Thursday, July 30 TWIN PERILS of air pollution and a power shortage forced a sweltering New York City to declare the first stage of an emergency alert Wednesday and to cut electric voltage five percent for the second day. Mayor John V. Lindsay warned New Yorkers to "prepare for the banning of all private ve-hicles from certain areas of if the pollution worsened. The warning came after the Air Resources Department reported that oxidants in the air had reached "unsatisfactory to unhealthy" levels.

Friday, July 31 COMMON COUNCILMAN David Eberhard convinced some 400 young people to leave Balduck Park Thursday night, moments before police were called into the area to clear out the crowd. This surprise action by Eberhard, 36-year-old minister at Riverside Lutheran Church and first year councilman, averted a possible new confrontation between police and young people in the East side park. He promised the crowd he would see that they had an opportunity to talk to the Common Council.

Saturday, August 1 WILLIAM I. VAN ZANDT, executive director of Council 77 of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employes, the largest union of city employes, predicted Friday that there would be mass work stoppages in all city departments next week if the city fails to offer laid-off incinerator employes jobs in the new garbage-compaction stations.

Sunday, August 2 A WOMAN DIED and 53 other subway passengers and rescue workers were overcome by smoke Saturday in a suffomotorman and conductor led 75 to 100 panic-stricken passengers back through the Bowling Green station and



REPRESENTATIVE Albert R. Horrigan, D-Flint, a key Michigan legislator said Sunday that the use of tax funds by state lawmakers to mail thousands of last minute preelection newsletters "has gotten completely out of hand." added that the lid had to be put on this mailing business soon. Horrigan is the chairman of the 16-member Legislative Council, which serves as a general watchdog on legislator's spending.

A LARGE-SCALE survey of Detroit's total populations revealed that the city dropped some 169,000 persons for a total population of 1,501,400. In that same period the black proportion rose from 28.9 to 42.4 per-cent, highest ever. The picture the survey portrayed was one of white decline, through death and exodus to the suburbs, and black growth, through high birthrates and migration from the South.

Edict Calling for Free Books and Abolition of Special Fees Called "Serious Blow"

How does the July 17 ruling by the State Supreme Court that all public schools must supply textbooks af-fect The Grosse Pointe School System? Dr. Theos already trimmed its proposed budget for 1970-71 prior to the voter approval of operating millage in the spring, was a "serious blow" to the local district.

"Whether or not we agree philosophically that all youngsters should receive 'free' text-books and materials, the facts remain that someone has to pay for them and most school systems and all and the state of the s tems had already adopted their budgets or were in the final stages of preparing their budgets," Dr. Anderson said.

He added that the instructional program is set and that the staff is under contract.

To purchase textbooks for students in grades 9-12 during the coming year would cost our district an estimated \$125,763, with fees adding an additional \$87,000 to our operating expenses. Fees Charged for Years

Fees for materials used in pecial courses have been assessed in Grosse Pointe for many years. In the instructional rogram at both high schools entative fees for 1970-71 ranged from \$2, (for such courses as Auto Shop, Drawing and Painting, Physical Education, and Fashions and Fabrics), to \$4. for Graphic Communications, Industrial Adventure, and Art of the Film). Other fees on the list for the school year that begins September 10 include a \$6 voluntary athletic pass for both senior high schools, a \$3 fee for 6th graders in the middle schools, and a \$5 charge for 7th and 8th graders.

"The ramifications of the decision are almost limitless. At this moment, (a month before school starts), we do not know, (and there is little help forthcoming from the State Department of Education), whether the decision means that we shall be required to provide musical instruments, physical examina-tions for children entering school, paper and pencils, fabrics used in clothing classes, gym suits and shoes-to name a few of the items that could cost us money," he added.

Driver's Statement

Hoholek stated: "We were picking up rubbish on Renaud and were almost finished around 3 p.m. I was on the right hand side of Renaud going toward Mack. The driver of another rubbish truck was on the left side. I backed up so he could get by me and the accident happened.

"I heard 'Oh, no! What did you do?' by the men, Doug and Jim, who were in my truck, and I also heard screaming by the nen in my truck. I stopped the truck and saw the boy on the street, and the men ran to call the ambulance.

A boy and his sister, who witnessed the fatal accident, said they saw Steven standing bethe truck, and the truck backing up and hitting him. They said they heard the other drivers yelling to Hoholek to stop, but apparently too late.

"By legislative decision we are not permitted to reduce staff at this late date. The result is that a very small sec-tion of the budget must suffer cut-backs to buy the required books and materials.

"As we examine the funds we have available per pupil, decisions are difficult to because we have no definition of what school materials are now required of the property taxpavers. Please encourage the state agencies to supply us with guidelines at once,

"Since Grosse Pointe is in serious trouble, such must also be the case almost state wide.

"The only hope we have is that you will urge the Legisla ture to appropriate emergency funds for the purchase of at least a substantial portion of the books and supplies which parents may no longer be expected to furnish for their own children.

"Please bear in mind that cannot legally adopt a deficit budget, the date before which schools may reduce staff is long past, and it is too late or ill-timed for schools to seek edditional revenue through referenda prior to the opening of school.

"Your help is desperately needed.'

Find Drug Items In Farms Park

If the evidence is correct someone is using the Farms Municipal Pier-Park for something other than picnicking, or all around general recreation. On Tuesday, July 28, the gate attendant turned over to the au-thorities, a syringe and a bindel of hashish, found while the grounds were being cleaned up.

Patrolman Ronald Wooten said that he was on a routine inspection of the park at about 6:30 p.m., when he was called to the gate house by the em-ploye, who released the syringe and hashish, (concentrated marijuana). The attendant said the items were found in the grass of the picnic area, the syringe by two male employes and the bindel, by a female employe,

on Sunday, July 28. The gate watchman said he placed the items in the desk drawer in the gatebouse, with the intention of giving them to the first police officer he came in contact with, but forgot them until he saw Wooten.
