Thursday, August 12

HASKELL SHANKS, 63-year-old plant security guard from Warren, was reported in "stable condition" at Sinai Hospital today, following a 10-hour, \$25,000 operation Wednesday that gave him a permanent partial artificial heart. Hospital officials said that Shanks was progressing as expected seven hours after a team of surgeons, headed by Dr. Adrian Kantrowitz, one of the world's foremost heart surgeons, implanted a six-inch, rubber and dacron pump in his body to aid his failing heart. It was the third time in history such an operation has been performed. If Shanks survives, he will be the first man ever to be maintained successfully on a permanent artificial heart device.

Friday, August 13

GOVERNOR GEORGE C. WALLACE challenged the whole Nixon administration Thursday to join the President's opposition to school busing as a means of desegregation. He did so in ordering the transfer nearer to home of a white pupil who has been assigned to a predominantly black school 22 miles away. Wallace invited the administration to join him in fighting a federal court desegregation plan for the Birmingham area. He told newsmen he was trying to "help the President carry out his wishes against massive busing."

Saturday, August 14

JUDGE BENJAMIN C. STANCZYK of Wayne County Common Pleas Court said that an Army major from the Pentagon tried to get the convention of the Disabled American Veterans in Detroit to pass 11 pro-Pentagon resolutions drafted by the Pentagon. The judge made the statements public Friday on the Lou Gordon show which was aired again at 10 p.m. on Saturday on Channel 50. The judge identified the officer as Maj. George H. Chase. Stanczyk said that the Army officer threatened to punch him when he objected to the proposed resolutions.

Sunday, August 15

A BRITISH SOLDIER, who was shot and killed Saturday night, was the third soldier and the 28th person to die in Northern Ireland in the past week. The soldier was killed by a shot from the crowd as he moved in with fellow troops to disperse a crowd gathered near the Ardoyne area of Belfast. His death capped five days of fires, explosions and gunfire.

Monday, August 16

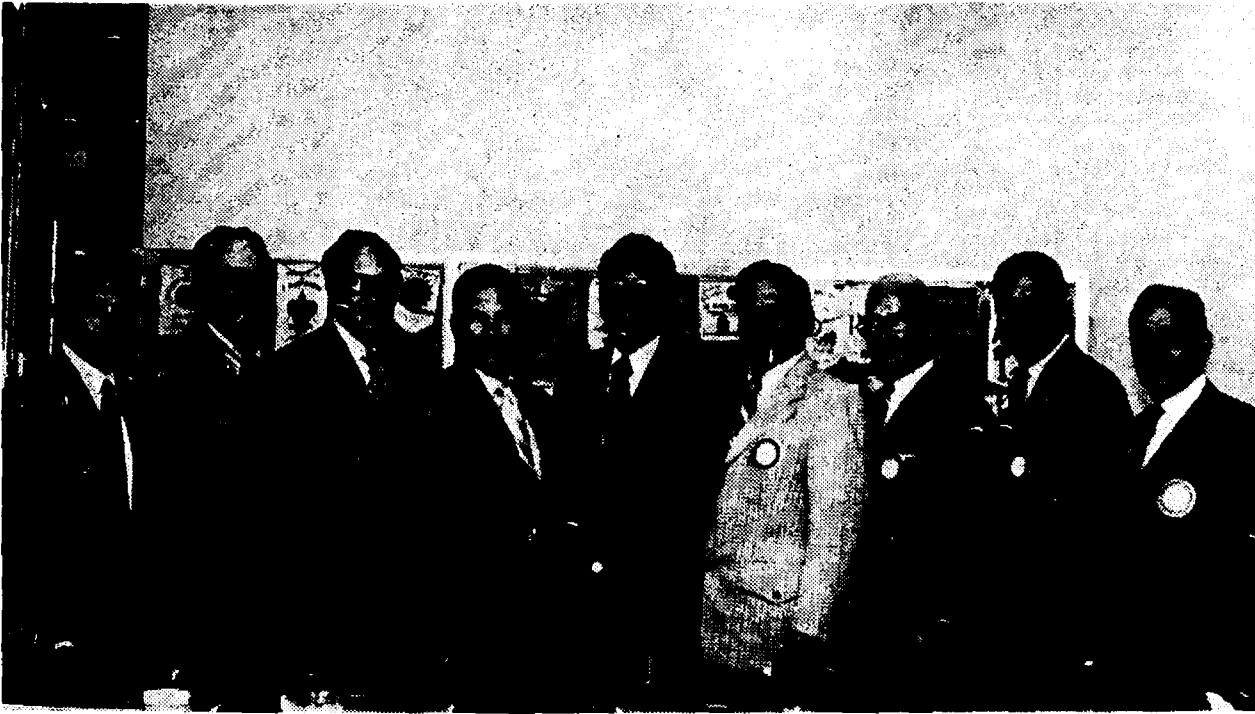
IN A 20-MINUTE address to the nation last night, President Nixon charted a new economic course with a 90-day freeze on wages and prices, a request for federal tax cuts and a broad range of domestic and international moves to strengthen the dollar. Included in the program, which must be approved by Congress, is Nixon's attempt to repeal the seven percent excise tax on new cars—a move that would cut the customer's cost of an average American car by \$200.

Tuesday, August 17

TREASURY SECRETARY John B. Connally said in an hour-long news conference on Monday that the 90-day federal freeze on wages applies to all wages without exception including boosts in labor contracts, cost-of-living bonuses already scheduled, merit raises and seniority raises. The freeze will also affect prices and rents.

A RECORD 32.39-point rise in the Dow Jones industrial average, accompanied by record volume of 31.72 million shares traded followed the Nixon Administration's announcement of a wage-price freeze. Near-chaotic situations existed in the stock exchange Monday because of an imbalance of orders on the buy side.

Board Signs Contract for Teacher Pay

Raises Cannot Go Into Effect Until President Nixon's Wage Freeze Ends

After 400 hours of negotiations, representatives of the Grosse Pointe Education Association (GPEA) and of the School Board reached an equitable teacher agreement, one that will permit the school system to go about the business of educating children, which is what it's all about.

Subject To Edict

The Board decided that it could agree to the new two-year contract subject to the President's edict, which means that none of the financial increases can go into effect until the freeze is lifted.

However, representatives of both the GPEA and the Board indicated that the non-economic features of this contract were every bit as important as the financial ones and felt that the contract should be approved so they could be instituted upon the opening of school this fall.

One of the most significant non-economic features of this contract is a trial program of evaluation and orientation of probationary teachers. A teaching coach will be assigned.

The Farms Council is looking to the future. It has voted to conduct an active self-examination of the limited area it has for new development while preserving the good living conditions now being enjoyed by residents, through contracting for a land-use study for the entire city.

Seek Information

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Farms Charged With Unfair Practice

(Continued from Page 1) to the time of Police Chief Jack Roh, who originally suggested that this change be made because in his experience, he found that too often patrolmen were asked to assume the duties of command officers without remuneration, when sergeants fell ill. The city fathers also felt that this was an unfair procedure.

When Robert Ferber became chief, he also suggested to the council that there be established three sergeant positions and three corporal positions so that there would be two command officers on each shift, thus eliminating the need to assign patrolmen without compensation as command officers.

Eleven Took Exams

After considering the matter, the council agreed to establish two corporal posts. Eleven men took the written and oral examinations which were conducted in January. On February 8 Wooten was named corporal as a result of his scores in both tests.

Glanert was appointed corporal when Lt. Vern Sylvester retired in May of this year, by virtue of his test scores and seniority. This was the beginning of the establishment of the program both Chief Roh and Chief Ferber had suggested. The program is set up now so that when and if a sergeant's post is vacated, a corporal will be appointed to take his place.

