whose current members, Norm Bolz, Everett Hawley and Robert White, are Pointers.

One Must Contribute

"You've got to be active in your community," Jeff Barry believes. "No matter what you do in your business life, it's important to make a personal contribution to your community."

This contribution can be anything from Little League to support of a local symphony.

Jeff's a trustee of the Riverside Civic Fund. He served as treasurer of Bill Bryant's campaign for State Representative, (Bill and Jeff are old friends, ex-University of Michigan roommates).

He was director of Wayne County's Day in May environmental clean-up program. "I think everybody has to be concerned to some degree with ecology. It's important to every segment of society."
