GEORGE MEANY said Sunday that he was "quite sure" that trade unions would agree to a no-strike pledge if organized labor were given a part in setting up ground rules for future economic controls. But he indicated that there would be no such pledge if future controls were applied only by the federal government and the courts.

Tuesday, September 7 THE UNITED STATES has undergone a "baby bust" that presents the possibility of zero population growth and threatens to force a major reshaping of the economy, a new study shows. The "haby boom" of World War II has been replaced by the greatest decline in the nation's under five child population during the 120 years for which statistics have been kept, the 1970 census has revealed. The de-cline coincided with one of the largest recorded 10-year increases among young adults in the principal childbearing age range of 15 to 34.

32 Teachers Rehired

As of September 1, the net loss of teaching positions in the system stood at 82. Thirtytwo of the teachers dismissed in April have been rehired to fill resignations. This does not mean that 32 positions have been restored. Budget approval (including the millage renewal) will restore about 50 positions.

Because of confusion generated by President Nixon's wage-price freeze the Board of Education passed a resolution on August 30 indicating that funds which cannot be expended would be formally reserved for the 1972-73 operating budget. School officials said that they are in contact with the State Department of Education for a complete clarification of the local ramifications of the recent nationwide edict.

Partial Renewal

Although by law the ballot wording must use the term "increased," the 2 mill rate is a partial renewal of a 2.7 mill levy that has expired. The ballot question follows: Shall the limitation upon the total amount of taxes which may be assessed against all property in The Grosse Pointe Public School System, Wayne County, Michigan, be increased as prowided by the Constitution of Michigan, by two-(2) mills on each Dollar, (\$2.00 for each \$1,000.00) of the assessed valuation, as equalized, of all property in the School District, for a period of 3 years, for the years 1971 through 1973 inclusive, for the purpose of providing funds for operating expenses of the School District?