Mr. Bremer stressed that the city is in no way attempting to break the union. He illustrated this by pointing out that a police officer was named to replace civilian employe Earl Trombley, upon Mr. Trombley's death. Mr. Trombley was in charge of parking meters, street painting and dog catching. With the naming of a patrolman to this post the membership in the GPFPOA remained the same as before Mr. Trombley's death, according to Mr. Bremer.

Officers of the GPFPOA, president John Farley, Clarence Reichling, Gordon Evans and Philip Miglio released the following statement to the NEWS:

"We, the members of the Grosse Pointe Farms Police Officers' Association (GPFPOA) again find ourselves in a serious labor dispute with the City of Grosse Pointe Farms. We further find it necessary to inform the citizens of this city of some of the obstacles the city presents to us which greatly affect the morale of the police department on all levels.

"The position of Police Corporal was created by the city in January, 1971, without any formal notification or communication with the GPFPOA after Andrew Bremer, city manager, stated he would meet with the GPFPOA to discuss the various aspects of the new rank. He made this statement at the close of negotiations in December of 1970 for the current contract. After the examinations two patrolmen, Ronald Wooten and Otto Glanert, were selected for the position of corporal. Upon appointment to the rank of corporal, Ronald Wooten submitted a letter of withdrawal from the GPFPOA, which was accepted.

"In February, 1971, the GPFPOA, on the advice of its attorney, Winston L. Livingston, requested a clarification of the duties of the corporal. Previously no such position existed and is therefore, not defined in the Rules and Regulations of the Grosse Pointe Farms Police Department. Upon receipt of the clarification our attorney indicated that the duties of a corporal as outlined did not fall within the existing labor laws of the State of Michigan. As a direct result of our questions Officer Glanert's promotion was held up. He was informed by the city manager that should the corporal belong to the GPFPOA he would not be promoted. Two weeks later Officer Glanert was promoted to Police Corporal, after which he resigned from the GPFPOA.

"Currently the Sergeants' and Lieutenants' Association receive all benefits and fringes enjoyed by the patrolmen plus a percentage over and above a patrolman's base pay. They do not pay a service charge to the GPFPOA as provided by the Agency Shop clause of the current contract. Should corporals be recognized as supervisors this would raise the patrolmen/supervisor ratio from three to one to two patrolmen to one supervisor. This ratio is unreasonable and adds to the already existing cost burden carried by the GPFPOA.

"Along these same lines patrolmen have been freely substituted, through work reassignment and sickness, for sergeants and corporals. Inasmuch as we are all professionals no conflict of interest exists between patrolmen, corporals and sergeants. Our goals, good service to the citizens, as professional police officers are the same. Therefore, it appears the only reason to exclude corporals is to weaken and ultimately destroy the GPFPOA as a bargaining unit.


"Your police officers were forced to file unfair labor practice charges against the city as the only legitimate avenue open to us because the city would not meet with us for meaningful discussion. The supervisors realize all the benefits patrolmen must fight for without having to share the cost of the negotiation. The City is top-heavy with supervisors but still finds it necessary to use patrolmen in place of supervisors without

School officials indicate that if students follow the schedule outlined, no one should have to wait in line for any long period of time. Students may leave the building when they have completed registration activities.

Four Ordinances Amended by City

The City of Grosse Pointe Council on Monday, August 12, amended four of its ordinances. The first revised the permanent bicycle registration fee from 50 cents to one dollar.

The second revised the annual dog license fee from \$1.10 for male and neutered dogs and \$2 for female and \$3 for male, female and neutered animals. If the licenses are applied for 30 days or more after required renewal date the fee will be \$5.

The Council also set a fee schedule for building permits based on construction costs as follows: up to \$1,500, a fee of \$10 minimum; \$1,501 to \$5,000, \$20 minimum; \$5,001 to \$50,000, \$4 per \$1,000 or fraction thereof; \$50,001 to \$500,000, \$200 plus \$3 per \$1,000 or fraction thereof over \$50,000; \$500,001 and over, \$1,500 plus \$2 per \$1,000 or fraction thereof over \$500,000. Demolition permits will cost \$20 per 25,000 cubic feet or fraction thereof.

The Council also passed amendments to the City's sign regulation ordinance limiting window advertising signs to not more than percent of window area.

The members also approved two resolutions. The first provides for a City Charter amendment to change the number of municipal judges from two to one and to restrict municipal judge's age to less than 70 years at the time of election or appointment and to place the proposition on the ballot at the City's November 2, 1971, General Election.

The second, a resolution, to protect endangered species.

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Police Blockade Forces Elusive Speeder to Stop

A Detroit motorist who sought to elude a Park policeman in a high speed chase that began at Jefferson and Lakepoints, at 2:49 a.m. on Sunday, August 15, gave up at Lake Shore and Vernier, when Shores police set up a roadblock on both sides of the road, forcing the driver to come to a stop.

Park Sgt. Thomas Martin, who had been pursuing the man identified as John Haviar, 28, of 15305 West Chicago, said Haviar was traveling at between 90 and 100 miles an hour, and that the man ignored the scout car flasher and siren. Also, during the chase, the officer said, Haviar sped through three red signal lights, going in and out of traffic, forcing a number of cars to come to an abrupt halt to avoid being hit.

The speeder was arrested by Shores police and released to Sgt. Martin, who took the man back to the Park station. Haviar was charged with reckless driving and released after posting bond of \$100. He is scheduled to appear before Park Municipal Judge William E. Speer on September 29.

Martin said that he first observed the speeding motorist at Lakepoints, and took up chase. At Yorkshire, the officer said he paced Haviar at 90 miles an hour, and at times, 100 mph.

The sergeant said that during the chase, Haviar appeared to lose control of his car on several occasions, weaving from curb to curb.

Martin said that Haviar disobeyed a red signal light at Cadieux, and another at Fishers road. At the Moross intersection, the motorist sped through the red light at a 90-mile clip, the officer added.

The sergeant radioed for assistance, and Shores police, using scout cars, blocked off both sides of Lake Shore road, at the Vernier intersection, forcing Haviar to come to a stop.

Haviar did not explain why he refused to stop, Martin said. There was no evidence.

The third priority among projected re-hiring dependent on the September 13 proposition and state aid includes a special education position, librarian-instructional material specialists, and professional librarian and a processing clerk for the public library.

Maintenance accounts will be re-established, funds will be allocated for instructional supplies, library materials, and curriculum development.

All qualified registered voters, whether property owners or not, may ballot on the operating millage proposition.

Word on the September 13 ballot is as follows: "Shall the limitation upon the total amount of taxes which may be assessed against all property in the Grosse Pointe Public School System, Wayne County, Michigan, be increased as provided by the Constitution of Michigan, by two (2) mills on each dollar, (\$2.00 for each \$1,000.00) of the assessed valuation, as equalized, of all property in the School District, for a period of 3 years, for the years 1971 through 1973, inclusive, for the purpose of providing funds for operating expenses of the School District?"

ed to new teachers to assist them throughout their first two years. In addition, there will be a minimum of classroom visitations by both teachers and administrators for the appraisal of teachers' performances. Although the ultimate authority remains with the Board to perform evaluative functions, the teaching profession will now assume a share in the contractual responsibility of assisting new teachers in their first, difficult two years. Accountability of teaching performances has long been a matter of concern and this new agreement should contribute to the positive efforts to achieve good performance.

A new school calendar in which teachers will report to duty before Labor Day and students will return on Sep-

tember 7 (instead of in the middle of Labor Day week) is also included in the contract. Students will also have a full two-week Christmas vacation this year. The last day of school before the Christmas holidays will be December 17, students will return January 3.

Under this new schedule students will also have 183 credit days of school instead of 180, as in the past.

