



SCHOOL QUESTIONS ANSWERED

HEADLINES of the WEEK As Compiled by the Grosse Pointe News

Thursday, August 19
PAY FOR STATE and local government workers, including teachers, is covered by President Nixon's 90-day freeze, the government announced Wednesday. The Cost of Living Council, chaired by Treasury Secretary John B. Connally, issued a seven-page question-and-answer statement intended to answer the most frequently asked questions about the freeze. The council said persons may receive raises for bona fide promotions, that state and local tax rates may rise during the freeze and that increased sales or excise taxes may be in the form of higher prices.

THREE POLICEMEN were shot Wednesday in Jackson, Miss., and one was in critical condition following a shoot-out between law enforcement officials and members of the black separatist Republic of New Africa. The critically wounded officer was shot in the head and his chances of survival were slim, according to a police spokesman. No RNA members were wounded in the gunfight. In Detroit, an RNA officer promised Wednesday afternoon that the RNA would wage war unless 11 of the organization's members arrested after the shoot-out were released.

Friday, August 20
PRESIDENT OF THE AFL-CIO, George Meany, rejected administration appeals for co-operation Thursday and threatened strikes, pressure on Congress, and the use of the courts if necessary to fight President Nixon's economic program. Meany told newsmen very bluntly, "We will not cooperate."

Saturday, August 21
THREE GUARDS and three convicts, including "Solead Brother," George Jackson, were killed today in a bloody attempt to escape from San Quentin prison, in California. Jackson, a prominent black prisoner, was cut down by guards' bullets as he and another convict raced from the cell block into a yard carrying a .38 caliber revolver. The other two slain convicts had their throats slit by those attempting to escape, authorities said. Associate Warden James Park said the gun had been smuggled into Jackson by a visitor.

Sunday, August 22
THE DEMOCRATIC National Committee joined labor leaders Saturday in denouncing President Nixon's economic rescue package, calling it a display of continued Republican "contempt for the welfare of the average working American." In its first official comment on the President's week-old recommendations on inflation and unemployment, the Democratic high command called the wage-price freeze and the decision to revise the international monetary system by halting the conversion of foreign-held dollars into gold, "long overdue and welcome," but criticized almost everything else at considerable length.

Monday, August 23
VICE-PRESIDENT Nguyen Cao Ky announced Monday that he would remain out of the South Vietnamese presidential race. His decision, announced at a Monday morning news conference, leaves President Nguyen Van Thieu as the only candidate in the October 3 election.

Tuesday, August 24
THE GOVERNMENT ruled Monday that wage increases for non-union white-collar workers tied to union contracts may go into effect under certain conditions during the President's wage-price freeze. The Cost of Living Council held that such "piggy-back" wage boosts may be granted if the union management agreement was reached before August 15 and met certain other conditions.

The youngsters will be vying for boys' and girls' bicycles, fishing rods and reels and other special gifts. President of the Metropolitan Club, Lieutenant Arthur Turner, of the Grosse Pointe Farms Fire Department, said he anticipates more youngsters this year than ever before. Some 4,000 participated last year.

School Operating Budget Shows Effort to Hold Line

The operating budget proposed for 1971-72 for the public schools and public libraries shows an increase of only 1.4 per cent over disbursements for the 1970-71 year, Dr. Theos I. Anderson, Superintendent of Schools, revealed this week. "In spite of the inflationary spiral and changing economic conditions that have gripped the nation, it is obvious that the school system is making a concerted effort to hold the line," Dr. Anderson said. "The operating millage rate recently sought September 13 is needed to finance \$874,682 in proposed operating costs," Dr. Anderson said. He added that the rate of the renewal is 26 per cent less than the 2.7 mill levy that has expired and is 56 per cent less than the 4.5 mill

GP Farms Police Believe Young Gunman, 'Customer' Together in Store Hold-up

Second Youth Ordered to Rear Room With Clerk; Seen Entering Car Which Left Area With Another Person Behind Wheel

Two youths being sought by Farms police are suspected of working together in the hold-up of the "One-Hour Martinizing Cleaning", 19200 Mack avenue, Thursday evening, August 19. One suspect entered the cleaners approximately 10 minutes ahead of the other, but he was seen entering a car occupied by a second person and leaving the area.

Dt. Sgt. George Van Tiem and Det. Joseph Miller, who are investigating the robbery, said they believe that both young men are involved, even though the first to enter the store was ordered at gun point to a room at the rear of the building, along with a woman employe of the place.

After "releasing" himself from confinement, the youth walked to the parking lot of the Mack-7 Shopping Center at Mack and Moross, entered a car, with another fellow behind the wheel, and left the area. The employe was unable to describe the make of the car, or give the authorities any information regarding the direction the pair had taken.

Description of First
The clerk told Patrolman Gordon Evans that a young man entered the establishment at about 7:30 p.m. He was described as being white, between 18 and 19 years old, about five feet nine inches tall, 160 pounds, with long blond, wavy, shoulder length hair, parted in the middle, and wearing a pink, or light purple pullover type shirt and blue jeans.

