



He told the NEWS that his judicial responsibilities over the past years have been an enjoyable and rewarding experience and that he will always be indebted to the community for the trust it placed in him.





A second note was sent to the department to express "gratitude for the courtesy that was extended" by Youth Service Division Officer Thomas Podeszwik to another resident.





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TIME FOR A CHANGE

It is time for a change. It is time for an accommodation between the school board and the administration which can lead to some constructive ideas and programs to meet the pending financial crisis, the encroaching state controls, and the persistent alienation of a confused public. It is time for an accommodation between administration and teachers so they may creatively and positively confront the problems of unionism and professionalism, performance accountability, and financial priori-ties. And it is time for an accommodation with the future so that we can plan together the changes in education which will prepare our children to live responsibly in the 21st century.

For many years, Grosse Pointe schools functioned benignly, with the financial support of an approving community, a dedicated staff, and a highly motivated student body. This was a time when the trusteeships were mildly contested by civic-minded gentlemen, the yearly elections barely making a ripple on community consciousness.

During that period, real problems were emerging, within the boundaries of Grosse Pointe as well as in the state and society at large. Increasing student population created a need for a new high school at a time when major inflationary trends pushed construction costs out of sight, lead-ing to the population costs out of sight, leading to the now-monumental rancor surrounding North High School. Five years ago increasing teacher assertiveness led to the state-wide legislation enabling collective bargaining. A universal teacher tenure law was established then. Escalating salaries and inflationary construction costs, all tied to an outmoded property tax base, too quickly ended that period of complacency.

Within the context of rapidly changing times, accelerated technological developments, a world wide knowledge explosion, and intensely competitive pressure for college placement, our schools have become the focus of a host of political and economic stresses that have yet to be resolved. This is true of school systems throughout the country.

Riding the local crest of the nationwide wave of dissatisfaction and anxiety caused by these stresses, two trustees were elected four years ago on the basis of their opposition to further taxation, antagonism toward the new high school, antipathy to educational frills', and repudiation of alleged regionalism.

Understandable as this negativism may be, their four-year incumbency on the school board proves the inadequacy of the negative approach in solving any of the problems still with us. It is not enough to be against, to vote NO, to abstain, to challenge, demean, or attack. The pettiness of Mr. Fuchs and Mr. Sandberg, as they have voted repeatedly against accepting the minutes of a previous meeting, quarreled with the parliamentarian, harangued over minute contractual matters, or obstructed by their perennial motions to table, has paralyzed the policy-making role of the entire board.

Instead of providing responsible and forceful leadership, they have tried to manipulate by focusing on distorted minutiae. Professing to be watchdogs for the community, they have poorly represented a small minority of local citizens. They have, however, managed to create an atmosphere of distrust wherein character assassination and trial by innuendo have made public board meetings an adversary contest and endurance match.

Despite the new appointments of three top administrators, Fuchs and Sandberg have refused to build the bridge of communication by which board and administration can work together constructively. Rather than do their homework of preparing for the announced a g e n d a which would mean calling staff on questions for clarification, they have chosen to make a public grandstand about details and then vote NO or vote to table matters of budget, course development, personnel changes, and textbook approval. Theirs is an intolerable delaying tactic which time and again has held up the important decision making process of the board. They have voted against the superintendent's an-uual contract review; they negocidently attack the Department of Instruction; they have accused the nual contract review; they persistently attack the Department of Instruction; they have accused the Department of Administration Services of dishonesty in taking bids (The Truck!); and they have charged the financial officer of hidden funds and double bookkeeping. All these charges have been unsubstantiated.

Parading as the champions of the classroom teacher, they nevertheless voted against the last two-year contract. Incapable of understanding the value of effective supervision and teacher evaluation, they have voted against money for inservice training and curriculum development. After pri-vately and publicly subverting recent millage elections, Mr. Fuchs and Mr. Sandberg voted against releasing the teachers who had to be cut because of reduced revenue. Mr. Fuchs then committed the impropriety of sending a statement to all discharged teachers. That his statement was full of factual errors and that such direct contact between board m e m b e rs and employees is a gross violation of standard employment practices, appears to have escaped Mr. Fuchs.

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Mr. Fuchs would wish an authoritarian, 3-R type of education. He is of the old One-Textbook School, and has voted consistently against suggested textbook lists, supplemental texts, and against any new courses offering variety, choice, and incentive to students. He voted against FLEC, against f und s for the Nouth Russel and the base of the students for the Youth Bureau, and on the basis of one complaint, was prepared to suspend all sex education except standard biology. The suspension included films which have been shown with parental approval since 1948. Mr. Fuchs is against any change except going backward.

Both men have viewed it a board member's perogative to attempt to censor school courses, publications, and press releases. One of Mr. Fuchs' first acts was an attempt to ban Catcher in the Rye from a high school reading list. Mr. Sandberg recently proposed an editorial review board for the South High paper, The Tower, although the student editors, faculty advisor, and board president had all made public apologies for the cartoon to which he objected. At the same time, Mr. Fuchs was demanding that no press releases leave the superintendent's office without his prior approval.

They cannot work with anyone who is unlike themselves. They distrust the knowledge and ex-pertise of the professionals. Mr. Fuchs even chose to draw his own architectural plans for remodeling South High, impeding the work of the hired architectural firm and resulting in a professional fee to the school system for \$3,750.00 for the architect's review of Mr. Fuchs' plan. That his ideas were based on 19th century educational concepts, that he forgot to figure costs for one entire floor of his projected building, and that his public claim of being able to save a million dollars was entirely fal-lacious, all point up the preposterous nature of their public position.

They have polarized the board and the community, resulting in an irresponsible impasse. There is no room for public discussion of reasonable alternatives, no room for rational differences of opinion, no room for constructive criticism. Nineteenth century ideas are not adequate to the problems of our times; Mr. Fuchs and Mr. Sandberg are not proper spokesmen for the people of Grosse Pointe.