A modified reduction of staff clause enables the system to retain its best qualified, most experienced teachers in the event of a large scale reduction of staff, or cutback in financial support, or lowered student enrollment.

The salary considerations of the agreement provide a minimum of \$8,700 for a BA and a maximum of \$14,320, as compared to the old contract which

provided a beginning teacher with a BA with \$8,530 and a maximum of \$13,390.

Teachers with MA degrees will receive a minimum of \$10,000 as compared to \$9,385 they got last year. Tops for an MA is now \$16,330 as compared to \$15,255 of last year.

The net financial picture amounts to a \$574,826 increase over last year, minus \$30,000 savings in such areas as association subsidies, tuition payments and monies saved from not having to negotiate a new contract next year. So the figure, \$544,826, represents

the 8.3 percent increase over last year. In the second year of the contract, teachers will get a 4 percent increase plus a cost of living increase not to exceed 2½ percent.

Last year the system paid \$8,583,895 in salaries for teachers. This year the total teacher salary figure will be \$9,158,821 . . . when the president lifts the freeze.

Following the Regatta, Steve Hume, a member of the rowing team and two friends, John King and Bill Sharf went swimming near a rapids created by a hydro plant near 12 Mile Creek. George, who was watching from the shore, observed John King struggling in the water near the falls, he shed part of his clothing and dove into the water in an attempt to assist King. In the meantime, King regained his composure and made it to the shore as did Sharf and Hume. The boys said the last time they saw Hendrie was when he initially dove into the water. George is believed to have been pulled down into the water by the strong undertow.

Niagara Regional Police and St. Catherine's Fire Department boats have been searching and dragging the area around the clock in an effort to locate young Hendrie's body. An aerial search is also being conducted.

George's parents, Mr. and Mrs. George Hendrie, Jr., of 330 Merriweather road, are currently in St. Catharines. George was recently graduated from Grosse Pointe South High School.

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Most Pointers Opposed To School Bussing Plan

Most Grosse Pointers don't endorse the bussing of suburban children into the inner city, a survey taken last week shows. In fact, many of them strongly oppose the plan.
Federal Judge Stephen J. Roth can order cross-bussing of students between Detroit and the other 85 school districts in Wayne, Oakland and Macomb counties.
He'll do this if he finds that the segregated attendance pattern in Detroit is due not to bussing patterns, but to illegal and deliberate separation of races.
The NAACP has brought the integration case against the Detroit schools, and a move to include suburban districts was made by Alexander Ritchie, attorney for the Citizens' Committee for Better Education, an intervening defendant.
Grosse Pointe was mentioned by William A. Shumck, superintendent of Wayne County Intermediate District, in an interview with the Detroit News.
"We should also remember that the students now living in Grosse Pointe and Birmingham are not going to be living in a Grosse Pointe world of adults," he said. "It is sound education for them to start learning about the rest of the world."
What do Grosse Pointers think about that? Shoppers in the Village were asked their opinion.
Mrs. F. R. Bacon, of Chalfonte avenue, said:
"I don't believe in bussing. Youngsters should be free to roam after school. I don't care if they're red, yellow or blue, they don't belong on a bus."
John Becker, 18, of Fordcroft road, who graduated from Grosse Pointe North in June, said the whole idea was definitely wrong.
"The taxes here are quite a bit different, and the standard here is quite a bit different," he said. "I know people from other schools and know what they're taught. Even the textbooks are different."
He's right about the taxes. In the Pointe, they provide \$1,200 annually per student, while Detroit spends only \$800.
Mrs. Joseph Fruciano, of Roslyn road, was asked what she'd do if her children were ordered to school downtown.
"I'd have to try to get them in a Catholic school," she answered. "I'd be desperate because I know how hard it is."
She said her children used to attend a parochial school, but recently switched to a public one.
Rob Brown, 17, who lives on Beaufait avenue, said, "I wouldn't go. Probably my parents would send me to a private school."
Most of the girls, interviewed as they hunted for sales or bargains, agreed with him.
Leslie Weller, 20, of Lancaster road, said, "I'd enroll

still not up, the city administrator added.
"Maintenance on this highway right-of-way has been neglected for more than five years," Petersen stated in the letter to Skenbensky, "and this office, (Woods), cannot justify the expenditures of our city's gasoline tax monies to perform maintenance that was, and is, the responsibility of the Wayne County Road Commission."

Petersen said that the turn-back which would have placed Vernier road under the jurisdiction of the Woods, and a section under the jurisdiction of the Shores, had been scheduled for last January 1, when the State was to have completed all improvements of the highway, including paving and installation of curbs, besides other commitments. He is at a loss to understand the delay regarding fulfilling of the State's pledges to complete all phases of the program, he added.
He is still waiting to hear from officials of the State Highway Department, he said.

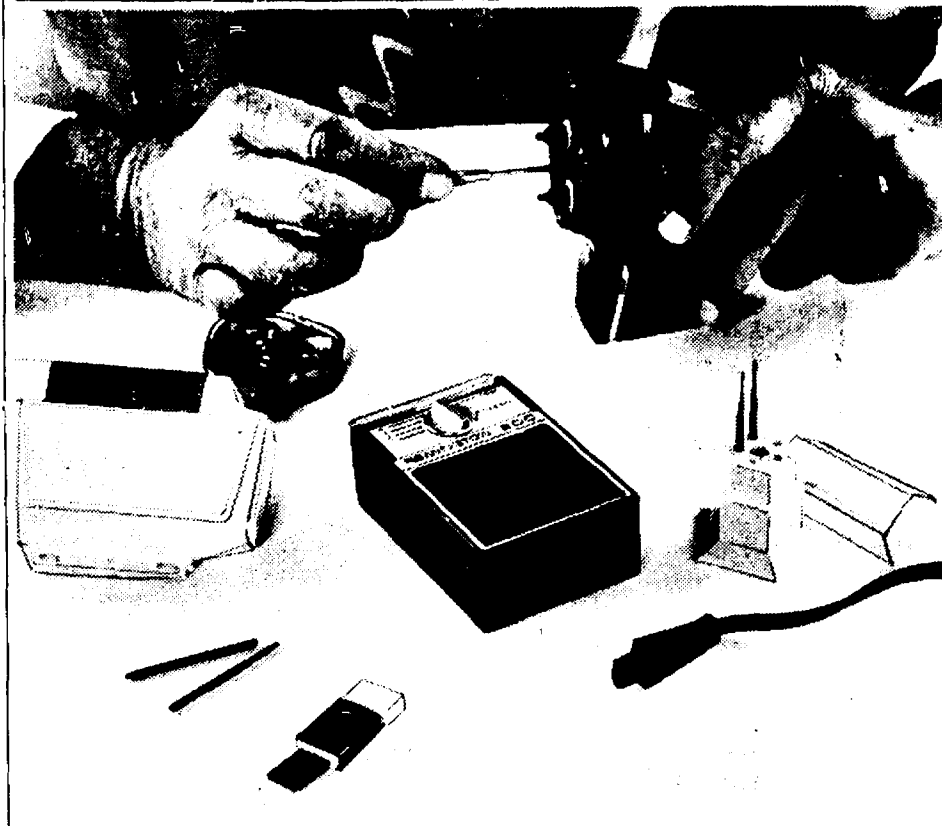

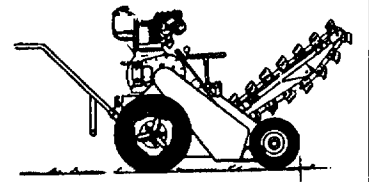

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Woods to Buy Voting Machines

The Woods council, on Monday, August 16, approved the purchase of three new voting machines from the Schoup Voting Machine Company of Bala Cynwyd, Pa., at a total cost of \$5,790.