He was in the store about 10 minutes, seeking information about the reconditioning of a leather coat, when the

rate sought in March. Dr. Anderson said that in 1970-71 the \$6.02 daily cost of educating a pupil during the school year has been estimated to increase three cents—to \$6.05—with approval of the budget and necessary funds for the new year. The proposed budget includes funds to restore approximately one-half the 100 professionals dismissed in the spring as a result of the defeat of millage on March 15. To hold the line on costs, the Board of Education will hire about 40 non-professional lay supervisors, for non-instructional duties, mostly in the secondary schools. As in the past, the Superintendent said that salaries will

School Board Seeks Title I Assistance

Applies for \$60,000 to Expand Program for Children with Emotional Problems

Members of the Grosse Pointe Board of Education, at a recent meeting, approved the superintendent's recommendation that the school system submit an application to receive \$60,000 in a program to be funded by Title I of the Elementary-Secondary Education Act to expand the special education curriculum offered to children at Barnard Center.

Barnard is located on the campus of the Children's Home of Detroit. The home accepts children without regard to race or creed. It can accommodate 72 children, 12 to a cottage, under the direction of two house parents. Presently, there are two girls' cottages and four boys' cottages.

Age for admission is between six and 13 years. All children in the home have some emotional problem. Many have received in-patient psychiatric care or other intensive therapy. They are temporarily in institutional care because they are in need of a structured residential environment. The children are referred by parents, hospitals, guidance clinics, courts, schools, social agencies and individuals.

Most Stay Two Years
The Children's Home is an open treatment institution. Children remain on an average of two years. While in residence they receive help from social workers, recreation workers, special education teachers and have access to medical and psychological consultation.

Barnard Center is part of Monteth School. Children from kindergarten through sixth grade are enrolled at Monteth, along with one room for an adjusted learning program for the educable mentally handicapped, and another for a newly developed pre-school program. The educational program is provided by the Grosse Pointe Public School System in the Monteth, Brownell and North High Schools. The Children's Home and the school system jointly administer the special education school on the grounds.

Full Time Tutor
The home provides a full-time tutor for those who need one, and operates a mandatory study program for older children under teacher supervision. (Continued on Page 2)

Bottle Collectors Ordered to Move Noisy Task Inside

Neighbors Object to Smashing of Glass in Metal Drums; Hearing Scheduled for Friday, September 10

Earth Lovers, a local ecology group which collects bottles for recycling, and city residents have been involved in a running battle . . . "land pollution" against "noise pollution." The latest scene of the drama took place on Friday, August 20, before Judge Douglas L. Paterson in the City of Grosse Pointe Municipal Court.

Earth Lovers were issued a violation notice by City police on Saturday, August 14, for violating the City's code governing noise nuisances. The violation was issued as a result of numerous complaints from residents living near the parking lot of the Grosse Pointe Unitarian Church where Earth Lovers were stationed for bottle collections. Some 21 neighbors presented the City Council with a petition regarding the excessive noise created by the bottles being thrown into metal drums.

Earlier Complaint
Just a week prior to issuance of the violation, residents had complained of the noise created by the breaking of bottles in metal drums by Earth Lovers volunteers. At that time, when informed of the complaints, the Earth Lovers agreed to no longer break bottles. However, the City offices and police station continued to receive complaints from area residents and the violation was issued.

City Manager Thomas Kressbach, who personally went to the parking lot to observe the Earth Lovers' operation, complimented the young people on their ecological efforts and told the NEWS that he was most impressed with the youngsters and their project. He added, however, that he fully understood and sympathized with the neighbors who were subjected to the noise.

In court on Friday, an interim agreement was reached by the parties involved which will permit Earth Lovers' to continue operations inside the building. The case was then adjourned until Friday, September 10. Mr. Kressbach said that moving the operation indoors should, hopefully, eliminate the noise complaints.

Purse Snatcher Foiled at Store

Isobel McCulloch, 882 University, reported to City Police on Wednesday, August 18, that on that date at 8:58 p.m., she was exiting through the rear door of the Kroger store at 16919 Kercheval when a white male, about 17 to 18 years of age, attempted to grab her purse.

She told officers she dropped her groceries but held on to the handbag. The would-be thief, described as about six feet tall, slim with short dark hair, wearing a black shirt and pants, ran through the parking area and headed north on St. Clair, making his escape.

Thief Abandons Stolen Car Containing Assorted Loot

Woods Public Safety Officer John Albrecht has been credited with the recovery of a car that had been reported stolen in the Farms on August 2. In finding the vehicle, several stolen items found in the auto were also recovered. While on routine patrol at 6:24 a.m., on Monday, August 23, Albrecht passed the home of William Shannon, 1070 North Oxford, and observed a station wagon in the garage on the premises, with the cover for the spare tire and wheel off, and the rear door open. He investigated and found the tire and rim missing. Glancing over to the home of Richard Rabbideano, 1130 North Oxford, the officer saw a station wagon in the driveway, its left rear door open.

