TWO STATE DEPART-MENT OF CORRECTIONS offices in San Francisco and Sacramento, Cal., were heavily damaged by bombs Saturday in what an underground group said was "one outraged response to the assassination of George Jackson." A third bomb wrecked the State Department of Rehabilitation office in San Mateo, Cal. Investigators said the Sat Mateo blast did not appear related to the seemingly coordinated attacks on the two prisons system offices. No one was injured in the three explosions.

Commerce Secretary Maurice H. Stans and Labor Secretary James D. Hodgson, both members of the Cost of Living Council set up by Mr. Nixon under his new economic policy, agreed that some sort of restrain on business profits was possible in the post-freeze period.

Project Okayed

The Grosse Pointe Park Council on Monday, August 23, approved the recommendation of City Manager, Robert Slone, to institute Phase I of the preventive maintenance work at the Pumping station, on Jefferson and Maryland. Phase I work will include inspection, testing and adjusting all the switch gears and installation of new mechanisms where necessary. This phase will cost the Park

\$5.179.

According to Mr. Slone this work will take care of everything except the big motors which will be part of Phase II. Work on Phase II will be-

gin next year. At that time one of the big motors will be removed, rewound, rebated and adjusted. Cost of work on each motor is estimated at \$14,000.

The pumping station was built in 1938 and remodeled in 1963. New pumps were added so at the present time, there are four storm water pumps with a capacity of 1.050 cubic feet per second. five dry weather pumps, with a capacity of 84 cubic fect per second. The old original pumps are the storm water pumps.

Mr. Sloane said this work is necessary to prevent any possible failure in the pumping operation which could possibly flood basements in the area during heavy rains.

Work will begin in about a week, according to Mr. Slone.

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Is This Law Necessary?

It's a beautiful, sunny afternoon. You're driving or riding a bike or walking down Lakeshore road and you decide that you'd like to sit by the lake for a while and relax, read a book, play guitar, or simply enjoy the scenery. Forget it . . . there's an ordinance that prohibits loitering, standing, fishing or swimming on the lake. You can always sit in your own back yard, or scrounge through your wallet or purse trying to find a park pass for a park that may be miles away, or you can just forget the whole idea and move on. After all, you can be glad you don't live in the inner city where there isn't a lake.

Despite the ordinance, however, more Pointers this summer have been trying to enjoy Grosse Pointe's Lake St. Clair shoreline, ignoring the signs that prohibit such "loitering," Maybe it's the ecology movement and the greater awareness people have of the diminishing "natural" earth or maybe it's because the parks have become too crowded and noisy, but more residents are enjoying the solitude of their lake.

The Grosse Pointe Farms and Shores police, however, are still enforcing the ordinance, driving up onto the shoreline onto the grass and warning loiterers to "move on."

The reasons behind the ordinance, according to Grosse Pointe Farms police, are threefold. First, and most important, is the safety factor. A concave breakwall separates the lake from the shoreline, making it difficult to climb if someone falls in. Also, in many places near the shoreline, the water is 11 feet deep or better.


Secondly, residents near the lake complain of people parking near their houses to get to the shore. And thirdly, there's a possible litter problem if people start sitting by the lake.

Admittedly, the safety problem is something to be reckoned with.