The council acted on the recommendation of City Administrator Chester E. Petersen, who disclosed that the machines, which would cost \$1,900 each, will be needed to take care of the newly franchised 18-20 year olds, granted the right to vote in all elections.

The city administrator told the council that there are approximately 1,100 such potential electors in the Woods, and that 329 have already registered.

He told the council that there are 39 machines and 12 precincts, and the three additional machines will be placed where voting is expected to be the heaviest. Also, he said, although it is not likely, there is a possibility that a 13th precinct might be created because of the expected increase in registration.

Another reason for the additional machines, Petersen pointed out, is that one could be held in reserve in the event one should break down at any of the precincts. The two others can be placed where voting is expected to be very heavy.

In another action, the council voted to rescind a resolution giving prepaid postage privileges on absentee ballot envelopes. The vote on this was 4-1, with Councilman Marv Boutin absent.

Prior to this, a motion was made to continue the prepaid postage, but with the absence of Boutin, the vote was 3-3, which killed the move because of lack of a majority. In this action, Mayor Kenneth McLeod and Councilmen Rodger Graef and George Freeman voted no, and Councilmen Kenneth Boerner, Benjamin Pinkos and Conrad Naegel, yes.

Graef, who made the motion to rescind, stated that the pre-paid postage envelopes gave absentee electors the advantage of voting without going to the polls, whereas, the stay-at-homes must drive or walk to their respective precincts to cast ballots.

It was pointed out that pre-paid postage was 12 cents an envelope, and with the rescinding of this privilege, the city should save some money.

Petersen said that during the last presidential election, there were approximately 800 absentee ballots cast.

Woods Petitioners Express Opposition to Townhouses

On Monday, August 16, the Woods council accepted a petition bearing 48 signatures of home owners residing in Anita and Hollywood, who are protesting any proposed zoning changes in the neighborhood which would allow the construction of multiple-family or townhouse dwellings.

Mayor Kenneth McLeod informed the protesters in attendance at the meeting, that the council could not act on the matter at the session, but that the petition will be referred to the Planning Commission for study and recommendation, to be presented to the city body at a future meeting for consideration.

The petitioners, who own property at the northeast corner of the Morningside and Vernier roads intersection, asserted that they strongly object to and oppose the request of Webb H. Coe for permission to construct townhouses on the property, comprised of Lots 9 and 10A Assessors' Grosse Pointe Woods Plat No. 1 of parts of Lots 1 and 2 Plat of partitions of Private Claim 249.

The home owners, all but one living in Anita, asked the council to maintain the present status of the property for use as single-family dwellings only.

They stated that they were opposed to: 1. A change of zoning of said property to permit construction of multiple-

family dwellings; 2. The construction of multiple-family dwellings or townhouses on said property; 3. The increased population density which would result from the construction of townhouses on said property; 4. The increased traffic resulting from the construction of townhouses on said property; 5. The change in character of the neighborhood from its present exclusively single-family dwelling character; 6. The appearance of townhouses on said property; and 7. All other objectionable characteristics of townhouses in a single-family dwelling neighborhood.

Get Set for New Hockey Season

The Grosse Pointe Hockey Association has announced that it is busily engaged in finalizing preparations for the 1971-72 minor hockey season for Pointe youngsters. The Association indicates that more Pointe youngsters, between the ages of 6 and 18, will be playing under the auspices of the Hockey Association this year than ever before.

As a result of the tremendous upsurge in the amount of enthusiasm generated by Pointe youngsters for minor hockey, the Association indicates that it has been successful in obtaining some additional ice-time for the coming season. This in turn, permits the expansion of the program to more Pointe youngsters.

Enrollment is expected to increase by over 100 players and will result in approximately 500 youngsters actively engaged in the sport this season. The Association will still be compelled to place some of the new applicants on a waiting list since there is just not enough ice-time available.

In order to rent sufficient ice-time to expand the program the Hockey Association is compelled to purchase hours that are less than ideal. This year the Association will be assigning early morning weekend hours to practically all teams in the program on various occasions throughout the season. These practices are expected to begin as early as 5 and 6 a.m. at various neighboring arenas.

Unlike the policy in past seasons, the Association advises that there will be no early registrations accepted this year. Instead, all youngsters must register on the morning of September 11, between 8 o'clock and 12 noon.

Construction for the Center, which is to be built on Austin Catholic Prep School's athletic field, Mack Avenue and Canyon, is scheduled to begin November 15, providing a community-wide fund raising campaign is successful.

A public community meeting has been scheduled for the Parcels School auditorium on Tuesday, September 14, at 8 p.m. to detail the complete plans for the arena. This meeting will include the showing of slides, diagrams, sketches and other information outlining the various aspects of the arena. Also on the program is a general discussion session involving the construction, usage and maintaining of the facility.

All the local governmental leaders in the Grosse Pointe area have been invited to attend this important meeting, according to the steering committee.

Funds to begin construction of the new arena are expected to be obtained by virtue of an "every resident" fund raising campaign, according to campaign chairmen Harry Jewett, John Hastings and Peter Logan. The Steering Committee has already taken up campaign headquarters in the Fisher Mews, 377 Fisher road, and plans to open the office officially on September 1. Literature and other material necessary for a successful fund raising campaign are nearing completion, according to the committee, with plans to distribute this material at the September 14 meeting.

The committee expects over 700 adults to attend the public meeting scheduled for September 14. As always, volunteer workers are needed. 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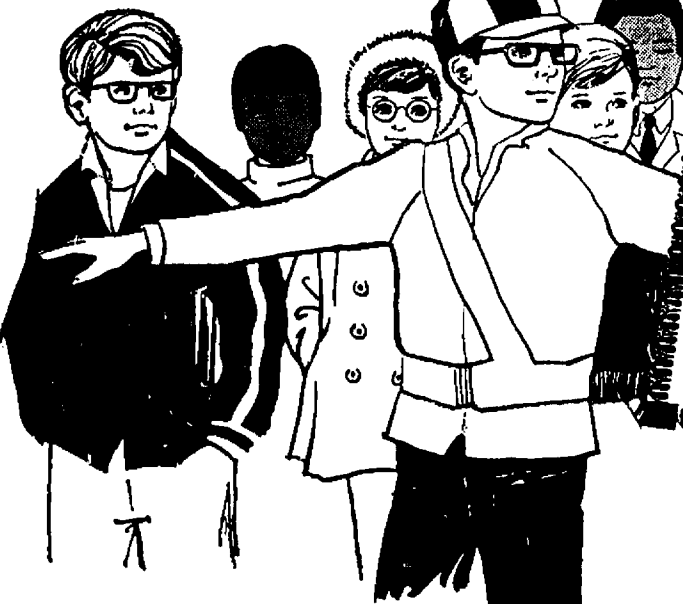
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Pedestrian Hit; Cyclist Injured

Mr. Wolfe said the entire green had to be dug out and replanted and cost the club some \$250. The vandals also overturned benches and generally disarranged the area.

So far this year the cost of vandalism at the club has risen to \$2,500.

In June, the club requested that the Woods Council grant them permission to increase the height of their fence surrounding the golf course at 1018 Sunningdale, but permission was denied.

Permission was denied by the council because several residents surrounding the golf course objected to the height increase.

Hill's Wrigley Changes Name

One of the Pointe's most familiar supermarkets changed its name and its personality this week, as the Wrigley sign came down, and a Four Seasons sign took its place.