Injured Dog Put to Sleep In Hospital

Imbecilic Hunter Sought For Shooting Miniature Poodle; Police Pressing Investigation

Efforts of veterinarians to save a miniature poodle, beloved pet of Dr. and Mrs. Ethelbert Spurrier, of 261 Kenwood court, proved futile and the little creature had to be put to "sleep."

Louis XIV was paralyzed by a .22 caliber bullet, or air gun pellet, which shattered its spine, on Monday, August 16. The missile was fired from a gun in the hands of a despicable person; still unknown, who according to witnesses, was in a moving car. The dog was walking in Beaupre avenue, between Moran road and Kenwood court.

Louis XIV is no more. The damage to the animal's spine was such, he had to be put away to end his suffering. There was nothing else that could be done, according to Dr. Gretchen Flo, of the Veterinarian Section at Michigan State University, East Lansing, who examined the little creature.

X-Rays Were Taken
Farms Det. Joseph Miller, who has been working on the case, said that he spoke to Dr. Flo at 4:20 p.m. on Thursday, August 19, at which time he was informed that Louis XIV's suffering was mercifully ended. The object, which x-rays showed to be of a small caliber fired from a rifle, or hand gun, shattered a vertebra of the little animal's spine. After the shooting, the mighty hunter poodle writhing in agony on the sidewalk.

The pet was taken to the Cadieux-Mack Animal Hospital by Patrolman Clarence Reichling, where efforts to save him were made. When it became apparent that nothing could be done there, it was decided that he should be taken to Lansing, as a last hope.

Was Hopeless Case
Mrs. Spurrier took Louis to the Small Animal Hospital at MSU, for examination by Dr. Flo, an authority on spinal cords. The doctor said nothing (Continued on Page 2)

Give Voters Information For Election

Comparative Data Supplied to Enable Citizens to Assess Importance of Millage Issue

Such interrelated factors as student enrollment, total staff, cuts in state aid, and postponed expenditures are matters which Grosse Pointe voters will want to understand fully before they ballot on the single 2-mill proposition to renew operating millage on Monday, September 13.

Dr. Theos I. Anderson, Superintendent of Schools, has provided comparative data to enable citizens to assess for themselves the importance of the September 13 election and to view the operation of the schools in perspective over a six-year period.

Comparative enrollment figures, (taken at the end of the 5th school month), for the school years from 1966-67 through 1970-71 show that the number of youngsters served by the Grosse Pointe Public School System increased from 11,923 to 13,282, a total of 1,359. Projected enrollments for 1971-72 show a potential of 13,347.

Staff Increases
During the same period the system's educational staff, (teachers, administrators, speech therapists, school librarians, and counselors), increased to reflect the need for more personnel as dictated by higher enrollments. Year by year totals follow: (1966-67) 601; (1967-68) 652; (1968-69) 701; (1969-70) 728; and (1970-71) 711.

Dr. Anderson said that the district's total educational staff of 646 projected for 1971-72 to accommodate 13,347 students is six less than it was in 1967-68, when student enrollment stood at 12,292.

Dr. Anderson said that the district's 648 educators, a decline of 65 from last year's total of 711, is the net reduction projected for 1971-72, including positions to be restored in Priority One by the forthcoming millage.

Dr. Anderson reminds residents that 75 professional staff members had to be recommended for dismissal on Monday, April 5, after the spring millage defeat. In addition, the 29 staff members who had resigned, retired, or took leaves of absence were included in the total of 104 persons who were cut. Since six returned from leave, 95 positions were eliminated as planning for the 1971-72 year began.

Some Teachers Rehired
Dr. Anderson said that funds accumulated as a result of district-wide economies has enabled the Board of Education to rehire some teachers for the 1971-72 year. He indicated that a balance of \$179,000 at the end of the 1970-71 year resulted from the postponement of purchases in new furniture and equipment, the curtailment of already-planned remodeling projects, and delays in plans for new site development. He also added that the replacement of equipment and furniture was another of the district's economy moves.

Dr. Anderson said that the holding back on planned expenditures had begun long before the millage defeat on March 15. As early as January, when it became obvious that state aid would be curtailed seriously, the system began to postpone projects already budgeted.

ERROR



(Continued from Page 1) could be done to save the dog, and the best thing to do was to "release him to merciful, eternal sleep". The operation to remove the missile was performed in the presence of Dr. Flo's students.

Miller said that the bullet, or pellet, will be mailed to his department, along with an autopsy report, which should be ready in about two weeks. In the meantime, he said, he is continuing his investigation.

The poodle escaped from the yard of his owners on the Monday date, the first time in the nine years of his life that he ever strayed from the protection of the premises. His unfamiliar freedom lasted a few brief minutes. He was felled by the missile fired by the still unidentified imbecilic "hunter".

