THE APOLLO 15 ASTRO-NAUTS rocketed out of lunar orbit and started for home Wednesday, bringing ancient rocks and new photos from man's greatest exploration of the moon, Astronauts David R. Scott, James B. Irwin and Alfred M. Worden fired a powerful burst with their main rocket engine to break cut of the moon's gravity and start the 250,000-mile voyage to a splashdown in the Pacific Ocean Saturday.

Friday, August 6

WORKING WITH SURPRIS-ING speed and ease, astronaut Alfred M. Worden wrapped up Apollo 15's spectacular lunar expedition in high style Thursday with man's first walk in deep space to retrieve priceless films of the moon. Beginning his 20-minute space walk when Apollo 15 was 196,000 miles above earth, Worden completed three 36-foot round trips along the moonship's handrails in about the time he had made two in practice before the 12-day flight.

Saturday, August 7

THE ADMINISTRATION estimated Friday that environestimated friday that environ-mental cleanup would cost \$105 billion over six years and said factories should have to pay for polluting as much as they pay for electricity and gas. The \$105 billion repre-sents an average of \$525 for every man, woman and child.

President Nixon, in a letter to Congress accompanying the annual report of his Council on Environmental Quality, cautioned against pollution controls so strict that they would risk "bankrupting the vefy taxpaying enterprises which must pay for the social advances the nation seeks." The council said that pollution at its present level costs more than the programs to curtail schedule will be one dollar if

AMERICA'S TRIUMPHANT APOLO 15 explorers splashed down safely but with a teeth-jarring lolt in the Pacific Saturday, ending a 12-day journey to the moon acclaimed by scientists as "unprecedent-edly successful." After David R. Scott, James B. Irwin and Alfred M. Worden made their fiery plunge into the earth's atmosphere at 24,545 miles per hour, one of the three main parachutes collapsed suddenly above the Endeavour spacecraft in braking its final descent. The recovery carrier Okinawa radioed at 3:45 p.m. Detroit time that there would be a hard impact. A half-minute later the Endeavour hit the water with a tremendous splash, only a little more than six miles off its target, 316 miles north of the Ha-wailan island of Oahu, with all aboard in good shape.

Monday, August 9

THE MICHIGAN DEPART-MENT of Natural Resources warned Sunday that continued commercial lake trout fishing by Michigan Indians will wipe out the state's entire supply of lake trout within a five month period. "At the present level of Indian fishing, I predict that the lake trout stocks will be completely depleted by the end of December," said John Scott, director of the Great Lakes Fisheries Section for the DNR. Tuesday, August 10

In Northern Ireland British troops and rampaging Irish Republicans battled with guns and bombs through Monday night and into Tuesday in angry bouts of sniping and rioting that took 13 lives and wounded at least 17. The violence, which rocked the capital of Belfast, and two other troubled cities, was touched off by a dawn crackdown Monday in which more than 300 suspected terrorists were rounded

To Increase

New Schedule of Fees Becomes Effective September 9; To Remove Orange Canisters

The Grosse Pointe Farms Council on Monday, August 9, unanimously approved a change in parking violation fees effective September 9.

The new parking meter fine paid within five days of issuance; two dollars after five days of issuance until the court date, and five dollars after court date.

Currently the rates are 50 cents if paid within a 24-hour period and two dollars if paid after 24 nours.

Other parking violations will cost five dollars if paid by the court date and \$10 if paid after the court date.

The fines must be paid within the times specified, in person or by mail, at the City Hall, The Traffic Engineer is authorized to provide envelopes to violators for convenience of payment. The postmark on the envelope will be considered the date paid.

Until the Farms has the payment envelopes printed, violators will have to provide their own, according to Chief Robert Ferber.

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

(Continued from Page 1) yard rubbish containers, they should be placed between the curb and sidewalk for pickup on the same day as your regular household rubbish pickup.

3. All yard rubbish, and branches and limbs, to be picked up at curbside should not be placed out at the curb before 4 p.m. on the day preceding regular pickup nor after the rubbish crews have made your pickup on the regular day. All empty containers should be removed from curhside by evening of the day on which they are collected. The use of plastic bags eliminates the need for residents to re-

4. Bulky items such as stoves, dryers, television sets and play apparatus, should be placed out at the curb for pick up on Thursdays only. The resident should also call the City Offices (885-5800) to request a bulky item pickup. No other types of rubbish such as household or yard rubbish should be placed out for pickup on Thursdays or Fridays.

5. Contractors (and residents employing same) are responsible for private removal of all commercial landscape, tree trimming and building mate-

Anyone having questions on refuse collection procedures should contact the City Offices. Mr. Collinson and Mr. Kressbach expressed confidence that cooperation by residents in following these guidelines would improve the City's collection procedures. They indicated the City was currently working on formal pickup regulations and revising certain rubbish

Since most of you have by now seen this author on television, or heard her on the radio, and since I've already mentioned this title in a previous column, I will only remind you that this is one more contribution to the literature on Women's

The Number 3 slot is taken by AMERICA INC. by Mintz and Cohen. The subtitle is: "Who owns and operates the United States," and is a rundown on private power as abused by big corporations and abetted by the American government, with the empha-sis on "big." Listed are the top 200 companies and their injuries to our health, wealth. safety, and exercise of choice.

A newcomer is THE GIFT HORSE by Hildegard Knef, an autobiography of one who fled Germany, escaped the Russians and a prison camp, fled to America, has had a career as an actress, and, in the book, ends up in Switzerland to start a new life.

Life within THE BELL JAR by Sylvia Plath is our next choice. Here we are dealing with a breakdown and suicide attempt, institutionalization. "To the person in the bell jar, blank and stopped as a dead baby, the world itself is the bad dream."

A change of pace is BOSS by Mike Royko—the story of Richard J. Daley. According to one reviewer, it gives a sharp picture of the Mayor, his policies and methods, and tells us a good deal about Chicago. The author, one of Chicago's best-known columnists, has a host of anonymous privy information, and thus the picture is built, beginning with Daley's youth. This book has been on the non-fiction Best Seller list for 18 weeks.

The rest will have to go unmentioned and changes are constantly made as time passes. What really goes into the hopper to produce a best seller? As you can see, it's virtually impossible to answer that question, and that is what makes the list fascinating, as one studies it from week to week. .