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CITY OF Grosse Pointe Farms MICHIGAN CODE NO. 6-01 UNIFORM TRAFFIC CODE ORDINANCE NO. 179

AN ORDINANCE TO ADOPT BY REFERENCE THE UNIFORM TRAFFIC CODE FOR MICHIGAN CITIES, TOWNSHIPS, AND VILLAGES AND TO PROVIDE FOR CERTAIN AMENDMENTS AND ADDITIONS THERETO. THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE FARMS ORDAINS: Section 1. CODE ADOPTED The Uniform Traffic Code for cities, townships and villages promulgated by the Commissioner of State Police on February 14, 1958 and published in Supplement No. 13, and as amended both on February 14, 1961 and published in Supplement No. 25, and on February 28, 1968 and published in Supplement No. 54, to the 1954 Michigan Administrative Code, in accordance with Public Act 62 of 1964, State of Michigan, is hereby adopted by reference as in this ordinance modified. Section 2. REFERENCES IN CODE References in the Uniform Traffic Code for Michigan cities, townships and villages to "governmental unit" shall mean the City of Grosse Pointe Farms. Section 3. CHANGES IN CODE The following additional sections and subsections are amended or added to the Uniform Traffic Code as indicated. Subsequent section numbers used in this ordinance shall refer to the like numbered sections of the Uniform Traffic Code. Section 1.043(a) is hereby amended to read as follows: "Trailer" means a vehicle with or without motive power, other than a pole-trailer, designed for carrying property or persons and capable of being drawn by a motor vehicle. Section 2.7(b) is hereby amended to read as follows: (b) Disposition of an abandoned vehicle shall be made as provided in Section 252 of the act, or as provided in (c) thereof, or (d) thereof. Subsections (c), (d), and (e) are added to Section 2.7 and shall read as follows: (c) When an impounded vehicle shall remain unclaimed for thirty (30) days, the Police Department shall be authorized to dispose of the same at public auction to the highest bidder. Notice of any such auction shall be given to the general public by advertisement in a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Grosse Pointe Farms at least two (2) weeks prior to the sale, and to the person in whose name the vehicle is licensed by certified mail sent to the last known address of such person at least thirty (30) days prior to such sale. The proceeds of such sale shall be applied to the costs and expenses of the city in impounding and disposing of said vehicle and paid to the City's general fund. (d) The Police Department shall be authorized to dispose of junk automobiles which have been abandoned and remain unclaimed for thirty (30) days. Notice of any such action shall be given to the person in whose name the vehicle is licensed by certified mail sent to the last known address of such person at least ten (10) days prior to such disposal. Junk automobiles are hereby defined as automobiles more than five years old and of a value of less than \$100. (e) Storage Charges. Before the owner or person in charge of an impounded vehicle shall be permitted to remove the same from the custody of the Police Department he shall furnish evidence of his identity and of his ownership or authority, he shall sign a receipt for the vehicle, and he shall pay the actual towing costs or other related expenses to cover the cost of removing the vehicle from its original location, plus storage charges. In the case of storage by the Police Department, no storage charge shall be made for the first five (5) days of storage; thereafter the charge shall be one dollar (\$1) per day. Section 2.11 is hereby amended to read as follows: When any person not a resident of this state shall be arrested without a warrant for any violation of this Act, under conditions not referred to in Section 727 of the act, or of a provision of this ordinance under conditions not referred to in Section 2.17c, the officer making such arrest shall upon demand of such arrested person forthwith take such person before a magistrate having jurisdiction to answer to the complaint made against him. If no magistrate is available, the person so arrested may be released upon giving the officer a guaranteed appearance certificate or a sum of money as specified by the Judge of the Grosse Pointe Farms Municipal Court but not to exceed \$200. Section 2.20 is hereby amended to read as follows: The Police Department shall receive and properly file all accident reports made to it under state law, or under any ordinances of this governmental unit. Section 2.53 (Traffic Control Orders) is amended to read as follows: (a) The authority to regulate traffic contained in this ordinance shall be exercised by the Chief of Police by the issuance of traffic control orders which shall specify rules and regulations adopted or established by him. Such traffic control orders shall become effective upon being filed with the Clerk and upon erection of adequate signs or signals giving notice of the existence of such regulation, if signs or signals are required by the provisions of this ordinance pertaining to such regulation. Traffic control orders may be either temporary or permanent and all such orders shall be filed with the Clerk. All such orders and any action modifying or repealing such orders shall be kept in a separate book by the Clerk to be known as the Traffic Control Order Book. (b) Copies of traffic control orders certified by the Clerk to be a true transcript compared by him with the original in his office, shall be evidence in all courts, and proceedings in like manner as the original would be if produced. If it shall appear that a traffic control sign, signal or device conforming to the provisions of this ordinance was erected or in place when the alleged violation of this ordinance occurred, such showing shall be prima facie evidence of the existence of a lawful traffic control order authorizing such traffic control, sign, signal or device, and it shall be unnecessary for the prosecution to affirmatively show the existence of a valid traffic control order in such cases, unless and until such presumption is rebutted by competent evidence. Section 2.54 (Clerk) is amended to read as follows: The following duties prescribed for the Clerk shall be duties of the City Manager of the City of Grosse Pointe Farms or his designated representative. Section 5.8 hereby amended to read as follows: Concealing Identity. No person shall conceal or attempt to conceal his identity or falsely identify himself or give false information to any police officer or to any person entitled to the information prescribed in Section 5.4(a), 5.5, 5.6, or 5.7 above. The following language is added to Section 5.14: (c) It shall be unlawful and in violation of this ordinance for any person to operate any vehicle upon any street or highway, or any other place open to the general public, including any area designated for the parking of motor vehicles within this city, in a manner resulting in unnecessary and excessive engine noise or tire squealing during acceleration, deceleration, or turning. Section 7.9 is hereby amended to read as follows: Between adjacent intersections at which traffic control signals are in operation, pedestrians shall not cross the roadway except in a marked crosswalk, or except where no traffic is in sight. Section 7.10 is hereby amended to read as follows: No pedestrian shall cross a roadway other than in a crosswalk in any business district except where no traffic is in sight. The following language is added to Section 8.5: (b) Whenever a vehicle becomes stalled or for any reason cannot be moved, by its own power and in consequence obstructs a street, or causes the vehicle to be otherwise illegally parked, the owner or operator shall cause the immediate removal of same by towing or otherwise. The following language is added to Section 8.10: (s) Parking Between Sidewalk and Street Curbings. No person shall stop, stand or park a vehicle on that portion of land located beyond any curb, unless permission from the Traffic Engineer is obtained. (t) Towing of Improperly Parked Vehicles. When deemed a traffic hazard by a police officer, any vehicle in violation of existing parking control regulations may be towed, and costs incurred will be at the registered owner's expense. The following language is added as Section 8.11(a): (a) Parking of Certain Vehicles and Trailers Prohibited During Night. It is unlawful to park any commercial vehicle, self propelled mobile home or camper, more than eighty-nine (89) inches in width, or trailer on any street in this city for a period longer than thirty (30) minutes between the hours of 2:00 a.m. and 4:00 a.m. of the same day. The Traffic Engineer, for good cause, may grant special parking permits permitting parking of such vehicles or trailers, during the above hours, provided each permit is granted for a definite period of time. The following language is substituted for Section 8.24: Parking Signs Required. Whenever by this or any other ordinance of this governmental unit any parking time limit is imposed or parking is prohibited on designated streets, no such regulations shall be effective unless appropriate signs giving notice thereof are erected and in a place of the time of any alleged offense, except that no such signs need be erected to make effective (1) ordinances regulating the stopping, standing, or parking of vehicles when these ordinances do not differ from the provisions of Act No. 300, Public Acts of 1949, as amended, and (2) provisions of this ordinance relating to night parking. The following language is added as 8.25: Riding Outside of Vehicle. No person shall ride in or operate any motor vehicle unless all portions of such person's body are entirely within that portion of the vehicle that is designed for the carrying of passengers or merchandise or as otherwise permitted by this ordinance; provided, however, that this section does not apply to any person whose employment makes it necessary to ride otherwise. Section 9.3(c) is amended to read as follows: Any person violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be punishable by a fine not exceeding \$500 or by imprisonment in the City Jail, County Jail or the Detroit House of Correction, for a term not exceeding 90 days, or by both such fine and imprisonment which may be imposed at the discretion of the Court, except when lesser penalties for parking violations upon which a guilty plea or plea of nolo contendere is entered within thirty (30) days by resolution of the City Council. The following language is added as Section 9.6: Whenever the term "Traffic Engineer" is used in such code, it shall be construed and be deemed to mean the Chief of Police of the City of Grosse Pointe Farms, Michigan. Section 4. NOTICE TO BE PUBLISHED The City Clerk shall publish this ordinance in the manner required by law and shall at the same time publish a supplementary notice setting forth the purpose of the said Uniform Traffic Code and of the fact that complete copies of the Code are available at the Office of the Clerk for inspection by and distribution to the public at all times. Section 5. CONFLICTING ORDINANCES REPEALED Ordinance No. 101 adopted February 16, 1953, entitled "AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE THE OPERATION OF MOTOR VEHICLES AND BICYCLES, AND TO REGULATE VEHICULAR TRAFFIC AND RELATED MATTERS AND TO REPEAL ORDINANCES NO. 53, 58, 67 and 78," and Ordinance No. 85 adopted September 19, 1940, entitled "AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO TRAFFIC AND REGULATING THE USE OF PUBLIC STREETS AND HIGHWAYS WITHIN CERTAIN ESTABLISHED PARKING METER ZONES OF THE VILLAGE (NOW CITY) OF GROSSE POINTE FARMS; PROVIDING FOR THE DESIGNATION OF INDIVIDUAL PARKING SPACES, FOR THE USE OF SUCH PARKING SPACES, AND FOR THE USE OF PARKING METERS IN CONJUNCTION THEREWITH," are hereby repealed. The school building should be entered through the boys' locker room doors. As a general rule the fellow who worries about nothing has nothing to worry about.