Three Heard Shot

The shot was heard by a painter who was working on the outside of a house nearby, and by two residents in their homes in the immediate neighborhood. Someone called the police.

Those who heard the shot, said it sounded more like the report of a regular firearm, rather than the noise of an air rifle or pellet hand gun.

"The shooting of this little animal was an awful thing, and the person responsible could be nothing but sub-human," Chief Robert Ferber said. "This was a senseless deed, and it is beyond explanation why anyone would want to harm such a little creature, which had strayed away from home, and was not hurting anyone. We will do everything we can to apprehend whoever did this."

(Continued from Page 1) vision plus evening programs in ceramics, woodshop, crafts and gym.

Many of the children from the home attend regular classes at Monteith. When a child at Barnard shows sufficient improvement, he is moved to Monteith or the local middle school, depending on age and maturity.

At the present time, there are four self-contained special education classrooms at Barnard. With the Title I expansion, the system would be able to add a teacher for a fifth special education classroom, a perceptual-motor specialist to work in the area of physical education, two additional teacher aides, increased psychiatric and psychological consultation and a crisis teacher. The crisis teacher is a relatively new development in the area of education of the emotionally disturbed.

Judge Paterson Clears Docket

The City of Grosse Pointe Municipal Court convened on Tuesday, August 10, with Judge Douglas L. Paterson presiding. The following cases were heard.

(Continued from Page 1) account for 85 per cent of the budget, with all other phases of operation taking 15 per cent. In addition to the proposed operating budget of \$15,330,178, funds in the amount of \$1,119,273 have been earmarked for debt retirement. In 1971-72 a total of 2.65 mills will be levied to meet these obligations.

The total school millage rate of 33.25 proposed for 1971-72 represents a reduction of .15 of a mill from the 1970-71 rate of 33.40. The proposed budget millage rates are based on a 6.83 per cent increase in the state equalized valuation of real estate throughout the school district.

An unofficial public hearing on the proposed budget has been scheduled as part of a special meeting for 8 p.m. on Monday, August 30, in the Board Room of the schools' Administration Building, 389 St. Clair avenue.

Interested citizens may obtain copies of the budget summaries prior to the meeting at the public libraries and at 389 St. Clair.

Need Crisis Teacher

Reginald Sienkiewicz, Director of Pupil Personnel, said that the use of a crisis teacher, as therapeutic intervention, is a necessity. With the addition of this special type teacher, the child in need can be removed from a stressful situation to a neutral setting. The teacher will work to reduce the emotional tension, assist the child with his instructional program, and return the child to his classroom as soon as possible.

The value of the crisis teacher is enhanced by the immediacy of her contact with the disturbed child. There will no longer be a need to wait and have the dynamics of the situation explored at a later date, or isolate the child. This improves the total mental health picture at the school because crises can be handled privately, quickly and skillfully.

The crisis teacher will attempt to get as many details of the crisis as possible from the classroom teacher and secure the child's assessment of what went wrong, thereby assisting the child in coping with his feelings. In this program it is imperative that the work of the crisis teacher is regarded as a support and aid for all in a difficult situation and not as an escape or permissiveness.

Now Interviewing

Currently the system is interviewing qualified certified teachers of the emotionally disturbed, and social workers for this post.

If the system receives this grant it will be able to accommodate 10 additional children in these classes for the emotionally disturbed. The extra services will enable the school system to provide a better educational environment and consequently effect a more rapid rehabilitation.

The Title I grant requires that the school system evaluate the progress of the children in the light of improvements implemented through the grant money and must be submitted to the State Department of Education.

Final word on the grant is anticipated momentarily. Mr. Sienkiewicz told the NEWS that he is optimistic that the grant will be received.

Tennis Courts Renovated At Two Park Play Sites

Tennis buffs are enjoying their game again, on a limited basis, at the Windmill Pointe Park, following the renovation of two courts, which were opened to players on Friday, August 20, it was disclosed by City Manager Robert Slone. Two other adjacent courts are scheduled to be put into use by the end of this week, when work on them is completed.

The city manager said improvements to the courts were begun on August 6, with the use of city labor and city purchased materials. Work on the two courts at Three Mile Drive Park, will start in about two weeks.

Total cost of the program is about \$5,000, only about half the amount required if submitted on a bid basis, which had been thoroughly looked into, Slone said. This is a big savings to the city taxpayers, he added.

The courts at Windmill Pointe Park are located at the far east side of the grounds, and the two at Three Mile Drive Park are centrally located and north of the parking lot.

Herbert Heger, director of the Department of Public Service, and Parks and Recreation Director Donald Guinan are enthusiastic regarding the improvements, which, they said, will add color and beauty to the landscapes.

The projects do not entail major repairs, only resurfacing of the court with five layers of asphalt mixed with fiber and sand, for resilience. This type of material, which is applied with trowels, is better than concrete, which is hard on the feet, it was revealed.