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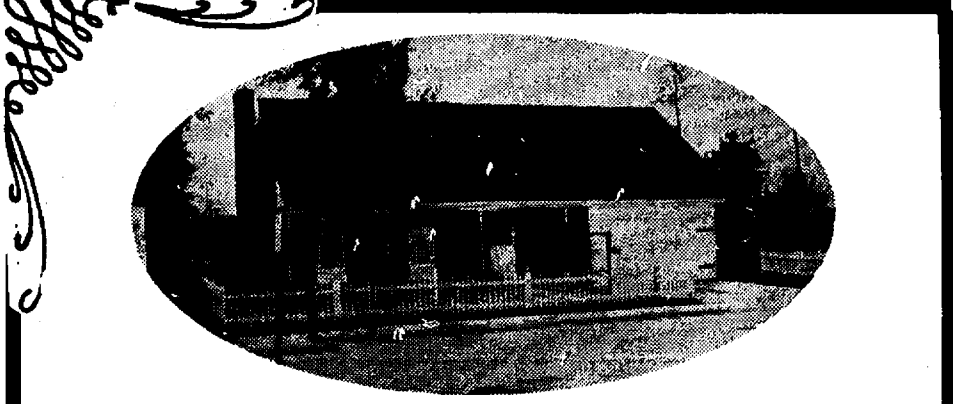
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Let's Nail This One Down

We hope that the mighty hunter who shot a miniature poodle in The Farms on Monday is writhing in the agony of a tortured conscience. Such a daring deed deserves no less, and should be rewarded far more suitably... such as being hung by his trigger finger for a few days.

Louis XIV, beloved pet of Dr. and Mrs. Ethelbert Spurrier of 261 Kenwood court, lies paralyzed in a veterinary hospital. His owners and the doctors are wrestling with the difficult decision of whether it would be more humane to put him through surgery in the faint hope of a miraculous recovery, or to release him to a merciful, eternal sleep.

Louis, who has given boundless joy to many during the nine years of his happy, healthy life, somehow escaped from the yard while the Spurriers were having tea in the garden on Monday afternoon. It was the first time he had ever strayed from his own premises.

A painter working on the exterior of a house in the neighborhood, said he heard two shots, looked around and saw Louis, thrashing in pain, on the curb in Beaure avenue between Kenwood court and Moran road. No one was in sight, but the painter thinks he heard a moving car just before the shots.

A .22 calibre bullet, lodged against Louis' spinal column was removed. The decision on further surgery depends on the victim's condition in the next few days.

Louis' tragic experience should offer a poignant lesson to dog owners on the importance of keeping their pets confined to their own properties. The Farms police are investigating. We fervently hope they ferret out the cowardly imbecile, who fired the shots. No effort should be spared to bring such a character into the spotlight of justice.

Coaches for School Board?

It was sports' night again at the meeting of the Board of Education on Monday, August 12. An overflow crowd was in attendance at the Board office on St. Clair avenue. This time it was football fans... just a week ago it was tennis buffs. The Board members don't know before a meeting whether to lob or smash, or punt, pass or pray.

The main issue was the discontinuance of freshman football at both North and South High Schools. The administration announced last Thursday that two football coaches, one basketball coach and one coach each in cross country, swimming, baseball and golf will be dropped at each high school. There had been six football coaches at each school, three basketball coaches and two baseball coaches.

The discontinuance of freshman football was decided upon by school system officials, but freshman boys will be eligible to try out for junior varsity and varsity squads and participate in the conditioning programs. Suggestions of all kinds were made to the board, from volunteer coaches to financial aid specifically earmarked for freshman football. Superintendent Anderson explained that board policy prohibits any extra curricular activities being conducted at the schools without authorized, paid supervision. He added that financial donations, while welcomed on a general basis could not be accepted from vested interest groups.

The entire air at Monday night's meeting was one of regret... on the part of the school administrators in having to make cuts of any kind academic or athletic... regret on the part of the parents whose youngsters are intricately involved in the athletic programs... and regret on the part of board members who have been facing cuts and more cuts since the first millage failure some two years ago. What of the future? Until state aid is a known factor... until sufficient millage can be passed to restore all the programs... until school systems all over the country find other means of financing... meetings like Monday night's session will continue throughout the country.

Air Medal Won By Major Meyer

Major Albert D. Meyer, son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert A. Meyer, of Hampton road, graduate of Grosse Pointe High School, Michigan State University, with a masters degree in public administration from the University of Oklahoma, has been awarded the Air Medal for flying combat missions during the period from May 17, 1970 through May 20, 1971.

The award was made recently at Andersen Air Force Base, Guam, where Major Meyer is the director of operational intelligence for the 8th Air Force Headquarters. The citation accompanying the medal said, "By direction of the president, Major Albert D. Meyer is awarded the Air Medal for meritorious achievement while participating in aerial flight. During the period

indicated—May 30, 1970 to May 17, 1971—outstanding airmanship and courage was exhibited in the successful accomplishment of important missions under extremely hazardous conditions. The highly professional efforts of Major Meyer contributed materially to the Mission of the United States Air Force." Since leaving the United States in May 1970, Major Meyer has been awarded the Joint Services Commendation Medal for meritorious service with the Joint Chiefs of Staff while assigned to Strategic Air Command (SAC) Headquarters near Omaha, Neb. He has also been awarded the Viet Nam Service Medal and the Viet Nam Campaign Medal. Major Meyer is married to the former Dianne Nichols, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fred J. Nichols, of Massena, N.Y.

What Goes On at Your Library

Those of you who weren't away on vacation earlier this month; those of you who have children; those of you who love the Beatrix Potter books—did you have the opportunity to see the exquisite PETER RABBIT AND TALES OF BEATRIX POTTER at one of our local motion picture houses? If not you missed a rare treat, and I would urge you to watch for a return engagement. The Royal Ballet was superb; kudos should certainly go to them for their marvelous interpretation and their faithful reproduction of the Beatrix Potter illustrations in her many children's books.

All of this started me to thinking—what was this author like, what sort of life had she led? And this, in turn, led me to read what I could find of a biographical nature. In case you, too, had a hiatus in your background, I'd like to share what I learned with you.

Beatrix Potter was born in 1866 at Bolton Gardens, Kensington. She came of a characteristic Victorian family of the monied middle-class. Children in those days were seen and not heard, and so poor Beatrix led a lonely, dull life. She was educated by governesses and had only one sibling, a brother, Bertram. At an early age she showed an astonishing ability to draw and paint—plants, small animals, and some interiors. (It is interesting to note that her brother also became an artist.) From 1881 to 1897 she kept a journal, revealing a quiet life, but surprisingly full of interests. She visited many museums, always had a host of pets, dissected some, thus learning to know the structure of the animals which would later appear in her books.

PETER RABBIT was her first modest book. In spite of the restrictions of her family, she managed to make friends who were able to help her in this direction, and got Frederick Warne & Company to become her publisher. In fact, the youngest member of this publishing house, Norman Warne, eventually proposed marriage to her, but unfortunately he died within the year. Her family raised violent objections to this engagement; they did not want her to marry or to leave home.

For the next eight years she purchased a Lakeland farm—Hill Top Farm in Sawrey, which was quite a bold step for an Edwardian spinster. By this time she had also written, illustrated and published THE TAILOR OF GLOUSTER, THE TALE OF SQUIRREL NUTKIN, THE TALE OF BENJAMIN BUNNY and several other children's books, and had amassed a modest amount of money to enable her to be somewhat independent. Her legal business at Sawrey was handled by Mr. William Heelis, a gentle, kind country lawyer, whom she married in 1913, in spite of the objections of her family (she was 47 at the time!) By this time most of her writing was finished, and she became a doughty English farmer, buying up more property as time went on, going into the sheep business, and enjoying 30 years of a very happy marriage. She died in 1943 at the age of 77.

One wonders. What would have happened to Tom Kitten, Mrs. Tiggy-Winkle, Jeremy Fisher, Mrs. Tittlemouse, the Flopsy Bunnies, and all the rest of her charming characters if Beatrix Potter had not led such a strict Victorian childhood? We, and our children would certainly have been the poorer, since almost all of her books are perennial favorites, and the motion picture reminds one that especially her illustrations have appeal for both young and old. In spite of the fact that nearly all of her animals belong to a small area in the Lake District in England, they have universal appeal. Her books have been translated into many languages and thus are loved by children the world over.

At this very moment, the Processing Department is putting through added copies of some of her titles. Looking them over reminds me of my childhood, reminds me how much I enjoyed reading them, over and over again. First there is THE TALE OF THE FLOPSY BUNNIES and their adventures in Mr. McGregor's garden. Next we find THE TALE OF PIGLING BLAND, in which Aunt Petticoes sends Pigling Bland and his brother Alexander to market (there are too many mouths to feed.) Do you remember THE TALE OF MRS. TITTLEMOUSE and her very dirty visitor, Mr. Jackson? If you saw the motion picture, you will certainly want to reread THE TALE OF MRS. TIGGLY-WINKLE, as well as THE TALE OF MR. JEREMY FISHER. My remaining two books are THE TALE OF MR. TOD and THE TALE OF TOM KITTEN, the latter containing one of my favorite characters, Jemima Puddle-Duck.

I can see I've got to sit down and reread all of these Beatrix Potter books, and perhaps you feel the same way. I think our patrons have had this urge, as it is very hard to keep copies of any of these books on our shelves.

Public Schools in Focus

In addition to a school calendar for 1971-72 that we believe will permit improvements in the educational program, (including four days of instruction during the first week and a Christmas vacation schedule designed to stem student absenteeism), the contract recently ratified between the Board of Education and the Grosse Pointe Educational Association also provides for an improved measure of staff accountability to the public. Through conversations and various community contacts, we believe that this aspect of the agreement will please many Grosse Pointe residents.

Details of a unique trial program for evaluation probationary teachers in The Grosse Pointe Public School System includes three administrative observations between the end of the first month of service and a date prior to 90 days before the end of the first school year. Three similar observations are also planned during the second year of probation. The contract states that the administrators' classroom visits are to be followed by personal interviews and by written evaluations. Deficiencies observed in a teacher's performance are to be remedied through specific suggestions for improvement. In addition, two tenure teachers will be selected by the administration to make three evaluations of the performance of each probationary teacher.

One View From The Capitol

Back in session after a two-week break, the House this week must tackle the largest budget items, welfare and education, while the Senate works on other budget bills and more importantly, considers a constitutional amendment ballot proposal.


I hope the Senate kills the ballot proposal. The special election this November will be expensive and what would you get for your money? You would get a chance to vote, once, on a combined proposal allowing a graduated income tax and taking school tax control away from the district and giving the authority to the state.

What would you gain? Greater equality between school systems. What would you lose? Money, the chance to vote against taxes and excellence in our schools.

Governor Milliken has determined he wants reform in the method of school financing. His means attack the local control of schools, without facing the hard question of whether or not local control is still a good concept. There is a need for action, but not action which would destroy a system of locally controlled, locally financed public schools without full debate and without a clear alternative.

The Governor has not told us what his system of schools would look like or how it would be funded and budgeted. I think he owes us that before he asks us to pay a graduated income tax and do away with local school operating property taxes. I ask you again to write your state senators opposing House Joint Resolution GG.

The traditional beginning of the year planning conferences, normally slated for Tuesday and Wednesday of Labor Day week, have been advanced to Wednesday and Thursday, September 1 and 2. This year all students attending the public schools will report for classes on Tuesday, September 7, instead of on Thursday as in the past. This provides for four full days of instruction, instead of two, during the first week. The calendar provides for a two-week Christmas recess, a feature that may reduce a growing rate of student absenteeism as families scheduled vacations and trips prior to the official beginning of the holiday period. Sept. 1-2: Teachers report for duty (Planning for school opening). Sept. 7: Students report for full day. Oct. 13: Curriculum half-day (Students report only in the morning). Nov. 18: Curriculum half-day (Students report only in the morning). Nov. 25-26: Thanksgiving Holiday. Dec. 20-31: Christmas Holiday. Jan. 3: Schools reopen. Fees for inspections and the issuance of permits or certificates or copies thereof required or issued under the provisions of this Chapter shall be collected by the City Treasurer in advance of the issuance of such permits or certificates. The amount of such fees shall be established by resolution of the City Council, from time to time, and shall cover the cost of inspection and supervision from the enforcement of this chapter. The fees shall be paid to the General Fund of the City of Grosse Pointe.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTIONS 8.172, BY ADDING TO SAID SECTION SUBPARAGRAPH (2); TO AMEND SECTIONS 8.174 AND 8.181; AND TO ADD A NEW SECTION, WHICH NEW SECTION SHALL BE DESIGNATED AS SECTION 8.183, OF CHAPTER 105 OF TITLE VIII OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE. THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE ORDAINS: 8.172 Permit Required. (2) A permit will not be required for window signs and banners which comply with Section 8.183. 8.174 Conformance with Specifications. All licensed signs and banners must be constructed and erected in safe and stable manner and strictly in accord with the drawings and specifications set forth in the application as approved by the Building Inspector. (1) No sign or banner shall be over five (5) feet high and seven (7) feet wide, nor shall all signs on a single face of a building cover more than 35 square feet, except as permitted under Section 8.176 and Section 8.183. (2) No sign or banner shall be designed, installed or maintained so as to oscillate, rotate or revolve. 8.181 Order to Remove. Should any sign or banner at any time be found by the Building Inspector to be unsafe, insecure, improperly constructed or not in accordance with the plans or requirements of this Chapter, the owner, tenant, person in charge of premises or the one to whom the permit was granted shall be immediately so notified in writing, at the address stated in the application for the permit or at the last address on the books of the City of the owner of the property upon which the sign or banner is erected, by the Building Inspector. Unless the necessary changes or repairs are made within five (5) days after notice, or the sign or banner removed within five (5) days after notice, or such shorter period as safety may require, the Building Inspector shall immediately cause the sign or banner to be removed, and the City of Grosse Pointe shall be entitled through the proper court of law to recover from the licensee the cost of so doing or to assess against the property upon which the sign or banner was constructed as part of the next tax to be collected the cost of such removal. 8.183 Limitation on Window Signs and Banners. No sign or banner shall be permitted to be affixed on the inside, outside or within three feet of any glass window or any similar transparent window within the City of Grosse Pointe if said sign or banner occupies more than ten per cent of the total area of said window or if, when considered with other signs or banners in connection with said window, the total area of the several signs or banners exceeds ten per cent of the total window area. If more than one pane of glass or other transparent material are placed together so as to create the effect of one window, they shall be treated in the same manner as one window for purposes of this section.