A total of five layers is applied, with the first two coats, comprised of emulsifiable asphalt and sand laid down first, then two coats of this asphalt, and the final layer, diluted with water and spread on with a trowel to a smooth finish.

The play sections are all green, and the outside borders are in red, creating a beautiful contrast of colors, and enhancing the area.

Extra lighting around the courts have already been installed. This program was completed in June, Slone said.

Resident tennis enthusiasts will be able to use the courts at both parks as long as the weather permits, it was pointed out.

Elworthy Field Study Continues

By Pepper Whitelaw
Progress continues on the Elworthy Field recreational complex study. Since the Grosse Pointe Board of Education, in May of this year, unanimously approved the leasing of the field to the City of Grosse Pointe for the fee of one dollar a year for 50 years, a special Mayor's Committee, of which Henry B. Joy, Jr. is honorary chairman, and headed by City Councilman William Hurley, has been studying both the physical and financial aspects of the proposed complex.

The terms of the lease state that the City must abide by all the stipulations of the original gift, namely that the field be used for recreational purposes for all residents of the school district. (Trustees of the Helen Newberry Joy Fund provided the cash gift to the school system early in 1966 for the express purpose of purchasing the portion of the Neighborhood Club property now known as Elworthy Field).

Because of the nature of the original agreement, a Show Cause Hearing must be held at which time anyone objecting to the lease agreement between the Board of Education and the City of Grosse Pointe may be heard.

The hearing is slated for Friday, August 27, before Judge James N. Canham, in Wayne County Circuit Court. All Pointe councils have been apprised of the hearing. The Farms Council, on Monday, August 23, asked its attorney to study the lease and if it appeared agreeable, voice no objection and make no appearance at Circuit Court.

The Park Council discussed the matter at length at its regular meeting on Monday and asked its attorney to request a postponement of the Show Cause Hearing until council members and the attorney had an opportunity to make an in-depth study of the terms of the lease.

City manager, Robert Stone, told the NEWS, that because the City of Grosse Pointe Park has a vested interest in the field he felt in all fairness to the many Park residents who use it, a further study of the lease should be made.

The termination clause of the lease covers failure by the City to implement substantial portions of the master plan by 1975 or in any case upon six months notice after 15 years, provided the Board of Education compensates the City at fair market value for capital improvements.

Pointe Theater 200-Strong Entering Its 24th Season

Remember when you were twelve . . . and the images of Scarlett and Rhett on the screen filled you with determination to head for Hollywood as soon as you were old enough to leave home?

Remember when you were twelve . . . and the delicious thrill of that first trip to New York was compounded by Yul Brynner stomping across the boards of the St. James Theater to dance (one-two-three) with Gertrude Lawrence, and you resolved to start dancing lessons as soon as you got back home?

Remember when you were twelve . . . and every trip to the old Cass Theater filled your bosom with bursting thespian ambition . . .

Somehow, you never did make it to Hollywood, or Broadway, or even to the Cass. Instead, you were sensible, became an attorney or an accountant or a teacher or a wife and mother. But in your deepest inner self, you know that if you had studied and worked and slaved, you could put Olivier or Hayes or George C. Scott to shame . . .

You aren't alone. The difference is that some of your friends and neighbors have acted upon that old desire, and while they'll never have their names in lights along the Great White Way, they have the satisfaction of acting upon a stage, or working behind it, in demanding roles and doing important jobs which go into putting together some of the best local theaters around.

In most large communities throughout the state, one or several of the groups known as "community theater" have sprung up in response to demands for better entertainment at convenient locations, as well as being areas for fulfillment of personal desires to act, create, build, write, and produce theatrical and musical shows. One of the most acclaimed of these in Michigan is right here in our own community.

The Grosse Pointe Theater was started in 1948 by a small group of local talent headed by Russel Werneken. The first play presented was a Booth Tarkington comedy, "Clarence." Shortly thereafter followed "Claudia," "I'll Leave It to You," "State of the Union," "Ten Little Indians," and "Jenny Kissed Me."

In the years since, the group, growing to over 200 strong, has presented such dramas as "The Glass Menagerie," "Dial M for Murder," "Anastasia," "Death of a Salesman," "I Inherit the Wind," and "The Lion in Winter."

Among the comedies presented have been "Harvey," "The Solid Gold Cadillac," "The Seven Year Itch," "Come Blow Your Horn," "The Odd Couple," and "The Man Who Came to Dinner." Musicals came on the scene

in 1963 with "Kiss Me Kate," and have included "Oklahoma," "Can Can," "The Most Happy Fella," "Kismet," and "Gypsy." Each of these has been a full blown production—built from the ground up from set design to set construction to painting to sewing costumes to buying, making, or borrowing properties, furniture, rugs, curtains, and animals. The backstage work is done completely by the members—people like Lois Mitchell of St. Clair Avenue, (a bookkeeper and housewife, who created the Oriental makeup for "Flower Drum Song"; Nancy Fielding of Three Mile drive, (a mother of nine), who gathered properties for "Fiorello"; and Rita Flaherty of Prestwick road, (a teacher at Kerby School), who produced "Picnic."

And, all of the actors are amateurs. George Wilson of Woods lane sells automobiles. Carol Purdon of Village lane is a dental hygienist. Don Bliss of Ridgemoor road is a contractor. Each of these people has appeared in numerous productions for GP.

Any member who wants to appear onstage but feels reticent about making that initial public appearance is able to learn stage presence through a program of workshops, presented monthly following the regular business meeting. At the workshops new material, new actors, new directors, new ideas . . . and "old" talent doing something different . . . is the rule. As much care goes into these 20-50 minute productions as goes into each major production presented by the group. During the past season, instructional workshops in lighting and pantomime were presented, as well as several one-act plays, one act from a three-act play, musical productions, and one completely original script.

For members who wish to learn to dance to possibly qualify for a position in the dance chorus of the musical shows, a weekly class has been conducted for several years past by Robert Mitchell of St. Clair Avenue, formerly a professional dancer. For those who are artists or builders, the construction of the set (or sets) is the most challenging part of the action. Last season, "The Apple



Farms Answers 'Unfair' Charge

The City of Grosse Pointe Farms has issued an answer to the unfair labor practice charge leveled against it by the Grosse Pointe Farms Police Officers Association (GPFPOA), stemming from the creation of the position of corporal and the subsequent promotion of patrolman Ronald Wooten and Otto Ghanert to corporals.

In its answer, filed by attorney John O'Mara, the city contends that it has the right to create new positions in or out of the bargaining unit and that the creation of the position of corporal makes good management sense. The answer further states that people who fall into the classification of corporal have been assigned supervisory duties which as a matter of law removes them from the GPFPOA's bargaining unit.

Andrew Bremer, city manager, told the NEWS that he was surprised that the officers of the association contend, (in last week's issue of the NEWS), that they had not been approached regarding the establishment of the position of corporal. He said "While the patrolmen did not agree with the idea we, (Carroll Lock, Farms comptroller), did apprise the association of our intention to create the position of corporal."

Mr. Bremer also referred to the association's statement in last week's issue of the NEWS contending that "the su-

corporals must be made to pay the service fee the association is requesting of them, in lieu of dues.

A hearing has been set for Monday, September 13, in the Employment Relations' Com-missions Office.

Continue Watch Over Pizzeria

Surveillance continues at Mama Rosa's Pizzeria, located at the corner of Lakepointe and Mack, in the Park.

As a result of objections and a petition from neighboring residents Park Police have been checking the area for excessive noises, rowdiness, loud and obscene language, careless and reckless driving of those entering and leaving the pizzeria," since July 27.

At the council meeting of August 9, Chief Gerard Kesteloot reported his findings. He told Council members that on July 27 one of his officers observed teenagers loitering in the parking lot and asked them to disperse. Then on August 7, he said the department received a complaint regarding the theft of some 12 tapes from a car which was parked in the lot around 2:35 a.m. The car had been broken into through the side vent window.

On August 8, he received a report of four teenagers talking loudly in the parking lot. He said during that period he had no reports of reckless driving or excessive noises other than those mentioned. He said at that time the major nuisance factor appeared to be lack of control in the parking lot.

In the audience that night was Lee Gerow, 1471 Lakepointe, one of the petitioners, indicated that he felt much of the noise and loitering was created by employees of the pizzeria and added that when the owner was on the premises these incidents rarely occurred.

Since the owner of the establishment, Anthony Milano, was on duty with the reserves, Mayor Matthew Patterson suggested surveillance be continued and Chief Kesteloot present another report at the August 23 meeting.

Last Monday night Mr. Milano, represented by attorney William Buffalino, was present for the hearing. He informed the Council that he had fired the employee who he believed might have been responsible for some of the complaints. He added that his establishment closes at 1 a.m. weekly and at 2:30 a.m. on the weekends. He said he has observed many cars in the lot on different occasions that were not those of his employees or customers.

Mayor Matthew Patterson indicated his awareness that Mr. Milano was attempting to quiet the nuisance but added he was concerned with the continuing complaints of noises from neighbors during sleeping hours.

Chief Kesteloot then presented his most recent surveillance report. He said his men have checked the pizzeria hourly with the exception of August 13 and August 17 when operational conditions at the department would not permit.

His check revealed that at no time was there any cause for complaint during the two week period. He added no one has signed a formal complaint against the pizzeria.

Despite the Chief's report the Council, led by Councilman Douglas Graham, suggested that Chief Kesteloot continue the surveillance and report back to Council.

Nicholas Stroh Presumed Dead

A spokesman for the U.S. Embassy in Kampala, Uganda, said on Wednesday, August 18, that freelance journalist and Pointer Nicholas Stroh, 33, who disappeared in southwestern Uganda early last month, is now presumed dead and that a presumptive death certificate will be issued.