The effective date of the within Ordinance No. 145 shall be ten (10) days after date of publication thereof.

Butler and Councilwoman Nancy J. Waugaman were excused from attending the meeting. The Minutes of the Regular Meeting of July 19, 1971, were approved with minor corrections. The Council, acting as the Zoning Board of Appeals, approved the following appeals: A. The appeal of Mr. Howard Crane, of 32 Edgemere Road, from the denial of a Building Permit for an addition to his home. B. The appeal of Dr. Donald E. Kelly, of 302 Grosse Pointe Boulevard, from the denial of a Building Permit for the enclosure of an open porch attached to his home. C. The appeal of Mr. Edward M. Ranger, of 335 Grosse Pointe Boulevard, from the denial of a Building Permit for the enlargement of a portion of his home. At the conclusion of a Public Hearing which was held concerning the matter, the Council enacted Code No. 6-01, Ordinance No. 179; an Ordinance to adopt by reference the Uniform Traffic Code for Michigan Cities, Townships and Villages, and to provide for certain amendments and additions thereto. The purpose of such Code is to regulate the operation of vehicles, to provide for the regulation and use of streets, highways and alleys and other public and semi-public places within the City of Grosse Pointe Farms, and to provide penalties for the violation of said Code. The Council further announced that copies of the Uniform Traffic Code, as amended, are available at the Office of the City Clerk for inspection by and distribution to the public during the regular office hours, 8:30 a.m. until 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. Police Department Report for the month of June, 1971, with attachment of the Detective Bureau's Semi-Annual Report. The Council adopted a resolution to postpone its Regular Meeting scheduled to be held on August 16, 1971, until 8:00 p.m., on Monday, August 23, 1971. The Council approved payment in the amount of \$20,513.94, to the City of Grosse Pointe Woods, as the Farms' portion of the Grosse Pointe Inter-Municipal Communities Youth Service Division's operating budget for the current fiscal year, beginning July 1, 1971 and ending June 30, 1972. SISTER SEAN MARTIN, OF CENTER POINT

She's pert, perky, pleasing and filled with an enthusiasm for living and loving that's infectious. She's Sister Sean Martin, one of the three adult coordinators at Center Point, Family Life Education's (FLEC) drop-in center, located at 17150 Maumee avenue, the annex of Grosse Pointe Unitarian Church.

But to the young people there she is someone very special. To call her a "buddy" would be inaccurate because she doesn't try to be one. Maybe the simple answer is that she loves young people (she's pretty young herself).

She takes the kids at face value . . . accepts their jargon and listens with a capital L . . . that's the most important part of her job . . . listening. The second most important part is caring, and Sister Sean is long on caring and the young adults know this.

Attitude Is Answer
How does someone like Sister Sean from a rather sheltered life in the religious community become involved in the stark, basic and sometimes painful world we live in? by her attitude. She says, "Any mission of God to the people of God must be brought to the people."

Sister Sean entered the religious community in 1960 after earning her BS degree from Siena College with a major in biology. (She is doing her graduate work in biology and chemistry.)

Raised in Shaker Heights, O., Sister Sean attended public elementary schools then was enrolled in Beaumont School for Girls, a catholic girls' high school, from which she graduated. She entered the Adrian Dominican Order upon graduation.

Very early in life Sister Sean knew she wanted to work with young people; teaching apostolically seemed to be the answer. She taught for four-and-a-half years at St. Peter's Grade School in Harper Woods then joined the Staff of St. Paul School, where she worked for six years.

Wrote Curriculum
While at St. Paul, she wrote the entire sex education curriculum for grades one through eight. She then became interested in the drug problem, as it affected young people. She was among the first adults to attend the Drug Work Clinic at South High School. Further study of the drug situation resulted in a complete drug curriculum for grades one through eight for students in parochial schools.

The more Sister Sean studied the drug problem the more aware she was of the changing society in which she lived. So, she began looking for ways to help people beyond the confines of the church and school. She talked with the then president of FLEC, Dr. Max Gardner, and told him she was interested in helping with FLEC's program. FLEC board members were delighted and immediately asked Sister Sean if she would be interested in working at the crisis intervention center . . . Center Point.

Starts Training
Her answer was a resounding YES! She immediately began her training by attending the adult training program offered by FLEC, while still teaching at St. Paul. After completion of the course she was more interested than ever! She spoke with her Mother General, Sister Seans says, "She was wonderful . . . she agreed that working with young people with problems would be a worthwhile apostolate and immediately agreed to my release . . . my whole

by trained professionals). At these sessions young people can study and learn in a relaxed informal atmosphere.

24-Hour Service
Center Point maintains a 24-hour phone service crisis line (881-7744). Sister Seans says, "Our phones are busiest between 6 p.m. and midnight. Last month we handled 230 telephone calls. Each and every one of those calls received individual, confidential attention from staff members who cared! Most of the calls were from young people wanting to "rap" about their problems. A few required extensive follow-up and some were of an emergency nature requiring medical back-up. Whatever the need, our staff is here to fulfill it," smiles Sister Sean.

The center is open daily from noon until midnight. Young people enjoy going there to rap . . . to read . . . to sing . . . or to just be themselves.

Center Point is another of the many FLEC-sponsored youth oriented activities geared to helping strengthen the family unit through programs of education, information and recreation.

- "No Second Fiddle"
- 2 packages (10 ounces each) frozen green peas with pearl onions, cooked
- 1 cup celery, cut diagonally
- 1 can (1 pound) bean sprouts, drained
- 1 package (7 ounces) frozen shelled, deveined shrimp, cooked
- 1 can (7½ ounces) King crabmeat
- lemon juice
- ½ cup mayonnaise
- ¼ teaspoon curry powder
- 1 teaspoon soy sauce
- 1 teaspoon salt
- ¼ teaspoon pepper

About two hours before serving: combine in large bowl cooked peas with pearl onions, celery, bean sprouts, shrimp split in half (reserve a few for garnish), well-drained crabmeat. Sprinkle with one tablespoon lemon juice and toss. In a small bowl, blend mayonnaise with curry powder, soy sauce, salt, pepper, and two teaspoons lemon juice; pour over vegetable mixture, toss well, refrigerate. Just before serving, garnish with a few shrimp. Serves six people.