A commission of top-ranking army, air force and police officers, set up by President Idi Amin three weeks ago, is still investigating the disappearance.

The spokesman said he had no information on the progress of the inquiries, but the Embassy had been assured the investigation was being "actively pursued" and it would be advised of the commission's findings.

Nicholas was said to have July 7 for Mbarra, 160 miles southwest of Kampala. He was accompanied by university lecturer, Robert Siedle, who is also believed dead. The men were reported to have been detained by troops at the Mbarra army barracks two days later.

Nicholas was said to have been investigating an incident in the barracks in which a number of soldiers were killed at the end of June.

He went to Uganda last September with his German-born wife, Gerda and their two children. Mrs. Stroh was brought back to The Pointe at the end of last month by Nicholas' cousin, Peter Stroh, of Cloverly Road. Nicholas' parents are Mr. and Mrs. John W. Stroh of Lakeshore road.

Recover Young Hendrie's Body

The body of 18-year-old George S. Hendrie, III, was recovered by St. Catharines, Ontario, Canada, firemen on Wednesday, August 18. Young Hendrie had been the objective of an intensive water and aerial search since Sunday, August 15, when he dove into the rapids of 12-Mile Creek in an attempt to assist a friend, who appeared to be in trouble. Hendrie is believed to have been pulled down into the water by the strong undertow.

The body was recovered just 75 feet north of the rapids. A trio of boys, who were boating, spotted the body and hailed the St. Catharines fire department boat, one of three boats

dragging and diving for the body. George was graduated from Grosse Pointe South High School this past June. He was an avid sailor and ice boater and a member of the South High School swim team and of a Detroit Boat Club crew. George crewed on Don Snyder's "Flying Jenny" and frequently sailed smaller boats

out of Crescent Sail Yacht Club.

The Senior Babe Ruth League, comprised of boys from 16 through 18 years of age, was organized in 1970. From a total of five teams, it

has grown to eight this year, giving 100 young men a chance to participate in the sport. The Woods-Shores Seniors won their laurels during the State Tournament held in Alpena, July 17 through July 20. The team traveled to Sedalia, Mo., to compete in the Central Sectional Tournament, July 30 through August 4, finishing in third place.

View From The Campus Reveals Climate Of Hope

William Clark Durant, III, senior class president of Tulane University's College of Arts and Sciences, was one of thousands of graduating college students who left behind last spring four years marked by unparalleled frustrations.

He shares with many students disappointments, as well as hopes, regarding the educational system and the direction of the country.

Yet he left Tulane with optimism—belief that administrators, faculty and students are fostering a better understanding of problems and grievances that have torn them apart.

"I'm not down on anyone," says the chairman of Tulane's Direction '71 program, an annual student-produced symposium which brings nationally prominent and controversial leaders to the campus to "rap" with students.

"There seems to be a retreat to understanding," he says of the relative calm this spring on campuses throughout the country. "There is a greater degree of openness. Students are being given more responsibility and less control."

Durant, who received a Bachelor of Arts degree in Economics during May 31 commencement exercises, says changes on campus during his four years have both good and bad overtones.

"There is a greater understanding that men and individuals must have more voice in their own lives," he says, reflecting on the good.

"But the greatest change is in the awareness among students of what is going on. Four years ago there was never any real concern for major issues facing the campus or the country. Now I believe there is a strong awareness."

He expresses disapproval of some students whom he feels accepted certain movements on campus without examining the reasons. "Many accepted and followed certain trends merely because they were noisy and new."

The 22-year-old graduate views Tulane's fourth annual Direction program, which was run entirely by students, as the type of innovation needed to make education more responsive to students. "It demonstrates the value and excitement of reasoned dialogue."

"The tragedy of the institution is that it exposes students only to textbook ideas, which are only a rehash of the original. Students never get exposure to the real world. They live a sheltered life." The Direction program, Durant avers, is one of the

most relevant educational programs on any college or university campus because it answers a cry among students for contact with decision-makers.

"It is an effective means to expose students to a multiplicity of views. It provides intimate exposure to some of the more prominent individuals in American life."

Among speakers in the Direction '71 program were syndicated columnist William F. Buckley; British conservative J. Enoch Powell; presidential hopeful Senator George McGovern; Dr. Clark Kerr, chairman of the Carnegie Commission on Higher Education; Cleveland Mayor Carl Stokes; Daniel P. Moynihan, former presidential adviser; and Seymour M. Hersh, Pulitzer Prize-winning author of "My Lai 4, A Report on the Massacre and Its Aftermath."

Under Durant's leadership, Direction '71 was expanded to include the "Direction Living-room," an idea he proposed to stimulate greater audience participation. In the informal atmosphere of the University Center, students sat on the floor and talked candidly with some of the most controversial figures of today.

Durant spent many hours during his senior year traveling throughout the country, talking and convincing national celebrities to come to Tulane. All major speakers in this year's spring symposium either said no or were hesitant to accept the first invitation. Durant pursued them, however, and swayed them to come.

"Ironically, the greatest reward was learning how to deal with defeat."

During his many visits to Washington to see Direction '71 speakers, Durant used every opportunity to talk frankly with congressmen about the causes of student unrest. He found them attentive to a student's viewpoint.

Durant leaves Tulane feeling that students universally have legitimate complaints about the educational system. But he feels strongly that problems can be hashed out through "less dramatic means" than those of the past.

"Problems of educational institutions are much deeper than evidenced by the dialogue," he observes. "The institution suffers from the fact that it is an institution. It doesn't enhance or stress the individual. It is a multiversity emphasizing only the mass."

Durant was one of three Tulane students who sat on a question panel during the taping of two of columnist William F. Buckley, Jr.'s "Firing Line" talk shows in New Orleans earlier this year.

Twenty-four Warrants Issued by Judge Speer

Public Schools in Focus

This is the time of year when the public's thoughts again focus on schools. September 7 will find more than 13,000 youngsters returning to classes in our public schools and once again the community's biggest business — in terms of budget and personnel employed — will again be in full swing.

Other sources since last year, Our proposed expenditures for 1971-72 are based on state aid revenue of \$96.76 per pupil, although the yet-to-be determined formula and impending legislation may "guarantee" a different amount. Some readers may recall that last spring we were planning on state aid of less than \$70 per pupil for 1971-72. The absence of a final state aid formula at this time should not be regarded as a major deterrent in financial planning. Many residents will remember our disastrous experience regarding state aid in 1970-71.

Although the formula and the "guarantee" were for a per pupil payment of \$141, the Governor's mid-winter edict resulted in payments of \$124, a loss of \$190,000 in funds already budgeted and committed — mostly for personnel under contract. The net loss in all types for state aid for the 1970-71 year was \$191,413.75. The original estimate was \$2,210,677 and a actual receipts were \$2,019,453.25.

Expecting the unexpected has, unfortunately, become a way of life in school finance. Another dramatic example of this occurred in July of 1970 when the Supreme Court required districts to furnish textbooks and supplies to all students. This decision cost our system an unexpected \$149,917.63 at a time when the 1970-71 budget had been virtually finalized.

One View From The Capitol
 Representative William R. Bryant, Jr.

Last week was one of total frustration for Republican attempts to balance the 1971-72 state budget. Manuevers by the Democrat Speaker, Bill Ryan, totally wasted two days by adjourning the House before the Social Services Bill could be debated and amendments voted on.

Republican amendments earlier had support of a majority of those present, but failed to get the 56 votes required for adoption. We had 53, 54 and even 55 votes for various amendments and we were certain some could be adopted by voting on them again.

Ryan apparently knew we had the votes so he adjourned the House until this week. We are trying to do two things with the Social Services budget, along with reducing it by \$12 Million. First is to refuse to adopt, at this time, a welfare report calling for greatly increased ADC benefits at a time when states must say "no" to increases to pressure Congress into Welfare Reform.

Over a period of many years, I have encountered people who think that a librarian sits at a desk and reads a book much of the time. Those of us in the profession have been trying to change this image as it is certainly not true. A librarian's day is full to the brim with many and varied professional duties; a great deal of these are done "behind the scenes" and so the patron is not aware of them. I'd like to devote this column to outlining some of those for you.

I'll start with the Processing Department, which works almost completely behind closed doors. Here we find book selection, the entire processing, or cataloging, of books and AV materials, the selection and ordering of periodicals, supervision of inventory, the disposition of gift books, and the choosing of memorial books. The clerical staff follows up on the rest of the work, so that we handle all phases "from publisher to public" of books, pamphlets and AV materials.

Have you ever watched a reference librarian at his desk on a busy day? He may be fielding telephone questions, referring them to the proper channels, answering them "on the spot," or writing down a research question to be done later, with a return call to the patron.

Next he may have a reader's advisory question from a patron in person. This means advice in selecting reading materials for the person in question. The advice he gives is based on his own reading experiences, book reviews he has read, and any knowledge he has of the interests of the man, woman or child who is asking for help.

Next the librarian may have a student with a class assignment which will require some instruction and aid. Many people are not used to using the public catalog, so explanations here are in order, as well as a bit of orientation as to how and where our books are helved. An indispensable help for periodicals, both to patron and librarian, is "Readers Guide to Periodical Literature."

Certain special collections and services need to be pointed out and interpreted to the user. Perhaps it's the college catalog collection, or the business services, or pamphlets in the pamphlet file, or the tool collection. Many ready reference books are kept near the librarian's desk so that he may, with his training, find the answers more readily, whether it is a telephone question or one in person. The entire reference collection, of course, is a boon to all of us.

Other services which you can't see are the preparation of non-book materials for the pamphlet file and the interloaning from other libraries of books which we do not have in our libraries, but which our borrowers have requested.

Let's not forget our Juvenile Department. Besides helping the small fry find the




